PREPARATIONS BEING MADE FOR CONCLAVE

Been Discussed by the Car-

Rome, July 27.—The Vatican resembles an ant hill, so feverish is the work of preparing the part of the building set aside for the conclave. Before 1870, conclaves were held in the Quirinal Palace, one long wing of which was always ready without any special preparation, but in the case of the Vatican, apartments of three or four peoms for each cardinal have to be specially prepared, and as there are 64 englinals the amount of work involved is very great.

Ottawa, July 21st, 1963.

Your Excellency:—I beg you to convey to His Eminence the Cardinal Secretary of State the deep sense of sorrow which has been caused in this country by the death of His Holineas Pope Leo XIII. 

Associated Press correspondence dated Pekin, June 13th, says the growth of Japanese influence in China since the upheavel of 1940, has attracted little attention in Europe and America, largely because it has developed gradually. Nevertheless, it is one of the results of the campaign, which should be considered in connection with the future politics of the Far East. Moreover, there are indications that Japan is striking in every way to advance that influence with the Chinese government, and it is even broadly stated that her ultimate object is to strengthen her own position by attalliance withe Celestial Empire, using the argument that together both could resist the aggressions of the Western powers.

resist the aggressions of the Western powers.

Japan's meteroic rise since she began to adopt Western methods, a little more than a century age, has impressed many prominent Chinamen who are now fully awake to the helplessness of their country, which was so strikingly illustrated by the easy capture of their capital. As an Oriental people who understand the Chinese as no European people can, and as only the Asimie Russians can hope to do, the Japanese may be able to make headway in their undertaking.

It is certainly true, as the records of the Japanese legation here show, that a very large number of Japs have invaded Northern China, since the Boxer war. Not counting the Russians, they are perhaps equal in numbers to all the Europeans and Americans in Newchwang, Port Arthur and Dalny. There are over 1,300 at Tientsin, and more than 500 in Pekin.

To attain her political objects Japan's agents are trying to win the confidence of the more powerful Chinese officials, notably the progressive viceroys Chang Shi Tung and Yuan Shi Kai. They were warmly welcomed, and Japan sought to impress them with the community of interest between the two countries. 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
