Montreal, July 25.-According to Bissley cables, six Canadians were left in the final stage of the King's prize. They were:-

BODY OF POPE LEO CONSIGNED TO REST Scene at St. Peter's as Bier Was Removed in the Presence of Cardinals.

Rome, July 25.-On the stroke of midday, as the noon gun from the Castle of St. Angelo was fired, the lying in state of the body of Pope Leo XIII. came quietly to an end, and those few who still lingered at the gates of the Chapel of the Sacraments in St. Peter's were ordered to leave.

The body of Pope Leo was interred in St. Peter's to-night. The strokes of the hammer which resonated through the immense dome of the cathedral announced to the vast gathering in the nave that Leo XIII. had been laid to rest.

When the last supreme moment came the heavy coffin, weighing in all 1,322 pounds, were rolled out of the chapel, preceded by nine bearers and choir singing as they went, and followed by all the cardinals, among which the bowed figure of Gregorio, the stately upright Agnelli and the immense black-browed Stampa were the most conspicuous.

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A RACE WAR Lynching Band Encounter Negroes and Are Afterwards Fired on at Jail.

Danville, Ill., July 25.-A race war broke out here to-night. While a mob of 600 men was on its way to the county jail to lynch James Wilson, a Blooming-ton negro, who had confessed to assaulting Mrs. Thomas Burgess, wife of a farmer, J. W. Mayfield, a negro, shot and killed Henry Getterman, white, a member of the mob. The murderers were then lynched by the mob and three other negroes, who attacked the whites, were beaten badly.

JAPAN'S INFLUENCE IN CHINESE EMPIRE

She is Said to Be Gradually Strengthening Her Position With Celestial Empire.

Associated Press correspondence dated Peking, June 13th, says the growth of Japanese influence in China since the upheaval of 1900 has attracted little attention in Europe and America, largely because it has developed gradually.

It is certainly true, as the records of the Japanese legation here show, that a very large number of Japs have invaded Northern China, since the Boxer war.

Not counting the Russians, they are perhaps equal in numbers to all the Europeans and Americans in Newchwang.

Before the troubles they were a mere handful. To attain her political objects Japan's agents are trying to win the confidence of the more powerful Chinese officials, notably the progressive viceroys Chang Shi Tung and Yuan Shi Kai.

GOES TO SEATTLE

Saturday's Seattle Post-Intelligencer says: "The gold receipts for the United States assay office for the first five years following the establishment of the institution on July 15th, 1898, amounted to \$73,394,790.18, or materially in excess of \$14,000,000 a year."

The figures do not represent the total output of the districts named. Heavy consignments were made each year to San Francisco, Denver and Philadelphia, a considerable amount going also to New York.

—A general meeting of the King Edward Building Society will be held in Pioneer hall, Broad street, on Tuesday, August 4th, 1903, at 8 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of receiving the secretary's semi-annual report and for holding the second drawing for an appropriation.

—Yesterday afternoon an excursion party comprising about 427 people arrived from Seattle by the steamer Clallam, and spent a few hours in the city. The trip from all accounts was most enjoyable, the weather being all that could be desired. While here they made good use of their time taking in all points of interest.

—The hotel draft agreement proposed by Sir Thomas Sloughness will come before the city council this evening. It was informally considered last week and generally approved. It will doubtless be accepted to-night without any opposition. A couple of by-laws introduced last week will be advanced to stage, while among the other business will be the appointment of a fence viewer, Mr. Sorby, it is understood, having decided to decline the appointment.

—Campers on Saanich Inlet were yesterday treated to a somewhat unusual entertainment. A school of about six whales found their way to the head of the Inlet, and judging from their cries, spent a most enjoyable day in those placid waters. Evidently they were in a remarkably sportive mood, for at times they threw their entire bodies out of the water. This, however, interfered considerably with other sport, for fishermen after salmon having little luck from the time they made their appearance.

—On Saturday a meeting of the mineral committee of the B. C. Agriculture Association was held at the offices of Swinerton & Oddy, H. Mortimer Lamb was present and in a few words announced that the Mining Association was prepared to take over the preparation and management of an exhibit at the forthcoming fair. Messrs. Lamb and Spton were appointed a committee to work with the association. Another committee of one was appointed to meet the local Mining Association and ascertain how much space will be needed for the proposed exhibit.

—A large find of copper ore in the Klaskan Inlet, about twelve miles south of Quatsino Sound, has been discovered by a party of prospectors, consisting of Messrs. Ferguson, Pederson, Larson and Uiversand, according to news received by the Queen City. The ridge of iron capping is plainly visible over four claims from 8 to 20 feet wide. A large body of magnetic ore has also been found on the Ingersoll river, showing two claims. The ore assays 6 ounces in gold, and a very high percentage in iron. The Queen City also brings news to the effect that Mining Recorder Leeson has got 33 voters for the list on the Quatsino marsh. There will be nearly 50 when all are in.

—To-night will open one of the strongest bills of attraction which has been at the Edison for some time. The act entitled "Rubber Neck," by Rose and Severns, is without a doubt the most laughable sketch ever placed before the public. Madaon Lloyd, the well known dramatic soprano, will appear for one week only. W. P. Richardson will amuse all by an exhibition dance. The unstarred song, "Trust Him Not, the Fortuna Teller Said," will be rendered. Another feature of this lengthy programme and full evening's entertainment will be the moving pictures. Up-to-date surgery will be shown, and will cause both old and young to laugh.

—At the usual propaganda meeting of the Socialist party, held in Labor hall last evening, an interesting address was delivered by Mrs. G. Weston Wrigley on "Social Contrasts." The speaker showed how one-half of society did not know how the other half lived, and told how fully \$10,000,000 of American money, representing the sweat and toil of men, women and children in the working class ranks, go to Europe as dividends on stocks and interest on bonds held by the nobility and aristocracy of the old world. The speaker contrasted the fads of the "smart set," of the society ladies of the East who are imitating the fads that have been introduced in London and Paris, of having diamond rings upon their toes, and of the manuring of pet poodles, with the other side where in New York city alone 20,000 children are at work, old at 17, with their lives practically over at 40. And the pity of it is that not necessity, but greed—pitiless, grasping, selfish greed—is the source of this lamentable condition. Socialism, she said, came to abolish these contrasts, and all workers were called upon to act together in unity, for the substitution of a co-operative system of production whereby the worker will receive the full product of his toil and the "smart set," with other non-producers, will be compelled to work or starve.

# VICTORIA FIRMS WORKING ON FERRY

## IN ORDER TO HASTEN SHIP'S COMPLETION

Will Be Running in Mid-August—Eva Marie Abandons Behring Sea Cruise—Notes.

In regard to the vessel may enter service before all the fine weather is gone this season, the C. P. R. Company is pushing the work on the new ferry steamer Princess, Victoria with all possible dispatch. Asked this morning when the steamer is likely to begin service, Captain Troup replied that it would likely be about the middle of August. He said that the company were doing all possible, and towards this end had Victoria as well as Vancouver firms working on the ship. Weller Brothers and Muirhead & Mann had all their available forces directed on the undertaking, so that local business men were enjoying a share of the patronage of the company in the completion of the steamer.

The Captain started in reply to questions in regard to when the company proposed starting building operations on their property across James Bay, that nothing would be done in the way of permanent improvements until after the harbor has been dredged to a sufficient depth to admit of their new steamer ferry entering and leaving port with ease at all stages of the tide. This was a matter to which he has already directed the attention of the Board of Trade, and hopes that in the near future something will be done along this line. He has had plans prepared for the new wharf and offices which it is proposed to erect on the property mentioned, and these have been submitted to the headquarters at Montreal, but he added that company would not feel warranted in going to a big expenditure until something was done to make the harbor of sufficient depth to accommodate the company's new steamer.

## WILL REDUCE RATES.

Attopos of the Pacific Coast Steamship Company's intention to build more steamers for their coast business a San Francisco says: "Four new steamers are to be added to the Pacific Coast Steamship Company's fleet, to be used on the coast as freighters. With the completion of the steamers a reduction of freight rates will be made, and the competing steam schooners now plying on the coast may find it hard to get cargoes."

The new steamers are to be 240 feet in length, and will have a capacity of 1,500 tons of freight each. They will have limited passenger accommodations and will be adapted to any of the coast runs. The increase in the freight business on the coast has caused the company to decide to augment its fleet. General Manager J. F. Lawless, in speaking of the reasons for building the four steamers, said: "For a long time we have felt the necessity for several freight carriers. At first it was decided to build two, but later four steamers were deemed necessary. The vessels will carry general freight, and will be conducted so that lumber and heavy machinery may be carried on deck.

"The vessels will be operated more cheaply than the passenger steamers now running on the coast, and shippers may hope for lower freight rates. The high draft of the steamers will enable them to enter any of the ports on the coast. The plans for the steamers are now being drawn up, and bids will soon be called for. The vessels will burn coal as fuel."

## TEES FROM NORTH.

The steamer Tees arrived yesterday from northern British Columbia ports with a number of passengers from the upper Skeena, brought down that river by the Hazelton on her return from the first voyage she had made since leaving the Skeena. The water in the river, which was not navigable a month ago, because of the annual spring freshet carrying too many logs and other dangers down stream, is now safe for steamers to make the trip to Hazelton, and the little vessel of that name, as well as the Mount Royal, were preparing to sail on the day the Tees reached Port Simpson from Victoria. On the arrival of the C. P. R. steamer yesterday, there were a number of arrivals from the upper Skeena, and over half a hundred people made the passage south. Among the number were Miss Tomlinson, William Hunter, J. Cameron, D. A. Williams, Mrs. Willisford and family, Mrs. McKenzie, R. Frayme, C. A. G. Robins, W. Estelle, Mr. Busby, W. Shack, Mr. and Mrs. Fraser, Miss Sherwood, Miss Kincade, Miss Elliott, Miss Keris, Captain Nowell, James Ferguson, James Morris and D. Ross.

According to information brought by the Tees there has been no important improvement in the salmon fishing conditions of the north on those previously reported. The run on the run is still short, with a total pack not exceeding half of that put up by this time last year. At Rivers Inlet the catch is fair.

PROVINCIAL NEWS.

FERDIE. Nearly a dozen of the new coke ovens are now ready for use, and it is expected that they will be burning coke inside of a couple of weeks.

CRANBROOK.

Senator Turner, of Spokane, in response to a query by the editor of the Cranbrook Herald, as to what effect the lead bounty would have on the Sullivan group, telegraphed: "Proposed bonus will enable Sullivan company to start mine immediately and to complete the smelter this season, Geo. Turner."

REVELSTOCK.

The Pingston Creek Co., Ltd., is the latest corporation formed to engage in the ever-increasing lumber industry in the vicinity of Revelstoke. Its officers are: Thomas Kilpatrick, president; J. M. Doyle, Frank McArthur, P. Agnew and J. A. Kirk. Mr. Kirk will act as managing director. The company has secured several valuable timber limits in the vicinity of Arrow Lake and will at once proceed to erect a mill of 20,000 feet capacity, at the mouth of Pingston creek, which runs into the lake from the west about 17 miles south of Arrowhead. Ample water power has been secured for operating the machinery and construction work will be pushed. The mill will begin cutting some time in August.

GRAND FORKS.

A big financial deal was closed here this week, when A. C. Flumerfelt, a director of the Eastern Lumber Bank and assistant to President S. H. C. Miner of the Grand Consolidated, and H. N. Galer, assistant general manager of the Grand Consolidated, acquired a two-thirds interest in the Grand Forks Investment & Trust Co. Lloyd A. Manly, the founder and organizer of the company, will retain a third interest. The name will be changed on August 20th to that of the British American Trust Company. The capital will be very considerably increased, but the amount has not yet been determined. It will, however, be sufficiently large to enable the company to extend its operations to Manitoba, the Canadian Northwest and the State of Washington, where branches will be opened. The new officers are as follows: President, A. C. Flumerfelt; vice-president, Lloyd A. Manly; managing director, H. N. Galer.

ROSSLAND.

John A. Finch, the Spokane millionaire mine owner and operator, is in the city for the purpose of examining the Jumbo mine. Mr. Finch came in last night, and will be here until Sunday, which is a somewhat longer stay than he has made in Rossland for a considerable period. His mission is exclusively in connection with the Jumbo, and interesting developments are being coming as the outcome of his inspection. The recent lead mine in Canada or on the continent, St. Eugene, is to join the shipping list in the immediate future, as the outcome of the passage of the federal bounty on Canadian lead. This statement emanates from J. C. Dreyer, one of the directors, and James Cronin, manager. Mr. Dreyer arrived in Rossland yesterday and will be here some days at least. In the course of his trip East he concluded important business in connection with valuable Alberta coal lands. The announcement as to the St. Eugene settles conclusively the question as to the effect of the bonus.

Shipments for the week ending July 25th are larger than usual. Le Roi, making up for the light output of the previous week. The details are: Le Roi, 4,800; Centre Star, 1,920; War Eagle, 1,200; Kootenay, 351; Le Roi No. 2, 540; Velvet, 20; Giant, 23; Jumbo, 108; total for the week, 8,162; total for the year to date, 28,152 tons.

The Velvet consignment this month is the last for a considerable period. Le Roi is now over the hundred thousand ton mark, and Centre Star, close to the fifty thousand ton for the year to date.

Much interest is manifested in the resumption of work at the Great Western, and the examination now proceeding at the Homestake.

KAMLOOPS. The inquest into the circumstances surrounding the deaths of Colin MacEwan and John Russell, killed by the falling of the bridge at Carlu on Monday, has been concluded. Mr. Pinkham, of Revelstoke, attended the inquest in the interests of the Columbia River Lumber Company. A number of witnesses were examined, including General Manager M. Carlin and Foreman J. Rutman, who was in charge of the work of repairing the bridge, and who was on the bridge at the time it fell. Merrill, another of the men engaged in the repair work, testified that the jack screw employed in propping up the beam, flew out of its place and immediately that happened the bridge

collapsed. After hearing the evidence the jury brought in a verdict of accidental death, declaring that no blame attached to anyone. The bridge which collapsed was a trestle built in 1901, according to plans furnished by Mr. Kilpatrick, at that time C. P. R. bridge superintendent, under the direct supervision of a C. P. R. bridge foreman with a gang of bridge carpenters. The dimensions of the bridge were: Length at top, 40 feet; width at top, 12 feet; width at bottom, 64 feet; height, 154 feet.

NELSON.

Nelson may have a rush equal to the Poplar creek excitement if recent discoveries on the Juno mine are followed by similar strikes in the vicinity. The free gold belt extending west from Nelson for ten miles or thereabouts undoubtedly has rich veins that have not been discovered. The lodes that supplied Forty-Nine and Rover creeks with the thousands of dollars washed out thirty years ago or more by the arguments of California and in later years by hydraulic companies and Chinese miners, have never been located, nor have the frequent finds of wonderfully rich free gold float in various creeks draining the belt in question been accounted for by the discovery of the parent lodes.

A very pretty wedding took place yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the residence of J. J. Walker, Carbonate street. The contracting parties were John Conrad Thelin and Miss Emma Sophia Betcher, both of Nelson. The ceremony was performed by Rev. John Reid, pastor of Emmanuel Congregational church. The bridesmaids were: Miss Ruth Thelin, white organdy dress, trimmed with silk applique and carnations, with a bridal veil over all, and carried a magnificent bouquet of roses, carnations and lilies. Miss Ruth Thelin was bridesmaid, and was attired in a cream silk dress, trimmed with D'Ospelt lace and silk Battenberg. The bride was given away by Gus Erickson.

THE FRANCHISE.

To the Editor—As the present is an interesting time for electors, I will endeavor, if nobody else does, to reply to the question of your correspondent "L," as to the political franchise—whether it is a "privilege" or an inherent "right." He does not state his question well. For the word "privilege" commonly has no particular application to some "right" conferred, but, assuming his question to be really, whether the franchise is the creation of law established by determining superior, or, on the other hand, a so-called "right," resting upon the laws of God or Nature, or upon laws which are sanctioned morally, the answer may be given, without hesitation, that the electoral right, in the British and other leading nations having more or less popular governments, is a right derived from positive law in the enactments from time to time made by the sovereign or supreme body, whatever it may be, which is charged with the duty of legislation. This is the modern theory and practice. Though attempts were made at different periods of our history to show that the elective franchise was a common law right possessed by classes variously described. The law creates, extends, narrows, or annuls the right of election in the Old Country the sovereign, or supreme body, consists of the King, Lords and Commons—the latter term signifying, strictly, not the House of Commons, which is a temporary body with delegated sufficient powers during the term of its appointment, but the electors, who share, permanently, the sovereignty with the King and the Lords. It is the same here, under our somewhat differing constitution, and the fact surely ought to impress upon the electors the dignity and responsibility of their position, which many, it is said, fail to appreciate.

It follows from the above that the occupiers of an uninhabited island (a case mentioned by your correspondent) would not possess the elective franchise until the law gave it to them, but they would have certain undoubted rights and privileges common to all British subjects. Practically the Crown in the expedient, temporary exercise of its executive authority, would establish some kind of government, pending the action of parliament, as the Crown did in the case of British Columbia. This also is what the United States does. For instance last month the President appointed a governor of the uninhabited Midway Islands where a cable station is to be established, perhaps the nucleus of a colony. It will be for congress to prescribe the form of government, and I shall be surprised if it includes any elective franchise. May I add, reminiscently, that during the Crimean war, about fifty years ago, I was "had up" before the tax commissioners at Somerset House, London, for refusing to pay income tax, on the ground that not being eligible for the franchise, I was taxed without being represented in parliament. I was making a lovely speech, but the old gentleman pulled me up before I had got far down the sea from Edward the First, and said I must pay. Your correspondent "L" seems to be much in the same state of mind that I was then in.

G. M. SPROAT.

Henry Shatz, a carpenter of Soderlorn, Pa., was picked up unconscious alongside the tracks of the Reading railway in Philadelphia. He was unconscious and had evidently been struck by a train. While a police patrol wagon was crossing to a hospital with the injured man it was struck by a trolley car. The force of the collision killed Shatz. The driver of the wagon and two policemen were severely injured.

Rev. Dr. John O. Rust, of Nashville, Tenn., who received a call to the pastorate of the First Baptist church, Seattle, some time ago, has wired to the trustees of the society his acceptance of the call. The message states that a letter will follow immediately. He comes here from Nashville, where he was pronounced by competent judges the best preacher in the South.

Prof. Albert Schmidt, of Toronto, was on Saturday acquitted in the United States district court at Detroit of the charge of smuggling \$5,000 worth of jewellery and precious stones into this country from Canada. Schmidt was arrested soon after his arrival in Detroit with Miss Sara Crawford, also of Toronto, and the couple will be married here to-morrow, it is said.

VICTORIA AS A RESIDENTIAL CITY

PROF. SHORTT ON SOME OF ITS ADVANTAGES

Affords an Attractive Centre for the Tourist—The English Element in British Columbia.

Prof. Shortt, writing to the Toronto News, says: British Columbia is not at present one of the special objective points of the great Western migration. But, though in some respects it may not appear to be the outside world, and in others may not be in reality as prosperous as it was during the mining boom, yet outside of the industries which are crippled by strikes, there is little evidence of stagnation in the coast cities and towns.

The Position of Victoria. Its more ancient rivals, Victoria and New Westminster, though distanced in the race for supremacy, are, nevertheless, making substantial progress.

The English Element. A prominent social feature of British Columbia, and more particularly of Victoria, is its English element.

Large Hotel Projected. Arrangements appear to be nearly completed between the city and the U. P. R. for the building of a large modern hotel, adapted to a constituency similar to that which delights in the Chateau Frontenac at Quebec.

The Englishman's Attitude. The Englishman himself is not in the slightest disturbed by the adverse criticisms which are passed upon him.

Tourist Travel. Though Victoria with its large English element and relative repose may not be so progressive in a business way as some of its rivals, yet it has considerable promise of a prosperous and distinctive future well suited to its social and physical attractions.

People of wealth and leisure, so rapidly increasing in numbers on this continent, are finding that it is possible to escape the climatic rigors which at once or another season of the year afflict most places in America.

Physical Attractions. Realizing the economic importance of this new line of industries, those localities which possess the most promising resources on which it depends are beginning to develop them.

It only remains for the people of British Columbia to increase the number of visitors and prolong their stay in the province.

The annual hunters' picnic was held yesterday at Langford Plains, there being an attendance of about one hundred. The Sports of different kinds had been prepared for the occasion, and the day passed very pleasantly.

One of the Chinese aboard the Indramasari when she was at the outer wharf last week has not been allowed to land at Portland. He speaks English fluently, and claims to have lived in Seattle until a few months ago.

The bureau of statistics show that American exports to China for the fiscal year, 1903, exceed \$19,000,000. Including exports to Hongkong and English possessions they exceed \$27,000,000 as against \$8,000,000 10 years ago.
