New York, April 17.—Oscar Hammerstein and his son Arthur are restrained from producing either comic or grand operas in Boston and New York until April 26, 1920, according to a decision of the appellate court to-day. The complaint against Hammerstein was filed by the Metropolitan Opera company, and stated that Hammerstein agreed not to produce operas in Boston or New York for ten years if the Metropolitan would purchase Hammerstein's Philadelphia opera house for \$1,400,000.

London, April 17.—General Sir George Digby Barker, G. C. B., is dead at the age of eighty. He was the first man to enter the breach at Lucknow in the Indian Mutiny of 1857.

WHITE IS MAN FRIDAY OF PRIVILEGED CLASS

Budget Speech Built on Explanations and Apologies of Finance Minister

Ottawa, April 18.—All his life Hon. W. T. White, minister of finance in the Borden government, has been the servant of the big interests. From the time when he entered as a young man into the employ of large corporate concerns he has been the Man Friday of the privileged classes. So long as Mr. White served them in his private capacity and placed his talents at their disposal for a stated remuneration, little exception could be taken to his course. But when Mr. W. T. White, manager of trust companies and other concerns, became Hon. W. T. White, custodian of the public treasury of the people of Canada, his responsibilities became far more extensive and his obligations were transferred to a larger and more cosmopolitan clientele. Mr. White became the trusted servant of his country and its citizenship. His efforts should have been transferred wholeheartedly and unreservedly to the advancement of the general public welfare.

How has Hon. W. T. White carried out his great trust? He has had grave and serious responsibilities. Synchronizing with the advent of the Borden government the period of good times and prosperity which characterized the progress and development of Canada under the Laurier regime came suddenly to an end. Money stringency, increased cost of living, unemployment, and the keen and bitter bite of hard times came upon the Dominion. Mr. White argues that the Borden government was not to blame for this. He ascribes it all to the phenomena of recurring economic cycles—whatever they may actually mean—and talked learnedly about them. His budget speech was full of explanation, and apologies.

But progressive and virile Canadians, eager for the well-being of the country and its citizenship, anxious to see early betterment of conditions, keen for Canada to renew her onward march on the Laurier lines of progress and prosperity, expected more than explanations and apologies from the man who had been entrusted with the economic reins. They looked for Canadian-like, for action. They looked for the enunciation of a strong progressive policy along lines of betterment by a man whose talents and energies were presumably consecrated, for the time being, to their service.

The confidence of Canadians has been misplaced. Hon. W. T. White, minister of finance, is still the Man Friday of the privileged big interests. His thought is still for them. His endeavor is still for their aggrandisement. Toward the common people, the holders of wood and drawers of water, the working Canadians, he evinces no responsibility and no concern. He makes no move to help them. He anticipates no legislation to better their condition. He has no inspiring message to encourage them to renewed endeavor. Hon. Mr. White still serves exclusively the protected and privileged classes. His is a manufacturer's budget.

J. G. Turritt, the out-spoken Liberal from the new western province of Saskatchewan, pointed out to parliament where Mr. White had erred in seeking to serve one class at the expense of the others.

"The way to help the manufacturers," Mr. Turritt told Mr. White, "is to do all that we can to make prosperous the farmers and other citizens of Canada. Put the farmer in a position to get value for his product and he will keep the factories busy. But as long as you keep him from getting value so long will you keep him poor and the factories will run on half-time while the manufacturers come to the minister of finance for more protection. You cannot remove depression by increasing the burdens on the people by means of tariffs. If you want to help the manufacturer, then put money in the pockets of the people, and the manufacturer will have a rich market at home."

It was a realization of the sound economic good sense and splendid national results resultant from the practice of this doctrine of national co-operation and national camaraderie which enabled the Liberal regime under Sir Wilfrid Laurier to be one

ALBERTA LUMBER MILL AT VANCOUVER BURNT

Wind-Fanned Flames Consume Property Worth Quarter Million Dollars

Vancouver, April 18.—Damage, estimated at about a quarter of a million was done last night and early this morning by a fire which broke out in the lumber mill of the Alberta Lumber company on the south side of False creek, half a dozen blocks west of the Connaught bridge on First avenue. The outbreak was discovered by the night watchman shortly before midnight, and the alarm was promptly turned in.

A strong wind from the east fanned the flames in the direction of the vast piles of timber that were stacked in the yards of the company. The fortunate circumstances in connection with this was that the wind was blowing in the direction of the water, a fact which facilitated the firemen in their endeavors to cope with the flames.

As it was the task before them was an immense one. The saving of the premises, which included the mill proper with the boiler house, was out of the question and the attention of the firemen was directed solely to keeping the outbreak within a certain area.

It was this problem that confronted Chief Carlisle and his men at times. To minimize the risk of an explosion the safety valve of the boiler was opened and the hissing of the escaping steam could be heard as far as the Connaught bridge. So fierce did the fire become that there was a general stampede to places of safety by the thousands who had gathered to watch the progress of events.

IMMIGRATION DROPS OFF FOUR PER CENT

Ottawa, April 18.—The total immigration to Canada during the fiscal year ending March 31, 1914, was 384,867, made up of 142,622 British, 107,530 Americans and 134,715 from all other countries. During the fiscal year, ended March 31, 1913, the total number was 402,432, composed of 150,542 British, 133,009 Americans and 117,881 from all other countries. The decrease is 4 per cent.

SHIPBUILDING.

In his illuminating address before the board of trade yesterday the Attorney-General alluded encouragingly to the prospects of the growth of the shipbuilding industry on this coast.

We have no doubt that these obstacles will disappear in time. They are not peculiar to British Columbia but to all that part of the west now in the early stages of development.

But the government if it wishes can overcome many of the handicaps in the path of the shipbuilding industry in a number of ways.

We are not trying to make political capital out of this situation; but we believe everyone will appreciate the advantage that would accrue to shipbuilding here if the federal government appropriated a million or so a year for the construction of ships in our waters as part of a national programme.

Aid of this character would give the industry a long start. The shipbuilding industries of other countries have been advanced very substantially in this way.

"HOPE DEFERRED," ETC.

Now it is the big drydock at Esquimalt that is to be commenced immediately and "rushed to completion." We hope it will be, because although we have been told that Conservative rule "synchronises" with prosperity, times in British Columbia, and indeed in all parts of Canada, are none too good at the present time, and any work that promises employment would be very welcome.

LAWLESSNESS AT NANAIMO.

We have a letter from a correspondent suggesting that the late murderous attack upon three coal miners in the neighborhood of Nanaimo was conceived or carried out by the provincial police. The writer insinuates that as comparative tranquility has been restored in the lately disturbed area, that the police fear the loss of their jobs and are countenancing or perpetrating assaults in order to convince the authorities of the necessity of maintaining the strength of the force.

The conditions are unfortunate, but they are not likely to be improved, so far as the union men are concerned, by assaults upon workers who are exercising their individual rights in accepting the terms of the companies and earning their livelihood under conditions which to them are satisfactory.

PREPARE FOR THE INFLUX.

We are at one with the Attorney-General in the warning note sounded in his speech before the board of trade yesterday relative to the necessity of preparations to meet the conditions that will arise on this coast with the opening of the Panama canal.

Not only the government but the municipalities should take precautionary measures, and in this connection the suggestions of Mr. Shallcross in his recent address on the laying out of a city have special application. We must take the most pronounced steps to prevent the growth of slums.

FATE OF THE EARL GREY RIFLES.

The Earl Grey Rifles was an ambitious militia corps organized at Prince Rupert. We speak of it in the past tense, because it no longer exists. It was disbanded on instructions from Ottawa for various reasons—lack of funds, the contemplated organization of another corps, etc.

New Zealanders in common with Australians resent the suggestion in the recent speech of the First Lord of the Admiralty that they should look to Japan for protection on the strength of the Anglo-Japanese alliance.

Another healthy tug. 'Arrooo, a feesh!' he called, without moving. His wife came, hauled in the line and removed a three-pounder from the hook, after which she rebaited and cast the line back into the stream. The Indian resumed his slumber."

EXPECT FOUR LINERS IN PORT NEXT WEEK

NIAGARA WILL BRING 600 PASSENGERS

BAD GALES BOTHER WHALING STEAMERS

Yokohama Maru Was Spoken Last Night; Empress and Architect Coming

For a brief period early this morning the operator at Estevan was in communication by wireless with the inbound Nippon Yusen Kaisha liner Yokohama Maru, Capt. Washi, but did not receive the ship's position. At 2:15 o'clock the coast station picked up the calls of Japanese liner far out at sea, but owing to thick weather no observation was taken yesterday, and the operator on board said that he would flash the Yokohama's position later. The Maru is due to arrive here next Wednesday from Hongkong, Shanghai and Yokohama—she has several hundred tons of freight to put off here and many Japanese passengers will disembark.

There is expected to be a little more business along the waterfront during the coming week than has been done for some weeks past. Shipping has reached a low ebb of late, about one or two deep-water ships coming in every seven days. This week four big vessels are due in. Besides the Yokohama Maru the Empress of India, Capt. Halley, is expected in on Wednesday from the Far East, and the following day the Harrison direct liner Architect, Capt. Neilson, is looked for from the United Kingdom. The Architect has 500 tons of cargo to work at this pier, she is now berthed at San Francisco, discharging cargo, and the agents here expect that she will leave for Victoria on Monday afternoon.

It is just possible that the Hamburg-America steamship Sudmark, first of this fleet's trans-Pacific vessels to call at this port, will steam into port from Hamburg and other European ports via the Orient towards the end of the week. The big ship has 500 tons of cargo to discharge here; part of which is from the Saxonia, which ran ashore off Shanghai during a dense fog, and was so seriously damaged that she had to be withdrawn from service.

On Tuesday afternoon next the Nippon liner Sado Maru, Capt. Asakawa, leaves for the Orient with a full cargo of freight and a good list of passengers.

Fast Australian Liner Left Auckland Day Late; Expected Here on Time

Although she cleared from Auckland, N. Z., one day behind her schedule time for departure, it is not expected that the big Canadian-Australian liner Niagara, Capt. Morrisby, will be late arriving at this port. She is now driving along on the leg of her voyage between Suva and Honolulu, and it is most likely that she will reach William Head one week from next Tuesday. The Niagara is capable of making 18 knots, so

Vessels Report Nasty Weather Off Coast; Prevented From Hunting

TATOOSH NOT OVERDUE; INCORRECTLY REPORTED

Seattle, April 18.—The Puget Sound Tugboat company, owners of the tug Tatoosh, which was reported in a cable dispatch from Valdez, Alaska, as overdue there, says that the tug is not due at Valdez until tomorrow, and that no alarm is felt for her safety. On April 10, when she was incorrectly reported sighted off Cape St. Elias, she was just leaving Ketchikan, and hence could not have been caught in the gales of that day. The Tatoosh is towing the once noted clipper ship America, now dismantled and turned into a barge. There are forty carpenters on the America, bound for the Granby Mining & Smelting company's plant.

REPAIRS AT NAGASAKI

A report from Nagasaki, Japan, says that the Hamburg-American steamship Saxonia, which met with a bad accident near Shanghai a month ago, has reached there to have repairs made. She was towed there by the salvage boat Ojira Maru. The Saxonia will have permanent repairs made in Japan and when they are completed it is believed that she will be placed on the charter market for a cargo to Europe, and upon arrival there will re-enter the Hamburg-Victoria service.

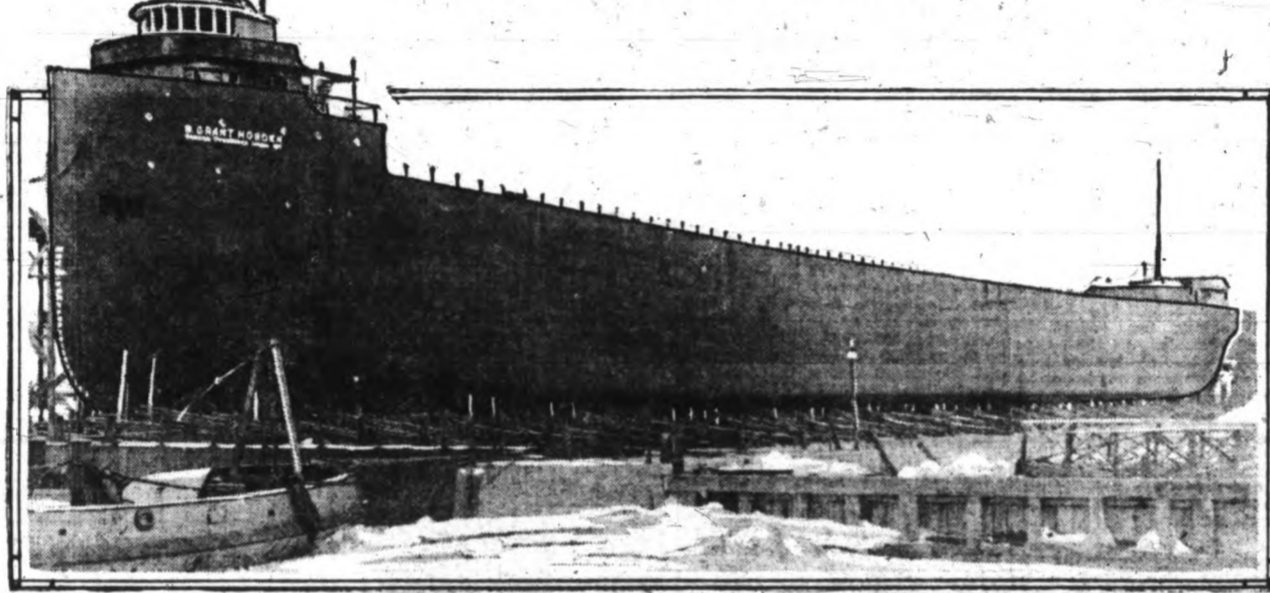

Largest Steamship Afloat on Fresh Water

routes. The Great Lakes are the home of many huge freight vessels, ranging from 400 feet to 500 feet in length, and capable of handling tremendous cargoes. The keel of the Grant was laid early last summer and the great hull has been put together in smart time by the builders.

This huge freighter has room for 555,000 bushels of oats, or approximately 20 trains of 30 cars each. She is 425 feet long 50 feet beam and 32 feet deep, with a water bottom and side tank 5 1/2 feet extending from the keel up to the main deck. She is divided into 15 watertight compartments, which may

be flooded or pumped out individually, as conditions may require. The cargo hold, extending 436 feet, is divided into six compartments by five solid steel bulkheads, entrance to which will be gained by 35 steel hatches opening from the spar deck.

RITCHIE EASILY DEFEATS MURPHY

Davies, May Receive Championship Belt; the World's Champion Was Winner in Twenty-Round Bout

At Davies and Scotty McKay returned to the city from their invasion of the Vancouver mitt artists, each carrying a trophy beneath his arm. While McKay was seeking three titles he managed to lift the 155 pound B. C. title in easy manner, Hall, of the V. A. C. defaulting to him, while in the 145-pound finale, Scotty fought Morrison of the V. A. C. with a broken hand, and lost the decision at the end of three rounds.

Al Davies was the star of the entire tourney. The manner in which he defeated Len Holliday two nights ago amazed the Vancouver enthusiasts, and greatly impressed Blackburn of the V. A. C. who refused to meet the Victoria 160. Davies was awarded the trophy. Davies may also receive a handsome belt offered for the best boxer participating in the championship battles.

Scott Cropper states that he will be only too glad to give Jack Larkigan a return fight, and that the party will battle at the next V. L. A. A. tourney. Scotty McKay would undoubtedly have lifted two trophies had he not participated in a battle with Athens, a heavy-weight. In that bout he broke his thumb, and was forced to fight Morrison with one hand. The night previous Scotty had defeated Morrison with ease in the 155-pound division.

FULLERTON TWIRLS IN BRILLIANT STYLE

Seattle, April 18.—Fullerton held Portland to one hit yesterday while Seattle knocked Callahan out of the box in the second inning, winning the game 3 to 0. Broome, who relieved Callahan, held the locals to four scattered hits during the rest of the game. Killilay's fielding and hitting were features.

REMARKED ON THE SIDE

Where Amateur Boxing Rule is Faulty. One of the peculiar rules with which the Amateur Athletic union governs its amateur boxing contests is that which says that a contestant, when groggy, must be sent to his corner and given a minute to revive. In other words a knock-down ends the round, but the boxer must continue at the expiration of a minute. An instance has been cited of a tourney in Toronto where one competitor was knocked out three times, namely coming back after he had been put away on the first two occasions. Under the Marquis of Queensbury rules a boxer, when he is unable to rise in ten seconds, forfeits the bout. The fight fans are firm in the belief that the pros have the better method of handling a bout in which one boxer is superior to the other and eastern authorities are talking steps to have the rule changed so that a boxer will not be allowed to continue after having been knocked out. In other words, but ten seconds will be given a boxer to revive instead of a minute as allowed at present.

San Francisco, April 18.—There was no dispute to-day among sporting writers and ring-side experts that Willie Ritchie holds rightfully his title of lightweight champion of the world. His defeat last night of "Harlem Tommy" Murphy, of New York, at the end of twenty rounds, in one of the most trying fights any champion ever weathered was conclusive. Ritchie won all the way and from every angle. At the same time Murphy, who never has been a boxer to win much applause in a short distance bout, displayed again that he is a tireless, indomitable rooster, never flinching under punishment, and always ready to come back with as much as he takes.

Except for Murphy's admirable courage and increasing ability to assimilate punishment, the fight was uninteresting. There was but one round that could be called his by the utmost exercise of charity. Nevertheless, at each time he seemed about to submit to the steady fusillade of straight lefts to the face and cruel right, and left ribs to the body, he was always able to raise the crowd to its feet with a hiss of fighting spirit.

So far as his own fortunes went, the trouble was that most of his short arm jolts were blocked, and the remainder carried no punishing power. The champion was often discouraged by his inability to put his opponent out, but never in distress. In the closing rounds, Ritchie stalked warily around his man, measuring him with his left and crashing in from every angle blows that seemed as if they might have felled an ox. Murphy took them, staggered, shook his head and bowed in for more.

There was not a clean knock-down. Murphy was pounded through the ropes in the last round, but finished fighting strong, though hopelessly worsted. There was no protest on his face when the referee raised Ritchie's arm in token of victory.

BIRMINGHAM HURT.

Chicago, April 18.—Examination of the injury to Joe Birmingham, manager of the Cleveland American league team, confirmed fears that he was hurt internally in Wednesday's game. According to the physician of the Chicago Americans, the Cleveland leader is likely to be out of the game for the remainder of the season.

CLEVELAND WELL REPRESENTED

Boston, Mass., April 18.—Cleveland boxers will figure largely in the final rounds of the annual American boxing championships to-night. Of the survivors from the field of 110 in last night's preliminary bouts, seven are Cleveland. Four boxers each from New York and Toronto will appear in the finals.

Orme, the challenger, was from London, about Broome's age, and somewhat smaller in height and weight. The ring was pitched in a field in the country near London. Among the 2,000 spectators who had traveled to the battleground on a special train, Broome was the favorite, but soon after the scrap began it was evident that the champion had met a fighter worthy of his mettle. Tom Sayers, himself destined to become champion a few years later, was Orme's second. For 25 rounds it was give and take, with neither man having a decided advantage, but after that Broome's superior stamina began to tell, and when Orme tottered to the mark in the 31st round it needed but a tap to drop him, whereupon Sayers tossed in the sponge.

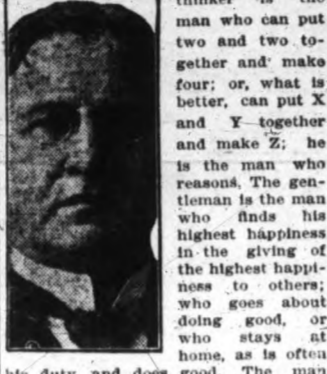

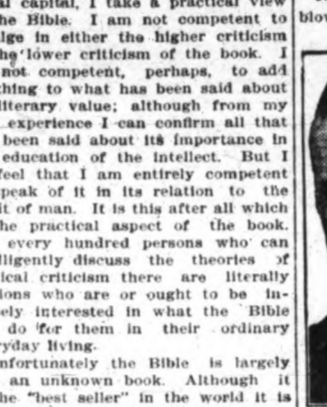

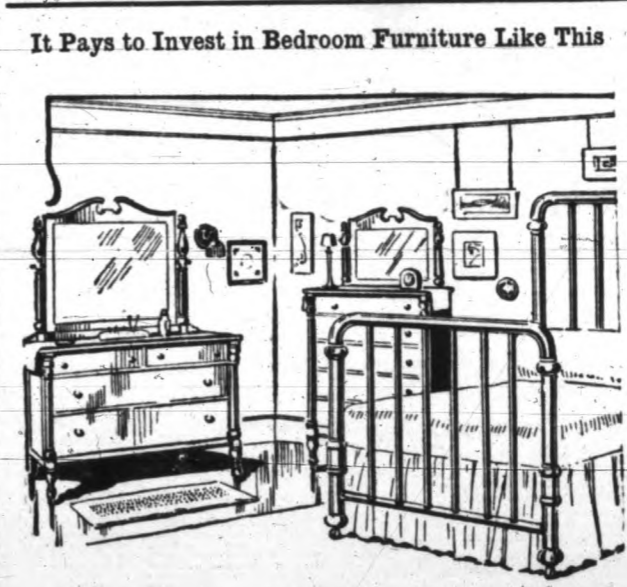
The members of the committee regretted that there was not some general agreement which would have guided them in the action they will have to take in recommending a day to the council, but promised that their best consideration would be given to the matter.

Dripping of Oil and Gasoline is Causing Disintegration of Asphalt, City Engineer Reports.

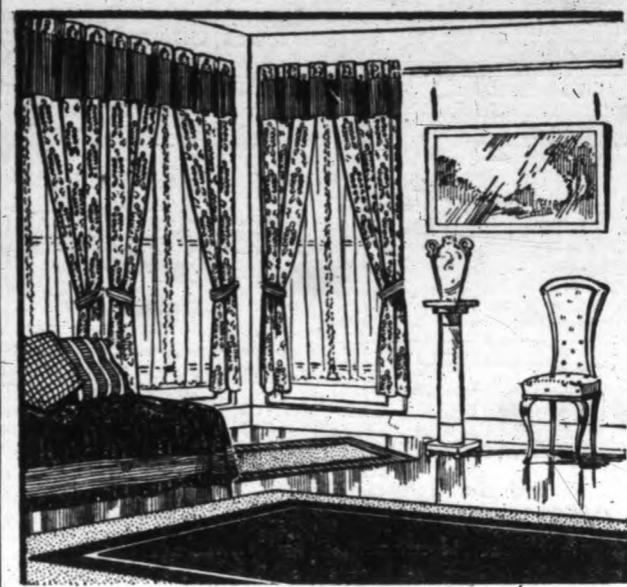
That great damage is being done to the asphalted streets in the city by the dripping of oil and gasoline from motor cars was reported to the streets committee yesterday afternoon by the city engineer.

Mr. Rust stated that he had recently made an inspection of these streets and found several instances where disintegration had set in as a result of oil and gasoline dripping from standing motor cars. He suggested the advisability of introducing a by-law to compel attention to this matter.

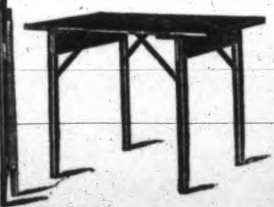

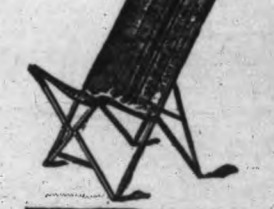
