When the Russians starved out the Austrian garrison at Permysl, an operation which brought them into the fortress on March 22, they did it slowly and systematically, conserving the lives of their men as much as possible. The methods which the Austro-Germans have been employing recently to accomplish the same have been entirely different. Their expenditure in men and ammunition has outdone anything in this war, not even outdone anything in this war, not even excepting the German rushes for Calais and the terrible struggles along the Yser river.

The retaking of the Permyst forts already has been characterized by British observers as one of the most remarkable feats of the war. Immediately after the surrender of the Austrian garrison the Russians began a westward rush through Galacia and it was predicted that they soon would overrun both Silesia and the plains of Hungary.



Seattle; Paid His First Visit in 1870

Seattle, Wash. June 3.—Capt, David Gilmore, veteran of the civil war and one of the ploneer shipping men of Seattle, died at the Minor hospital at 11.55 o'clock Tuesday night. The death of Capt, David Gilmore marks the passing of one of the oldest shipping and seafaring men of Seattle, he having been prominently identified with the marking heart of the companion of the companio its maritime industries since his fire visit here in 1879.

Gilmore, after five year of the Commoder master of the Commodore, bought a part interest in the sailing ship Grace Darling, which he also kept in the coastwise trade from Puget sound to

He retained his interest and cor mand of the Grace Darling for two years, then purchasing the brig Lev Stevens. On this vessel he made several trips to South America and cir umnavigated the globe casions. Selling the Law Stevens in 1889; Capt. Gilmore concluded to invest in Seattle and in 1882 purchased hi first lots here and erected on them th first cracker factory in the north west, The property is now the site of the Grand Pacific hotel, 115 Firs

He engaged in the tug boat bu after making Scattle his permanent home, owning the tug boats Hope and Mastick. After the establishment of the Japanese line of steamers he was made pilot and landed the first big steamer, Mika Maru, at the Arlingt docks, August 21, 1896. This was sur an important event in shipping circle that practically the entire population crowded down to the waterfront

Born in Ireland. Capt. Gilmore was, born in Bally-Bolly, County Down. Ireland, Febru-ary 13, 1842. He came of a seafaring family and first went to sea at the age of 12 with his father. Two years later he struck out for himself and climbed so randity in his profession that he beso rapidly in his profession that he be-

came master of a small English coastwise vessel at the age of 19.
