PIONEER MARINER OF SOUND PASSES AWAY

Capt. David Gilmore Died in Seattle; Paid His First Visit in 1870

Seattle, Wash., June 3.—Capt. David Gilmore, veteran of the civil war and one of the pioneer shipping men of Seattle, died at the Minor hospital at 11:55 o'clock Tuesday night.

Capt. Gilmore, after five years as master of the Commodore, bought a part interest in the sailing ship Grace Darling, which he also kept in the coastwise trade from Puget sound to San Francisco.
