### POTATO FARM

OF 300 ACRES

Largest in Canada is West of Winnipeg

Winnipeg, Sept. 26.—Silver Heights Farms, located a short distance west of this city, are reviving the glories of the old Silver Heights estate of the late Lord Strathcona and this year can make the proud boast of the largest potato farm in the whole of Canada. Three hundred acres of potatoes were cultivated this year, and carlot shipments are being made saily to Eastern Canada and United States points. Shipments have been made to Kansas City, and Minneapolis, also to Foronto. The American shipments are profitable, it is claimed, even when duty is paid, the difference in exchange helping out materially.

Messervey, the managing director of the farms, which also include 300 acres of grain, states that the crop is of very fine quality and the early potatoes ran about 215 to 250 bushels to the acre. The Irish coblers variety run considerably over 300 bushels per acre. Much of the crop has been grown from certified seed and will be put on the market this Fall and Winter under Government certificate.







We were taken off to the "banks of the Fraser," where Colonel Moody was engaged in opening up a second landing place, and where we resided from 1859 to 1859. Vancouver was a "sawmill town," with one mill in operation on Burrard Inlet. A visit to the Inlet in 1864, on a Sunday School excursion, was the first experience in that locality. Things have changed some since 1864. It now appears that the ultimate fate of New Westminster and Vancouver will be one great city extending from the shores of English Bay to the banks of the Fraser, and eventually "becoming the largest and most densely populated city on the Pacific Coast." It is always possible for a man to be lost in the woods within a few miles of his own door, but to wander for hours where the forest disappeared and where lofty buildings have replaced the "tail timber" without realizing where one's sleep-fing place is located, is an experience most certainly modern. Imagine one setting foot in a "sawmill town" one Dreaded Readjustments.




