GLADIOLUS CULTURE

Spade ground rather deep, pulverizing it well. The use of fertilizer is advisable in clay soil or where insufficient fertility is obvious. In any event, we recommend the placing of Bone Meal in the furrow or hole, covering it with 1 inch of soil before the bulb is planted. Place the bulbs 3 inches apart and 5 inches deep in rows 2 feet apart. Small bulbs should not be planted quite so deep. Cultivate well and keep free from weeds. Water frequently and freely if necessary. Successive plantings can be made until about July 1. Cuttings should be made 8 inches above ground when 2 blooms have appeared. After the flowers are cut the bulbs should remain in the ground until late September or October. Remove them before freezing, cut off top and cure and store in basement, or place of moderate temperature for the winter.

How to Succeed with Flowers

Demand Quality Seed

Your success with flowers depends largely upon the quality of the seed you buy and the proper method of growing the plants. There is a difference in the germinating and productivity qualities of flower seeds. If the amount you invest in flower seeds is invested in quality rather than quantity, there is no doubt but that you will have better success.

We both know that seed cannot be exempt from all blame for poor results. The most common cause of failure with flowers is the lack of knowledge in properly growing and caring for seedlings. Being successful is easy if you know a few fundamental principles.

Annuals bloom the same year and die and can usually be started from seed sown directly in the garden. Biennials generally do not bloom until the second season, then die. Perennials are hardy, endure winter weather and start blooming the second season in the spring.

Throughout the flower seed section we have endeavored to give you enough information about each variety offered so that you may know whether it is an annual (a), biennial (b), perennial (p), etc. (See key to symbols on opposite page.) We also give its height, whether it prefers sun, partial shade or shade, blooming period in months, where it can be used to best advantage and its proper culture (see opposite page), including the depth to sow the seed.

Sowing Seed in the Garden

After frost is out of the ground it should be dug and broken up to a depth of at least 9 inches, mixing in plant food if necessary. Pulverize the top soil well and sow the seed evenly, covering as directed herein. Keep the soil at as even moisture as possible until the little plants appear. Thin or transplant as necessary to prevent crowding. Water thoroughly every few days instead of a light sprinkling every day and cultivate often to keep down weeds and to retain moisture in soil.

Growing Seedlings Inside

The ideal box for growing both flower and vegetable seedlings is a window flat about 3 to 4 inches deep. For a few plants, any shallow box (cigar box) will do. In any event, place holes in the bottom for drainage. Fill to a depth of 1 inch with cinders or gravel, and the remainder with good, well sifted garden loam to within ¼ inch of the top and firm down.

Place the box in a pan of water and let the water be absorbed from the bottom until the top soil shows moist. Let the surplus water drain out of the bottom after which sow the seed to depth as given under each variety heading. Place the box in a window, preferably with southern exposure, and cover top with glass or heavy paper. Turn this cover several times a day to prevent moisture forming. As soon as the seeds have germinated, remove the cover. Give the seedlings as much air and sunshine as possible but shade them from the noon sun if it is extremely hot. After the plants are well up, keep them cool rather than warm, and grow them slowly. The soil should be kept moist but not wet. This should be done with bottom moisture as above. Before the plants are transplanted into the garden, they should be hardened off. On mild days expose them to the outdoors and they will soon be able to stand the outside weather without injury.

All perennial flowers can be started in these same boxes, but with fresh soil, except that the box is placed outdoors in a cool, shaded location.

The Cause of "Damping Off"

"Damping off" and Rots of seedlings are actually caused by living germs that live in the soil. If the seedlings are not killed before they emerge they are attacked again at the soil level and topple over and die. Attention to proper moisture, ventilation and transplanting to prevent overcrowding tends to decrease this disease. The most successful way of combating it is to sterilize the soil with Formaldehyde Dust. (Offered on page 18.)

Under each flower variety heading on the following pages you will find keyed references which refer to the information given below. These keys indicate whether the variety is an annual, perennial, etc., and what culture it takes. The depth to sow the seed is also given. This same information is given on each packet we send you. The depth you sow the seed is very important. Lack of this information has been a common cause of failure with flowers. We hope the simplified way we tell you "how" contributes to your success with flowers this year.

Culture A.—Sow seed inside in shallow box of light, well pulverized, moist soil in early spring. Cover to depth as indicated under variety heading herein and firm soil with board. Cover box with glass or paper and place in warm location until germination. After germination, remove cover, supply bottom moisture and place in sunny window. When large enough to handle, thin or transplant 2 inches apart in other boxes and gradually expose to outside conditions. Plant outside after danger of frost. This seed may also be sown outside in the garden in well pulverized soil after frost.

Culture B.—Sow seed outside in well pulverized soil after the last killing frost. Cover to depth indicated under variety heading herein, firm soil and keep moist. Thin or transplant as necessary. If earlier bloom is desired, sow seed inside in shallow box of light, well pulverized, moist soil in early spring. Cover to proper depth and firm soil. Cover box until germination, after which remove cover, supply bottom moisture and place in sunny window. Thin or transplant to other boxes and plant outside after frost.

Culture C.—Sow seed thinly outside in the garden in well pulverized soil after last killing frost. Cover to depth indicated under variety heading herein, firm soil and keep moist. Thin out as necessary so that plants are not crowded. It is best to sow this seed where the plants are to remain as they do not transplant very successfully.

Culture D.—Sow seed outside in early spring as soon as the soil can be well pulverized. Cover to depth indicated under variety heading herein, firm soil and keep moist. Thin or transplant as necessary. For very early bloom, sow outside in late fall just before freezing weather, or can be started quite early inside in box as in culture A and transplanted outside after frost.

Culture E.—Sow seed inside in shallow box of well pulverized moist soil, preferably during spring months. Cover to depth indicated under variety headings herein and firm soil with board. Cover box and place in warm location until germination, after which remove cover, supply bottom moisture and place in sunny window. When large enough to handle, transplant to pots and shift to larger pots as necessary.

KEY TO SYMBOLS

- a** **Annuals.** Attain full growth from seed in one year, bloom and die.
- b** **Biennials.** Generally bloom second year, then die. Some planted early, bloom same year.
- p** **Perennials.** Endure winters. Live and bloom several seasons.
- ra** **Rock-Garden Annual.** Usually of dwarf growth.
- rp** **Rock-Garden Perennial.** Hardy, dwarf growth.
- h** **House Plants.** Mostly grown inside the year around. Some bloom outside in summer.
- ca** **Climbing Annual.**
- cp** **Climbing Perennial.**

Culture F.—Sow seed inside in shallow box of light, well pulverized, moist soil in late winter. Cover seed to depth indicated under variety headings herein and firm with board. Cover box until germination, after which supply bottom moisture and place in sunny window. When large enough to handle, transplant 2 inches apart in other boxes and plant outside after frost is out of the ground. For earlier blooms, sow seed in fall, carry over in cold frame and plant out in spring. June sown seed will bloom in fall.

Culture G.—Sow seed inside in shallow box of well pulverized, moist soil in early spring. Cover to depth indicated under variety headings herein and firm soil. Cover box until germination, after which supply bottom moisture and place in sunny window. When large enough to handle, transplant 2 inches apart in other boxes. When 2 to 3 inches high, shift to pots or can be planted outside after frost.

Culture H.—Sow seed inside in shallow box of well pulverized, moist soil in early spring. Cover seed to depth indicated under variety headings herein and firm soil. Cover box until germination, after which supply bottom moisture and place in sunny window. When plants are large enough to handle, transplant 2 inches apart in other boxes. Plant outside after frost. In the fall take up roots and store in cool, dry place. Seed can also be sown outside after frost.

Culture J.—Sow seed thinly in shallow box of well pulverized moist soil after frost and any time up to August or September 1st. Cover seed to depth indicated under variety headings herein and firm soil with board. Place in cool, shaded outdoor location; after germination, supply bottom moisture. Thin as necessary and transplant to permanent location when large enough to handle. Give protection the first winter. This seed can also be sown in the fall as above, transplanted into cold frames where it is carried through the winter, and planted out in the spring.

Culture K.—Sow seed thinly outside in well pulverized soil in early spring and any time during summer. Cover seed to depth indicated under variety headings herein, firm soil and keep moist. Thin out as necessary. Seed should be sown where plants are to remain as they do not transplant very successfully. Provide protection the first winter. Usually do not bloom until second season.

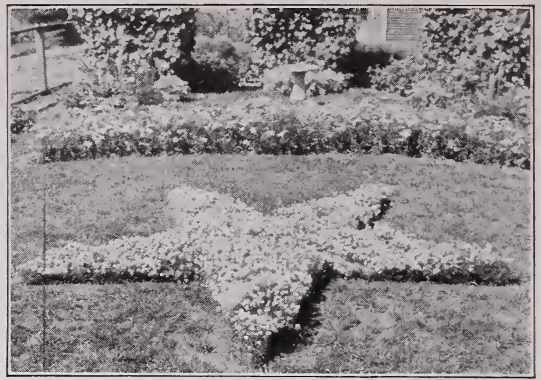

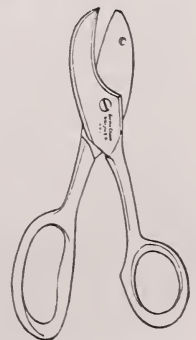

Pick blooms daily by pulling toward the center. Do not cut them.

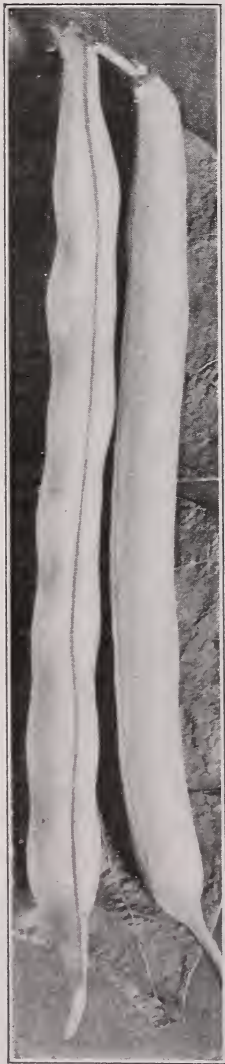

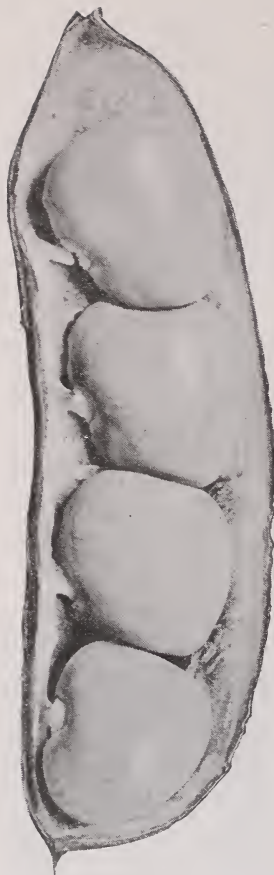

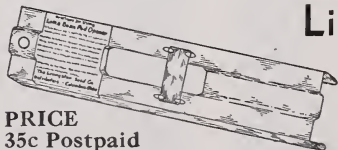

Culture—The soil best suited for the culture of the Beet is that which is rather light, well fertilized. 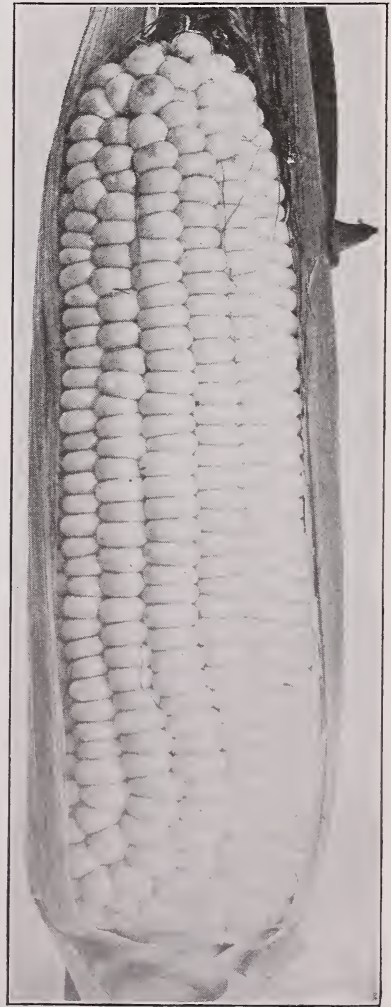

Culture—To grow good Leaf Lettuce outside sow the seed very thinly (1/4 inch) in rows 15 inches apart, covering with very fine soil. This can be done in April as soon as the cold wet days of spring are past. Successive sowings can be made at 2 weeks intervals for a continuous supply. Diligent hoeing, especially in dry weather and plenty of water are essential. Thin plants to 2 inches apart when a few leaves appear and normal use will further thin the row as they develop. 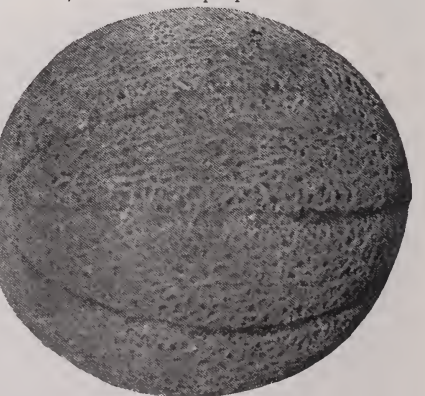

Culture—Pumpkins are not so particular in regard to soil as melons or cucumbers, but in other respects are cultivated in a similar manner. Sow in the month of May, when you plant your corn. Make hills the same as you do for squashes, but about 8 to 10 feet apart each way. Place about 8 seeds in a hill, cover 1 inch, and thin to 3 to 4 vines. It is preferable to grow Pumpkins in the field, and not in the garden, as they mix with the squashes and other vines. You can sow some among the late corn, putting in a few seeds, say every third or fourth hill. This will give you plenty for the table, and your stock the coming winter.

One ounce of seed will plant 15 hills; 3 to 4 pounds will plant an acre

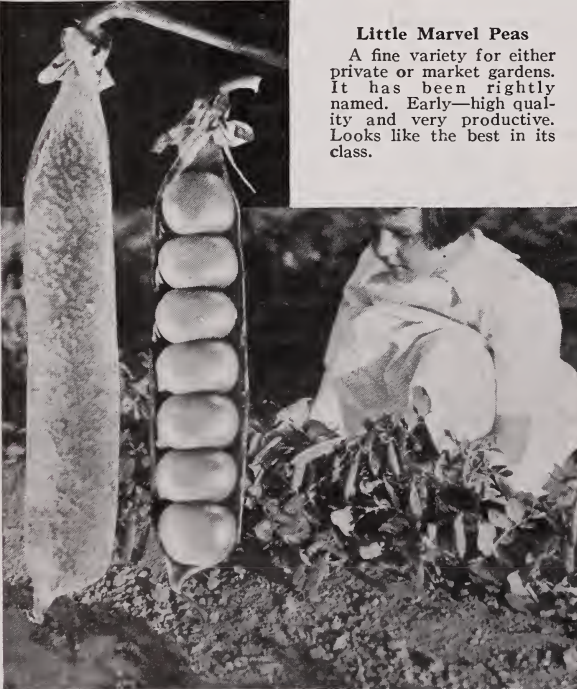

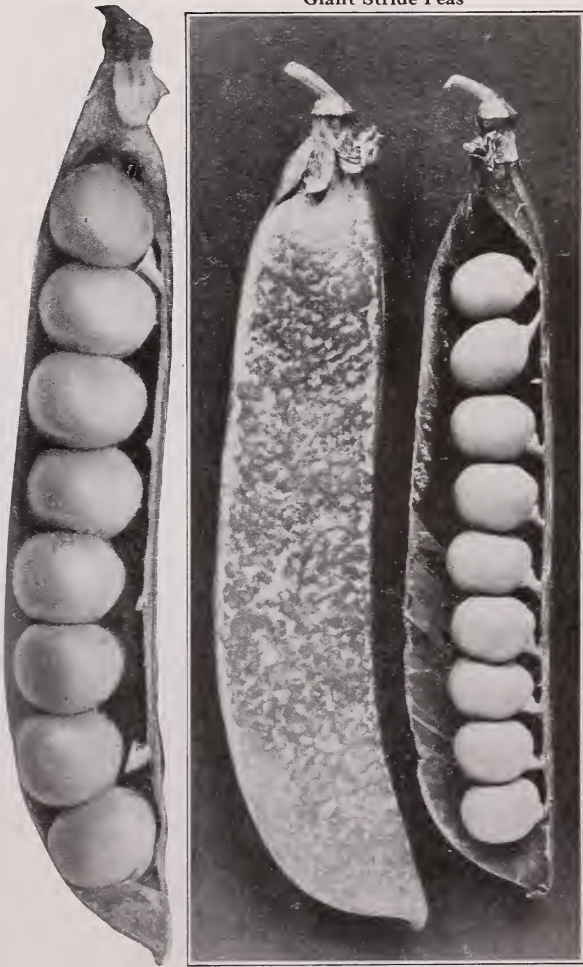

Grow Your Own Pepper

Tomato Types

The Livingston Seed Co. introduced the first modern tomato, "The Paragon," in 1870. Since that time more than 30 other varieties have been developed and introduced by us. This supremacy in Tomatoes has enabled us to rather definitely fix and define types. Practically every tomato in cultivation today comes under one of the types as illustrated here. To better assist you in determining tomato shapes, we are designating under each variety offered, which type it is.



Tomato Culture

In this locality, for very early fruit, the seed should be sown in a hotbed about the first week in March, in drills 5 inches apart and $\frac{1}{2}$ inch deep. Later sowings may be made until the last of April. You can approximate your sowing date from this according to your location. (Sufficient plants for a small garden can be started by sowing a few seeds in a shallow box or flower-pot and placing in a sunny window in the house.) When the young plants are about 2 inches high, they should be set 4 to 5 inches apart in another hotbed or coldframe, or transplanted into small pots, allowing a single plant to a pot. Expose to the air as much as possible to harden them for planting out. Water freely at the time of transplanting in the open ground and shelter from the sun a few days until the plants are thoroughly established. Cultivate as long as the vines will permit, but the last two or three workings of the soil should be very shallow. The use of fertilizer, high

in potash, makes tomatoes more solid and tends to keep them from cracking.

Tomatoes grow splendidly trained to stakes or trellises. The fruits are of better quality and appearance and ripen earlier. This method is common with market gardeners and is practiced by private gardeners where neatness and conservation of space is desired. The usual method is to set one strong plant to a stake 5 to 7 feet high, tying the plant up with wool or other strong, soft twine, and pruning quite freely as the vine advances in growth. By this method plants may be set much closer than in the ordinary way. Ask for Tomato Booklet, giving more detailed instructions. About 2,000 plants will be produced from one ounce of seed. 4 ounces will plant an acre. Maturities given are from the time plants are placed in the garden to first ripe fruits.

Turnips

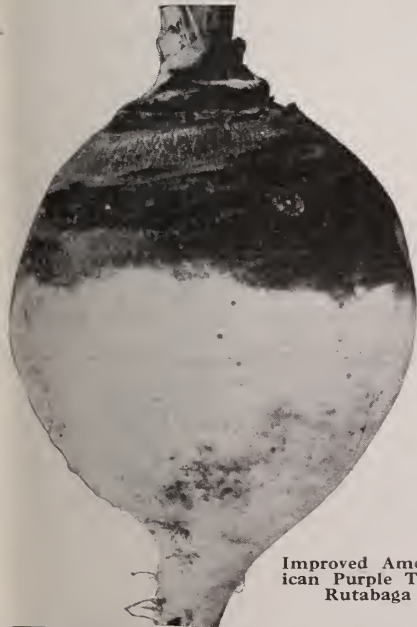

"Damping Off" and Rots of Seedlings are actually caused by living germs that live in the soil. The most successful combatant is sterilization of the soil and seed or seed-pieces. We recommend the use of Hammond's Formaldehyde Dust for this purpose. It is offered on page 18.
