This radio in three parts.

Part 1. Request services of two specialists be obtained on temporary basis for 90 days of type personnel for whom salary of \$25.00 per day is appropriate. Services of these individuals are required to make physical inspection of aluminum and copper rolling mills in Japan in order to implement reparations program. Qualifications these individuals follow: Specialized knowledge of aluminum and/or copper rolling mill operations and equipment. Ability to evaluate and appraise equipment and facilities as mentioned above and to prepare the required reports. Graduate metallurgists or mechanical engineers with minimum of five years' rolling mill experience desirable but modification acceptable considering substitute qualifications.

Part 2. Suggested that Reynolds Aluminum Company, Aluminum Corporation of America, Revere Copper and Brass Company, American Rolling Mill Company, Chase Brass and Copper Company and Reconstruction Finance Corporation, War Assets Administration be considered as probable sources for such personnel.

Part 3. No funds are available this Headquarters for defrayment of expenses of salary or travel these experts.

 1. Mr. N. Utagawa, Japanese national, has requested clearance for entry into Japan for his mother-in-law, Virginia Caulfield, his two children, Japanese citizens, and his wife, former Princess Mary Visaca Svasti of Siam (Tab: Request).
 2. Background of this request is as follows:
 - a. Miss Caulfield lived in Japan from 1923 to 1939 as a teacher and social worker, aiding the blind. In 1926 she adopted a Japanese girl, H. Hida.
 - b. In 1938 Miss Caulfield and her adopted daughter went to Siam to open a school for the blind, under the auspices of the Siamese Government. Miss Caulfield has remained there since that time. Her adopted daughter married Mr. Utagawa in 1940, but died the following year after giving birth to twins who are living in Siam under the care of Miss Caulfield.
 - c. In 1946, prior to his repatriation to Japan, Mr. Utagawa married Princess Mary Visaca Svasti of Siam. The marriage contract, witnessed by a Catholic priest, is a legal marriage according to Father Bitter, Secretary of the Apostolic Delegate (Tab: Contract).
 3. Miss Caulfield has been offered a teaching position in Keio University. In addition, the Apostolic Delegate vouches for her as an outstanding lay worker for the Mission. (Tab: Assurances)
 4. Mr. Utagawa guarantees support for his family.

 1. Request has been received by State Department from Christian Science Church desiring permanent representation in Japan. Further desires James Watt, currently a Chaplain with Headquarters 2nd Major Port, Yokohama, be separated from service in Japan and become their representative here.
 2.
 - a. CI&E (Mr Bunce) informs that Christian Science Church had no organized missionary effort in Japan prior to the war.
 - b. Recent action in two cases (Rev. Father Luke and Rev. Okumura) has discouraged or denied initiation of missionary efforts or visits by organizations which did not operate in Japan prior to the war.
 - c. Under current regulations (Paragraph 32, RR Circular 5, 13 April 47) personnel of Services are not authorized to accept discharge in this theater unless they are to become employees of an agency of the U. S. Government.
 3.
 - a. Religious organizations which did not have an active operating group in Japan prior to the war lack the necessary organization, property and personal contacts with Japanese religious leaders necessary to enable self-sufficient operation with a minimum of support from the Occupation Forces.
 - b. It is considered highly undesirable to allow an exception to RR Circular 5 in the case of Chaplain Watt for the following reasons:
 - (1) In the eyes of the Japanese this action would inevitably attach the prestige of the Occupation to one particular Christian sect. This would lead to criticism from other sects on grounds of discrimination, and from Japanese religious leaders on grounds of contravention of freedom of religion. In this connection Chaplain McKenzie advises that he denied informally similar requests of several of his Chaplains in the early days of the Occupation.
 - (2) It would set a precedent which might allow individuals to exploit their intimate knowledge of the Occupation Forces and personal contacts

Reurad WCL 42779, 1 May 47. ~~Due~~ to unstable economic conditions, lack of housing and transportation, organizations which did not rpt not have active missionary movement in Japan prior to war are discouraged from initiating missionary effort in Japan until conditions improve greatly. Lack of operating organization, property and personal contacts with Japanese religious leaders which pre-war mission organizations possess would cause representatives to be charges on Occupation Forces for indefinite period.

With reference to Chaplain Watt, current theater regulations allow separation from Service in Japan only if individual is to accept employment with agency of U. S. Government.

1. Subject of C/N No. 1 is the clearance to Korea of a Japanese technician for the purpose of survey of rehabilitation required on a heating plant in a hospital in Seoul.
2. a. Lt Col Tate, Engineers Office, states that a substantial amount of parts for repair for the plant are expected to be procured from the Train Manufacturing Company.
b. Because of this anticipated need he further states that the services of the technician are to be extended as a courtesy without pay from a source other than the Train Manufacturing Company in view of the order for parts anticipated by that company.
c. The Japanese national will be placed in protective custody by a member of XXIV Corps Engineers immediately upon arrival in Korea and will be kept under continuing surveillance until his departure.
d. The name of the Japanese is not yet available but will be supplied in the near future.
3. a. Travel of the subject Japanese may be authorized under the provisions of paragraph a (2) of C-69684 which approves such travel when equal mutual benefit will accrue to the two countries concerned.
b. Expenses of travel may be considered to be sponsored by an agency in the country to be visited inasmuch as the anticipated order for parts is sufficient inducement for payment of wages by the Train Manufacturing Company. Cost of actual travel fare may be at government expense in view of the benefit to the Army of the rehabilitation planned.
4. G-4 Air Transportation (Captain Cassidy) states no objection to travel by air at government expense.
5. Recommend approval of appropriate orders for travel by air at government expense of one Japanese technician (name to be supplied at later date and to be approved by G-2 prior to departure) to Korea and return on or about 14 May for purpose of survey of needed repairs to the heating plant in Seoul.

1. 1. a. CG RYKOM radio C-15476 AIMGG of 2 April 1947 requests permission to return to Japan persons in certain categories:
- (1) Persons of Japanese parentage, married to Ryukyans, who have been repatriated to Ryukyus to find no husbands or relatives living in the Ryukyus.
 - (2) Ryukyans who were in Japan at the end of the war and who were repatriated to the Ryukyus in search of friends or relatives who are now dead. This type of person has more assurance of a livelihood with friends or relatives in Japan.
 - (3) Japanese or Ryukyans who were repatriated from all areas to Ryukyus in search of friends and relatives but now find that friends and relatives are in Japan, and it is more desirable with more assurance of livelihood to live with relatives in Japan.
- b. Request is made to utilize Japanese shipping now engaged in repatriating stragglers from Japan to the Ryukyus for return of persons to Japan listed in above categories.
2. a. Those Japanese described in paragraph 1a (1) above should be permitted to return to Japan if it is definitely determined that their husbands or relatives are no longer in the Ryukyus. Such action is in furtherance of SCAP policy that all Japanese are acceptable in Japan.
- b. Those Ryukyans who were in Japan at the end of the war, and who later accepted repatriation to the Ryukyus should be permitted to return to Japan only after it has been definitely determined that (1) they are without families, friends or means of livelihood in the Ryukyus and (2) families, friends or means of livelihood actually exist in Japan. Precedent for such entry into Japan was established by the recent case of Kunio Ohashi, a Korean who was permitted to return to Japan for permanent residence with his family.

4. It is concluded that:



All such reports should include full name, age and sex of individual being reported as well as full name, age, sex, complete address in Japan and other available particulars of the friends or relatives in Japan. After completion of investigation a decision will be made in each individual case.

Part 3. Those Japanese mentioned in your Category III will be considered in the same manner as Japanese mentioned in your Category I and our Part 1 above.

MEMORANDUM TO: General Heiderlinden

SUBJECT: W. R. Foerster

1. Attached C/N #3, G-2 to G-1, summarizes the case of W. R. Foerster. C.L.O. report also is attached for information.

2. Reference paragraph 1, containing the remark that this action started in the CinC's office on 1 April, this case was summarized and submitted to the Office of the CinC in February 1947.

3. Foerster originally was classified as objectionable (as a joint G-1 - G-2 (CIC) action during spring 1946) on moral grounds (repeated abortion and black-market activities) and on the more serious grounds of having aided the Japanese war effort by supplying machine tools, lathes, etc., to Japanese (Zaibatsu) aircraft factories. The fact that Foerster was not a Nazi and was "persona non grata" with the German colony and authorities is not considered pertinent, nor is the fact that he is not considered by G-2 to be a security risk.

4. This case was discussed in detail with following persons and information secured as indicated:

a. Diplomatic Section (Mr Overton) - Foerster undoubtedly would have been deported because of his abortion and black market activities had there been a normal peacetime government in Japan. Prior to 1938 many foreigners were asked to leave Japan, or tried and deported, for activities of a less serious nature than those in which Foerster engaged.

b. Legal Section (Mr Bassin) - SCAP has the authority and responsibility to deport Foerster on the basis of his past record.

c. Mr. Vondrous, Czechoslovakian, ex-secretary to Foerster and now employee of CCD - G-2.

- (1) Foerster started a machine tool factory prior to the war. During the war he supplied machine tools, lathes, etc. to a Japanese (Zaibatsu) aircraft factory. His only customers were the Japanese Army and Navy.

- (2) He was very friendly with many Nazi officials, including Meissinger (No. 1 Nazi in Japan), and bragged openly of such friendship. The fact that he did not become a Nazi is explained by his reluctance to subjugate himself to the Nazi regime.
- (3) He exploited his personnel unmercifully. Far from being a friend of the stateless and Jewish Germans, he was instrumental in having many of them oppressed. The only German Jew he employed was an engineer named Stern. Stern resigned at one time because of Foerster's oppressive and obnoxious conduct.
- (4) In Vondrous' opinion, Foerster is an unscrupulous and habitual criminal. (It should be noted that Vondrous broke with Foerster during the war and is politically, and otherwise, clear. Presumably he can be trusted - he is now employed by G-2.)

5. Reference paragraph 6, C/N #3, the listed "mitigating circumstances" are generally irrelevant. The fact remains that Foerster is an objectionable German subject to forcible repatriation on moral grounds and on the grounds of having aided the Japanese war effort.

6. I do not believe anything will be gained by having Foerster in for an interview.

7. Vondrous has been requested to report to my office for another interview. His testimony will be taken and sworn to before an AG.

8. After receipt of Vondrous' sworn statement, this case will be prepared for submission to the Chief of Staff.

Part 1. While on recent temporary duty at this Headquarters, Dr. Hammon recommended that consultants be obtained through the Virus and Rickettsial Commission and the Surgeon General's Office for the 1947 Japanese B Encephalitis season, to advise concerning the control, diagnosis and treatment of cases of Japanese B Encephalitis occurring in the Far East Command. A team consisting of an entomologist, a virologist, and an internist in addition to himself, with special experience in Encephalitis and Poliomyelitis was suggested. Concur with this recommendation. Dr. Hammon suggests in addition to himself the following individuals: The Professor of Entomology at the University of Utah as the Entomologist; Dr. Leon Lewis, Associate Professor of Industrial Health at the University of California as the clinical consultant; and Dr. Cassels of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research as the Virologist.

Part 2. No funds are available this Headquarters to defray expenses these consultants. This Headquarters will make available billets and messing facilities on same basis as War Department civilian personnel. Dependents and additional secretarial personnel may not accompany individuals. Laboratory space will be made available and transportation as available will be furnished. These individuals will be subject to same theater regulations as are War Department civilian employees this theater.

1. 1. Request was made in WCL 40480 for views this Headquarters on entrance of an American into Korea for the purpose of accepting a position as a technical consultant to a commercial organization, Korean Motors. (Tab - WCL 40480)
2. a. Statement was made that the State Department did not support the request but desired to know the views of this Headquarters in this particular case and on the general subject of entry for such purpose by U. S. and Allied nationals.
- b. The subject was discussed by telephone with G-1, USAFIK. Because further time for study was requested by USAFIK, our Z 44710 was sent as interim action to War Department. (Tab Z 44710)
- c. The view of USAFIK now expressed on the entry of such personnel is that it is undesirable. (Tab - ZGAP 577) Reasons given are that such personnel would not contribute directly to the mission of the occupation and, while in the eyes of native Koreans would represent occupation forces, would not be sufficiently under the control of Occupation authorities.
3. It is concluded that entry of Mr. Catchpole into Korea should be denied and that, in general, the views of CG, USAFIK on entry of such personnel into Korea should be adopted as current policy.
4. Recommend approval proposed radio to War Department.

Rear WCL 40480, 24 April, entry Catchpole into Korea not favorably considered. The views of this Headquarters concerning entry into Korea of U. S. or Allied nationals for purposes similar to that expressed for Catchpole is that it is undesirable in general because the presence in Korea of foreign personnel, who are not connected with or contribute to the mission of occupation, is not considered to be in the best interest of the occupation. Specifically it is felt that embarrassing situations might arise by the lack of full control by Occupation authorities of such personnel and, that because of shortage of standard facilities, such personnel would constantly demand privileges which can be accorded only to occupation personnel.

MEMORANDUM FOR: General Beiderlinden

1. Request has been made by the Chinese Mission through Diplomatic Section for the temporary entry of several high ranking Chinese officials who are aboard the General Gordon.
2.
 - a. The request was received in this division at 0800, 1 May.
 - b. The latest information from U. S. Maritime is that the Gordon will dock at daylight, 2 May at Kobe, and daylight, 3 May at Yokohama.
 - c. The officials are listed in paragraph 1, Check Note #1.
 - d. Travel by military train from Kobe to Tokyo is requested in order that the officials may have more time for conference with authorities in Tokyo before the departure of the Gordon from Yokohama.
 - e. By telecon 1020, 1 May Mr. Bushner, Diplomatic Section, states that Chinese Counselor of Mission contacted Counselor of Mission, Diplomatic Section this morning urgently requesting that travel by military train of Mr and Mrs Yang be particularly considered if feeling for travel of the party as a whole is negative.
3.
 - a. It appears that such conference as could be conducted by conscientious officials in such positions should be of benefit to the mission of the Occupation.
4. It is recommended that the Chief of Staff be contacted by telephone and clearance of the officials concerned with authorization for travel by military train from Kobe to Tokyo be recommended.
