
2. These documents are located at the ATIS Document Section storage room, NYK Building.

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The translation of Page 5, 8, 13,
30, 64, 122, 150, and 151,
the extracts from the file of
Inner Mongolia Affairs.
(S.A. NO. 15030, Sack No. 17, #1.A.).

SATU, Serichl.

The whole translations re Page 5 and 8 are as follows: -

Page 5: - "According to the information obtained from the sources of Lamaists, recently the enthusiasm of Nan-king Government to govern MONGOLIA is gradually becoming keenly, and they seem, first of all, to cajole the Panchen Lama supplying 10 wireless apparatuses together with some arms and monthly propaganda expense of about 50 million Yuan, by which they are intending to oppose against the permeation of Manchu-kuo influence."

Page 8: - "From the end of the last month the Chinese Central National Government and HUANG, the Chief of the Department of Domestic Administration together with SHIH-CHING-YANG, the Chairman of the Mongolia & Tibet Conference were consulting about the proper measures for future, the result of which decided to despatch specially HUANG, and CHAO, the Vice Chair-man of above conference to INNER-MONGOLIA, and let them inspect each community therein and pacify the leaders as well as to direct them; and it is said that two personnel of the Frontier Service Band in the General-Staff-Office, three personnel of the said department, and a councillor of above conference will attend on this journey."

"However, HUANG is saying that he will leave NANKING before or

after the 20th day to meet with CHIANG-KAI-SEK ahead and then he will enter into MONGOLIA through PEI-PING by the PINE-HAN Railway, while news papers are playing up that the said party's visiting MONGOLIA is to be hastened as they are demanded by the repetition of wires from Mongolian Princes and that HUANG and CHAO's going to MONGOLIA is to be deserved by the Princes' well-come, the extent of the claim for the autonomy being 23 tribus-flags of 3 united districts."

(Telegram from ARIZOSHI Chuichi to HIROTA Koki)

The translation re Page 13 is as follows:-

Page 13 :- "The reporter's response for my inquiry [Arizoshi's inquiry] was that the rumour of CHIANG-KAI-SEK's going to the north is not true, and there is no least anticipation to realize it within this year (HO-YING-CHIN, who called on this legation today, also said so)."

LI-SHOU-HSIN is a Mongolian general and the background of TEH-WANG.

"Beside the above, he says that : (1) as to the movement of INNER-MONGOLIAN Autonomy, the JE-HO Special Service Organ of Japan is backing this movement, which was disclosed by the inter-communicated letters between the said organ and the Mongolians concerned, and that : (2) there still being the stationed army of LI-SHOU-HSIN in TE-LUN, the Chinese Government will advise such conditions to SHIBAYAMA military officer and entrust with him to negotiate with the KWAN-TUNG Army to cease

such backing and the withdrawal of the said army, and that it is decided to let HUANG-SHAO-HSIUNG go to MONGOLIA within few days and investigate the real conditions."

"Further on the same day HO-YING-CHIN was appealing to be favoured by us to expedite Chinese taking over of the disarmed districts as they are not able to make the administrative acquisition owing to the Japanese Army's posting there, although the governors of some districts therein are already appointed."

The translation of Page 30 re TE-WANG's proposal is as follows:-

Page 30:- "TEH-WANG, feeling keenly to concert with Japan, proposed to MORISHIMA to be favoured by him regarding the following cases."

"(1) He wishes to send two or three hundred youths from SI-SU-NI-TE to Japanese native land, FENG-TIEN, and HSINKING etc. for study of the following sciences."

"(a) The technics of making leather, fabrics, and various arms."

"(b) The education of army-surgeons."

"(c) The education of the military cadets."

"(2) He wishes to be sold or lent the air-crafts, armoured motor-cars, and other arms of every kind."

"(3) The loan of 3 million Yen."

" This loan is to allot for the above expenses and should be arranged to be the joint responsibility of SELIN-GOLMENE 10 tribus-flags under the names of the tribus-chair men and vice chair men, giving Japan the pre-emption of salt and offering the employment of the Japanese advisers and professors in each tribus flag [community]. "

"(4) Further TEH-WANG persuaded MORISHIMA to come to SI-SU-NI-TE [TE-WANG's community] in this spring and desired him to bring there a powerful wireless; our army is assuring the real condition about TE-WANG's proposal, while we are studying friendly what degree of acceptance is adequate for his requirement according to the already decided course of measures for INNER-MONGOLIA, paying consideration for the Chinese and Soviet relations. "

The following [the appendix of Page 30] is the gist of the telegraph from the Chief of Staff of Kwan-tung Army to the Vice War Minister, on the 16th, Jun, 1934.

" MORISHIMA met with TEH-WANG several times just before his evacuation from SI-U-CHU-MU-SHIN Prince's government, and the contents of the conversation between them are as follows. "

(1) " TEH-WANG's purpose to come to the above governmental office is to

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report about the process of the autonomic movements since Sept. and discuss the counter plan in future as he was invited by the Chief of SI-U-CHU-MU-SHIN, and at the same time he wished to exchange views with MORISHIMA perceiving MORISHIMA is staying there."

(2) "The United Autonomy Conference of 3 Tribes Flags had been held and succeeded since Sept. at PAI-LING-MITAO, and they failed in the final negotiation with the NANKING-Government, but they have the intention to oppose against Chinese authorities by the 2nd measure."

(3) "As the purpose of the conference at first is to complete the independence by the individual and real power rather than the autonomy, it was objected by the unexpected channels contrarily to the expectation; it seemed as if it was the simple conference of SELINGOLMINE rather than it is called as the 3 Tribes-Flags-Union — it was ended as the single combat of CHIN, the representative of SU-MING and HUANG-SHAO-HSIUNG."

(4) "The community of I-KU-CHAO-MING feeling the menace from SHAN-SI-Province, only the representative of one flag of 7 participated in the conference; CHA-HARU, fearing China, sent only the representatives of two or three communities out of 8 tribes flags secretly, but they did not attend to the conference; as to U-LAN-CHA-PU-MING community, U-KAO-LING corrupted every prince

and important personnel and threatened them."

(5) "Although this conference was ended in failure, there is the probability to succeed the movement utmost of them until the achievement of the union for independence and let OUTER-MONGOLIA participate in this movement; at present the refugees from OUTER-MONGOLIA to SU-NI-TE are amounting three hundred men."

(6) "TEH-WANG's opinion in view of this time's failure that he felt keenly is as follows:-

"1. At present there are no able men among Mongolians."

"2. There are small arsenals in INNER-MONGOLIA, but they are primitive."

"3. Chinese side assumed the attitude of onlookers at first considering there is the support of Japan for the autonomy, but as soon as she saw the fact of non-support, she has taken the firm attitude."

"4. It is difficult to achieve every thing without Japanese support."

(7) "Numerous anti-Japan + Manchuria prints were distributed to every community by the NANKING-Government, but all of them were burnt."

The translation of Page 64 is as follows.

Page 64:- "The representative of TEH-WANG of SI-SU-NI-TE, PU-YING-TA-LEI, who is staying here at present, proposed to the Kwan-tung Army the loan of a million Yen as the preparation fund for independence (apportionment: half a million is to be assigned for the purchase of arms from Japan and the rest is for the education of able men), as MONGOLIA desires to form an independent country by the support of Japan, uniting CHA-HARU, SUI-YUAN, and OUTER-MONGOLIA."

"In our army's opinion, although the said proposal seems to be only the hope of SI-SU-NI-TE [TE-WANG's community] and not the will of whole SELIN-GOLMENE, it is good in general view to accept this proposal of loan after the careful research about the investors, term, and the securities or the secret agreement (for instance it rules that the mines of all kind, railways, communications, aviation, and trading etc. are not to be allowed for the 3rd countries unless they have the approvement of Japan & Manchukuo) etc., if it is cleared that the said proposal is the hope of all Mongolian tribes at the result of further investigation on this matter."

"With such point of view we asked the instruction of the

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military center on the 2nd day."

"As to the details please refer Kwan-Wire No. 180."

The translation of Page 122 is as follows.

Page 122:- "Summing up the stories of the member of the Zen-Lin Association who came back to TE-LUN from the near place of SI-SU-TE-NI and a traveller to MONGOLIA who came back to HSINKING, the Chinese authorities suspect the relation between TEH-WANG and Japan, and from 15th, Sept. they sent a partial soldiers of SUNG-CHE-YUAN's army to the Prince's Government at SI-SU-NI-TE and are now setting them for watching."

"Such being the case, it is said that TEH-WANG requested the members of Zen-Lin Association to leave TE-LUN and the Chief Director of same association also consented to recede for the time being."

"In view of the circumstances that HAN-FENG-LIN was arrested previously and PU-YING-TA-LEI (who came to HSINKING as the representative of TEH-WANG in this spring) fled to the Mount UTAISHAN and escaped from the danger, TEH-WANG and his surroundings seem to be in the dangerous position, and according to the rumour, the tribes are uttering the complaint that the positive measures of TEH-WANG induced the

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oppression of Chinese authorities."

"It is somewhat reasonable to deem that TEH-WANG's wires of anti-Japanism towards NANKING etc. is a measure to avoid the danger, and therefore I recognize that a great care is necessary for all the plans regarding SU-NI-IE districts [center of INNER-MONGOLIA]."

"Further it is said that the touring foreigners therein are not few, but most of them are limited ~~confined~~ to inspect whether there is the positive establishment by Japan or not, and there is none who intends the constructive action by himself."

The translation of Page 150 is as follows.

Page 150:-

"According to CHANG-ISO-LIN's story through A.B. source, it is said that HO-FU of CHING-HAI Province [the living Buddha in CHING-HAI], accompanying YA-WANG and a lady-aviator LIN-PENG-SHEN (who has relation with the 3rd country, previously went to CHING-HAI and married with MA-CHUNG-YING), came to NANKING and was preparing to attend to the 5th Central Meeting of All Nation recently."

"However, as I was reported that a few days ago he came to SHANGHAI and is now projecting something with Japanese authorities concerned, the contents of which are unknown, but Japanese side seems to be persuading HO-FU's decisive visiting Japan, I made inquiry to OTSUKI who has the relation with YA-WANG who had a connection with us in the past, for which OTSUKI ascertained the report as a fact in general, and to be frank HO-FU was approaching to our military authorities through YA-CHING-CHI (same as YA-WANG, and HO-FU is his younger brother) and already met with the lieutenant colonel KAGESUKE and the colonel SASAKI (KAGESUKE told personally to the member of this legation that he met with them)."

"As to their purpose OTSUKI stated as follows: "

"(1) It is to obtain the support of MANCHUKUO, having regard to the circumstances that the Mongolian Princes YUNG-WANG and TEH-WANG having been corrupted by CHIANG-KAI-SEK [who went to the west-

northern area of China & HOPEI-Province previously], it is destined to open the Whole Mongolian Conference (the place of meeting is not yet fixed) and sooner or later all the districts of INNER-MONGOLIA will be placed under the control of Nanking Government, and thus there is the anxiety to end the long cherished desire in smoke (about such condition it ought to have been informed to Manchurian authorities through Kwan-tung Army)."

"(2) Finally in order to be granted an audience by the Emperor of Manchukuo it is decided to let YA and SHIH-CHENG-CHU (the principal of the CHING-HAI & MONGOLIA-TIBET SCHOOL and the representative of CHING-HAI-TRIBUS) go to MANCHURIA with the purpose to make the petition of the relief for the above stated conditions."

"The plan to establish the trading company to develop CHING-HAI-Province may be discussed upon his arrival to MANCHUKUO according to the circumstance." "And if the result of their going to MANCHURIA is favourable ~~at its result~~, HO-FU also may well visit MANCHUKUO."

"Regarding OTSUKI's story as above, it is necessary to assure more exactly, but I make this information without delay."

The translation of the gist re the accounts of Page 15-1 is as follows.

Page 15-1 i - "The creators of the Great Asia Volunteer Army, RAPIN-DORA-NAAS-PRATAP, the man of AFGHANISTAN, and M. NILE, an Indian, who arose emphasizing on the great allied union of Asia races, were travelling in INNER + OUTER MONGOLIA for more than 80 days through JE-HO, and came back to DAIREN on the 4th, inst. by the train to arrive there at 50 past 6 P.M., and in no time they lodged at the place of OKAWA, SHUZO (the younger brother of OKAWA, SHUMEI) situated at in the compound of the Whole Asia Association, No. 75, KIRISHIMA-CHO, DAIREN-CITY."

"The general movements of both of them are as follows."
 [As it is too laborious to translate the whole details of above travellers, I only mention the gist of their stories itemized].

"(1) We pre-arranged to meet with TEH-WANG at SI-SU-NI-TE-Prince's government, and although it was impossible to meet with TEH-WANG owing to the interruption by Chinese authorities, they could make the familiar talk with many Mongolians regarding the foundation of the Great Asia Volunteer Army, the result of which having been successful to obtain their understanding and enough to fulfil our purpose to visit there,

we decided to return from the journey."

[The above is the extract from his greeting when he returned to DAIREN.]

(2) The reporter viz. the Chief of the Police-Affairs-Bureau of Kwan-tung Government ascertained that OKAWA, SHUZO made the following greeting, according to the account of this file.

"It is the purpose in common of Asia race to make the great allied union of Asia race, and the duty imposed upon us was decisively executed by you [the two men] instead of Japanese, for which we have no words to gratify."

"It is the cause of obliging you that you are easier than us to enter into MONGOLIA, and at all event it was the great achievement to be specially noted that we have obtained comrades in OUTER-MONGOLIA."

The following is the gist of the public address made by PRAIAP on the 5th day of Sept., 1934 at the welcome meeting as well as conversations under the auspices of the Whole Asia Association and the Office of the Asia-Race Alliance :-

(1) "It was A.M. 9 of the 9th day of Sept. that we left DAIREN parting with you who came to give us send-off, and after continuing our journey since that time we could come back safely, for which we thank you deeply believing that we owe to your inscrutable support."

(2) "We immediately went to HSIN-KING, where we asked the support of the Kwan-tung Army and was approved, and through FENG-TIEN,

- PEI-PIAO, and LINE-YUAN we arrived at CHENG-TEH on the 19th day of Sept." "We left CHENG-TEH on the 10th, Oct. after the completion of the preparation to enter into MONGOLIA by the assistance of the Special Service Organ stationed in CHENG-TEH."
- "We accompanied a Mongolian youth who were studying at the Gokuraku Temple of HARBIN and my old friend [other than M. NILE] together with two motor car drivers [viz 6 men in total]."
- "We left TE-LUN on the 22nd and arrived at SI-SU-NI-TE on the 31st, Oct., where we could not meet with TEH-WANG, and after our meeting with the important subjects of TEH-WANG we started from SI-SU-NI-TE on the 9th Nov. on our way home."
- "By the travelling of this time we could know that Mongolians are greatly relying upon the Emperor of Manchukuo, convincing that the Emperor is not only the spiritual leader, but his Majesty is also the director of the Mongolian administration."
- (3) "General Mongolian youths seem to hold the revolutionary spirit of China and it is not deniable that the Soviet communism is also influenced there considerably."
- "As MONGOLIA is surrounded by three countries viz. MANCHUKUO, CHINA, and SOVIET-RUSSIA, and each of them is anxious to extend their influence there, it is necessary for Mongolia to essay the prudent discrimination about the political course." "But in my opinion it is the best to have the influence of Manchukuo expanded

into MONGOLIA, and another mode is to make the declaration for independence uniting MONGOLIA, KAN-SU, CHING-HAI, HSINKIANE, and TIBET into one country, by which the peace of Asia is to be secured, and we can drive away the influence of the white race consequently."

"In the case that Japan is going to appeal to the war, it is not sufficient to maintain the peace by the support of Manchukuo only; however, if the said united country together with Manchukuo espouse the cause of Japan, it will be able to secure the safety of Japan as well as the peace of Asia, and thus it enables us to invade so far as to reach at the mountain-side of the HIMALAYA at once in the war, and without such confederation it is impossible to sweep away English influence from Eastern Asia."

OKAWA-SHUZO, after thanking for the two men's effort of visiting MONGOLIA, expressed to the audience as follows.

"Mr. PRATAP is pre-arranged to travel towards PHILIPPINE and we desire to reward." "But we are not able to support Mr. PRATAP and NILE with materials, accordingly I wish that all gentlemen assembled here will enter into the Great Asia Volunteer Army under the auspices of Mr. PRATAP by way of rewarding him."

The audience accepted OKAWA's proposal as above and completed the procedure to be enlisted into the said volunteer army.

1. Your attention is invited to the following documents:

a. IPS Document No. 2279 -- an envelope containing reports by General TADA re military situation in North China. This document has not been used in evidence. TADA is a Defense witness assigned to Mr. Lopez. (TAKAHASHI).

Ray b. IPS Documents 2316 to 2322 inclusive -- being secret documents on the Marshal Chang Tsuo-lin Incident including comments by HATOYAMA, Ichiro, who received these documents from General TANAKA, Giichi. One of these documents is a report by General TANAKA to the Throne stating that the assassination of Chang Tsuo-lin was planned and executed by members of the Kwantung Army Staff. These documents have not been used in evidence. HATOYAMA is a Defense witness assigned to Messrs. Comyns-Carr and Brown.

Ray (IYOTA) c. IPS Document 2384 -- file of messages on Inner Mongolian Affairs. Among them is a wire from ARIYOSHI to HIROTA dated 25 October 1933 containing reference to the support given to Inner Mongolian leaders by the Japanese Special Service Organization. This document has not been introduced. A person by the name of ARIYOSHI, Chuichi will be a witness for the Defense. The first name of the sender of this wire is Akira. However, the Defense application states that the witness was Ambassador to China which is true for the sender of this wire (ARIYOSHI, Akira), but not for ARIYOSHI, Chuichi. It may therefore be assumed that the first name on the Defense application is an error. The witness ARIYOSHI is assigned to Mr. Brown. ARIYOSHI, Akira, is correct name.

2. Your attention is further invited to the fact that the Russian Division filed with the Document Division a number of affidavits by or implicating persons who are now being called as Defense witnesses. Among them are the following:

Telegram from ARIYOSHI, ^{Akiya} Chuichi to HIROTA, Koki

(p 13) "The reporter's response to my inquiry (T.N. ARIYOSHI's inquiry) was that the rumour of CHIANG-KAI-SHEK's going north is not true, and there is not the least chance of realizing it within this year (HO-YING-CHIN, who called on this legation today, also said so)."

"Beside the above, he says that: (1) With the movement for Inner-Mongolian Autonomy, the JE-HO Special Service Organ of Japan is backing this movement, which was disclosed by letters between the said organ and the Mongolians concerned, and that: (2) Since the stationed army of LI-SHOU-HSIN is still in TE-LUN, the Chinese Government will tell of such conditions to SHIBAYAMA, military officer, and entrust him to negotiate with the KWANTUNG Army to cease such backing, and for the withdrawal of the said army, and that it is decided to have HUANG-SHAO-HSIUNG go to Mongolia within a few days and investigate the real conditions."

"Further, on the same day, HO-YING-CHIN was appealing to be favoured by us to expedite the Chinese taking over the disarmed districts, since they are not able to arrange the administrative acquisition owing to the Japanese Army's posting there, although the governors of some districts therein are already appointed."
