Balfour, the government leader, in the course of eulogy of the field marshal, whom he compared with such men as Gollingwood, Nelson, Marlborough and Wellington, said there was no doubt that but for Lord Roberts's daring and strategy and rapidity with which his plans were carried out, Kimberley and Mafeking would have fallen, 11,000 British would have been starved into submission at Ladysmith, and there would have been a general rising of disloyalists in South Africa, Great Britain might have recovered therefrom, but at what a cost.

The country was saved from this by the genius of the man he now invited the House to reward by a manimous vote, irrespective of political differences.

Recent Promotion.

The Proad Arrow, London, England, of a recent date, has this to say about Colonel Cotton and his recent promotion:

"The promotion of Colonel W. H. Cotton to the appointment of quartermaster-general of the Dominion forces, vice Lieut. Col. Foster, R. E., has given the utimost satisfaction throughout Caunda. Colonel Cotton, who is a man of marked ability and an untiring worker, is thoroughly acquainted with all the requirements of his very important position.

KILLED BY NATIVES Story Told of Murder of Three Prospe

tors By Alaskan Indians.

In a letter written by R. C. Kafoway, the fur trader of Unalaska, to a friend in Seattle, the killing of three prospectors on Unimak Island is thus described by C. Jackson, the sole survivor of the attack made by the Indians:

"Four of us, P. J. Rooney, of Seattle: C. Sullivan and F. Sullivan, brothers, from Butte county, Mont., and myself left Seattle in April on the schooner Idzzie Colby. We landed at Cape Lipin, Unimak Island, on May 12th, to prospect the country. On Jane 7th we landed in a dory at another part of the island, and went some distance from the shore to a dory at another part of the Island, and went some distance from the shore to put up our tent. On returning to the boat at 2 p.m. we found that the Indians had stolen our guns and ammunition, and on looking around saw them hiding behind some rocks. They opened fire without a word of warning and shot Florence Sullivan dead. Con Sullivan and myself, having no way to protect ourselves, ran for the hills. As we turned the natives fired again, hitting Rooney, who fell mortally wounded, whereupon an Indian ran up to him and shot him dead. They then directed their fire at Sullivan and myself, and finally shot Sullivan in the

Mills. This mill was the newest of three which comprise the works here, and was equiped with all modern machinery and improvements. It was situated on the St. Francis river, about three-quarters of a mile above town, and was built about three years ago. It contained a pulp mill and machinery for making paper for the Star and La Presse. It is supposed that the fire was caused by spontaneous combustion. The building was a total loss in an hour. The loss is estimated at about \$200,000; well insured. Eighty hands are thrown out of employment. It reached the paes, almost dend from hunger, exhaustion and pain. 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
