



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba of the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 168 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry or Inspection must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent.

COAL,—Coal lands may be purchased at 110 per acre for soft coal and 320 for anthractle. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or company.

Royally at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.

QUARTZ.—A free miner's certificate is granted upon payment in advance of 35 per annum for an individual, and from 150 to 1500 per annum for a company according to capital.

A free inner, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500 feet.

The feer for recording a claim is \$5.


