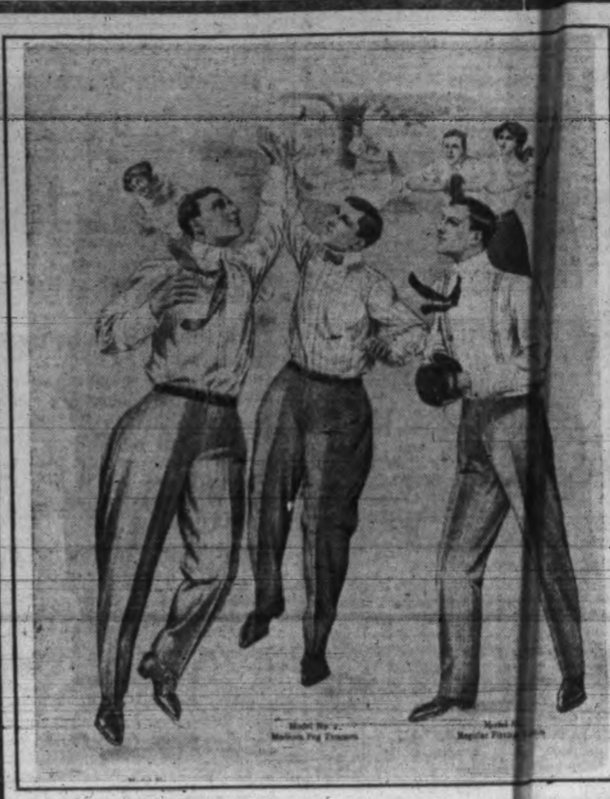

LOSE SUPPORT IN VANCOUVER

PEOPLE ARE ARRAYED AGAINST THE CABINET

Members Are Hissed and Called on to Resign - Premier's Statement

Legislative Press Gallery, Feb. 23.
The government is none too strong in Vancouver and South Vancouver at this moment, thanks to the attorney-general who having been elected at the head of the poll in the Terminal City, is naturally looked to to protect and advance its interests.

Premier McBride, rising after prayers, said he desired to make a statement on a question commonly known as the annexation of Vancouver.

As a result of his most careful consideration since the submission of the government's final decision, and of very close consideration of the views that were presented by the gentlemen who composed the deputation, he, and after careful counsel with his colleagues, he was able to say that the government had approached the matter with every consciousness of the responsibility resting upon them.

The deputation which had seen him the night before had asked that the government reconsider this decision. He found that there was ranged behind them a number of citizens, and that another meeting was held on Sunday in one of the theatres as well.

With regard to South Vancouver it would be quite competent to investigate its needs for sewerage, with care and deliberation, and the government would have the province's assistance in that investigation, and the formulation of a comprehensive scheme of sewerage for greater Vancouver.

**CLOSING HOURS OF THE SESSION**

**RUSHING LEGISLATION WITHOUT CONSIDERATION**

**Many Bills Were Put Through Final Stages at Yesterday's Sittings**

Legislative Press Gallery, Feb. 28.  
The House practically closed its labors at this evening's sitting, having spent the two days in rushing legislation through at top speed. There was no pretence at a considered discussion of anything and the criticism which was advanced got scant attention. So hurriedly were bills put through that three or four government measures, after passing third reading and leaving the House, had had to be sent back by message from his Honor in order to have some change or addition made which ministers did not think of in time.  
Protest has been made several times during the past week by the Liberal and Socialist members against the House being asked to enact legislation practically in the dark, bills being brought down and passed before members had time to digest them or consider the effect of the legislation proposed.  
A bill to amend the Counties Definition Act was put through by the attorney-general. This places Queen Charlotte Islands in Atlin county instead of Vancouver, which will be more convenient, especially since the county court judge now lives in Prince Rupert. The North Thompson country is removed from Cariboo county to Yale county and part of Nicola district from New Westminster to Yale.  
In committee on the Health Act amendments Hon. Dr. Young introduced a section exempting from the vaccination provisions those who make a statutory declaration that they conscientiously believe vaccination would be prejudicial to their health or that of their children.  
"There are a few people in British Columbia who are troubled with a conscience in this matter," said the provincial secretary. "The government does not wish to insist on the adoption of sanitary measures as a personal habit and if people do not want to be vaccinated because they have conscientious objections we do not wish to force them. But when an epidemic does come I shall insist on the carrying out of this section in the interests of the public, and I shall make them take the oath that they have a conscientious objection."  
The text of the new section is as follows:  
"Any regulation heretofore made, and in force or hereafter to be made by the provincial board of health requiring the vaccination or revaccination of all persons resident within the jurisdiction of any health officer, shall be deemed not to apply to any person who makes an affidavit, or a statutory declaration before a magistrate or any other person authorized to take oaths to the effect that such person conscientiously believes that vaccination would be prejudicial to his health (or the health of his child, as the case may be) or for conscientious reasons objects to vaccination, and such person shall deliver or transmit by registered mail to the health officer for the district in which he resides, a certificate by such magistrate or other official person before whom the oath was taken of such conscientious objection."  
The Municipal Clauses Act amending bill being again taken up in committee Hon. A. E. McPhillips moved to strike out the words "or prohibit from the clause giving municipalities power to pass by-laws to regulate or prohibit the keeping of wild animals in captivity." The words were struck out.  
Mr. McPhillips also protested against municipalities being allowed to issue debentures for or levy taxes in respect of roads where the work was not properly done or in accordance with the specifications. He instanced the case of Richardson street paving, where the city had not done the work in accordance with the by-laws, as was acknowledged over the signatures of the city clerk and city engineer. He had spoken to the attorney-general about it, and that gentleman said the city had no right to levy but that the act was a general act and no exceptions could be made. This would be notice to the city that when it did not comply with the by-laws if it attempted to collect the local improvement rate it would be directly against the conscience if not the letter of the law. Municipal government was sometimes brought into disrepute for the reason that councils did not live up to the same order of rectitude that private citizens had to. If the council attempted to exact the rate for Richardson street it might look for some remedial legislation. Councils too frequently became arrogant and autocratic and came to the legislature year after year to put up fences against their own citizens. The legislature should not be made an instrument for doing this.  
Just before the House rose at six o'clock Mr. Hawthorthwaite introduced a petition from Bert Richardson, asking for legislation to compel his enrolment as a dentist in this province. The member for Nanaimo briefly reviewed the case known to the public in regard to the struggle which this

**EXCHANGE OF OWNERS IN MARINE HOSPITAL**

**Federal Authorities Agree to Grant Province Site of Present Building**

In return for the Dominion Government waiving its title to the area of between one and two acres of the Indian reserve, on which the marine hospital now stands, the provincial legislature last night expressed its willingness to cancel the maintenance charges of a marine hospital against the Dominion Government. The federal authorities will either establish a new marine hospital in another location, or otherwise take care of patients through the public hospitals.  
The matter was taken up with the Dominion Government by Hon. William Ross, minister of lands, who yesterday received in reply a telegram from Ottawa agreeing to the province taking over the land provided the Dominion Government was relieved of its hospital charges. A resolution dealing with the matter was moved in the House last night by Mr. Ross and adopted. It reads as follows:  
"Whereas, by an agreement, bearing date the 25th day of October, 1910, made by and between His Majesty, King George V. in right of his province of British Columbia, represented by the Honorable Richard McBride as his trustee, of the one part, and that band of Indians, known as the 'Songhees

Josef Hofmann.  
"Beyond Josef Hofmann there is nothing in the piano art," writes Thomas Nunan in the San Francisco Examiner of Monday last. "I do not feel inclined to say, as some other enthusiasts do, that Hofmann stands unrivalled. That should not be said while Paderewski and Grieg are still alive, and several others are on the concert stage; and to assert that any living pianist is the peer of the equal, of Hofmann is praise enough. Twenty-five years ago this pianist first came to San Francisco. Then he was ten years ago, Poland's 'boy-prodigy,' a juvenile wonder of the world. Three years ago we heard him, a matured pianist and musician. Now he is here again, this time a little giant of the piano, greater as a man-musical than he ever was as a boy-marvel. That he can develop still further seems impossible of belief. Surely he is a supreme master of technique, and intellectually he ranks with the composers whose work he interprets. But this pianist no longer belongs to Poland, the land of his birth; nor to Germany, where long he resided; nor to Switzerland, where in a summer home overlooking Lake Geneva he is neighbor to Paderewski. He considers himself a resident of the United States, and like his illustrious summer neighbor in the Swiss republic, he has an irrefragable sense of the inalienable right of human liberty."  
Mr. Nunan's comment upon Hofmann's programme is peculiarly interesting because it is the same programme that Hofmann is playing at the Victoria theatre to-morrow evening, this recital being one more event of the first magnitude, for which local music-lovers have to thank the enter-

Tribe of the other part, it was agreed, that, upon the terms and conditions therein mentioned the said tribe of Indians would remove from the tract of land on which they resided within the confines of the city of Victoria, British Columbia, and commonly known as the 'Songhees Reserve' and would transfer to his said Majesty in right of his province all their claims for rights in and improvements on the lands within the boundaries of the said 'Songhees Reserve'.  
"And whereas, by the terms of union under which British Columbia was admitted into the Dominion of Canada, Canada agreed to assume and defray the charges for a marine hospital at said city of Victoria, and which marine hospital has been erected and maintained on land within the boundaries of said Songhees reserve.  
"And whereas, it is necessary for the carrying out of the purposes of such such Indian reserve is being acquired as aforesaid, that the lands and premises now occupied by or held in connection with such marine hospital should be rendered available forthwith to his said Majesty in right of this province;

NO BULLION STOLEN FROM STEAMER'S MAIL

The Princess Beatrice Did Not Carry Gold Dust—One Registered Sack Taken

(Times Leased Wire.) Vancouver, March 1.—Picked up by a tramp schooner named by confederates, the men who robbed the Canadian mails on the steamship Princess Beatrice between Skagway and Vancouver are thought to have made good their escape with their booty. Information has reached Vancouver to the effect that the tramp was decked at Prince Rupert for several days previous to the return of the Beatrice from her voyage to the north. She pulled out at the same time as did the Beatrice, and headed for the open sea. Though the police refuse to talk on the case, it is concluded that they have a feeling that their quarry have escaped. In the event that the customs operators did not take to sea, the topography of the mainland between this city and Skagway—a four-day voyage usually by steamer, is such as to afford ideal opportunities for escape.

The Dominion police at Ottawa, one of the most thorough forces in the world, who handle cases which only effect government matters, have been brought into play, the Royal Northwest Mounted Police have been asked to co-operate and no stone is being left unturned to round up the marine rascals.

With the arrival of the Princess Beatrice in port last night, the officers emphatically denied the reports which had been received here stating that gold dust amounting to several thousand dollars had been stolen, as they did not bring any bullion down from the north. They, however, admitted that one of the registered mail sacks had been tampered with and that letters containing Canadian currency had been taken.

The Beatrice had a fine trip to the north and encountered very little rough weather. She brought south about forty passengers and 180 tons of ore from the Big Thing mine at Athol, which was discharged at Ladysmith for the Tyee Copper Company. Besides this she had about fifteen tons of general freight.

RETURNS FROM NORTH

Bringing twenty passengers from the north, the Boscowitz steamer Yadao arrived in port last night from northern British Columbia points. The vessel brought over from Vancouver ten tons of solder for Evans, Coleman & Evans. Fine weather was experienced all the time during the fortnight she has been away from port. The Yadao will sail for the north again to-night, and is taking a good sized cargo as well as a large number of passengers.

UMATILLA FOR "FRISCO"

Taking but 57 passengers and little freight, the Pacific Coast steamship Umatilla left port this morning for San Francisco. The vessel brought over from the South 30 tons of general freight for Victoria merchants, which was brought up from the south on the Governor. The passenger lists on the southern bound boats are gradually getting smaller, the trend of travel now being reverse, as people are returning north after spending the winter in California. The City of Puebla, of the same line, is due to arrive here tomorrow afternoon from San Francisco. She is bringing 147 tons of general freight for Victoria besides a number of passengers.

POACHERS' TACKLE TAKEN BY KESTREL

Schooner Was Ten Miles Off Shore but Gear Was Inside Limit Near Cape Cook

The fishery cruiser Kestrel has made a capture as well as the trawl. A day or two ago she arrived at Quatsino with six settings of halibut trawls which she picked up close to Cape Cook within the three-mile limit. At the time the gear was captured a schooner was sighted ten miles off shore travelling under sail and gas, and she was probably the boat which left the gear behind in her efforts not to be caught. The capture included nearly three miles of line with hooks. Some of it was taken up and the rest cut adrift. There was a lot of cod and halibut on the hooks so that the officers and men of the Kestrel had abundance of fresh fish for a few days.

The Kestrel was hugging the shore west and the fishing schooner evidently sighted the cruiser long before the little fishing craft could be seen by the officers of the Kestrel. The fishing vessel then gathered in what gear she could together with her dories and was well outside the limit before the Dominion government vessel reached the scene of the poaching. Reports from the West Coast state that the story published recently in the Colonist in regard to poaching in the bays is untrue. It is only at such points as Cape Cook that they dare put down their tackle, for the Kestrel is cruising back and forth constantly. In the case just mentioned the schooner would have been captured had she been fishing in a bay.

QUADRA AND LEEBRO LEAVE PORT TO-DAY

Former Going to North With Lighthouse Supplies and Latter to West Coast

Carrying lighthouse supplies for the keepers in the north, and a number of beacons to be placed in Stewart channel, the steamer Quadra and Marine and Fisheries department, left port at noon to-day in charge of Capt. Halsett. The lighthouse tender has had only a short stay in Port, arriving here last Thursday afternoon.

In Stewart Channel the aids to navigation are very few, but when the Quadra has completed the work of placing the new beacons at the head of the channel the task of plotting vessels through this water will be rendered more easy. Quadra will be away from port for several weeks, and if favored with fine weather may return to port earlier than is expected. On the last trip she was stormbound in the north on several occasions, but all vessels that have returned to here since then have reported that the weather is becoming fine.

To-night the steamer Leebro (Capt. Hunter) under charter to the Marine and Fisheries department, will leave for the west coast. She is taking B. H. Fraser, assistant chief engineer of the Dominion government, who arrived from Ottawa a few days ago, on a tour of inspection of the trails and lighthouses now in the course of construction.

At the rate of \$6,150 per month the steamship Purley, of the Vancouver New York line, has been chartered by Andrew Weir & Co. She is to be delivered on March 19 at Comox, and is to load several million feet of lumber, besides a large general cargo, for Australia.

J. S. Byrom, port steward of the B. C. Coast Service, has left on an extended trip through the United States, Great Britain and the Continent. He is visiting California and other states and at New York will take one of the Cunarders across the Atlantic.

John Braden, who returned from Albernai by the steamer Tees yesterday met with an accident at Bantford, falling from a platform to the rocks, about six feet below. He was removed to the Jubilee hospital on arrival of the steamer.

After having repairs made, caused through the collision in Grenville channel with the steamer Meteor, the fishing schooner Kingdisher was launched from the Star Ways yesterday and proceeded to Vancouver, her home port. Her damage amounted to several thousand dollars and was repaired by the B. C. Marine Railway Co.

While standing in the galley of his vessel drinking a cup of coffee, Capt. William Benyon, of the Dominion government tug Princess, tender to the dredger Mudrak, was stricken with a paralytic stroke several days ago. He was immediately removed to the hospital for treatment and it was discovered that his left side had been paralyzed. Capt. Benyon is well known along the waterfront and his many friends will regret greatly the news of his severe sickness.
