Some experiments have been made in France to determine the specific action of a considerable lowering of temperature upon the brilliancy of certain bodies which shine in the dark after having been exposed to sunlight. Tubes of glass filled with the powdered sulphides of calcium, barium, strontium, etc., all substances possessing the property of phosphorescence in a high degree. COMMERCIAL **COHO** BOSTON.

phides of calcium, barium, strontum, etc., all substances possessing the property of phosphorescence in a high degree, were exposed to the solar rays and afterward proved to be luminous in the dark, this being done in such a way as to fix upon the memery the mean value of the progressive diminution of the emitted light, and the time also was noted during which the light was strong, less strong and weak respectively. The tubes were next placed in bright smilight for one minute and then suddenly introduced into a double walled glass cylinder, the interspace of which was filled with nitrous oxide at 140 degrees C. In about five or six minutes the temperature of the tubes was some 100 degrees. They were then withdrawn, and when observed in a perfectly dark chamber no luminosity whatever was perceptible. As the tubes recovered their normal temperature, however, the phosphorescence returned without the exciting agency of the sun's rays or of diffused light. These results were proved to be general for all phosphorescents substances employed. In fact, some such preparation should be frequently used to retain a healthy condition of every part of the mouth.

A 2 per cent solution of salicylic acid is especially recommended by the profession.



A good knife of moderate size and great sharpness is a necessity. In sharpening a carving knife the sharpner should hold the blade close to the stone, almost flat. Hold the carving knife firmly with one hand, pressing the thumb against the back of the blade, and frequently whet the knife against the steel. We are told that the use of ice for cooling rooms causes "dampness," while the ammonia apparatus produces "a pure, dry cold." It is hardly necessary to say that the facts are just the other way. When warm air, which, in inhabited buildings, is always moist air, passes over ice, the moisture of the air is condensed by the reduction of temperature and deposited on the ice, to be carried away with the drainage water from the ice, and the air which passes beyond the ice is not only cool, but comparatively dry, as its moisture has been, so to speak, wrung out of it by the ice. With pipes filled with ammonia chilled liquid running through the room to be cooled, the case is reversed. All the moisture originally contained in the air remains in the room.

Such air as comes in contact with the cold pipes will deposit its moisture in the form of drops of water, which will either fall on the floor or must be collected in some way and drained off, while the remaining air will be held at the point of saturation. What Makes Niagara Falls' Power?
What makes Niagara falls' power possible is the fact that Lake Superior, Lake Michigan, Lake Huron and Lake Eric, with a combined area of 90,000 square miles, representing the reservoirs of some 250,000 square miles of watershed, are situated 600 feet above the sea level. The great volume of water falling over the vast territory flows on its natural course to the Atlantic occam with but a slight descent, until it is brought into the narrow Niagara river, when, in the rapids just above the falls, it declines 55 feet and then, with a s'ingle plunge, drops into the abyss, 165 feet below. Enrineut engineers have computed that 275,000 cubic feet of water pass over the falls every recent, especienting in the recital energy over 6 630, 600 homepower.—Castier's Magazane.

Delicous Cool Drinks.

Currant Water.—To a pint of red currant juice and a gill of raspberry juice add a pound of palverized sugar, a quart of water and a lump of ice.

Cherry Water.—Bruise and rub through a hair sieve enough ripe cherries to produce a pint of juice. Add to this a pound of pulverized sugar, a quart of water and sufficient ice to cool.

Raspberry Vinegar.—Take any quantity of ripe raspberries, place them in a stoneware jar, add white wine or pure cider vinegar, just sufficient to cover them. Cover the jar closely and set aside for five or six days in a moderately cool situation to infuse. Now filter off the liquid and add an equal quantity of simple strup. Mix well together, bottle and keep in a cold place. When wanted for use, dilute with water or with any kind of aerated mineral water.

ETIQUETTE.

What to Do When Leaving Town and o What to be When Leaving rown and own Various Gecasions.

When a lady leaves town, as usual, for the season, or if she is only to make a summer voyage, she sends P. P. C. cards to such of her friends or acquaintances as she is indebted to for unacknowledged civilities. If she chooses, she sends also her temporary address. When she returns to town again, it is not customary for mere nequaintances to show their consciousness of her presence until she is ready to resume social life again, at which time she sends out her visiting card with her receiving day engraved upon its left hand corner. A properly kept visiting list will explain which lady should make the first call in the autumn.






