

### **Specimen Trees**

We desire to call attention to the following list of specimen trees, which we have in particularly fine shape. We invite intending purchasers to examine at our nursery at Scarborough, N. Y., the stock de-scribed below, which should be seen to be appre-ciated. It will be found to be unequaled in quality.

#### **EVERGREENS**

Colorado Blue Spruce (Koster type). We have a

particularly fine stock of this, plants ranging in height from 8 to 16 feet—perfect specimens. Oriental Spruce. Fine specimens, 6 to 8 feet high.

Juniperus virginiana glauca. Very heavy, sheared specimens, broad and full. Unusually fine plants, 6 to 10 feet high.

Juniperus Pfitzeriana. Heavy, bush feet high and 4 to 6-foot spread. Heavy, bushy plants, 4 to 6

Hemlock. Heavy sheared specimens, 7 to 14 feet high.

White Pine. We have a fine stock of large speci-men trees, 5 to 12 feet high—compact, bushy, well-shaped plants.

Pinus Cembra (Swiss Stone Pine). Specimens, 6 to 8 feet high.

Mugho Pine. Montana type. Broad, compact speci-mens, 4 to'5 feet in diameter.

Retinospora filifera aurea. Elegant specimens, 5 to 7 feet high and 5 to 7 feet in diameter.

Taxus cuspidata brevifolia. Heavy specimens, 4 to 7 feet in diameter.

#### LARCH

European. Very heavy, perfect specimens, branched from the ground. 8 to 16 feet high and 8 to 12 feet in diameter.

#### RHODODENDRONS

We have a large stock of plants in medium to large sizes, ranging from 4 to 7 feet in height.

#### JAPANESE MAPLES

The cut-leaved, blood-leaved Maple. Dissectum. Very fine broad specimens, 31/2 to 6 feet high, 4 to 6 feet in diameter.

Sanguineum. Blood-leaved Maple. Unusually fine specimens, 5 to 12 feet high.

#### DOGWOODS

White-flowered. Large specimen trees, 12 to 16 feet high, well-shaped, both standard and low-branched—an exceptionally fine lot of trees.


Red-flowered. We have a large stock of medium-sized specimens, 6 feet high, also a more limited stock of large specimens, 8 to 10 feet high.

#### WHITE BIRCH

European White (Betula alba). Very fine speci-mens, 15 to 20 feet high, 3- to 5-inch caliper.

Berberis Thunbergii. Heavy sheared specimens, 4 feet high and 4 to 5 feet in diameter. Trained Fruit Trees. Fan-shaped, pyramidal, etc.

### Offices and Show Room

Our offices and show room are at Tarrytown, New York, which is our post office address, where all communications should be sent. We have here the finest flower store in the world, erected in 1914. From this part of our establishment we distribute to the retail trade the choicest roses, carnations, violets, and other flowers in their season, fresh from our own greenhouses at Scarborough, on the Albany Post Road, five miles north of Tarrytown. In our green-houses at Tarrytown are grown the finest Pierson ferns and other varieties, of which we make a speferns and other varieties, of which we make a spe-cialty, also palms and other decorative plants. We deal, also, extensively in all kinds of bulbs and seeds and other requisites for country estates.

#### **Floral Decorations**

We give particular attention to floral decorations, employing men who are experienced in this line of work, and we have facilities for arranging artistically flowers and plants for all occasions.

#### Greenhouse Establishment

Our greenhouse establishment is located at Scar-borough, New York, and is one of the largest in the United States. The greenhouses are of immense size, each covering half an acre, and are devoted to the cultivation of cut flowers, with which we supply the markets of New York, Boston, Pittsburgh, Cleve-land action citize land, and other cities.

#### Nurseries

Our nurseries, comprising fifty acres, are at Scar-borough, which is on the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R., five miles north of Tarrytown. Thus the grounds are very accessible to those who wish to reach them by the railroad; and as they extend from the railroad station at the river to Broadway, or the Albany Post Road, along which they extend two-thirds of a mile, they are also very conveniently located for those who wish to reach them by automobile. Our nurseries are exceedingly interesting when the various shrubs are in bloom—from early spring until late fall. Visitors are always welcome; in fact, we invite intending pur-chasers to order in person rather than by mail, as, unless one is familiar with the stock wanted, a per-sonal inspection is always more satisfactory. Where distance or time will not permit, orders sent by mail will receive our most careful and prompt attention. Our stock of hardy shrubs and trees is very com-plete, and our collection of rare plants is unexcelled, comprising beautiful specimens—much larger than

comprising beautiful specimens-much larger than the usual nursery sizes-and many novelties which few nurseries carry.

We have a particularly fine stock of rhododen-drons in the finest hardy varieties; also elegant specimens of hemlocks, Japanese maples, dogwoods, Koster's blue spruce, Juniperus Virginiana glauca and Pfitzeriana, etc.

#### Landscape Work

is a most important feature of our business. We are prepared to design and carry out the most elaborate plans for planting private estates, either large or small. We employ experienced draughtsmen, and are always glad to submit suggestions or plans. We have, also, excellent facilities for moving and

transplanting large trees.

#### Guarantee

We guarantee everything when shipped from our nursery to be in good growing condition and of the best quality. After that our responsibility ceases, as we cannot assume responsibility for failure due to unfavorable planting or growing conditions, and we will in no way be responsible for the results. Our stock is transplanted frequently and is well-rooted, and will always grow under favorable conditions.

### Shipping

Spring shipping season of nursery stock begins the end of March and closes early in May. Fall shipping begins the end of September, after the foliage begins to fall after early frosts, and continues until the ground freezes. Evergreens can be planted to advantage in August and September. Shipment of nursery stock while in dormant con-dition can be made by freight; and where the quan-tity is considerable, we advise shipment by freight, excepting at the close of the season, when it may be necessary to ship by express on account of lack of

necessary to ship by express on account of lack of time.

Shipments by express or freight are at purchaser's risk. If for any reason goods are injured in transit, claim must be made on the delivery company at once, as our responsibility ceases after we deliver goods to transportation company in good order. When a large quantity of nursery stock is required, and the distore will parmit we recommend delivery

and the distance will permit, we recommend delivery by automobile truck, which is a much quicker and safer delivery than by freight. The charges for such delivery will be made as reasonable as possible, ac-cording to the distance from our nursery.

### Packing

As it is impossible to include the cost of packing in the price of nursery stock, we make a small charge, sufficient to cover the cost of packing; but where shipments are large enough to be shipped in bulk in carload lots, we deliver goods to the cars, and make no charge for carting or packing.

#### Terms

New customers, unknown to us, who desire to open accounts, must give satisfactory references as to their responsibility.

Orders from unknown purchasers, unaccompanied by remittance or satisfactory references, will be shipped by express C. O. D.

# for the Garden

T HE ROSES HERE OFFERED ARE EXTRA STRONG TWO-YEAR-OLD FIELD-GROWN DORMANT PLANTS, WHICH, IF PLANTED EARLY, WILL GIVE A LARGE NUMBER OF FLOWERS THE FIRST YEAR. THEY CAN BE PLANTED AS EARLY IN THE SPRING AS THE FROST IS OUT OF THE GROUND, AND FROM THAT TIME UNTIL ABOUT THE FIRST WEEK IN MAY, AFTER WHICH TIME IT IS IMPOSSI-BLE TO TRANSPLANT THEM. MOST OF THE VARIETIES OFFERED IN THIS LIST ARE GRAFTED. MANY OF

MOST OF THE VARIETIES OFFERED IN THIS LIST ARE GRAFTED. MANY OF THE FINEST VARIETIES CAN ONLY BE OFFERED IN THIS WAY, AS THEY DO BETTER GRAFTED THAN ON OWN ROOTS. GRAFTED ROSES SHOULD ALWAYS BE PLANTED DEEP. THE STOCK ON WHICH THEY ARE GRAFTED SHOULD BE NOT LESS THAN TWO INCHES BELOW THE SURFACE OF THE GROUND. IF PLANTED IN THIS WAY, THEY WILL NOT START FROM THE STOCK, AND WILL GIVE MUCH BETTER SATISFACTION THAN ROSES ON OWN ROOTS, BECAUSE THEY WILL MAKE A STRONGER AND HEAVIER GROWTH.

THE SOIL SHOULD BE DEEPLY TRENCHED AND WELL MANURED—IT CANNOT BE MADE TOO RICH. AFTER THE ROSES ARE PLANTED, THEY SHOULD BE PRUNED BACK TO WITHIN SIX INCHES OF THE GROUND, AND THE SOIL SHOULD BE WELL FIRMED IN AROUND THE ROOTS. WHILE ROSES CAN BE LIFTED AND PLANTED AS LATE AS THE FIRST OF MAY, IT IS ADVISABLE TO PLANT THEM AS EARLY AS POSSIBLE IN THE SPRING— JUST AS SOON AS THE GROUND CAN BE SPADED AFTER FROST COMES OUT. THE EARLIER THEY ARE PLANTED, THE BETTER THEY WILL DO. DORMANT PLANTS CAN BE SUPPLIED UP TO MAY 1.

### **Climbing Roses**

Climbing Roses are a great addition to the rose garden. They can be grown not only as climbers, but in pillar form as well, and can also be tied down and grown in beds. They can also be planted to advantage among shrubbery and on the border of rock gardens, etc., producing exquisite effects.

#### DR. W. VAN FLEET

Flowers large, full, and double; delicately perfumed. Delicate flesh-pink on the outer surface, deepening to rosy flesh in the center. Buds are pointed. Center of flower built high; petals beautifully undulated and cupped. When fully open, flower measures four inches and more in diameter. #### EXCELSA



### **Trained Fruit Trees**

There are several advantages in planting trained fruit trees. They do not occupy as much space as the larger trees do, but can be planted in the greenhouse. or in the garden against fences, walls, and buildings, and, consequently, do not shade other portions of the ground.
