### The Front Cover of This Book

Continuing our series of 'Gardens of the Great, we picture on the front cove the Juniel Mansion and its gardens as they, no doubt, appeared during the closing years of the eighteenth century

years of the eighteenth century

The mansion stands on Harlem Heights at a point now designated as 160ti Street and Jumel Terrace. Once it was way out in the country, but the City of New York has long since passed it in its sweep northward. The visitor to New York City can easily reach it by the Broadway Subway to 157th Street or by the Amsterdam Avenue surface cars.

The mansion stands on a rocky bluff overlooking the river and the plain to the south, where the battle of Harlem Heights was fought. From the batcon which may be seen in the picture, General Washington was able to view through his field glasses all the movements leading up to the light.

The interior of the mansion, which is open to all visitors, well illustrates the perfect Jechnique in craftsmanship attained by our early American builders an eabinetmakers, and besides many relies of Madame Jumel, it contains the William Lanier Washington collection of colonial furniture.

At the right of the mansion, and also in the rear, may be seen remains of the old garden, the outlines of the formal part of it being still visible. The house was built by Cot. Roger Morris, who married the beautiful Man Philipse in 1765, and they occupied the mansion for ten years. Washington and Morris had been warm friends in their youth, both having served with the Britise commander General Braddock; but the outbreak of the Revolutionary Wastensen of them to part as enemies, Col. Morris taking sides with the King. Hi estate was confiscated, and after the war sold by Congress to Stephen Junie. French merchant in New York, who paid \$10,000 for the mansion and thirty-sis acres surrounding it. Being a man of influence in his day, and a friend of the great Napoleon, it came about that the old mansion at various times sheltered such men as Lafayette, Louis Napoleon, Joseph Bonaparte, Jerome Bonaparte the Prince de Jomville and many other celebrities of the period. Here, also, were entertained among others the great figures of revolutionary times, Washingtor Hamilton and Burr. On July 1st, 1833, Aaron Burr married Madame Jinnethen the widow of Stephen Jumel, in the Tea Room of the mansion at the left of the entrance, and here Madame Jumel continued to hold court for year-receiving her guests and friends seated on a das. One of the last of the distinguished men to be received liv her was General W. T. Sherman

In habit this variety is a vigorous stoloniferous creeper and is the only other bent that can compare favorably with Creeping or Velvet Bents. - BERMUDA GRASS (Cynodon Dactylon). A most valuable grass for the Southern course. There is an unbelievable wealth and variety of food to be found in the vegetable kingdom if one investigates its possibilities and is willing to try the new varieties offered by seedsmen from time to time.

The average owner of a small garden usually limits himself or herself to not more than half-a-dozen of the better-known varieties, and passes over with indifference, or at least is not eager to try, the new introductions. This is not as it should be, and there is little doubt that all owners of gardens would find it much to their advantage to try out the new things.

From among the nations who have from time immemorial relied mainly upon a vegetable diet, one may select the Chinese and Italian peoples as representative, although all South European nations eat but little meat, due to a certain extent to its expensiveness. However that may be, this dependence upon a vegetable diet has led them to investigate mere closely than other peoples the edibility of them to investigate more closely than other peoples the edibility of vegetable plants and the possibilities of improving them hybridizing and selection.

That they have been successful in bringing forth for the use of man many varieties unknown to other nations, will be apparent to all by a perusal of the two following pages.

The endurance for which these people are so remarkable is no doubt due in a large measure to the fact that their vegetable diet has always provided them with a large supply of the all-important vitamins and mineral salts, so necessary to health and well-being.

In our country the campaign of vitamin education through health agencies and workers, newspapers and magazines, the public schools, health clinics, and other channels of information has been very effective, and to it, no doubt, is largely due the surprising increase in the acreage given over to growing vegetables, both for market and in private gardens.

There can be but little doubt that the increased healthfulness of our people is in large part due to the vast increase in the consumption of vegetable foods, and we are sure that the introduction of varieties little known to the American people will be the means of still further



#### Three Varieties of Chinese Cabbage Illustrated Above

These introductions from the Celestial Empire have been grown there for forty centuries and constitute a very important part of the food of the Chinese people. P'tsai, Chi-hi-li and Wong Bok have also been known for some years to a comparatively small number of people in America who appreciate Chinese food and cooking, but they have not become known to the general public, because it has been hard to get seed in sufficient quantities to warrant seedsmen in pushing the sale. We have pleasure in announcing that we have made arrangements in China to ohtain a much larger supply of seed than usual for this year.

The most outstanding characteristic of Chinese Cabbage is its perfect digestibility. There are many people who are fond of ordinary Cabbage, but dare not eat it on account of the unpleasant after-effect experienced; but no such objections can be made against Chinese Cabbage, and one may eat and enjoy it to the fullest extent.

COOKING. Besides being used boiled like cabbage, it is equally desirable and delectable served as salad or cold slaw, and may be eaten the same as lettuce or cabbage. The proper way to cook it for a vegetable is to break it into small pieces into a saucepan and cover with boiling water. Let it stand until cold, then drain and cover again with boiling water, letting it boil twenty-five minutes. It may be served with a sauce. When used as salad, cut up like celery into a bowl and cover with boiling water Let stand a few minutes, drain and cover with cold water; in about half an hour drain and shake until dry. Serve with any dressing preferred. preferred.

CULTURAL DIRECTIONS. Cool weather is required for best results, and where the summers are cool, sow seed in early spring. In the latitude of New York, sow seed about the middle of June, earlier if further North and later if further South. Sow in the open ground as the plants are

liable to a set-back if transplanted. Sow in rows eighteen inches apart, and cover seed one-half inch deep. When the plants are about three inches high thin out to stand fifteen inches apart in the rows. Cultivate same as Cabbage. It requires 120 days from seed sowing to mature the plants.



All the lattice work is covered by perennial climbers, including Aristolochia or Dutchman's Pipe, Clematis and Lathyrus or Perennial Sweet Pea. The garden walks are made of old flagstones, with small rock garden plants growing between, such as Saxifraga, Ceras-tium, Arabis, etc. The bed in the center is Heliotrope surrounded by Sweet Alyssum. On the left is a group of Lavatera. In the rear of the Sundial are two wire cylinders on which Sweet Peas are growing, a new way of growing them. Other plants are Hollyhock, Petunia, Dianthus, and Hardy Pinks. A very beautiful little Grown acres. ful little flower garden.

Is a photo of a path and a doorway in a brick wall. Over the doorway climbs the famous rose Dr. Van Fleet introduced by us. 

## What One Customer Did with Henderson's Flower Seed Collections

The illustration below was made from a photo, sent to us hy Mrs. H. A. Heilman, Kittanniny, Pa. It shows the flower gardens surrounding her hungalow, about forty miles north of Pittshurgh. The flowers in the various beds and borders were mostly raised from Henderson's Flower Seed Collections, excepting where larger quantities were required, some varieties being planted directly on the ground, and other varieties sown in boxes and transplanted later to the beds. Mrs. Heilman says in her letter describing the photo, "The arches are covered with Japanese Morning Glories, not yet in flower, but the heds and borders are hrilliant in color, but the photograph does not show them off. The long beds along the arches are borders of dwarf Marigold, Phlox, Zinnia, annual Chrysanthemum, Gaillardia, Portulaca, California Poppy, Snapdragon, Nemesia,

Balsam, Matricaria, etc. The borders in the background, too, are radiant with all colors imaginahle. Here also are planted climbers and some tall foliage plant such as Castor Oil Bean (Ricinus), Cosmos and Nicotiana. The climbers are Canary Bird Vine, Cardinal Climber—which is very fine—and more of the Japanese Morning Glories. In making my garden I used two collections and also 4 packets each of Portulaca, Nemophila, Lavatera, Phlox and Japanese Morning Glory."

The plan will enable anyone to make a similar garden, and the fact that all the flowers in it are raised from seed, places such a garden within the reach of everyhody. The round bed on one side of the plan is not shown but it should be made the same size as the one on the other side, using dwarf Antirrhinum for the center and Phlox drummondii for the border

The Delphinium has now taken rank as one of the most popular hardy perennial plants, and is a favorite in every garden in the United States.

Seeds must be sown between May and July in the garden, and it is desirable to sow them in some place where the young seedlings will be partly sheltered by other plants.

The vegetable garden is a good place to raise the seedlings, which must be thinned out to stand 8 inches apart. In the autumn transplant them to their place in the hardy border, and year by year thereafter you will bave an increasingly large crop of beautiful flowers. Seeds may also be planted in a cold frame and covered slightly with brush or lattice work instead of glass.

These varieties are very charming and beautiful, and quite indispensable in the hardy border. 

# Rockeries and Rock Gardens Summer is the best time to build a Rock Garden

Often, after clearing up new grounds, masses of stones will be present nich would be difficult to dispose of, and these can he used to good

advantage.

Sclect a partially shaded location where the ground has ordinary moisture and is well-drained. Begin hy placing the stones so as to allow the moisture from rains to run into the garden and not away from it. After placing a stone in position, work the soil in well around it in order to allow the moisture to work up among the stones and give the proper conditions for growing rock plants. Any air spaces that are left hetween the stones will prevent an even degree of moisture in the garden.

Rock gardens can be made any height desired. When building the upper course, he sure that planting spaces 8 to 10 inches in diameter are left so that a number of plants can he planted on the top.

There is great scope for the imagination in laying out a rock garden, and it will help the amateur considerably to study some natural rock formation. If a bank or terrace already existing is utilized, loosen it up with a pickaxe and add more soil. Place the stones as previously recommended.

Preparations for a Rock Garden must be made ahead, if all the plants used are Perennials which will not bloom the first year. Seeds should be planted outdoors on the rock garden in the places they are to grow, early in spring and up to July 15th. We strongly recommend planting Darwin Tulips and other hulbs in Rock Gardens as they provide a show in spring-time. (See our Butb Caialogue published Sept. Ist.) (See illustration.)

## **Brief Cultural Directions**

Sowing Sweet Pea Seeds in the Open Ground: When Sweet Peas are to be grown from start to finish in the open ground the seeds should be sown at the earliest possible date in spring, even before frosts are over. for they are quite hardy. But of course this cannot be done until the ground is dry enough to work, i.e., is crumbly, not wet and sticky. The object of early sowing is to give the roots as long a time as possible to develop before the warm weather excites the tops into rapid growth. Slow sturdy top growth and a well developed root-system, roots clear down to the cool, rich, moist lower layers of soil before hot weather, is one of the secrets of success. After the ground has been prepared, raked and leveled, draw a flat furrow with a hoe about 6 inches wide and 3 inches deep and plant the seeds 2 to 3 inches apart zigzag along the center of the furrow, cover with about 1 inch of soil, then tramp firm with the feet; this will leave the seeds in a light depression which will hold moisture and hasten germination. When the seedlings have attained a height of 2 to 3 inches they should be thinned out to remain 6 to 12 inches apart, the greater distance is advised for trench culture if the plants are expected to develop to their maximum capacity. Cultivation should begin just as soon as the plants are large enough to keep the surface of the ground loose, admit air and conserve the soil's moisture. At each of the earlier hoeings draw a little of the ridged soil into the furrow about the plants until it is all level. This gets the roots down deeper where they are less susceptible to the drying out effects of hot weather. We do not believe in ridging up the young seedlings as ridges turn the water away. The vines are of course to be supported by brush or netting.





Majestic and Charming in the Hardy Garden

Lilies are stately and most heautiful bulbous plants-producing large flowers of exquisite outline and varied coloring. They are hardy even in cold locations with protection, and usually surviving for many years. Ideal locations are in the shrubbery or herbaceous border where the roots are sheltered from the hot sun. Groups of 6 or more lilies of a kind, here and there, in such situations are most effective. Large isolated clumps or heds of the varieties Auratum, Henryi, Speciosum, Tigrinum, etc., are also very heautiful. They should be planted just as soon as the ground can be worked 6 to 8 inches below the surface in light soils, or 4 to 5 inches below in heavy soils; in the latter case the bulhs should be surrounded by sand to facilitate drainage.

Auratum. (The Golden Rayed Lily of Japan.) The flowers are pure white, thickly studded with crimson spots, while through the center of each petal runs a clear golden band. Fully expanded, the flowers measure nearly a foot across and possess a most delicious fragrance. Scason of bloom from July to October. 3 to 5 feet. (See illustration.) Our Pot-grown Roses are superior to the Roses usually sent out because they are cut back and potted early in the fall, giving ample time for root action and to allow the plant to grow naturally. They are sturdy and compact and when sent by express with the soil on the roots transplanting scarcely checks their growth. In planting, it is only necessary to make a hole a little larger than the ball of earth on the plant. After it is set in, firm the soil well around the roots, otherwise the dry air will shrivel them up and prevent their development.

Never set the plants out should the ground be wet and soggy, but wait until it is fairly dry. After planting give the soil a thorough soaking, and should the earth around the plant be dry it should be thoroughly saturated with water a day

or so before planting.



If they show premature growth, it is evident that there is too much moisture and means should be taken to reduce it.



## Rock Garden Plants

The construction of a Rock Garden is very simple, especially where stones are plentiful.


Often, after clearing up new grounds, masses of stones will be present which would be difficult to dispose of, and these can be used to good advantage.

Select a partially shaded location where the ground has ordinary moisture and is well-drained. Begin by placing the stones so as to allow the moisture from rains to run into the garden and not away from it. After placing a stone in position, work the soil in well around it in order to allow the moisture to work up among the stones and give the proper conditions for growing rock plants. Any air spaces that are left between the stones will prevent an even degree of moisture in the garden. Rock gardens can be made any height desired, but are usually not more than 10 to 15 inches above the surrounding ground. When building the upper course, be sure that planting spaces 8 to 10 inches in diameter are left so that a number of plants can be planted on the top.
