As it is best to cut back all citrus trees 40 to 50 per cent when trans-planting this will be done at the nurseries before shipping, as a rule. We therefore grade sizes by caliper above the bud. The law requires defoliation.

When buying trees it is very important to know something about the stock you intend to plant. We have all seen Profitable and Unprofitable trees, as well as profitable and unprofitable cows. The value of a calf is largely governed by the producing ability of its parents. The value of pecan trees for your orchard planting is in their producing ability, which is the same as the stock, or trees, from which these nursery trees are propagated. It is therefore as important to investigate the history and production of the orchard record from which the trees are being propagated as it is to know the history and production of a milk cow from which you would start a dairy herd. Our orchards, from which we cut our grafting wood, have proven to be the most profitable of any commercial orchards in the Gulf Coast region, and as far as we can learn, in the pecan belt.

Seven Successive Profitable Crops

from a commercial orchard is the record we have since the maturing of the 1924 crop. See record below. One Success tree eighteen years old yielded 273 pounds in 1923.

Another Matter of Importance

is to know that varieties are true to name. By propagating from heavy bearing orchards we reduce the chance of an error to the minimum. Scions from our orchards are sought by those who wish to grow profitable pecan trees. It is a known fact that some varieties of apples which have been propagated for many years from scion blocks instead of from bearing orchard trees have become almost barren. The pedigree of any tree or animal shows the source from which it springs. If there are any trees that have as good a pedigree as ours, we know they are as good as can be grown.
