## LIGHT HOUSES.

Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay df Tundy. - Hon. S. L. Tilley, Charles Wattere, James Steadman, G. 1. Hatheway, and John McMillan. R. W. Crookshank, Esq., Secretary: George W. Smith, Aecountant.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.-The first Light in approaching the Ray of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island fromany pgint of the coutpass. "A yery dangerous rock, under water, bit upon which the sea always breaks, called Blonde Rock, lies about 31 miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House Between this rock and the Inland, there are some dangers-the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessèls, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.-In advancing up the Bav, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof. A plain white light

Digby Gut Light.-The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the west side of Digby Gut-from Brier Island North East. ward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin - A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.-This Light is intended to wam vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprictor to the Seal. Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. "It is a flash light--white-twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House iapainted in stripes, vertical, black and white
Bearings and Distance by Compass from the Gannet Rook Light House. This Light bears from the Light house on Brier Island, N.N.W. 'W.' 22 miles.
From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor E. 1 S. distance 7 milesio From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock; off White Head Island, N. E. \& E. 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W. $6 \frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Ga hock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N. W N. $2 \frac{1}{2}$ miles.

To the Southe nmost of ditto, culled Saint Mary's Ledge, W S. W, 2 miles.
From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, $\mathbf{W}$ and by $\mathbf{N} \perp \mathbf{N}$. 13 miles.
Note.-Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends Westivard from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker called the Buh. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.
From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W. 4 W. 18.2 miles

Mcchines Seal Idand Lighto.-There are swo fixed sohits lights upon W.a Machias Seal Idlande, elovated about forty-five feat aboto high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant ab-ut 200 feet, by which circumitance of two Light Houses at the sampe gtation, they will he immediately distingnished from all other lighto opun the coast, (British or Aurerican) Both the Bnildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz:

To the Eouthernmont Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E. S. E. casterly. " Giannet Rock Light E. by 8. $\ddagger$ S. 13 miles.
n. Southern Head of Grand Manan, E: by N. \& N.
n Jorthern Head of Grand Manan. N: E. 1 E.
" N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.
n Little River Head, N. by W.
n Libby Island Light Honse, (American,) N. W. by W.
Vessels atainding to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment thej bring these Lighter in one, as they will not then be more than three frurths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than.five miles to the East of the lights.

1t is recommended that the Ship's Compauses should be well compared and adjuated (particularly in now shipw), bépote they lenve Partilige Islanta, as iel riows errore have froquently occurred from want of attention on tbis point ; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is revehtepen degrees Westerly, or ( 14 pointe) it will be found by the intent published Admirality Charts, that the course from Partridge loland down the Bay (South Chaỉnel) between the Old Proprietor and N. W. Ledse, is S. W. IS., but the coureo to he steeted must depend on the disection of the wind on feaving Partridge Idtand.]

Head Harbour Light.-Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light, (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Ifles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquody ; it onables vessela also at all times to enter Head Harbour-it is a fixed solite light. The brilding is painted White, with a red cross un it.

Point Le Prear Lights.-Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same houme, and distant 28 foet-Both lights can be seen from every point of the cnmpnse, where they may be useful-both are fixed and vohite. The Light Houge is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad esch. horizontally.

Partridgs Island Light.-This lightat the entrance of theRiver and Harbour of \$aint John, having been entablished upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed zohice light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes.

Beacon Light.-Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar which extends about half a mile S. S. E off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently aseful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enablen them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed white light. The House is white and black, in siripes vertically.

Quaco.-A rovolving white light is placed on a amall rock off Quaco Hend, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can

Weet Quoddy Light.-This ie an American Light, and is placed on the Weat side of the entrance into the Snint Croiz by Lubec and Enatport

Cape Forchu Light-On Cape Forchu, on the wastern nide of the ontrance to Yarmouth (Nova. Scotia), in lat. 43,39, N. long, 66,8. W. It exhibite a plain revolving light-visible one minute and o quarter, and invisible half a minute The building in painted whive and in elevated 135 feet above the level of the mea.
Grixdetone Istand Light.-An Octagonal Tower, aixty foet above the levef of high water on Grinditose Ioland. in Chignecto Bay, in Lat. $455^{451} 18^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{Ns}$. Long. $\mathrm{H}^{\wedge} \mathrm{sj} 251 \mathrm{~W}$. The Tower is painted white, as is aleo the Kceper'a bouse, one atory. situate about 50 feet to the Eantward of the Tower.
Bearings and distances of several placeo from the above Light Bouce, ai stllows: Cape Enrage Light, by compass. 8. 61 I W,, $101-7$ miles.

The point of low water off the light tinuse, by compans, $8.78 \mathrm{w}, 2-10$ mille.
Jones' Ledge, N . 10 W ., $3-10$ mile, it dries at low springa and hat about 2 1-2 fl thome on it st half tide.
A Band Bank, 8.15 W ., $\mathrm{G}-10$ mile, it had 1 l fathoms on its choslest part at lower water aprings.
Frand Naman.-There is a Light Honce and Keeper's House at the "8wallow Tail" on the North Eastern part of the Island of Grand Manan, in the Bay of Fuody. The light is 45 feet from Base to Deek; the point on which it otands is 103 feet above high water, making 148 feet elevation. This if a conspicuous mark in the sonth Channel between Brier Ieland and Grand Mapan. Both Howeet are painted White.

## RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Estallished by a Lato or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John-passed 3d August, 1848.
Five Shillings per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbont of Saint John, and mooring her into asafe place or berth, or feccuring her alongside of one of the Wharves; and Five Shillings per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, nnder and ly Virtue of the Qisarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of sach Vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Veasels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to tnke pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to thas rate above mentioned.

For removing Vessels from any mooring ground to any. Wharfior from one Wharf to anothèr Wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hnndred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Ve ofs over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, T: Shillings; for Vessels over 'Two Hundred and not exceeding. Ti, ree Hundred Tons, Fifteen Shillings; and for all Vessel over 1 hree Hundred Tons, the suin of Twenty Shillings.

First Distance.-From Patridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing North West, Five Shillings per foot:

Second Distance.-From Musquash Head to Point LePreaux, bearingNorth West, Six Shillings and Threepence pet fint.

Third Distance.-From Point Lepreaux to North Hiciu of Grand Manan, bearing North West-or North Channel, bearing South East, Seven-Shillinge and Sixpence perfoat

Fourth Distanco.-From the North Head of Grand Matman-or Norih Channel as aforesnid--to Machiay Seal Taland, hearing Soluth, or Brier Island bearing South South Eint, Fight Shillings and Ninepence per font.

Fijth Distance.-Any whero ontsids the aforeacid dietance, Ton Shillings per foot.

Objects and Risults of Mandring-- Leading objects of manuring are to improve the general quality and to increase the urorage quanaity or general yield of our arable farm products. All our plants are as much derived from dead matier as all our animals, in their substance and structure, are wholly and entirely from the products-in some stage-of vegetable assimilation, organization or growth. To the latter rule I knew of no exception ; to the former I perceive na reason for any. The plant grows by appropriating matter to large extent yielded by the decay and complete disseveration of the structure and substance of previous generations, or crops of similar plants-plants similar in quality or the ultimate composition of their substance or elements. The growth of these precursory plants was equally or more gradual and measured by conditions than that of their successors which we are cultivating. And their decay and decompositiou was eqnally measured and slow with their rate of growth, because it depended upon the same agencies of heat, humidity oxygenic air. The nature of the forces by which plants are formed and grow, matured and decay, are still the same as aforetime. Experience or art has not changed, and never can change, any natural process. It can modify adverse condiiions, intensify natural processes by accumulating the agencies with which nature works. But the conditions being placed, nature does all the work, both of production and destruction, of organization and decay, Art does not contribute an iota in either process. Art does not exercise natural power; butonly supplies conditions supposed to be more favorable to its fullest force and effect; and in this latter it often fails from imperfection of judgment, and in every failure must recur, before succeeding. to the lessons of nature for instruction.

Now do we not see that goowth is gradical, little by little, and dependent on many conditions? A plant is not a boa constrictor, nor yet a marmot, that takes in a mass of food at once, and then sleeps in inactivity till its glut has disappeared, or the nature of the seuson changed. Mauure is food to th. .plant, and its regular supply is as important to the vegetable as to an animal. Its activity in favorable weather, is as constant as heat and light, upon which it very much depends. Ard the simple process by which Mr. Smith of Lois Weedon, raises wheat on a clay soil without manure, but by frequent cultivation, shows distinctly the propriety and effect of a gradual supply of the elements of growth.

Yet in the face of all this it often is the practice to manure heavily for corn, which can be fed better than any other field crop by cultivation, and in this fashion supply the expected demand of future crops for manure, one, two, three or four years in adoance. Paying in advance implies ample funds, but manuring so long in advance wastes exceedingly the fund or store of manure, however much or little. It is a spendthrift system, reminding one of the fast young man who squanders in the dreams of anticipation what he never fully realises - a prodigality nnwarranted by the facts.

Not only are future crops cheated in advance, but the quality of heavily manured plants iv ofter injured by bising forced to a rank, coarse, dispreportionate and especially inedible, unsoholesome growth. Such is a frequent result incident to the gorge and starte syatem of annuring.

I have not now time to notice it further, but 1 have not a doubt that the loss of much of the turnip crop in England, and the club foot, and hand and finger diseases in cabbage and turnips with us is due to gorging with rank or unsuitable manure, and every cultivator must perceive in the fact that plants which owe their excellence to cultivation rather than forcing, are always superior in quality to those that are forced with much manure-that deterioration in quality is probably much of it due to injudicious modes of feeding, as to quality or quantity or both. An object of manuring is to secure the most healthy and vigorous growth ; but when rank, coarse growth supereedes healthy vigor it leads to deterioration of quality, which in reducing its real value for economic purposes sometimes more than counterbalances the greater size or mere gross product. There is too much " haste to get rich" by striving after size, which relatively always indicates coarseness, and often leads toward results in useless or odious forms of mostrosity ; and tisis by manuring future crops in abundauce, or several in the lump, and thereby debarring the later ones of a sufficient supply of food or matter of growth, of the very means by which alone they can become either profitable or satisfactory.

Adapting means to ends, or doing the right thing at the right time, is the best guaranty of success in any business, and instead of dressing only one crop in a course of siree to aix, I should pre. fer to manure the same crop-of wheat particularly, as corn is more aocessible to cultivation-twoice duriny its growth. Fall wheat, besides manuring on the surface lightly after the wheat is covered at seeding, might again be lightly manured just before harrowing, as soon as the ground is Ary in the spring. Uats might be manured at sowing tinue, and harrowed, when high enough, in the same manner. In this way soil would be loosed, abraded and tuaned; manure divided and broken down, and the crop twice fed to the full extent of its absortive capacity, with truer economy and the best reasons for improved quality as well as augmented quantity of product.-Correspondent of the Countrg Gontleman and Cultivator.

Top-Dressing.--A correspondent of the Boston Cultivator tried an experiment with top-dressing a meadow at thyee different times in the year. The first was applied cavly in autumn, when the manure was comparatively dry, and before rain. Another portion sometime afterwards, when the soil was soaked. A third, the following spring. The first portion produced double the arop, well filled with timothy aud clover. The second, (applied later and after the rain) did not yield so-well. That applied in spring produced little effect, except to increase the "spire gra-s" at bottom. He thinks the best time is soon after the hay has been cut; last summer he manured a gravelly knoll at that time, from which

The manure was compost, made by spreading es foot of luam and muck under the barn, where the cows were yarded over night, and ploughing it once in two weeks, -an obviously excellent and economical practice.

The Quantities of Sebd Requibed to Sowa Givben Extbit of Spack,-The Messrs. Drummond, seedsmen, of Stirling and Dublin, in their very useful "Directions for Sowing and Cultivating. Vegetable Seeds," have given the following quantities, which is recommended to the notice of amateur readers as a safe guide to them.

Peas,-l pint, or 1 lb ., will sow a row from 40 to 60 feet of a single row, in which way peas should always be sown.

Beans.-1 pint, or 1 lb ., of the middle sized bean will plant a row of 90 to 110 feet, and the larger size 70 to 80 feet.

Kidnoy Beans.-1 pint, or 1 lb ., will sow a row of about 80 feet.
Onions.-1 oz. of seed will sow a bed (broadeast) 4 feet by 12, or 60 to 100 feet of drill.

Leeks. - 1 oz. of seed will sow a bed (broadcast) 4 feet by 14, or about 100 feet of drill.

Carrots. - 1 oz . of seed will sow 60 to 70 feet of a row.
Parsnips.-l oz. of seed will sow 100 feet of a row.
Turnips.-1 oz. of seed will sow from 100 to 120 feet of a drill.
Cabbage. -1 oz. of seed will sow a bed 4 feet by 10.
Savoys. - The same.
German Greens or Borecole,-1 oz. of seed will sow a bed 4 feet by 12 .

Brussols Sprouts, Caulifonoers, and Broecoli.-The same.
Parsley.-1 oz, of seed will sow 80 feet of a row.
Spinach.-The same.
Don't Conmence Plovahina too Soon, - -By too soon, we mean before the soil is in a proper condition to turn up mellow and lively. Ground should always be allowed to settle after it has been frozen, before it is ploughed.

The soil is rendered lighter and more porous by freezing and thawing; and after it has been frozen and thawed it settles back to its original compactness. Therefore, if it be ploughed before it has settled, it will settle after ploughing, and in a short period of time will be as compaot as if it had not been ploughed at all. But let it be ploughed or spaded after it has settled to its former compactness, and it will remain mellow and triable for a long time, unless it is excessivoly wet.

Every farmer should make some estimate of his ploughing and sowing, in order to know how mauy days will be required to complete this branch of business; and then, if the weather is unfarorable and the soil too wet, ploughing may be delayed sometimes for a longer time, or until the soil is in a proper condition to be ploughed and harrowed.

These considerations are of far more importance where elay predominates in the soil, than where the soil is sandy or loamy.

Cars of Sherp in Springo-It is a prevailing custom among many farmers, to turn sheep to grass as soon as they can possibly get their living. This custom, though widely practiced should not be carried out. Sheep should be kept in a dry yard, till the grase is sufficiently high for them to get a good bite. And even then they should be yarded once a day, and fed corn or some other kind of grain. This is my experience, and I have kept sheep for the past twenty years, and have made sheep raising my business for the past eight years. Another practice is widely prevalent, that of letting ewes that have lambed, run with the rest of the flock. Just as soon as an ewe has dropped her lamb, she should be placed in a place separate from the other sheep, and receive extra care. An empty bay, or one that has been cut down and part of the hay pitched out; is a good place for such ewes. Too great care can not be bestowed on ewes with lambs. A little extra care, such as graining and keeping them where it is warm and dry, will be doubly repaid for, both by the extra amount of wool on the sheep and the bulk of the lamb. If your flock he a large one, and you have no convenient place in which to place your ewes, fence off the symniest and dryest part of your yard, and put them in there-or you can put them in some dry or convenient shed.

Psaso-I cultivated twenty sorts last year, of which I will only mention the most desirable or valuable. The earliest is the 'Iom Thumb, a dwarf variety, growing 6 to 8 inches high, requiring no bush, and yielding quite as well as many of the tall sorts. Two crops miay be grown on the same ground in a season. Next in season is the Dan. O'Rourke, a well known and popular variety, but not a first rate yielder. The Royal Dwarf is but a few days later, and yields better. The Eugenie, Napoleon, and others, mature next in season, and are favorites, but I have not found them reliable, sometimes dwarfing. The Lord Raglan, for instance, Pailed, the last three seasons. Maturing about the same time, and superior to them all, is a nameless variety received from Nourse \& Co., Boston. It was derived from a single pea, found among imported seeds. It is a large white pea, resenbling the Epps Monarch, but earlier, and does nut grow as high. It is equal to the best in quality, and yields better than any other variety I have. To complete the succession, I plant Epp's Monarch, a splendid pea, late, a great bearer, growing 5 to 8 feet high, and requiring tall and strong bushes A double row of the Monarch plant?d in June last, furnished green peas till frost came--Country Gentleman.

- Whiat and Guano.-The Genessee Farmer says, if we could get $\$ 2$ per bushel for our wheat, guano might be used for this crop with profit. At $\$ 1$ it hardly pays, except in rare. instances.

Clovar should be cut immediately after blossoming. It should not be exposed to the schorching sun, but after being partially curedit should be forked up into cocks, and left to cure in this position.

Rzoiprs yop Hamp and Soft Soaf.-A corrempondent in the Gormantovon Tolograph, offers the following recipe as one to be perfectly relied on :

Take ten pounds of sods ash, and dismolve it in twenty gallons of soft water, with twelve pounds of fresh lime and three fourths of a pound of rosin, by boiling them all half an hour, stirring the while to keep them from setting or burning; then pour all the contents into a tub to settle, washing your kettle clean. Ater these contents have settled, tale the clear water that comes on' the top and put it in the tettle inow hunt up aft your fat and skins till you get about twenty dhree pounds-if clear fat not quite so much-put over the fire to boil till all the fit is eaten up; perhape it will take two hours, or röt nearly so long; then take fá satt to diviae, and add chate till the hard soap comes on the top. It , will at frot look like froth, and the waste will look very dark in the Dottom of the kettle. Pour all out in a tub. I forgof to saf, op uip your tub with ebla wateridter tailing of the the clear ive,
ready to boil your soap froth with the second time; put two good hucketsfull of this clear lye in the kettle, then with an iron ladle take all this soap froth off the top of the tub and put it in with these two buckets of lye-water, to boil again a few minutes, to make your and soap olear and nioe, adding salt till it separates well. Then pour all out in a tub, to remain undisturbed over night. In the morning you will have over thirty pounds at as nice white soap as you will wish, for either washing or toilet use, which will not chap the hands at any time. Again, if you wonld wish a half barrel of nice white soft soap, fill up this said lime tub again with cold water till it settles, then take the hard soap that sticks to the kettle and the pitcher that you dip out with, and three or four ladles full of your hard soap, with two pitchers full of this lye-water, and let it boil a few minutes, then fill up your kettle nearly full of the lye-water, and let boil a few minutes, then pour it out into a vessel, and you will be much pleased with the result of your labor. This soft soap will be thick and solid, and it is very nice for boiling clothes or washing, as it makes a very nice froth.
In order to have plenty of soap fat, you must begin at the beginning to save all the skins of meat, and all the fat scraps that come from your table, whioh, in warm weather, should be put in some of this clear lye until you get enough to make some soap. By this course, in an ordinary family, you will always have enough soap without buying.
'To Sweeten Ranód Buttre.-An agrioulturist, near Brussels, having succeeded in removing the bad smell and disagreeable taste of zome bad butter, by beating or mixing it with chloride of lime, he was encouraged by this happy result to continue his experiments, by trying them upon buttor ac rancid as to be past use ; and he has restored to butter the odor and taste of which was insupportable, all the sweetness of fresh butter. I'his operation is extremely simple and practicable for all. It consists in beating the butter in a sufficient quantity of water, into which had been mixed 25 to 90 drops of chloride of lime to two pounds of butter. After having brought all its parts in contact with the water, it may be left an hour or two; afterwards withdrawn and washed anew in fresh water. The ohloride of lime used, having nothing injurious in it, can safely be inoreased; but after having verified the experiment, it was cound that 25 to 30 drops to two and a half pounds of butter, were sufficient.

Recipr for Maxing Rquaiza Wing-Cut the rhubarb into small piecen, put it into just enongh water to keep it from burning, boil until quite tender, strain through a coarae cloth. To one gallon of this liquid, add two gallons of water; to each gallon thus made, put four pounds of augar; ferment in an open vossel forty-eight hours, then take of the scum, and add one pint of best braudy to every four gallons, after, which put it into gn air-tight cask; then let remain six months undisturbed when it will be ready for bottling. In each bottle puit one raising and seal the bottle well.
