Pot Grown Strawberry Plants

POT-GROWN strawberry plants are much superior to the ordinary ground layers usually sold, as there is no loss of time in setting them out. They can be transplanted at any season with scarcely any check to their growth. The sooner pot-grown plants can be set out after June 15, the better they will grow, and the more they will produce the following spring.

Those marked P.P. have pistillate or imperfect flowers and must be planted near perfect flowering kinds, in order that the flowers may fertilize. The varieties not so marked are bi-sexual or perfect flowering, and can be planted alone. When properly pollinated the pistillate varieties are the most prolific.

Most dealers recommend planting strawberries in August. However, we hope you will see the advisability of setting pot-grown plants as early in the season as possible, when they will produce a large crop the next summer, and we believe if you follow our advice the results will be much more satisfactory.

Our list includes all the newest and best standard varieties, extra strong, healthy plants. We exercise the utmost care in packing and shipment, which is of great importance to the purchaser.

Directions For Culture

Strawberries require rich, well tilled soil. The plants should be set 15 inches apart in rows 2 ft. apart. 100 plants will plant 4 rows 30 ft. long, 6 ft. set above distance apart. For horse cultivation, set plants 2 ft. apart in rows 3 ft. apart. 7,500 plants at this distance will plant an acre. Firm the plants well in the soil, keeping them thoroughly watered and run off all runways. About the middle of December cover the bed with salt meadow hay, straw or leaves. In April, as soon as the plants show indications of growth, push the covering away from the plants to allow them to come through. This mulching protects the plants from cold in the winter and heat in the summer, keeps the bed clean and prevents the growth of weeds.

FOR SUMMER AND AUTUMN SOWING.

Hardy perennials are easily raised from seeds and give better results when sown in the open ground during the summer and fall. The soil should be kept evenly moist but not saturated. Transplant the seedlings once or twice if necessary to prevent crowding.
