LATEST reports from India suggest Congress may accept Lord Wavell's offer but such Lord Wavell's offer but such acceptance will mean a most unfortunate set-back to the Congress, The Congress could have had from Cripps' three years ago what it is now so eager to take from Wavell. Is then the blood shed by the fighters for India's independence in pursuance of the carefully. in pursuance of the carefully-considered rejection, by the Congress of Cripps' proposals, to go for nothing? An emphatic no can be the only answer.

Indians in East Asia, therefore, are not going to be deflected in the least from the struggle for India's freedom, by what the Congress may do in relation to Wavell's proposals. Netaji says that even if the Congress accepts the proposals, it will sooner or later have to part again with the British Raj, because it is bound to find out one of these days that Wavell's scheme is a means not to India's independence or self-government, but only to India's whole-hearted cooperation with Britain's imperialist war against Nippon. In view of this certain prospect, Indians in East Asja cannot afford to demobilise, and they are not going to.

The world situation at present affords another opportunity for Indians. True, tunity for Indians. True, Britain in league with her allies, has defeated Germany, but this has not made Britain a stronger power than she was before the German defeat.

One should only have to look at how Russia is using her influence over Poland, Austria, Turkey, Czechoslovakja, Rumania and other East European countries to be convinced that Britain is becoming a nonentity in the European continent while Russia can do there what-ever she likes Unfortunately for Britain, Russia, far from confining her power-politics to Europe is openly coming out to take a hand in the affairs of the Near East, Middle East, and even China. All this betokens an inevitable conflict between Russian Communism and British Imperialism in the very near

It is folly to imagine that India today is simply helpless before the all-powerful Britain and must therefore make up with the Britishers on any terms. In simple truth, never were India's prospects of complete independence so bright as plete independence so bright as at this moment. If Syria and Lebanon could throw off her shackles by playing off the British against the French was a way to some other country for refuge but as they were local people they were not allowed to evacuate. British against the French, we can do likewise. The British interference in the Levant pretext of world freedom has given Russia and France a right to keep an eye on the British doings in India. If at such a time, we make up with Britain without actually getting anything substantial in the way of India's self-government we will be only foolishly depriving ourselves of the moral and material support of foreign nations.

It is on the strength of all these weighty considerations that Netaji Bose is fervently calling upon his countrymen at home and abroad to keep up the anti-British resistance, even should the Congress accept Wavell's offer. This clarion call shall not fall on deaf ears. UNITY 580

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SyonanLikelyTo Become Scene Of **Bloody Fighting**

People's Support Urged In Execution Of Proposed Evacuation Scheme

"Syonan is very likely to become one of the battlefields of this war and by drawing the enemy to the shores of Syonan and then giving him a crushing blow we can greatly contribute to the decisive battle that will be fought in the near future on Nippon mainland or in its vicinity".

Thus stated Lt.-Col. Shozo Nakajima, Chief Spokesman of the Imperial Nippon Forces in the Southern Regions, at his weekly press conference here yesterday dealing with the subject of the evacuation scheme outlined by the Syonan Authorities and exhorting the public to give their wholehearted support to the Authorities concerned.

Prefacing his comments on the scheme and the necessity for such a measure, with an expression of appreciation of the earnest co-operation of the newspapers various Authorities, Lt.-Col. Nakajima said that the present evacuation scheme reminded him of the time three years ago when the Nippon forces occupied Singapore. At that time the enemy was making vicious propaganda that, when the Nippon forces entered Singapore, they would kill and slaughter the inhabitants. By this propaganda (went on Lt.-Col. Nakajima) the enemy of course Nakajima) the enemy, of course, intended to arouse the anta-gonistic feelings of the people against Nipponese.

"When the Nippon forces were about to enter Johore all the white people instead of remaining and fighting fled the country leaving the inhabitants to fend for themselves. There were many local inhabitants who evacuate.

"The reasons why the Nippon Authorities here are encouraging very parental. Looking from a broader angle I feel sure that in time to come the war would be brought nearer to Syonan-to and the defence of the island would become more difficult

INDIANS AT HOME URGED TO CONTINUE STRUGGLE FOR FULL INDEPENDENCE

Netaji Exhorts To Carry On Parallel Movement With Freedom Fight Here

Emphasising the determination of East Asia Indians to carry on the armed struggle against the Anglo-Americans to the last man and to the last round and simultaneously keeping the Indian issue alive as an international issue, Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose, Head of the Provisional Government of Azad Hind, in a broadcast address, exhorts Indians at home to run a parallel movement with the sole aim of continuing agitation for complete independence and preventing the Congress de-generating into a Liberal Federation by accepting Lord Wavell's proposals.

The following is the text of Netaji's radio address:

ment, on the road to independence, will be an obstacle and a mistake, the time has come to prepare this programme for the future. To those who are outside India, it has been clear during the last few days that the Congress Working Committee has already decided to accept Lord Wavell's offer It is but natural that those who are now trying to arrive at a compromise with the British Government, should strengthen their hands by having messages issued, and resolutions passed, by various individuals and organisations in the country, with a view to creating an impression that the country wants a compromise. But that will not deceive anyone who knows the real situation in India, and who realises that it is always difficult in our country to give open expression to extremist, or Left-Wing opinion.

What they want is the correct type of leadership, through which their real sentiments and wishes could be given ulterance to. with a dense population. When the war is carried over the island there will be much misery and hardship and the ravages of war will be acutely felt. In order to lessen the misery and ravages, the local Authorities have formulated this evacuation plan," stated Lt.-Col. Nakajima.

"In order to inflict as much losses as possible on the enemy we are putting in all efforts to fortify the defences of Syonan, Malai, Sumatra and other places. At the same time we are preparing both spiritually and materially to meet the enemy when he comes to Syonan. We are not only re-affirming our determination in the spiritual sense but in the material sense, too, we are doing our best to crush the enemy when he comes here," declared Lt.-Col. Nakajima.

"As to how or in what way we would meet the enemy and crush him I will not try to predict or say anything. At least we can inflict personnel losses or bleed, the enemy losses or bleed the enemy white on a much larger scale what he suffered in Okinawa. Should Syonan-to become a battlefield a very intensive and ferocious battle would take place.

"If the enemy should start raiding Syonan again I think there will be more indiscriminate bombing and by this method the enemy may try to make the people become excited. At the same time should the inhabitants lose their lives or property they will also blame the Nippon forces.

"As one way of making the defences of Syonan more complete the Authorities are now encouraging the people to evacuate and hence the Authorities and others concerned are doing their best to facilitate the means of evacuation. At the same time all those who will remain in Syonan should cooperate with us and for them too the Authorities are making full preparation to facilitate their livelihood.

"The Authorities look upon those who evacuate under the scheme and those who will remain and co-operate with them in the same way in that both groups of people are offering them positive wartime cooperation.

"Of course to leave a place to which one has become accustomed long or to go to a place which is not known to one, it is something in the nature of a problem. There may be hard-ships and all sorts of inconveniences but we have to make mander of the 14th Army today. sacrifices to bring this war to Col. Nakajima.

These people also think that while the Congress had been in the wilderness, other organisations had come to the forefront and had been trying to undermine the Congress.

Consequently, the Congress have some power, in order to rehabilitate itself, and put down other organisations working against it, and this is possible only through com promise with the British Government. Further, there is also a feeling that if the Congress does not achieve something now, it will be difficult to go back to the status quo of three years or perhaps five years ago. The other group, which forms a minority, thinks more of the international situation. The members of this group think that if India is to play her role in the camp of the United Nations, she must come to some sort of understanding with the British Government, to enable nationalist Indians to represent India at international conferences in future.

Defeatist Mentality

Besides having a defeatist mentality, the members of these two groups have another thing in common. Both the groups think that through a compromise, they will be able to work their way towards independence.

Now, why don't I agree with this school of thought? The reasons are as follows:

Firstly, I do not share their defeatist mentality. I do not think that it is certain that the Anglo-Americans will win this war. I say this in spite of the defeat of Germany. I could give various arguments to substantiate my point of view and I have already mentioned some of them in my previous talks. The war in the Far East will, in any case, be a long and bitter one, and during the course of this war, many surprises may be in store for the world. It was Napoleon Bonaparte who said, once upon a time, that the ultimate result of a war is sometimes decided during the last five

Thirdly, among the 'compromisewallahs,' to those who are thinking much about the internal situation in the country, I should say that this, is not the time when they should think of such small things as the revival of the Congress organisation in the country. The whole world is now in the melting pot and India's fate is, to a large extent, linked up with the final issue of this war. No harm will be done if the revival of the Congress organisation is postponed for a time and if we wait and see what the final issue of this war will be. By compromising now, we may get at most 10 per cent of Swaraj. By waiting for a time, we may get Poorna Swaraj.

Fourthly, to those who are thinking of how India can play her part in future international conferences, I should like to point out that the real question is not whether Sir Ramasamy Mudallar should represent India at the San Francisco Conference or at similar conferences-or Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru. The real question is-whom the Indian spokesman will represent at an international conference? Will the Indian spokesman represent a free India, or India under British rule?

According to foreign reports, Sir Ramasamy Mudaliar did very well at the San Francisco Conference so far as his individual ability was concerned. Reuter has told us that Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru is prepared to work under the Viceroy's leadership. This is news to me, and it is difficult to believe it. But if it be true, and if Pandit Nehru agrees to accept this new role, then I must say that so long as Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, "or any other Indian leader for the matter of that" works under the Viceroy's leadership, his voice at an international conference will not be the voice of Free India.

Issue Uncertain

I have already made it clear that the issue of the coming war in East Asia is by no means certain. No one say that the Anglo-Americans ultimately win this war. Japan will fight to the last and while this war is going on, many surprises may be in store for the world. Indians in East Asia have, therefore, resolved to carry on the armed struggle, to the last man and to the last round. Simultaneously they will carry on their activity in the field of international diplomacy, keeping the Indian issue alive as an international issue. It goes without saying that our hands will be considerably strengthened if, while we are carrying on the armed struggle, people at home keep up resistance to British imperialism. Combined Opposition

The first thing that should be done inside India is to combine all the oppositionists to Lord Wavell's offer, into some kind of a central organisation. If the efforts of all the oppositionists are pooled together, then results will be obtained more speedily

Secondly, a persistent demand should be made on behalf of the public that the Congress Working Committee should place before the country its programme for the Central Government and for the Provincial Governments. Once that programme is produced, the country will be able to judge very easily as to how far that programme will be executed in future.

Thirdly, a strong agitation should be carried on for the release of all political prisoners of all categories-including, of course, those detained without trial. The release of political prisoners will be one of the acid tests of Lord Wavell's sincerity and the Congress should not be allowed to make any compromise on this all-important

issue. Fourthly, the public should make a persistent demand of the Congress Working Committee to tell the country, to what extent it is going to participate in Britain's Imperialist war in the Far East. It is known to everybody that the Congress Working Committee has already pledged itself to wholehearted participation in that war. But the country should insist on knowing what that wholehearted participation will mean in actual practice In other words, how many troops will be sent out of India? How much money will India have to contribute for Britain's war in East Asia? Apart from men and money, what will India he made to contribute in the shape of war-materials for Britain's war?

Once we know how far India will be for India's internal reconstruction. As is well known, we have always agitated that India should not be made to sacrifice for Britain's imperialist war. Will the Congress adhere to this policy in future, or will it initiate a new policy of making voluntary sacrifices for the perpetuation of the British Empire.

Fifthly, will India be made to contribute to the U.N.R.R.A. fund, with the approval of the Congress? It is reported that India will have to contribute 15 crores to this fund.

stands in need of help from outsideand particularly from Britain, the chief exploiter. Will the Congress demand help for India's recovery especially in view of the sacrifices she has made in this war-or will the Congress pour out 15 crores of India's money as a contribution to the U.N.R.R.A, fund?

Sixthly, what about India's sterling balances which have been blocked outside India? Will the Congress insist that this money should be made available to Isdia-or will the Congress allow itself to be used as a pawn by British and American High Finance?

Seventhly, will the Congress reopen the question of India's public debt? So far, we have declared in an unambiguous manner India's demand for the re-opening of this question, but we have not been able to do anything to compel the British Government to accept India's point of view. Once Congress accepts seats on the Viceroy's Executive Council, the excuse can no longer be put forward that the Congress is not in a position to force the hands of the British Government. Therefore the country would like to see if the Congress will take up the question of India's public debt, when it accepts power and responsibility at the centre.

Sisters and brothers at home! These are a few points for your consideration. You will have to keep up agitation and propaganda on all these points, and you will have to insist that on each of these points, the Congress representatives, and their colleagues in the Central Government, give effect to the demand of Indian public. I must say that if we succeed in doing so, then British power in India will be reduced to a minimum. On the other hand, if they fail to force the hands of the British Government then they will become mere puppets in the hands of the Viceroy.

One thing more before I close. The responsibility of the Congress for the future policy and action of the Government of India will be very great. The Congress Working Committee will not content itself with submitting a panel of names for only those seats that have been reserved for the Congress. By submitting a full panel of names, embracing all religious groups, as well as all interests in the country, the of Britain's im- Congress is accepting full responsiperialist war, we shall be able to bility for the Government of India in future. The Congress cannot argue, hereafter, that the panel of names submitted by it were not accepted by the Viceroy.
