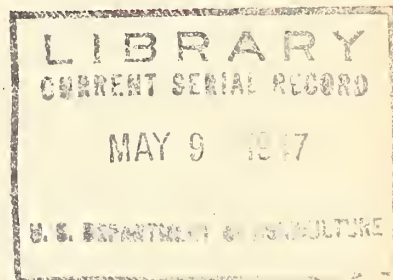

The National Garden Program for 1947 and the years ahead puts increased emphasis on the improvement of home grounds, parks, communities and roadsides through use of ornamental plantings both in country and city. Regarding this, Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson, speaking at the opening of the National Garden Conference Dec. 5, 1946, said:

"As the food emergency passes, many will want to put more effort on improvement of home surroundings--more efforts on lawns, ornaments, and trees."

"The Extension services of the State Colleges have for many years carried on successful programs in the field of horticulture that have brought great improvement and satisfaction to many thousands of homes. Now that wartime urgency has passed, the Department of Agriculture is looking more and more to the State Colleges for leadership in gardening and in home and community improvement. Research work by the Department of Agriculture in the growing of lawn grasses, flowers, shrubs, and ornamental and fruit trees, although keyed to needs in commercial production, has resulted in a wealth of information useful to home projects. We want to make sure that this information is available to all our people."

"We have opportunity now to make greater use of this knowledge and experience that has brought such good returns in the past. Gardening was good for America during the war. It will be good for America in time of peace."

This list has been prepared to assist garden leaders and specialists in gardening who are engaged in the broader program. It consists mainly of references to State and Federal publications, but includes also a selected number of books and a few periodical articles. Photoprint copies of material not available in local libraries or from the publishers may be obtained from the United States Department of Agriculture for the cost of reproduction.
