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

I place below a letter from Mr. Sri Prakasa to the Prime Minister dated September 12. The Prime Minister saw Mr. Ayer today and after discussion with him asked me to instruct Mr. Chettur to take over the gold and jewellery which are now in/charge of Mr.Murti and keep it in safe custody in the Mission. Mr. Ayer informed the Prime Minister that although Shri Subash Bose's ashes are now in a temple in Tokyo, there should be no difficulty about Mr. Chettur taking charge of them. The Prime Minister suggested our writing to Mr.Chettur to take charge of the ashes from Mr.Murti but not to remove the ashes to the Mission. Mr. Chettur should be informed accordingly and also told that further instruction about the disposal of the ashes and the gold will follow.

2. The Prime Minister suggested to Mr.Ayer that he should draw up a full report on the circumstances resulting in Mr. Bose's death, giving details of the he evidence which/had collected. On receipt of the report the Prime Minister will consider making a suitable statement before Parliament on the subject of Shri Bose's death.

On 23rd June 1951 the Prime Minister's instructions were conveyed by telegram to Mr. Chettur saying "you should endeavour to get possession of all the treasure on behalf of Government and keep it in safe custody pending further instructions". Mr. Chettur answered "all the treasure, if it existed, save the two boxes now promised by Iyer which are I understand in Ramamurti's possession now, must have long ago been converted into hard cash, commodities and landed property. The proceeds must also have been distributed between the parties concerned", three members of this gang being Ramamurti(IIL), Capt. Thairatatte and Col. Figgess. It was, therefore, too late to undertake a treasure hunt and, in any case, his investigations would involve "a degree of publicity which might well prove embarrassing not only to the Mission but also to the Government of India". In reply, Mr. Chakravarty explained that he did not think it necessary for ILM to start an actual search for the treasure but that they should ask Ramamurti to hand over the gold which was with him. Mr. Chakravarty added that the PM was out of town but he would mention the case again to him and obtain further orders. There is nothing on file to show that this was done or that ILM did actually take over the gold from Ramamurti.

S.A. Ayer saw me some days ago and told me about his visit to Japan and of the inquiries he had made there. I have separately spoken to you about the gold etc. and I understand that our representative has taken possession of this.

2. The other point that Ayer spoke to me about was his inquiry into the air crash which brought about the death of Shri Subhas Chandra Bose. As a result of his inquiry he felt dead sure that there was no doubt at all about Shri Subhas Chandra Bose's death on that occasion. He showed me some papers and some photographs and some documents signed by the Japanese people. I asked him to write out a full report about this. He has sent me the attached bundle of papers, photographs, etc. Please go through them.

3. It is for us to consider whether we should issue a public statement about this or not. In the balance, I am inclined to think that it would be desirable to issue some statement or to make it in Parliament. On the other hand, this may lead to some controversy, possibly even with Shri Subhas Chandra Bose's family.

4. I think the best course would be for us to draft some such statement and to send it to Shri Subhas Chandra Bose's family. After hearing from them, we could take a final decision about publication.

I told P.M.that it would be inadvisable for him to issue a statement now. Whether or not Shri Subhas Bose is dead is not a live issue at present. I have no doubt on the evidence that Shri Bose is dead, but P.M.'s political opponents would utilise any statement made by him for propaganda purposes particularly in view of the forthcoming elections. I did yay, bowavar, that there is a significant reference in Habibur Rehman's statement to Netaji Bose's intention to get out

of the plane at Dairen and to the intention of the Japanese authorities to let him cross over to the Russian-held territory. Habibur Rehman's is the really important evidence, and those who still cherish the belief that Netaji Bose is alive and is somewhere in Russian-held territory, will seize upon any piece of evidence in support of their theory.

I also pointed out to P.M.that whereas according to Habibur Rehman the dead body was cremated on the 20th August 1945, according to the municipal certificate the cremation took place at 6 p.m.on the 22nd August 1945. One could understand a fictitious name being used in the death certificate and in the cremation certificate, but there was no necessity of using a fictitious date of cremation. Either Habibur Rehman's memory must have played him false or there is something wrong with the cremation certificate.

P.M.asked me to record my remarks and also agreed with me that I should write to Shri Anand Mohan Sahay to whose house Habibur Rehman went on return to Tokyo after the accident. The letter below to Shri Sahay should issue without delay.



I. In June 1951, when Mr.S.A.Aiyer, formerly Publicity Adviser I.N.A., was on a visit to Japan, the Prime Minister cabled to Mr.K.K.Chettur saying that he should "endeavour to get possession of all the (I.N.A) treasure on behalf of Government and keep it in safe custody pending further instructions".

On his return to India, Aiyer denied that the Embassy had approached him in the matter and urged that they be asked to take over charge of the treasure from his former I.N.A. colleague in Tokyo, Mr.Ram Murthy.

After prolonged correspondence with the Foreign Secretary, Mr.Chettur reported that his Embassy had formerly taken possession of the I.N.A treasure on September the 24th. (<u>A list of the</u> <u>articles is attached</u>.) It is worth noting that the whole of the Ambassador's correspondence is charged with deep suspicion of the integrity of Mr.Aiyer who, "apprehensive of the early conclusion of the Peace Treaty" went to Tokyo' "to divide the loot and to salve his and Murthy's conscience by handing over a small quantity to Government in the hope that, by doing so, he would also succeed in drawing a red-herring across the trail".

A few months ago, the Government of India took over charge, in Tokyo, of some property belonging to the former "Indian National Army". This was done at the specific request of some officers of the I.N.A. who had kept the property with them since the reported death of Shri Subhas Chandra Bose.

By order of the Frime "inister, this INA property has now been sent to India through Mr Damle, Joint Secretary in the "inistry of Food and Agriculture . He is travelling by Pan American Airways flight 3, leaving Tokvo today and reaching Delhi on the evening of Monday, IOth November. The property consists of gold ornaments and dust and broken pieces and is being carried in a steel attache case.

We would be grateful if urgent instructions were kindly issued to the Customs authorities to exempt the contents of this steel attache case from examination and import duty.

As pointed out already by Foreign Secretary, even Government imports have to pay Customs duty. The Tariff provides for the levy of duty on goods <u>per se</u> and does not take into account other factors. The gold ornaments etc., being imported from Tokyo are thus liable to duty and we can see no reason for exempting them from payment thereof. We would have no objection to Customs exemption being waived provided the Ministry of External Affairs have with them a detailed list of the articles in question giving the weights and value of each item thereof. In that case, as is permissible for Government stores, the goods may be cleared under the Note & Pass procedure, under which the goods are cleared immediately on a Kacha Bill of Entry and duty is credited afterwards by book adjustment. If, however, detailed particulars of the articles is not available then it will not be possible to waive Customs examination because the goods will have to be assessed to duty. I have explained the position to Miss Naidu over the telephone and she has stated that we will hear further from them in the matter.

I understood from Miss Naidu that most of these articles are were broken bits of jewellery etc. They would, therefore, be classified as gold bullion and would require an import licence from the Reserve Bank of India. I have, however, spoken to Mr.S.S.Shiralkar of the Economic Affairs Department of this Ministry and he states that in anticipation of such approval of the Reserve Bank they would have no objection to the gold being cleared without such a permit. This will soon be arriving and will be placed in a safe deposit vault.

2. Most of the treasure consists of damaged articles of jewellery. There are also some gold pieces. There is no provision in the Customs Law for the exemption of such articles from duty. Even Government imports have to pay duty.

3. The only alternative is to treat them as objects of historical value. If it is clearly stated at the time of import that Government's intention is to display them in a public place, such as a museum, they would be exempt from duty. I presume that some time or other, when we have an historical museum, we shall keep these articles there in a special section devoted to India's struggle for freedom. Many objects of interest connected with the INA and other freedom movements could be kept in that section.

4. If P.M. could confirm that it is the intention to keep these articles in a museum at some future date-and not to sell them and use the proceeds for some national purpose--I shall inform the Central Board of Revenue that we are claiming exemption from duty on that ground.

It is difficult to say now what we will do with these articles or gold pieces. We may inform the Central Board of Revenue that it is our present intention to treat them as historical articles which might be kept in a museum. In the event of our deciding otherwise later, we shall naturally pay such duty as may be decided upon. You should really find out from the Finance Ministry what they advise in this matter. This is, in a sense, Government property. We do not yet know what the value of it is and what we will do with it.

Mr. Rauf has just written to say that, in addition to the gold already sent to us, Mr.Murthy had handed over twenty thousand Yens in cash to our Embassy in Tokyo. Mr.Rauf wishes to know whether this amount may be credited to the Embassy account. Even though the Prime Minister has said that the I.N.A. Treasure is "in a sense Government property", a decision is required as to whether Government is, therefore, at liberty to utilise the cash for administrative purposes.

The articles of jewellery, etc. have arrived and have been kept in safe deposit. Dr Rauf is still holding 20,000 Yen in cash which is also part of the treasure. He wishes to know whether this should be credited to the Embassy account.

2. It is our present intention to treat all these articles which have been brought from Japan as historical articles. Later on they may be kept in a museum. If it is decided to keep them in a museum, we shall get the currency notes, etc. which Dr Rauf is holding and put them along with the other articles. If the decision is to sell the articles and use the proceeds for some national purpose, Dr Rauf will be asked to send us the money which will be added on to the other proceeds.

3. As we are still uncertain about the ultimate use of all this treasure, I think Dr Rauf should be asked to keep the currency notes, etc. with him for the present. If he sends the notes to us here, there may be some difficulty in getting them exchanged for rupees in case it is decided to use the proceeds for some national purpose and not to display the articles in a museum.

Central Board of Revenue have been consulted and they are of the view that the duty will be payable unless the articles are treated as articles of historical value and are displayed in a museum. It has not yet been decided what will be done with these articles, These articles are roughly valued at Rs.90,000/-.



Mr. H.Dayal, Mr.Roy, Superintendent, Central Asian Antiquities Museum and I saw the 'treasure'. It is a miscellaneous collection of broken fragments of jewellery, ornaments etc., some twisted metal, presumably from an aeroplane and some dust and ashes. The individual items are generally very small and their number is quite large.

All three of us were of the view that it would be difficult to exhibit these things as they are not suitable for exhibition. If there were any personal momentoes of the late Shri Subhas Chandra Bose like a watch or medal, there would have been some interest in the articles. The charred pieces of jewellery, some of which appear to be of gold and some of base metal, are not likely to arouse much interest. As for the twisted metal or dust or ashes, these also are not likely to arouse much public interest.

The best way of dealing with this 'treasure' may perhaps be to hand it over to Shri Bose's family. They may exhibit it in the Subhas Museum which is proposed to be set up in Cuttack or in the house in Elgin Road, where also a collection of his things has been made.

If it is desired that some exhibition of these articles should be made in Delhi, I would suggest that a selection of some of the broken fragments of metal or ornaments may be made and arranged in one or two shelves in a glass case and exhibited in the National Museum for a month or so. Thereafter, this and the rest of the material may be given to the late Mr. Bose's family.

Shri M.O. Mathai will recall that I discussed the question of disposal of the INA"treasure" with him some time ago. The "treasure" was received from Tokyo and consists of some charred and broken pieces of jewellery. There is also a sum of Rs.265/10/- in cash, being the equivalent of the amount of 20,000 yen which was deposited with our Embassy. The pieces of metal and the cash are in a locked box which has been put inside a sealed bag and deposited in the cash chest of the Ministry. This is not a very satisfactory arrangement for its safe custody.

Shri Mathai said that he would investigate 2. in consultation with the Ministry of Education where the "treasure" could most usefully be kept and displayed, and would then make arrangements to take it over from us. The cash could perhaps be credited to any INA Fund that might still be in existence. We shall be most grateful if he would kindly take action as above and relieve us of the responsibility for the custody of the "treasure". He would, no doubt, obtain P.M.'s orders.

Mr. H.Dayal, Mr. Roy, Superintendent, Central Asian Antiquities Museum and I saw the 'treasure'. It is a miscellaneous collection of broken fragments of jewellery, ornaments etc., some twisted metal, presumably from an aeroplane and some dust and ashes. The individual items are generally very small and their number is quite large.

All three of us were of the view that it would be difficult to exhibit these things as they are not suitable for exhibition. If there were any personal momentoes of the late Shri Subhas Chandra Bose like a watch or medal, there would have been some interest in the articles. The charred pieces of jewellery, some of which appear to be of gold and some of base metal, are not likely to arouse much interest. As for the twisted metal or dust or ashes, these also are not likely to arouse much public interest.

The best way of dealing with this 'treasure' may perhaps be to hand it over to Shri Bose's family. They may exhibit it in the Subhas Museum which is proposed to be set up in Cuttack or in the house in Elgin Road, where also a collection of his things has been made.

If it is desired that some exhibition of these articles should be made in Delhi, I would suggest that a selection of some of the broken fragments of metal or ornaments may be made and arranged in one or two shelves in a glass case and exhibited in the National Museum for a month or so. Thereafter, this and the rest of the material may be given to the late Mr. Bose's family.



Please refer to your demi-official letter No. F.25/4/NGO, dated the 15th June, 1954, regarding the ashes of Shri Subhas Bose. Miss Naidu had shown me a letter received from Ranbir Singh 2. includ in which it was suggested that we should donate a receptacle of me ht appropriate material and quality to enshrine the ashes of the late . Romp. Netaji. She was most anxious, in view of the opinion of the family and some others, that the Government of India should not be committed to an admission that they acknowledged the ashes to be genuine relics. I, therefore, suggested that I would try to persuade some admirers of Netaji in Rangoon to donate a casket for the purpose. On my way back to Japan, I had only a day and half at Rangoon and, therefore, could not meet a number of people I had intended to approach. However, one gentleman to whom I talked to, was not enthusiastic about the idea.

> 3. The priest of the Renkoji temple is anxious for a recognition of his own status as the keeper of the ashes. Opinion of Indians here is divided. Any recognition, therefore, would be a source of controversy. It would not so much matter about the Indians locally, but the opinion in Bengal refuses to accept the fact of Netaji's death and, therefore, of the genuineness of the ashes. I would, therefore, suggest that so long as we can, we should try and keep things as they are until opinion in Bengal changes to accept the fact of his death.

Should he require financial assistance, we would be happy to provide it; but we hoped for his agreement to continue as the guardian of the ashes for some time.

4. Though repeatedly pressed to accept financial assistance, the priest made it very clear that he had kept the ashes, voluntarily, because of his high regard for Subhas Babu, which, in itself, made it impossible for him to accept any money.

5. He then told us in a round-about-way that the guardianship of these ashes was a source of worry to him; that some of the few-score Indians who have visited the temple and seen the ashe's have not behaved with due respect towards them and that he sought to have it stated officially, and publicly, by this Embassy, that the ashes were in his keeping. Finally, could we arrange to provide a receptacle, of artistic design, made preferably in India, in which the ashes would be kept? This receptacle would be on a shelf, in the temple, between two lighted candles; and visitors could make their obeisance before it. Of course, whether Buddhists (Mochizuki-San is a member of the Nichiren sect) or Shintoists, the Japanese venerate, greatly, the ashes of the dead.

6. As you know, many of our fellow-citizens living in Japan, as well as some of those at home, remain convinced either that these ashes are not those of Subhas Babu or that he is still alive. Such evidence as we have, on the relevant file, indicates that he is dead and it is likely, though not

absolutely certain, that these ashes are his.

Any official statement by this Embassy of the 7. type required by the priest would raise a storm of protest among some of our more obstinate fellow-citizens here.

The priest agreed to continue to look after the 8. ashes and we were able to dissuade him from insisting on public acknowledgment which, we implied, would, of course, be given when the ashes were, finally, taken to India.

The ashes are, at present, kept in a cupboard in 9. the temple and, when visitors arrive, they are taken out and placed between two candles - below a small photograph of Subhas Babu. They are kept in a small box about 9" X 6". which seems to be either tin or wood, and are covered by a white and somewhat transparent cloth which is almost gauze. This manner of viewing them is rather undignified. I would be grateful to have early instructions about the priest's request for the provision of a suitable receptacle. The points for decision are, firstly, whether we should comply with this request and, secondly, whether the receptacle should be made in India or obtained in Japan. Should it be decided to make one in India, I will consult the priest again and provide details about the sort of receptacle he wishes to have.

You may be interested to hear that the priest told 10. me that about one hundred persons, including Indians and Japanese, had visited him and been shown the ashes. Certain Americans had also come, to use his own words, to "worship" the ashes. It was sad to hear that the conduct of some of our own people had been lacking in propriety.

The Renkoji temple is fairly large and is well looked 11. after. I am quite convinced that Mochizuki-San does not require financial assistance to look after the ashes. He is a pleasant man of about 60 and I have little doubt that his genuine regard for Subhas Babu derives from his sincere, though metaphysical and ill-founded, belief, that Japan's Asian venture, if successful, would have been the fulfilment of a noble and humanitarian purpose.

In the priest's letter, some reference is made to his not receiving any help privately or officially. The Prime Minister would therefore like you to help him in any way you think proper, including financially in so far as any money might be required for this purpose.

Dear Sir:

I am the priest of Renkoji, Buddhist temple in the suburbs of Tokyo City. I have the honour to send this letter to you, guided by the soul of the late Sbath Chandra Bose ji. I have been keeping the ashes of Netaji safely, and praying for the repose of his soul since September 18 in 1945. Eight years have already passed since that time. Japan was under Occupation eight years ago, during which Japanese people were living their stormy life in social confusion. Therefore, apprehensive of consequences, none would accept Netaji's ashes to keep it safely.

I, a stranger to the late Netaji, was asked to keep the ashes by people who were strangers to me including Indians of whom I have never heard since that time. I thought anyone's soul should be warmly worshipped under whatever circumstances. According to such belief as a religionist who serve the spiritual world, I have secretly been guarding Netaji's ashes at the **risk** of my life. I have been so watchful that even small noises at midnight startle me.

In June, 1951, Ex-Indian Ambassador to Japan, His Excellency, K.K.Chettur, invited me to his official residence. And I was officially asked to keep the ashes by him, as the representative of the Indian Government. The witness was Mr. Tamura, Chief of the Ceremony Section of the Foreign Office of Japan. So my responsibility and duties for keeping the ashes have become more important.

Frankly speaking, I must inform you that, in spite of many inconveniences and trouble I underwent in keeping the ashes, I have never received any help privately and officially. But I believe I can keep up Netaji's soul perfectly by recognizing the importance of duties assigned me and with my strong belief as a religionist. Now Japan is not under Occupation. The peaceful relations between Japan and India have been reestablished. So, it is meaningless and pity for the late Metaji that his ashes should be kept in a temple of a foreign country, lonely and secretly, after all his vain efforts to bring about the independence of India and happiness of Asia. I think now is the time when such a significant plan as vivifies the historical achievements and sacred spirit of Netaji eternally for both Asia and mankind should be adopted.

During the latest equinox week, I dreamed a strange dream of Netaji two nights on end. The dream was enough to make me lose the peace of my mind as a religionist.

Such is the background of my taking the liberty of expressing my personal view in this letter, which I write as a religionist and a priest who is charged with such an important responsibility by the Indian Government.

I should be much obliged if you would kindly understand me, and send me, directly if possible, any suggestions you may have as to the disposal of the late Metaji's ashes.

Treasure", consists of some pieces of gold and charred and broken pieces of jewellery, and was handed over to us by the officials of the India Independence League at Tokyo, who kept it with them . since the reported death of Shri Subhas Chandra Bose.

2. The Prime Minister has decided that the "treasure" should be kept as evidence of the aircraft accident in which Shri Bose met his death.

3. I am accordingly to request you to authorise the Treasury Officer, New Delhi, to receive the "treasure" into the Treasury for safe custody under Rule 73 of the Treasury Rules. A list of the articles in question is enclosed for your information. Besides these, an amount of Rs.265/10 is held in cash, the equivalent of 20,000 Yen which was deposited in our Embassy at Tokyo. 



Sub:- "Indian National Army" Treasure -Question of exemption from Customs duty thereon.

You mentioned the other day that the Customs authorities had asked for payment of customs duty amounting to about Rs.20,000/- on the import of some personal effects and gold valued at about Rs.80,000/belonging to the late Shri Subhas Chandra Bose and wondered why the Government in whom this property now vested should be required to pay customs duty.

Under the law as it stands, even goods 2. imported by Government have to pay Customs duty unless they are covered by a specific exemption; the Finance Ministry did not consider that there were any strong grounds for grant of exemption from duty in respect of the "I.N.A. Treasure" unless it was of historical interest and was to be exhibited in a public place. Subsequent to our discussion the other day, papers were received from the Ministry of External Affairs in which you recorded a minute on the 11th November 1952 that it is the present intention to treat the I.N.A. Treasure as historical articles which might be kept in a museum and that, in the event of a decision otherwise later, such duty would be paid as may be decided upon. In the circumstances and on the analogy of the free entry permissible under the law of works of art, such as, statuaries and pictures intended to be put up for the public benefit in a public place. instructions are being issued, as a special case, exempting the articles in question from payment of customs duty.



BRING NETAJI'S **RELICS TO INDIA.** ASIANS SUGGEST

INDORE, December 3. IN talks with me at Sanchi this week, people from all over Asia expressed hope that the countrymen of Subhas Chandra Bose would soon take steps to bring his relics to his motherland for being enshrined either at India's capital or at Subhas's birthplace.

his motherland for being enshr or at Subhas's birthplace. The relics of Netaji are now enshrined in a small Buddhist temple near Tokyo where a monk has been offering wor-ship since August 1945, when Subhas Bose expired from burns sustained in a plane acident. Watable information was gathered by me at Sanchi, where I met a Buddhist monk, who returned last week from Japan after attending the In-ternational Buddhist Confe-rence. This Indian monk has also brought with him details of the plane accident and a photograph of the casket of Netaji's relics which has been placed above a portrait of his military uniform Entries in the diary show do his relics and their en-shrinement in the temple, all of which took place in August 1945. The small temole was chosen for security reasons. This Buddhist monk was the first man since the enshrine-ment, who was allowed to touch the relics as ne happen-et ocome from Netaji's land. The Buddhist monk has also brought a copy of the message that was dictated by Subhas Bose before his expiry in the military hospital wherein he has observed that he fought for the country's freedom while alive and was giving his life for the same purpose. The mes-sage exhorted his countrymen to intensify the fight for In-dia's Independence.

Leading an army of Indians recruited from Southeast Asia and from Japanese prisoner-of-war camps after the fall of Singapore, Chandra Bose at the pinnacle of his career pushed the British from the Province of Imphal in India and set up an independent government.

In the last days of the war he traveled through Thailand, Burna and Malaya addressing rallies of Indian trader support-ers. When he called for finan-cial aid, his audience often strin-ped off golden knicknacks and jewelry to contribute.

In August of 1945 Chandra In August of 1945 Chandra Bose loaded his war fund aboard two planes and took off from Singapore for Tokyo. His plane crashed on Formosa on VJ-day (August 15). The Indian leader died after about six hours in a Taipel hospital.

Taiper hospital. The gold and Jewels aboard the plane were confiscated. Mr. Ayer came to Japan in another plane, and, according to reports from various sections of the Far East, his plane carried the re-maining gold and Jewels. Ac-cording to unconfirmed reports, he turned the treasure over to Mr. Murti, the Tokyo repres-entative. entative.

Members of the Indian com-munity in Japan said that when Mr. Ayer left Japan for India, he did not take the bulky trea-sure with him. Mr. Murti claim-ed he had no knowledge of the estimated \$700,000. Mr. Ayer politely refused any and all com-ment on the subject.

In the years since the war, Mr. Murti has become a success-ful and prosperous Tokyo busi-nessman. His trading company is a store which sells fancy, ex-pensive watches, filmy lingerie and other American-made luxuries. Mr. Murti

Mr. Murti owns three auto-mobiles—including a Cadillac and a large Chrysler, according to Indian officials here. Mr. Ayer, returning to India, continued his work in politics, now holding a government job in Bombay.

My dear Bidhan,

I spoke to you about Subhas Bose's ashes in Tokyo.

One Ayer was Publicity Adviser to Subhas Bose in Malaya during the INA period. He was with him till Subhas left for Japan. In the course of this journey, it has been alleged that Subhas died owing to an aircrash.

Ayer went to Japan in May last to make further inquiries about this matter. He has presented us with a full report containing the evidence of Indians and Japanese, some of them eye-witnesses of the crash. He comes to the firm conclusion that there is not a shadow of a doubt that Subhas Bese died in Formosa in an aircraft accident and that his ashes were taken to Tokyo and are now kept in a temple there.

In answer to a question in Parliament I am going to place Ayer's report on the table of the House. I have no reason to doubt the correctness of this report and I think I must accept the final conclusion also.


The question arises as to what we are to do with the urn containing the ashes which is at present kept in a Japanese temple. We have asked our representative in Tokyo to take formal charge of this, but to leave it in the temple until further directions are given. 

INA TREASURES AND THEIR HANDLING BY HESSRS IYER & RAMAMURTHI.

Considerable quantities of gold and treasures were given to the late Shri Subhas Chandra Bose by Indians in the Far East as a part of their war effort. Shri Subhas Chandra carried a part of these "treasures" with in on his ill-fated flight from Saigon to Tokyo; the remaining "treasures" were left in Saigon.

According to photo-static conies of documents the following treasures are reported to have eventually reached Tokyo.

A. Recovered from plane crash

- (1) Comparatively pure gold in two wooden boxes and a paper wrapper (weight include weight of gold and wooden box)
- (2) One packet rold mixed with molten metal iron etc. (weight includes weight of gold, metal iron etc. and paper urapper.
- B. Brought by S.A. Iyer from Saigon

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In addition to the above Mr. S.A. Hyer handed over ¥.20,000/-.

The above treasures were handed over in Tokyo to one Mr. Ramamurthy. Mr. Ramamurthy was on several occasions questioned by representatives of the Government of India regarding these treasures but he denied the existence of the treasure and it was only recently that he admitted that the treasures were in his possession.

* These treasures have now been taken over by the Indian Liaison Mission, Tokyo, and the list of treasures recovered by them is at slip **. The weight of treasures new recovered is considerably more than the weight of treasures that are reported to have been handed over to Mr. Ramamurthy.' Further the #.20,000/- notes now handed over to Indian Liaison Mission are of current use. (The notes that were handed over to Mr. Ramamurthy in 1945 must have been those which are no longer current in Japan).

Mr. Iver recently vigited Japan with the ostensible purpose of investigating the present position in regard to the treasures. Mr. Iver's activities in Japan have been rather suspicious and Mr. Chettur's views re arding this are as follows:-

"It appears that Netari had with him in Saigon

Figges, the Military Attache of the British Mission in Tokyo, and the reported invitation extended by the Colonel to Ramamurthy to settle down in U.K.

My dear Dutt,

Please refer to my Top Secret telegram No.74-GS dated the 25th September intimating to you that whatever INA properties Ram Murty handed over to us were in our possession.

2. As arranged with Ram Murthy, Trivedi accompanied by the Office Registrar went to the former's house on the 24th September, and took possession of the various packages after opening and weighing them with our own scale in the presence of Ram Murty and his wife. These packages were in three cloth bundles. In addition there was a paper package containing gold pieces and and ¥ 20,000 in cash handed over by Iyer to Ram Murty. A copy of the detailed list with weights shown against each package is enclosed.

3. Trivedi also signed a receipt on the photostat copies of Habibur Rehman's and Iyer's letters to Murty dated the 15th November, 1945, copies of which I had sent to Chakravarty with my Top Secret D.O. letter
7 A __No.F.5(25)/51 of 6th June 1951.

4. If you compare the lists with the information given in the photostat copies, you will find that there was no wooden box and that the "treasure" was apparently divided into a larger number of paper packages and cloth bundles. Despite the absence of the wooden box, however, the weight is more than that shown in Habib-ur-Rehman's letter, which also does not mention another bundle mostly containing dust and some base metal. Ram Murty told Trivedi that the "treasure" was opened and weighed once again when Iyer came here last. Iyer has jotted down the weights in his handwriting and these slips of paper are with the bundles. Murty also stated that the third bundle was not mentioned in Habib-ur-Rehman's letter as it was practically worthless.

5. Two other points worth noting in this connection are that the twenty thousand Yen handed over by Ram Murty are in <u>current</u> notes of ¥ 1,000 each, and not in notes which were current in 1945 nor in their equivalent in actual value on account of changes in Yen currency values. Secondly, the gold lumps given by Iyer, which are obviously pieces from melted ornaments are bright and completely untarnished. You will no doubt consult experts whether gold will remain entirely untarnished after nearly six years.

6. Incidentally, when Trivedi first called Ram Murty in August 1951 after the receipt of your instructions to take over the "treasure", he admitted that the treasure was in his possession but that he had been denying its existence so far "in view of the risks involved in admitting it", meaning robbery or appropriation by the Occupation or Japanese authorities. As a matter of fact Murty has all plong denied the existence of the "treasure" and even Chakravarty questioned him when he was the Head of the Mission (and even though there is no specific noting on our file, it would appear that Rama Rao or Bahadur Singh must also have questioned him.)

7. I may add that we have since been able to secure on a personal and private basis a confidential report from the Japanese Foreign Ministry on the question of Netaji's "treasure". It appears that Netaji had with him in Saigon substantial quantities of gold ornaments and precious stones, but that he was allowed to carry only two suitcases on the ill-fated flight. You will, no doubt, draw your owm conclusions from all this, but to me it would appear uncommonly as if Lyer, apprehensive of the early conclusion of the Peace Treaty, came to Tokyo to divide the loot and to salve his and Murty's conscience by the handing over of a small quantity to the Government in the hope that by doing so he would also succeed in drawing a red herring across the trail. How far he has been successful, time will show.

Will you please refer to your D.O.letter No.25/4/NGO dated the 24th September 1951?

2. I am afraid there is some misunderstanding here. In none of my earlier letters did I say that the ashes presumed to be those of the late Netaji are at present "in the charge of Mr. Ramamurti". As a matter of fact, these ashes are not in the custody of Ramamurti but under the control of the priest of the Renkoji Temple, who does not recognise the right of Ramamurti to control its disposal. It may interest you to know that quite some months ago we had arranged with the Japanese Foreign Office here that these ashes would be left undisturbed and under our control in the temple until further instructions were received from this Mission. The priest himself is also fully aware of this decision, which was explained to him in person.

3. You will of course let me know in due course the decision of the Government of India regarding its final disposal.





SUMMARY.

Subject: Netaji Subas Chandra Bose.

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Five questions were asked in Parliament regarding Netaji Subas Chandra Bose in 1946. In answer to Mr.Mangal Singh's on 12 February 1946 question on Netaji's death, the Government/made an authoritative statement that Netaji succumbed to injuries sustained in a plane crash at Taihoku airfield on 18 August 1945. Subsequently however, the Government on 30 October 1946 stated, in reply to another question by Mr. Mangal Singh, that they are not in a position to make any authoritative statement on whether Netaji is dead or alive and that they have not made any enquiries in the This apparent contradiction is presumably due to the matter. fact that the former reply was given by the foreign controlled India Government and the latter by Shri Patel after the establishment of the Interim Government.

2. The Hindustan Times published on 12 October 1946 a statement by the Hon'ble the Prime Minister that there was not the slightest justification for the belief that Netaji was alive. This statement also referred to Col. Habibur Rahman's letters to the H.P.M. wherein he had assured the fact of Netaji's death on August 18, 1945. Col. Rahman was himself involved in the plane crash and he had his bed in the hospital side by side with that of Netaji.

3. Capt. Yoshimi Taneyoshi, a medical officer of the Japanese Imperial Army, has, in a long statement, given the details of Netaji's death.

wherein was reported that the ashes of Netaji were lying in a temple in Tokyo. The Indian Liaison Mission, Tokyo, were asked to verify this report. The Mission carried out possible investigations and reported that Mr.Ramamurti had confirmed that Aiyer and himself received ashes of Netaji in September 1945 and entrusted them to the custody of Renkoji Temple in Tokyo. The first secretary visited the temple and saw the casket. The Mission had reported that further verification was obvicusly impossible. They have stated further that according to understanding at time of deposit of ashes, the temple authorities **krff** prepared to despatch the ashes to India provided arrangements are made for receiving the casket with ceremonies and honour compatible with the status of Netaji.

My dear Chettur,

This is in continuation of my letter No. F.25/4/NGO, dated the 12th July, 1951. The Prime Minister came back yesterday and I mentioned the matter to him. From various considerations we think it desirable not to get mixed up with Netaji's Asnes at least for the present. The Asnes may remain where they are. You should, however, try to take possession of the gold from Ramamurti.

As regards the holding of an enquiry the position is as I stated in my letter dated the 12th July and the Prime Minister does not want any open investigations which might prove embarrassing to the Mission and to the Government. If any confidential enquiries are possible without causing any embarrassment to the Mission you will no doubt make such enquiries. Please let us know when you are able to take possession of the gold. The question of its disposal may then be considered.

I enclose a copy of a letter written to Bhat, Chief Secretary of the Bombay Government, by Ayer on his return to India. From your letters I got the impression that Ayer more or less avoided meeting you after the 5th June with the result that you could not communicate the contents of our telegram to him. He seems to suggest that the initiative was with you and that you did not send him any message until the day he left Tokyo. That, however, is probably to be expected.

The Prime Minister is away and I cannot at the moment tell you anything about the Ashes, but meanwhile you may ask Ramamurti to make over the gold to you.

I received your d.o.letter No.F.5(25)/51, dated the 29th June 1951 auly. As I had already told you in one of my previous letters there was nothing wrong in your interpretation of the Government's attitude. That was my own interpretation too. But when I talked the matter over with the Prime Minister he definitely said that that is not the Government's attitude. Apparently Harish Dzyal's letter was issued without the knowledge of the Prime Minister. In your letter dated the 11th June 1951 you stated that you had heard the most scandalous reports about the Ayer-Ramamurti link and that you had no reason whatsoever to doubt their authenticity, but that in view of the lack of interest evinced by Government in this matter in the past you have refrained from pursuing it. We therefore informed you thet Government are greatly interested in recovering all gold and other forms of treasure and suggested that you might pursue the matter. If as you now say that it is too late to undertake a treasure hunt we would certainly not press you to do so, particularly if it means that your "investigations may involve a degree of publicity which might well prove embarrassing not only to the Mission but also to the Government of India". I myself feel that the guilty persons should be exposed. If that cannot be done by confidential enquiries without causing any embarrassment to the Mission I suppose we will have to give up the idea altogether. I have not been able to show your latest letter to the Prime Minister. When he comes back from Bangalore I will mention the case again to him and obtain his orders as to whether he would like the matter to be investigated further. I will let you know his decision in due course.

• Will you please refer to the Ministry's cable No. PRIMIN-21557 dated the 23rd (received 25th) June 1951, which has crossed my top secret D.O. of the 22nd?

2. My interpretation -- which I am now told is wrong -of Government's attitude towards this matter was based on the Ministry's D.O.No.D.9593-FEA/47 dated the 29/30th December 1947, to which Incidentally I invited your attention when I reopened the case in my D.O. of the 21st May 1951 regarding SCAP clearance for Ayer's contemplated visit to this country. To the Mission's request as early as in December 1947 for instructions of Government on the duestion of the alleged misappropriation of the Netaji collections by Ramamurti, the Ministry's reply was: "In any event, the Govt. of India can hardly claim the assets of the Indian Independence League as its own and this is therefore a matter in which we cannot proceed officially. It is for the accusers of Ramamurti themselves to take such action as they are able".

3. It seems to me too late now to undertake a treasurehunt on the scale envisaged by you -- for one thing, all the treasure, if it existed, save the two boxes now promised by Ayer, which are I understand in Ramamurti's possession now, must have long ago been converted into hard cash, commodities and landed property. The proceeds must also have been distributed between the parties concerned, and as I observed before, this would appear in some measure to be borne out by Ramamurti's comparative affluence in 1946, Capt. Thairatatte's farming venture in Sendai and Col. Figgess' blossoming out into an Oriental curio expert and a collector of objet d'art. There are others also whose names have been mentioned, though the nature of their participation in this affair still remains to be revealed. The fact however that Ayer refused to see his old Indian Independence League friends, other than Ramamurti, during his recent visit to Tokyo and that he slipped out of Tokyo without calling upon me would appear to show a degree of complicity in the whole affair well worth examining. This I shall do if you agree, though I would also add that the scent is now stone-cold and that many red herrings have been drawn across the trail. You are also aware of the agitation amongst the local Indian community here and that I have had quite a number of promises from many Indians, who have been here since the war, of signed statements setting forth their knowledge of what transpired during this period. It is also probably within your knowledge that certain Japanese informants, who were willing to offer the Mission concrete and conclusive evidence in 1948 with regard to the disappearance of the Netaji collections, were prevented from doing so by interested parties.

4. I am perfectly clear however that any enquiry now will stir up a lot of mud which I would rather avoid, since the principal collaborators are well beyond reach and all that the enquiry would do would be to secure for us a measure of publicity which I for one would most definitely like to avoid. And it seems to me that Government also cannot avoid some measure of responsibility for evading the issue in 1947 -indeed the feeling here among local Indians was and is that the Government of India displayed an apathy and indifference to the manner of Subhas Chandra Bose's death and the disposal of his collections, which appeared to them to be little short of callous. Ayer is no doubt fully aware of all this -- this

is borne out by his clever observation to me that Government would be well advised to let sleeping dogs lie as election time was coming on and that it would hardly do to stir up the whole question of Netaji's death, the manner of his death and the disposal of his collections, which would appear to indicate, at any rate on his part, a very keen interest in letting this matter fade into oblivion.

5. All that we can salvage out of this business therefore would appear to be the two boxes, and as Ayer is now in India I suggest that he be asked to arrange for their being handed over to the Mission. It is interesting, as you observe, that both Ramamurti and Ayer should now admit the existence of this gold when they had originally denied all knowledge of any gold or jewellery -- and particularly when the photostat copies revealed their existence as far back as 1945.

6. I may be doing Ayer an injustice, but I am not sure that he is not a party to the misappropriation. Allegations have also been made here of his misappropriation of the deposits in the Azad Hind Bank in Rangoon, of which he was I understand the Managing Director. It is also stated by an Indian resident here that when he called upon Ayer soon after his arrival in Japan in 1945, his attention was drawn by Ayer himself to two big suitcases containing the personal effects of the late Subhas Chandra Bose, though what transpired later to these boxes has not been revealed. We should I think in this connection have on record an affidavit from Ayer with regard to his knowledge of these matters and I trust that the necessary steps to this end will be taken by you.

7. It would be also interesting in this connection if an affidavit could be secured from Col. Rahman, who is now in Pakistan, so that the two individuals who are known to have seen and/or handled the Netaji collections last may be on record, as it may throw considerable light on the amounts that were saved from the wreck. My own feeling is that Ayer's recent visit to Japan was not for a holiday but for the final disposition of the property, as a peace treaty was due very shortly and it was likely that the Japanese Government themselves might set afoot some enquiry as to the disposition of the treasure, as their good name also has been involved in this matter.

8. You may be interested to know in this connection that the Murti brothers are reported to be seriously contemplating quitting Japan and settling down either in the U.K. or in the U.S.A. -- probably the former and that Col. Figgess, Assistant Military Adviser to the British Embassy here has promised them every assistance if they propose to go to the U.K. It is not also without interest to mention that these ill-gotten gains have brought little happiness to the Murti family, save perhaps their Japanese wives in whose names I gather their property in Japan has been registered. The elder Murti (Ramamurti), though he owns a fine shop on the Ginza, perpetually wears a most harassed look. His asthmatic complaint, in spite of all the latest drugs that modern medicine can supply and his money can buy, have brought him little or no relief. What is even more tragic is that his younger brother (Jayamurti), who suffers from tuberculosis, has I understand had three of his ribs removed and has become practically a permanent invalid.



Dear Shri Bhatm

With reference to your D.O. No. C.S./229 of 11th May 1951, I arrived in Tokyo on 24th May and after a stay of 18 days there, returned to Bombay on 13th June. The next day I called on you at the Secretariat and gave you a brief oral report.

During my brief stay in Tokyo, I called at the Indian Liaison Mission and met His Emcellency K.K.Chettur, Chief of the Mission, on three days, namely, May 29, May 30and June 5.

In the course of the second interview I handed to Shri Chettur photostat copies of two documents one of which contained authentic information on what hap--pened to the jewellery which Netaji was carrying with him on his fatal plane dash from Saigon on August 17, 1945.

As for Netaji's sacred ashed, I told Shri Thettur that they were still enshrined in the temple where I had left them in 1945.

In view of the fact that Shri M. Rama Murti, ex-President, Indian Independence League, Japan, had been looking after the security of the **minimum** ashes as well as the gold for the last six years, I requested Shri Chettur to ask for cabled instructions from the **minimum** External Affairs Ministry to relieve Shri Murti of this onerous responsibility which should no longer be allowed to remain a burden on a private individual. Shri Chettur agreed to contact Delhi immediately.

When I called on him six days later, namely, June5, he said that he had airmailed a letter to Delhi soon after I saw him on May 30, and had not yet had a reply. In my presence, he dictated a cable to Delhi asking for an urgent reply to his letter. He promised to let me know the moment he heard from Delhi. I did not receive any message from him until the day I left Tokyo, namely, the 11th of June.

That, in in brief, is the position as far as I am aware at the moment. I do not know if Shri Chettur has since heard from Delhi. Ifnothing has yet been done in the matter, I would even now urge Delhi to instruct Shri Chettur to take over the responsibility for the safety of the ashes and the gold.

I need hardly add that I have sufficient proofs to convince any unbiassed person that the ashes are Nataji's. But, in view of the unfortunate attitude still adopted by Netaji's nephews, Shri Amiya Bose and and Arvind Bose, the ashes cannot be brought to India yet; nor would it be prudent to make any announcement 'for the time being, either.

As for the gold, it might be worth our while to wait till the signing of the Japanese Peace Treaty, which event is expected to take place in September next. Then it might be easier to do something with the gold in Japan itself or to bring it to India. For obvious reasons, we can hardly do anything in this connection as long as the American occupation lasts.

All these facts are very well known to Shri Chettur who, I presume, has already communicated them to Delhi.

As I informed you on May 14, I left my post as Director of Publicity, Government of Bombay, that day and took over my new new duties as Regional Officer, Bombay, with the Central Board of FidmCensors, Minis--try of Information and Broadcasting, Government of India, the next day, that is, June 15. I have been rather busy this last fortnight getting into my stride in the new place; hence the delay in writing this letter.

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May I request you to be good enough to communicate the contents of this letter to the proper quarters in Delhi at your earliest conveni--ence? They my contact me direct, if they wish to.

Thank you very much for your d.c.letter No. F.5(25)/51, dated the 22nd June 1951. You must have by now got our telegram and my d.o.letter No.25/4/NGO, dated the 25th June 1951 which I wrote after we received the photostats. My top secret D.O. letters of the 6th and 11th June 1951 have obviously crossed yours No.D.1859-NGO/51 of the 7th June.

2. I now understand that Ayer left by BOAC on the llth for Calcutta, though I have not been able to verify the earlier report that he had gone to Hokkaido, as subsequent reports indicated that his ostensible visit to this Island was designed with a view to covering his tracks. One such report alleged that he did not in fact visit Hokkaido, but had gone to Sendai, about 300 miles north of Tokyo, to contact an old Japanese colleague who was also closely connected with Ayer and Ramamurti and the Netaji collections. The last I saw him was on the 5th when he called on me to say that he was definitely leaving on the 8th and to enquire whether any instructions had been received from you regarding his proposal to dispose of the Netaji collections in the manner indicated in paragraph 3 of my D.O. of the 29th May. He also handed to me at the time two photostats which must be in your hands by now. As he was very anxious to ascertain your reactions before his departure, I sent you, at his request, a most immediate cable on the 5th and assured him that a reply would be received by the 7th at the latest. That he did not bother to see me again, much less hand over the gold as previously promised, or even make an attempt to find out whether any reply had been received from you to the cable despatched at his instance, has added to mxx my suspicions regarding the motives behind his holiday visit to this country. His extraordinary statement that he had received a letter from you, entrusting him with two commissions on behalf of the Government of India, is also a point worth investigating.

3. If Government are seriously interested in unravelling the mystery surrounding the disappearance of the Netaji collections, I shall be only too glad to make further investigations in the matter, but it should be understood that such investigations may involve a degree of publicity which might well prove embarrassing not only to the Mission but also to the Government of India.

My dear Chettur,

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Will you kindly refer to your Top Secret d.o.letter No.F.5(25)/51, dated the 11th June 1951, which I received on the 18th of June. As I wanted to mention the case to P.M. I had to wait till he returned from his Nepal and Bihar tours.

P.M. has seen your letter and also the photostat copies of the letters you sent me with your d.o.letter No.F.5(25)/ 51 dated the 6th June 1951. P.M. did not quite understand why you should think that there is a lack of interest evinced by Government in this matter. I had to refer him to Harishwar Dayal's letter to Bana Bau. P.M. thought that that letter was issued without his being informed about it. He was, therefore, particularly anxious that you should take interest in this matter and take possession of the gold and other treasure that may be possible for you to get now. I sent you a telegram on the 23rd June accordingly.

When I was in Japan I confess I interpreted Harishwar Dayal's letter in the same way as you have done. I did, however, try to ascertain the facts just about the time I was leaving Japan but I could not make much progress. Ramamurti bluntly denied all knowledge of gold and jewellery. Now that P.M. desires that we must take interest in this matter I would request you to make a confidential enquiry and try to ascertain the facts. Every Indian in Japan says that Ramamurti became rich almost overnight and probably there is some truth in their allegations. But I do not know whether you will get any evidence to prove that he had misappropriated the funds.

Please let us know when you get the treasure. Its disposal may be considered later.



My dear Chakravarty,

In continuation of my top secret D.O.No.F.5(25)/51 of the 6th June, I enclose herewith a press cutting from the Nippon Times of yesterday, which speaks for itself. The fact that the author of the article is a leading member on the staff of the important United Press organisation will give you an indication of the degree of interest that has been aroused in local circles, both Indian and American, in Ayer's holiday in Japan. As I mentioned in my earlier letters, I have heard the most scandalous reports about the Ayer-Ramamurti link -and I have no reason whatsoever to doubt their authenticity -but in view of the lack of interest evinced by Government in this matter in the past, I have refrained from pursuing it. In any case, I believe you know as much about the case as I do and my comments on the subject might seem superfluous.

2. SCAP clearance for Ayer's two-week holiday was to have expired on the 8th June, but at his request we have had it extended by one week. He called at my office on the 5th to bid me good-bye and to tell me that the BOAC had confirmed his booking and that he was definitely leaving on the morning of the 8th. I understand, however, that he is still in Tokyo, though he has made no attempt to contact me or to apprise me of the reasons which have led to the extension of his stay in Tokyo -- which incidentally has prevented me from passing on khexgiskxafxxaux to him the gist of your cable of the 6th June.

Shri K.K. Chettur,

Your Secret d.o.letter No.5(25)/51 dated the 21st May and your Top Secret d.o.letter of the same number dated the 29th May both arrived day before yesterday, Soon after, I received your Top Secret telegram No.46 GS dated the 5th of June. I replied to your telegram yesterday after consulting the Prime Minister.

Ayer's visit to Japan is by no means official or even officially sponsored. Ayer had approached the Deputy Minister through somebody for obtaining the SCAP clearance and a telegram was sent to you under instructions of the Deputy Minister. Ayer was asked to furnish particulars directly to you.

We wondered what the nature of his business was in Japan and we did not know what he was up to. After some consideration we decided not to ask him point-blank what he was going to do in Japan. We suspected that while in Japan he might be doing something about Netaji's ashes. I therefore rang up the Chief Secretary of the Government of Bombay and requested him to tell lyer that if he visits Japan and if he can find any authentic information about Netaji's ashes he might pass on that information to you and to us. We thought that this would give both you and 's some idea as to what he was doing there. A couple of days ater I was rung up by the Chief Secretary of the Bombay Government who told me that SCAP clearance had not been received and that unless the clearance came within the next two or three days Ayer could not go as his leave would expire. We explained to him that unless and until the particulars were made available to you the SCAP clearance I thought that Ayer had not been able to go to Japan. I did not therefore think it worthwhile troubling you. Your letter was the first intimation we received of Ayer's presence in Japan. Apparently the SCAP clearance had been communicated to him at Bombay. I am very sorry for this miscalculation as I now find that in trying to save you from some trouble I have unwittingly placed you in a difficult situation.

These are the facts. We certainly had no intention of seeking Ayer's assistance in getting the ashes. There is no truth in the other stories that he has given you. The statement that he had left behind in Bombay a letter which I am supposed to have written to him to avoid its contents being revealed during the journey or in any customs examination and that this precaution was taken at my instance reads too much like a six-penny novel. In fact I have never written to him. When I was in Japan I also heard about Ramamurti misappropriating the funds of the late Indian Independence League as also the personal property of the late Subhas Chandra Bose. Ayer's name was also mixed up with this. I could not, however, get any reliable evidence. Ramamurti in fact denied all knowledge of gold and jewellery. It is therefore interesting to know that Ayer is now able to produce some part of Netaji's collections. The Prime Minister thought that there is no point in refusing to accept the gold if that is made over to you by Ayer for safe custody. It is realised that it may not be possible to bring this gold out of Japan, but that is a matter which can be considered later. Similarly, if he wanted to show you the papers giving details of what was left there is no objection to your receiving these papers and examining them. A telegram was sent to you accordingly. I would request you to let us know in due course whether these papers throw any light on this question.

He dwelt at some length on his previous trip to Japan, his rela-tionship to Netaji, his knowledge of the tragic circumstances in which the latter met his death and his various interviews with P.M., particularly his recent one at the I.N.A. Pelief meeting. He confided to me in this connection that he had been entrusted by the Government of India with two missions: (i) worification of the authenticity of Netajiis ashes which It diepard. (i) verification of the authenticity of Netaji's ashes which he and others had placed for safe deposit in a temple in Tokyo and (ii) recovery of the gold and jewellery which had been collected from the plane in which Netaji met his death. Ayer told me that he had received a letter on the subject from you and that he had left it behind at Bombay to avoid its contents being revealed during the journey or in any customs examination and that this precaution was taken at your instance. You will no doubt be in a position to verify his statements. All that I can say is that I cannot quite see why you should have left me in the dark with regard to this matter. I should have thought that in the circumstance. this matter. I should have thought that in the circumstances it was most essential that I should be kept in touch with what was happening, particularly in view of Ayer's past history, his relationship with Ramamurti and the scandal connected with the disappearance of Netaji's collections. My letter on the subject of Ayer's visit - D.O.No.5(25)/51 of the 21st May - must have reached you by now. I may add that he was at great pains to assure me that he had been trying to return to Japan for the last four years to pay his respects to Netaji's ashes -- a story which, on the face of it, sounded extremely thin.

> Ayer's unexpected return here as Ramamurti's guest has, I may add, given rise to considerable speculation however and that many of the local Indians are now seething with indignation at the manner of his return and his renewedd association with these two brothers. Not that I personally see any reason why Ayer's choice of his friends should be anybody's xxxx3xxxxHaxaksoxconfidedxthatxxomexnartxofxHetajitsxcolke hadahaanxaaxad business except his own, but the fact that Ramamurti and Ayer were alleged to have had something to with the mysterious disappearance of the gold and jewelle collected by Netaji should, I think, have deterred us fro encouraging him in his visit to this country or in giving visit an official backing.

> He also confided that some part of Netaji's collect-3. ions had been saved, largely of fused and melted gold ornaments, which in his opinion was worth about a lakh of rupees ments, which in his opinion was worth about a lakh of rupees or so. He completely phoo-phooed the story that some crores worth of jewels and gold had been saved; indeed he had a hearty laugh when I told him that local rumour had estimated the value of these property at some millions of rupees. He informed me that Col. Habibur Rahman and himself had compiled elaborate details of what was left and that he would like me to go through these lists with him before the gold was shipped to India. His suggestion was that it should be broken up into small lots and sent by diplomatic bag to Delhi to be disposed of by the Government of India in such manner as they deemed fit It does seem odd that he should now be so anxious to divulge the existence of this gold, stranger still, if rumour speaks correctly, that Ramamurti should have blossomed overnight into

comparative affluence in 1946 when his compatriots were on he verge of starvation and misery. As you are aware, as well as I am, of the past history of this case, I am desisting from further comment, but I shall be grateful for your very clear instructions as to how I should further proceed in this matter.

My dear Chakravarty,

Will you please refer to the Ministry's secret telegram No.25112 dated the 8th May, asking us to obtain SCAP clearance for Mr. S.A.Ayer to visit Japan by the 15th May on a two-week holiday?

2. Apart from the fact that the particulars required under the existing SCAP regulations, of which the Ministry are no doubt fully aware, did not reach us until the 16th May, I was at a loss to understand why we should have been rushed in this fashion, unless of course Government were particularly interested in the visit, which however seemed unlikely as it had been clearly stated in the telegram that he was coming here for a holiday. We have also had a cable from the Passport Officer, Bombay, in this connection. This sudden hurry over what is purported to be a holiday trip and the fact that he is visiting this country as Ramamurti's guest make one wonder if there may not be more in it than meets the eye. As you are no doubt aware, there have been serious allegations against Ramamurti with regard to the misappropriation of the funds of the late Indian Independence League, as also the personal property of the late Subhas Chandra Bose, consisting of considerable quantities of diamonds, jewellery, gold and other valuable articles. Rightly or wrongly, Ayer's name has also been associated with these charges. The matter was referred to the Ministry in Rama Rau's secret D.O. of the 4th December 1947 to which Dayal replied in his D.O. No.D.9593-FEA/47 dated the 30th December 1947. I thought I should bring this point to your notice for whatever it may be worth.

3. I hope you are not seeking Ayer's assistance with regard to the disposal of Netaji Subhas Bose's ashes now lying in a Tokyo temple, as it is most undesirable that he should, in view of the suspicions surrounding him, be associated in any manner with the taking over of these relics.


