MORNING AND EVENING PLANETS.

MERCURY, the least of the six old planets, is but seldom seen by the naked eye, and is not even under favourable circumstances visible more than two hours before the rising or after the setting of the sun, but when seen it appears at a little elevation like Antares, or Arcturus, red stars of the first magnitude. The following will be the most favourable opportunities for observing this planet during the year 1844.

April 24 to May 15 in the evening after sunset bearing W. N. W.
Octr. 6. to Octr. 24 in the morning before sunrise bearing East.
For the conjunction of this and the other planets, see Calendar pages.

VENUS, will be visible in the evening, in the West, after sunset until July 23 the day of her inferior conjunction, and then in the morning in the East, before sunrise. In the months of June and the latter part of Augt. and first of Septr. her brilliancy will be so great that she may be seen at noon by the naked eye, without much difficulty, even amidst the strongest sunshine.

MARS, will be visible in the evening in the West after sunset until Augt. 4, the day of his conjunction, and then in the morning before sunrise.

The four small planets VESTA, JUNO, CERES, and PALLAS are seldom if ever seen by the naked eye even when nearest the earth. JUPITER will be in conjunction March 1, and in opposition Septr. 21. This planet is always easily distinguished by his beautiful white light, which though inferior to that of VENUS is by far more brilliant than that of any other planet or star.

SATURN, which shines with a pale red light will be about fifty degrees to the West of JUPITER the whole year, and therefore easily distinguished.

URANUS, will be in conjunction March 22 and in opposition Septr. 27, but cannot be seen without a telescope.

OCCULTATIONS.

The most important occultations probably visible in Nova-Scotia, in 1844, are those of April 5, May 30, July 24, Octr. 29 and Decr. 23, but there will not be this year any visible occultation of a planet, or of a star of the first, or second magnitude.

EXPLANATION OF THE CALENDAR PAGES.

LEFT HAND PAGE.

COLUMN, 1st and 2d, contain the days of the month and of the week.

3d and 4th. The rising and setting in mean time, of the highest point, or of the *upper limb* of the sun, corrected for refraction.

5th. Days length in hours and minutes.

6th. The Equation of Time (or quantity by which the Sun is slow or fast of the clock), at noon, apparent time (not mean) at Greenwich, or at a quarter before eight in the morning at Halifax.

7th. The Sun's declination, for the same as the Equation, 6th column.

8th. The rising or setting of the Moon. The setting being given from the New Moon to Full, and her rising from Full to New Moon.

9th. The Place of the Moon in the Ecliptic.

10th. The time of the Moon's southing, or passing the meridian.

11th. Days increase or decrease in hours and minutes.

The top of the columns of each month shows the moon's phases, or the times of new and full moon, and of the first and last quarters, or two quadratures with the sun.

The FARMER'S CALENDAR is placed at the foot of the columns of each month.

of that tide which immediately precedes the southing of the moon. These four columns being computed on the supposition, that the time of High Water on the days of New and Full moon, (*L'établissement du port*) is at Halifax, 7h. 15m.—at Annapolis, 10h. 45m.—at Charlotte Town, 10h. 15m.—and at Windsor, and St. John, N. B. 11h. 45m. The tides of Jany. 5, April 17, May 17, June 15, July 15, October 26, November 24, and December 24, will be the highest of all this year, *uninfluenced by wind*, and in like manner the tides of January 5, April 17, May 17, June 15, July 15, October 26, November 24, and December 24, will be very low for spring tides.

* * * It will be particularly noticed that all the calculations in this Almanack have been adapted to *mean solar time*; a mode of computation which has recently come into very general use, and which will probably soon entirely supersede the old mode of reckoning, as a clock regulated to *apparent solar time*, must, in consequence of the inequality of the solar days, be frequently adjusted. To those persons, however, who may prefer to use *apparent time* the calculations will be equally useful, as *mean* is easily converted into *apparent time* by subtracting the quantity in the *sixth column* of the left hand calendar pages, when the Sun is slow of clock, and adding it when fast of clock.—Thus, on 1st February the Sun rises in mean time at 7h. 20m. and sets at 5h. 8m. from which (if we subtract 14m. the quantity by which the Sun is that day too slow,) we obtain 7h. 6m. and 4h. 54m. the apparent time.

The grand measurer of our days presses on; still presses on in his unwearied career, and whirls our weeks, and months, and years away. Another annual period of our frail short lives is completed; another of our fleeting years is joined with those that have long since gone down to oblivion: the silent lapse of time is ever carrying somewhat from us, till at length the period comes, when *all* must be swept away. The prospect of this termination of our labours and pursuits, is sufficient to mark our state with vanity. Within a very little space all our enterprise are bounded. We crowd it with toils and cares; with contention and strife. We project great designs, entertain high hopes; then leave our plans unfinished and sink into oblivion.

Agricultural societies have been found among the most efficient agents in promoting agriculture, and at the present day they are constantly increasing in number, activity and consequent usefulness. Agricultural Societies bring farmers into a beneficial acquaintance with each other—they stimulate inquiry, they invite discussion, they reward care and research, and at the meeting of these Societies, the bands of brotherhood, are materially strengthened. Are your Apples good? If not, this month is the time to make preparations for improving them. There is a most surprising negligence among farmers on the subject of fruit, which is the more inexcusable, now when the value of fruit, apples particularly, is so much better understood than it formerly was. It should never be forgotten that a tree that will yield fifty bushels and upwards of large, fair, and beautiful apples, occupies no more space than a tree producing half the quantity of sour, bitter, inferior apples, that even hogs, unless threatened with the horrors of starvation, will not touch. Grafting is the remedy for such fruit, and there is no one who may not now sufficiently understand the process, to perform all that may be necessary to furnish

an assortment of the best apples the year round. Let the farmer then look about him during this month, and procure such apple grafts, as will give an ample supply of all the most desirable kinds. The Farmer himself should procure his own grafts, label them properly, and then, when put in, he will be certain of the fruit he wishes. We then again ask the reader, are your apples good? and if not, urge upon him the importance of attending to the matter without delay, as every year's delay in grafting, renders another year's use of worthless fruit necessary. Finish threshing your grain, and have it stored beyond the reach of rat, mouse, or weevil. If the roots have not been assorted when housed for the winter, the best should now be selected for seed and use, and the remainder fed out to the stock previous to the growth of green food in the spring. If you expect hens to lay during the winter, they must have a warm room, and plenty of suitable food, and in addition a supply of gravel and old mortar, or lime, and water.

But little can be done in the fields at this season of the year—but the good farmer will find March anything but an idle month, he will find it perhaps the most critical month in the year for his cattle and sheep, and that additional care will be required as the season advances, termed by farmers, between hay and grass—instead of lessening the quantity of feed his animals receive, he will increase it, and bring to his aid the roots he may have on hand. Where the straw and hay fed out are very dry, sprinkling brine over them will cause the animals to eat such food more freely—the weak animals should receive particular care, as should also cows and ewes. Cattle must be closely looked after.

and not allowed to wander in the roads or fields, dragging themselves through the mud, and poaching on meadows, without any benefit to themselves. Keep them sheltered and dry, and if they get well through this month, they will be safe enough on pasture thereafter. Do not believe those who tell you that green wood makes the hottest fire, and is cheaper to burn than dry—a man that preaches such doctrine usually has a smoking fire, and a scolding wife; two evils of no little magnitude to a man who loves to stay within doors on rainy days. March is a good month for putting agricultural implements in order, and this is a point of the utmost importance—it is idle to expect good farming without tools capable of giving such a result; and when obtained they must be of the best kinds and kept in order and preserved, or certain loss will ensue.

In the spring of the year much benefit may be derived from what is termed waste water, that is, the water that flows over the surface without being absorbed—all such waters contain more or less vegetable and animal matter, which if allowed to subside, forms one of the most fertilizing materials. The wash of roads in the spring is peculiarly rich, and every precaution should be taken to secure the advantage they afford. It is almost a criminal negligence in the farmer to allow the waste of the roads, yards, &c., to be lost to the farm. One of the most essential operations of the farm is ploughing, and on most farms the greater part of this is performed for spring crops, as they are called. If this business is not done well, or if the soil is not in a proper condition

for ploughing, poor crops may be expected. If the meadow grounds are not naturally free from stones, one of the first things that require attention, after the frost has left the ground, and it has become settled, is carefully to pick up all stones that appear, and which if left will be in the way of the scythe or rake. Dairy cows demand particular attention this month, to keep them from falling away. Sowing grass seeds on winter grain is generally performed this month, and is perhaps as well as if done earlier. Trees may be transplanted in this month, with every prospect of success, where reasonable attention is paid to them. The Garden should be particularly attended to—as much frequently may be raised on an acre of ground, for the support of the family in a garden, as from the best five acres of the farm. The fences should be staked up thoroughly on every part of the farm, so as to prevent waste of time, and crops from the inroads of unruly cattle.

Root Culture presents many advantages to the stock farmer. Roots are less exhausting to the soil than grain; they are admirably fitted to form a part of a course of crops; are very beneficial for pulverizing the soil; afford abundance of food for farm stock; may be substituted for grain; and serve to augment and improve the valuable product of the cattle yard. An acre of ground under good culture, will produce, on a fair average, 20 tons of Swedish turnips, mangel wurtzel, carrots, parsnips, or potatoes. Supposing a lean animal to consume one bushel a day,

and a fattening animal two bushels, the produce of an acre will then subsist three lean bullocks 110 days, nearly the period of our winter, and three fattening ones 55 days. The great obstacles to the more rapid extension of the culture here, is, the want of experience, proper implements, as drill barrows, cultivators, &c. and the labour of securing the crop in winter. The apparent magnitude of these obstacles is daily diminishing, and we shall ere long discover, that root crops may be cultivated, and secured for winter use, as easily as other farm crops. The whole force of the farmer will be required this month; his manure, if any remain, must be all carted out. The best manure for the meadow is a well mixed compost. All the new barn yard manure should be scattered over the ground before ploughing, and ploughed in.

Farms that will not produce good wheat, may be made to produce good Rye, yet to render it profitable, it should not be made to follow in consecutive years, as it often is, in the same field, sown with wheat, in the proportion of one to thirty of seed, rye is affirmed to be beneficial to the product of the wheat, affording shade and shelter, and protecting the latter from mildew, much improving the sample of the grain, and upon light soils, often giving an increase of two bushels per acre in the product. Rye will not thrive upon a wet soil—its general treatment nearly resembles that of wheat. The seed is generally sown early in September, sometimes in August, and sometimes as late as

November, and requires more covering than wheat. When sown early, it is often depastured in Autumn, by calves, sheep, and even cows, without prejudicing the crop, and even to its advantage. It is often sown as a soiling crop, to be cut in spring and fed to stock. It cannot be denied by any one, that those pests of good farming, noxious weeds, have increased, and are increasing, at a most frightful rate in nearly every part of the country—insignificant in their appearance or results at first, the farmer treats them with contempt, but before he is aware, they have obtained a hold on the soil, and sets him at defiance. The only safe course with weeds is to meet them early in the field, and allow them no rest until the extirpation is complete. This is the most active month of the whole year for vegetation—it becomes the farmer therefore, to be stirring early, and watch attentively the whole circle of his fields—nothing should be neglected.

Diseases in the cattle, like those in man, are more easily prevented than cured. The best preventives are, a plenty of wholesome food, dry pastures in summer, dry and clean sheds, or stables, or well littered yards in winter, and an ounce of salt per diem to cattle and horses, and a quarter of an ounce to sheep. Salt augments the nourishment of the food eaten, improves the wool, and prevents disease. A great object is gained by bringing turnips forward as rapidly as possible after they have come up, as the principal danger of destruction or failure is before the rough leaf is put forth. In England bone dust is usually drilled.

in with the seed, to hasten the early growth; here bone dust is rare, but a mixture of soot and ashes, or ashes alone, is found to be a very good application, particularly for the common turnip, and may be sown upon them broad cast, or scattered over the rows by hand—it will hasten their growth, prove a partial protection against insects, and improve the size and goodness of the roots. The soil for turnips should be such as will grow Indian Corn, it should be rich and dry, and with these qualifications, the more that sand preponderates the better, clay is the worst, and wet soils do not answer much better. Finish hoeing out corn, potatoes, and all other crops, and make early preparation for harvesting. See that your tools are all in order, and a full supply of each—get the best you can procure—in particular, rakes and pitchforks, which you know wont break by fair usage.

in which *wealth is created*, as a ramble in the fields, among the ripening or growing crops, or a few hours ride through a well cultivated district, when the farmer is filling his barns with the fragrant hay, and the reaper his arms with the golden sheaves; when the light wind comes scented with the odour of millions of flowers from the meadows and pastures, and gently bows the heavy heads of the maturing grain, when the rich silken tassels begin to wave amid the deep green of the luxuriant corn, and when, in short, on every hand, are to be seen unsailing indications of plenty, and for the toil and labours of the husbandman an abundant reward. Grass ought never to be exposed to the dew while spread. A few days of sun and dew while thus exposed, renders it almost worthless. Hay may also be carried into the mow sooner, by using salt freely at the rate of 4 quarts to a ton.

If your hoed crops have been properly cultivated, they are now free from weeds; still, as it is a practice where thistles prevail, and one founded on correct principles, to plant and hoe such land, it may be well to look over the corn, potatoe, and other crops, and see that none of these weeds escape—a few hours work properly applied now, may save the labour of weeks hereafter. Where it is intended to sow wheat after corn, this crop should be cut up and removed from the ground as early as its maturity will admit—if the ground is well manured for the corn, as it always should be, and well cultivated, a crop of wheat may properly follow corn, and but little labour in ploughing is required.

Cattle and swine intended for fattening, should now have increased attention paid to them, although the fact is generally known, that animals will take on fat much faster in moderate, or warm weather, than they will in cold, uncomfortable weather, it does not seem to have influenced the course of farmers as much as it should—the same quantity of food will give a far greater amount of pork in September and October, than in November and December,—begin to feed them as early as your means will admit, and you will probably find your account in this method. Dealers in pork may not like to have their operations commence too early; but when meat is making for home consumption, this objection does not apply—indeed so important is the difference, that it would be judicious for every man to reserve grain enough from his last year's stock, to feed his swine, cattle, &c. till his new crops are in readiness.

Some of the most important labours of the year are to be performed this month, and though they relate more to the preservation than to the production of crops, inattention to any of the essential things, will detract much from the comfort, as well as the profit of the farmer. Good potatoes may be spoiled by carelessness in digging and preserving--a few hours exposure to the sun, turns the surface more or less green, and gives the root a bitter, unpleasant flavour. Be not over anxious about a little dirt on your potatoes when housed, if they are dry, and no root should ever be put in the cellar, or in a pit when wet, for a

covering of earth is one of the best methods of keeping potatoes fresh, and in good order, when in the cellar. Winter apples are to be gathered this month, and on the manner of performing it, much of their durability is depending—to keep well, apples should be ripe, not bitten by frost, and perfectly dry and clean when gathered—the temperature of the air where they are kept, should be low and the air dry. Prepare all your supernumerary stock for market; cul! out your choicest animals for breed and use, and sell and fat the remainder—be careful to avoid an over-stock for winter—one half the animals well kept, will yield more profit, than the whole half kept. Secure your winter squashes and pumpkins by placing them in a dry cool place, and you may have the luxury of good vegetable and pumpkin pies during the winter.

No great amount of out door work belongs to this month; what has not already been done, with few exceptions, must be left to another year; still there will be found many things to which the attention may be well directed, and deserving the notice of the husbandman. The cellar in particular, should be well looked to, and the most remote danger of freezing prevented, by suitable precaution. There are some men who never have any wood at their houses, except such as is drawn at a "drag" at a time from the wood lot, through the mud and dirt. Such men generally grind their axes on their neighbour's grindstone, and think him unreasonable if he does not furnish a mug of cider.

and a boy to turn--this mode of getting fire wood, they deem saving; but reader, be ye not one of this class of saving men. Shelter for animals is a point too often neglected by farmers, their sheep and cattle are left to find the warm side of a stack or a fence, during our winter storms of snow or rain as they best can; and and when the former die off by the dozen in March, or his cows are "on the lift" for a month or two in the Spring, the owner affects to wonder at the cause, or why his neighbour who has good sheds is not as unlucky as himself. Domestic animals must have a shelter; it is as necessary for them as it is for man, and one may as well talk of comfort without it as the other. Animals should be salted in the winter with the greatest attention and regularity--farmers are generally too careless about this in summer and generally neglect it altogether in winter. Before the ground is frozen look well to your fences.
