TO THE CLASS.

GENTLEMEN, — Although the custom of printing a separate Secretary's Report, at the end of Senior year, is of quite recent origin, Mr. Richardson, of '64, being the first to introduce the practice, the obvious advantages of this form of publication over those afforded by any college magazine or paper have led me to follow the example of the two preceding Secretaries. In the first place, the space allotted, in any college paper, to the Senior statistics is so small that many interesting particulars cannot be printed; besides, the paper in which such statistics appear is never published till a week or more after Class Day, when the greater part of the Senior Class, to whom the statistics are of the most value, are away from Cambridge; whilst a separate report, appearing at Commencement, can easily be distributed amongst the Seniors then present, and sent to the few who are absent, — forming, by its small, compact form, a record of the most important facts of the Class in College, more easy and more likely to be kept than a magazine or paper the last page or two of which is devoted to a few meagre statistics.

In preparing this report, I have endeavored to select those facts which could be obtained as accurate, rather than as mere conjectures, and those which it seemed to me would prove generally interesting. With this view, I have not published the number of smokers and drinkers, although the approximate number of each has been obtained, because it is hard to draw the line between those who do and do not drink or smoke, — some styling themselves smokers because they smoke their semi-annual cigar; whilst others, who smoke a score or more of cigarettes a day, place them-

selves on the list of non-smokers because they do not smoke cigars — except to oblige a friend. The perplexing question, whether he who on occasion takes a glass of claret punch can be called a drinker or not, has caused a division of opinion; some being found on both sides of the drinking-list who have been seen on opposite sides of the same bowl of claret. The statistics relating to prayers, deductions, absences, &c., have also been omitted, as both uninteresting and incorrect; for, at the end of Senior year, we look with more wonder than respect on that marvellous piece of clock-work which has not cut a single prayer during the four years: and we should judge, from the frequent speculations as to the chances of cutting without being marked, that, to say the least, there is a current belief that one can be absent without the knowledge of the professor. The engagements have been inserted, although only approximate, for the sole benefit of those who are to contend for the Class Cradle. As a general desires to get some idea, however indefinite, of the opposing forces, so they are probably longing to know how many opponents they are to meet in the matrimonial arena.

The Base Ball and Boating statistics, it is hoped, will be considered ample substitutes for those omitted. They may be relied on as accurate; and the Secretary wishes to return his thanks to Mr. Frank Wright for valuable assistance in preparing them. The Secretary regrets that the result of the matches with the Charter Oak and Lowell Clubs, and of the coming regatta at Worcester, will not be known till after this Report has gone to press.

A Report will be issued every three years by the Secretary; and, to enable him to do this, every one must give a full annual account of himself in writing to the Secretary, informing him of change of residence, marriage, birth of children, &c. By so doing, you will not only oblige the Secretary himself, but all your friends who may write to him about you. Do not neglect to do this. Also, if the Secretary writes to you for any Class information, do not delay your answer so long that he will begin to think of calling a meeting for “Resolutions on the death of A. B., Esq.” *Do not forget the Class Fund.*

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SECRETARY'S REPORT.

NUMBER IN THE CLASS.

THERE applied for admission at the July and August examinations 132 candidates, 36 of whom were admitted unconditionally, and 24 rejected: 4 who were admitted never joined the class; so that the number in the catalogue for Freshman year was 104.

During Freshman year, 4 were added from '65; and, at the end of the year, 6 had either left college, or fallen into a lower class. Sophomore year, 13 left and 18 were added; Junior, 7 left and 2 were added; Senior year, 1 left and 2 were added.

105 were examined for degrees Senior year.

Of those who have joined the class since the beginning of Freshman year, 6 came from '65, 1 from '64, 1 from '66 Yale, 1 from '66 Dartmouth, 1 from '64 Haverford College, 1 from the University of Virginia.

Of those that have left us, 2 were dropped, 2 left for their health, 7 to go into business, 2 to study medicine, 1 to West Point, 1 to Naval School, 1 with Agassiz to Brazil, 1 to teach, 1 for Kenyon College, 1 for Europe, and 1 for reason unknown.

Besides these, there has been the usual number of secret societies, to which between thirty and forty of the Class have, at different times, belonged.

The Pierians have played at five Junior exhibitions, and, with the Glee Club, given six concerts. The leadership of both the Glee Club and Pierian has been held by our Class for two years and a half.

At the beginning of Senior year, an alteration was made in the constitution of the Christian Union, and the name of the society was changed to the Liberal Fraternity.

We had our Sophomore-class supper, Nov. 24, 1863, at Taft's Hotel, Point Shirley. About sixty attended. At the Class elections, the usual officers were appointed for a Senior supper; but, at a special meeting held May 12, owing to the illness of the chronicler, and the disinclination of a large part of the Class to attend the supper, it was voted to do away with it,—for which action we have been severely criticised by all past classes.

The committee have contracted with Geo. K. Warren for the Class pictures. Ours have been the first pictures taken with the green lithograph border. About twenty-one thousand photographs have been ordered. Six hundred negatives of the Class, and one hundred of views, groups, and the Faculty, have been taken. The greatest number of sittings for any one individual was ten.

Contributions have been received by the Secretary for a Class Fund, payable in five annual instalments. The sum due this Commencement will be \$640. The whole amount subscribed is \$2,920, with several more to hear from.

The autobiographies have not been written as well as usual. Five have refused to write at all, and the style of several others is equalled only by their brevity. An elegant titlepage for the Class Book has been designed and executed by Mr. T. M. Clark.

MATRIMONIAL.

(To be read with caution by the young and susceptible.)

The number of those really, absolutely, irretrievably engaged is eleven. Besides these, there are eight who are only half engaged. Dividing by two, and adding, we have fifteen who are engaged. Per cent of Class engaged, 14.29.

Of the twenty-six not now in college, four are engaged. Per cent engaged of those not now in college, 15.38.

To quiet the fears of anxious parents, we are happy to state, that, of the fifteen new engagements which were to come out on Class Day, thirteen have been postponed for an indefinite period. Since entering college, no less than fifty-seven have at different times, and, for the most part, without the slightest reason, been reported engaged. One, who is not at present in the Class, is married. Two are determined to die bachelors; and the affections of one poor young man have been nipped in the bud. Of

the eighty-eight remaining unaccounted for, one considers himself too young to be engaged, one too handsome, four are too rich to settle for life, and sixty-four too poor. Four are waiting for proposals, whilst three cannot tell which of three or four to take. Two are going to trust to fortune. In one case *his* papa objected; in five cases *hers*.
