



BACK TO RUSSIA THROUGH GERMANY

Russians in France Will Not Return by Sea, Says Colonel

London, June 20.—H. Warner Allen, representative of the British press with the French army, in a dispatch refers to the Russians who landed at Marseilles and now are at Camp Mailly. The Russian troops, says Mr. Allen, have come to France by sea, but their way back home lies through Germany. Mr. Allen's article follows:

"I told my men;" said Colonel Notchvolodov, commanding the first regi-ment, who was kind enough to show me round his soldiers' quarters, "after our interminable voyage that it was possible to bring troops such an enor-mous distance to fight, but that for nothing in the world would I consent to their being taken back by sea. We are going to fight our way back to Russia by land. . . The men were de-lighted at the idea."
