

HOW TO ORDER. Send orders early. Remember that delays are always liable to occur on account of a rush of orders, bad weather, scarcity of help, and other causes. Write plainly your name, post office, county and state, and also give your shipping address if it is different from your post office address. State whether stock is to be shipped by mail, express or freight. All orders will be promptly acknowledged.

PRICES in this catalogue abrogate all previous quotations. The prices quoted are for the quantities specified, but six, fifty or five hundred of a variety will be supplied at dozen, hundred and thousand rates respectively, except where prices are given for fifty and five hundred. Hundred lots cannot be made up at hundred rates of less than fifty of a variety; and thousand lots cannot be made up at thousand rates of less than five hundred of a variety.

GUARANTEE. I warrant all stock to be true to name, with the explicit understanding that, should any prove otherwise, I will refund the money paid, or replace it with other stock, but I am not liable for damages beyond this. I do not guarantee the crop, as too many conditions enter into the successful growing of any crop.

CLAIMS, if any, must be made upon receipt of goods, when they will be carefully and cheerfully examined and, if just, all made satisfactory. Claims made after fifteen days from receipt of goods will not be entertained.

TERM'S OF PAYMENT. Invariably, cash in advance. Money may be sent by what-

ever method is most convenient.

C. O. D. ORDERS. No stock will be sent C. O. D.

PREPAID PRICES. As most people prefer to have stock shipped prepaid, so they will know what the total cost will be, I have quoted prepaid prices on nearly everything listed. At these prices, stock will be shipped prepaid to any part of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, District of Columbia, Delaware, Virginia, and West Virginia. Stock will be shipped at my option, by mail or express, whichever is least expensive, but when requested to do so, I will ship by mail 300 strawberry plants, 500 vegetable plants, 100 asparagus roots, 100 raspberry, blackberry or grape plants, 12 roses and similar lots of other stock of about the same sizes. Pot-grown strawberry plants, rhubarb roots, trees and some other things cannot be sent by mail. If through error an express shipment reaches you not prepaid, when you have ordered at prepaid prices, notify me at once, sending the express receipt and I will send you the amount you have to pay for express charges.

SHIPPING. All stock is shipped at purchasers' risk. It will be delivered without charge and in good condition at the express office or post office, but after that, it is beyond my control and my responsibility ceases. When ordering stock sent by

mail, I would advise customers to send fee for insurance of package.

SHIPPING POINTS. You will notice that stock is shipped from several different shipping points, and your order may be filled in more than one shipment. By ordering at the prepaid prices, all uncertainty as to transportation charges will be avoided, as you will have none to pay when the stock arrives. I advise you to order at the prepaid prices, for in many cases the amount I have added to cover transportation charges is much less than the actual cost will be.

PACKING. All shipments will be carefully packed and packages will be as light as is consistent with good packing. No charge will be made for boxing and packing.

YOUNG PLANTS. All strawberry plants are dug from new beds.

SUBSTITUTION. It is my custom, should the supply of any variety become exhausted (which will sometimes occur), to substitute a similar variety. When it is desired that I shall not do this it must be so stated in the order. To simply affix the words "No substitution" is all that is necessary.

LARGE ORDERS. Special prices will be quoted on large orders.
BERRY PLANTS IN MID-SUMMER AND FALL. Strawberry plants can be very successfully planted during August and the fall months, and large numbers of them are planted at that time by people who do not get them planted in the spring. Pot-grown plants are usually ready about August 1, and the new runner plants about August 20. Raspberries, blackberries, etc., should be planted later, about October 1. RHUBARB AND ASPARAGUS ROOTS. Please notice the large sizes of rhubarb and

asparagus roots listed. These roots will produce a crop this year. Rhubarb and asparagus roots can be planted at any time during the season. Both can be easily grown during the winter by forcing them in cellars and greenhouses.

GARDEN SUPPLIES. Should you need anything for your garden or farm, that is not listed in this catalogue, such as trees, plants, seeds, berry baskets, implements or other supplies, I can get them for you at market prices, and shall be pleased to quote you prices at any time.


Strawberry Culture

The ground should be prepared the same as for other crops, by plowing deeply and thoroughly pulverizing the surface. Almost any kind of fertilizer may be used, but stable manure and finely ground bone meal are among the best. The rows should be from three to four feet apart and the plants should be set from 12 to 18 inches apart in the row. Dip the plants in water before planting, and place them only as deeply in the soil as they stood before they were dug. Press the earth firmly about the roots. Cultivate and hoe them often and, the first season after planting, remove the blossoms as they appear. If possible, in late autumn, cover the strawberry bed with a mulch of salt-meadow hay, or stable manure to a depth of about two inches. If set in rows three feet apart with the plants one foot apart in the row, an acre will require 14,520 plants. If set in rows three and a half feet apart with plants fifteen inches apart in the row, an acre will require 9,963 plants.

It is best to plant early, medium and late varieties, so as to have a long fruiting season, and by planting some of the Everbearing varieties, you can have berries all during the summer and fall.

The blossoms of all strawberries are either hermaphrodite (perfect) or pistillate (imperfect). When planting varieties having imperfect blossoms, every fourth row should be planted with a perfect flowering variety. Varieties marked (Per.) have perfect blossoms and those marked (Imp.) have imperfect blossoms.

Fall Bearing or Everbearing Strawberry Plants

Everbearing strawberries are now extensively grown both for home use and for market. They bear fruit steadily from early June until December. To get a large crop during the latter part of summer and in the fall, the blossoms should be picked off until about July 1st. They have the very finest flavor and sell readily at from 25c to 40c per quart.

The best varieties are the Progressive and Superb.

PROGRESSIVE. (Per.) Medium size. A vigorous grower and very productive. They bear fruit the same season they are planted. From 100 to 150 ripe berries, green berries and blossoms are often found at a time on a single plant. It has a rich wild strawberry flavor.

SUPERB. Per.) Much like the Progressive, larger, but not so productive.

Pot-Grown Strawberry Plants

FOR SUMMER AND FALL PLANTING



These are large heavily rooted young plants and are shipped with earth on the roots, just as they grow in the pots. They will reach you in a good growing condition and can be safely transplanted at any time, even in the hottest and driest weather, without any serious check to their growth. They will produce a good crop of the largest and finest berries next summer. While the first cost of pot-grown plants is somewhat greater than that of ordinary or runner plants, the advantages to be gained by planting the pot-grown are so great and many, there can be no comparison in value between them for summer planting. I can supply pot-grown strawberry plants during the spring months and from about August 1st until the ground freezes.

Runner Strawberry Plants

For August and Fall Planting

These are strong, well-rooted young plants grown from beds planted this season. They will be properly rooted and ready for transplanting about August 20th or 25th unless the weather should be very dry. The earliest of these plants will be shipped from growing stations in Maryland and Delaware and are extra good ones, being larger and better rooted at this time of year than plants grown in this latitude. There is a rapidly increasing demand for strawberry plants in August and during the fall, and I usually sell more plants at that time than during the spring.





Asparagus Roots

Asparagus Culture. Asparagus is one of the most delicious and profitable crops grown, and its culture is very simple. Set plants from one to two feet apart in rows three feet apart. Plant five inches below surface. Cover with two inches of earth, filling in balance to a level later in summer. By planting three or four year old roots, a crop may be had a few weeks after planting. Asparagus may also be forced in the cellar during winter by planting large roots. Leaflet on "Growing Asparagus and Rhubarb in the Cellar during Winter" will be sent free to each customer buying roots.


