NEW DEAN APPOINTED FOR APPLIED SCIENCE SCHOOL AND CCCFD

Dr. Roy I. Satre, Jr., president of the Community College of the Finger Lakes (Canandaigua) since in founding in 1967, has accepted an appointment as dean of RIT's School of Applied Science and Center for Community College Faculty Development. Dr. Satre, a noted biologist and conservationist, taught biology at Geneseo State from 1950-64 and was dean of Niagara County Community College from 1964-67. He is a graduate of Carthage (Ill.) College, holds M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from Syracuse University, and is a major in the Air Force Reserves.

RIT INITIATES VETERANS ENROLLMENT CAMPAIGN

A major drive to enroll returning Vietnam servicemen and other veterans in programs for the 1971-72 academic year has been started by the Institute. President Miller said that the veterans would be given "top priority consideration" on space available basis for admissions in the fall. The recently initiated career decision program, designed for students who are not certain of their career field, is expected to play a big part in the recruitment drive, according to Dr. Miller. The RIT admissions office is handling the campaign, with cooperation and support from the public relations staff.

BAUSCH & LOMB EXECUTIVE JOINS COLLEGE OF BUSINESS FACULTY

Herbert J. Mossien, a Bausch & Lomb vice president and general manager of B&L's Scientific Instrument Division, has been named a professor of marketing on the fulltime faculty of the College of Business. Mossien is retiring after 32 years with Bausch & Lomb to take the position. He has taught evening courses at RIT for several years.

COMMITTEE NAMED TO SEEK REPLACEMENT FOR YOUNG

A six-member search committee has been named by RIT's provost, Dr. Todd Bullard, to make recommendations for a new dean of the College of Business. Assistant Professor Clifford Brown will chair the committee, which will consist of Assistant Dean Dale Gibson, Professor Francis Pallischeck, Associate Professor Raymond Bernhardt, and Mrs. Inge Pinckney (BA 3), all from the College of Business, and Dr. Derrald Livingston, director of the College of Continuing Education's Business Division. The deanship vacancy was created when Dr. Jerry D. Young resigned to take a similar position at the University of Alabama.

GASSER LIBRARY FUND ANNOUNCED AT RECEPTION

Prof. William D. Gasser, recent recipient of RIT's "Outstanding Teaching Award", was honored at a campus reception by over 400 of his friends and colleagues. At that reception, announcement was made of the establishment of the William D. Gasser Library Fund, a permanent endowment to be used to purchase books on business, with an emphasis on accounting, Gasser's field for over 30 years.

KUNTZ NAMED TO ALL-AMERICAN GOLF SQUAD

On the basis of his varsity career record and his performance in the NCAA College Division tournament, RIT's Jim Kuntz was named to the third team of the 18-man All-American golf squad. He is the first RIT golfer to be so honored. Of the 18 men named, six of each of three teams, Kuntz was the only representative of an Eastern school. He had a 35-4 career match play record and a 74.8 strokes-per-round average, and was the 1969 ECAC co-champion.
