AGREE TO CENSORSHIP CLAUSE

ESPIONAGE BILL WITH PRESS GAG INCLUDED EXPECTED TO PASS BOTH HOUSES TO-NIGHT

WASHINGTON, May 25.—The Gregory Espionage bill with the censorship clause was agreed to by the House and Senate to-day. This clause makes it a misdemeanor to publish the names or positions of military or naval forces of the United States or her allies. The enforcement of the censorship clause will not be left in the hands of any single person or board. It is to be simply an ordinary law. The bill is expected to pass both houses to-night.

LLOYD-GEORGE COMPLIMENTS U. S. PATROL

DECLARES TO HOUSE OF COMMONS SATISFACTORY PROGRESS IS BEING MADE AGAINST U-BOAT MENACE

LONDON, May 25.—"We have dealt more effective blows at the submarine menace in the past three weeks than in any other like period," Lloyd-George declared in the House of Commons to-day. He asserts, "We are making satisfactory progress," and paid eloquent tribute to the work of the American destroyers in the U-boat patrol. "If everybody economizes," he continued, "and all land is used to produce food, the submarines cannot defeat us."

NEED NOT REGISTER

MEMBERS OF ORGANIZATIONS SUBJECT TO CALL FOR MILITARY OR NAVAL DUTY EXEMPT

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Members of the National Guard or any military or naval organization not yet mustered into American service but subject to call, need not register for draft June 5, according to a reconsideration of the war department proclamation to-day.

ROME IS MAD WITH JOY

GREAT REJOICING OVER "MAGNIFICENT TRIUMPHS" ALONG ITALIAN FRONT, DESPITE AUSTRIAN REPORTS

ROME, May 25.—Despite Austrian official statements that claim Austria is maintaining her supremacy along the Italian front, Rome is delirious with joy to-day over the success of the "nation's greatest blow of the war." Gorizia and other victories of yesterday were hailed as "magnificent triumphs." Fighting was continued to-day along the Italian front and was marked by mass attacks and high casualties.

FRENCH GAIN AT CHEVREUX

GERMAN TRENCHES CAPTURED ARE FOUND FULL OF WOUNDED AND DYING TEUTON SOLDIERS

PARIS, May 25.—The French seized new positions in the region of Chevreux to-day. They found the enemy shelters demolished by French fire full of dead. Many prisoners were taken. Fighting lulls at other points.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—An exhaustive probe into the recent deaths and accident aboard an American ship due to defective ammunition, was demanded in the Senate to-day by Senator Frelinghuysen.

TRUSTEES' MEETING

REPORTS AND COMMUNICATIONS READ AND CONSIDERED AT WEEKLY MEETING

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale was held in the City Hall, Thursday evening, May 17, 1917. Present: J. S. Thompson, president of the board, and Trustees Chas. Grist, R. M. Jackson, F. L. Muhleman, G. B. Woodberry. Also present J. C. Sherer, City Clerk; W. E. Evans, City Attorney; H. B. Lynch, Manager Public Service Department; Edw. M. Lynch, City Engineer; G. H. Herald, City Marshal; A. H. Lankford, Fire Marshal. Absent, City Manager T. W. Watson.

The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved.

Communications were presented as follows:

From the City of San Diego extending to the City Trustees an invitation to be present in that city on June 23rd next in attendance at the Friendship Fiesta. On motion of Trustee Grist, the invitation was accepted and the Clerk was instructed to reply to the same, stating that the Board of Trustees hope to be present in response to the invitation on the date named.

From the Los Angeles County Council of Defense recommending that each city in the county make such arrangements as it deems advisable for the holding of patriotic public meetings on Registration Day, June 5th. On motion of Trustee Grist, the communication was ordered to be filed.

From the City Tax Collector, stating that the tax roll has been delivered to the trustees as required by ordinance, but requested that it be returned to his office to remain until after publication of the delinquent list and the issuance of certificates of sale; further requesting that the time for his filing of a final report upon the collection of taxes be extended until Thursday, June 21st next. On motion of Trustee Muhleman, the request was ordered to be granted.

From the City Engineer stating that owing to present unsettled conditions as the result of the existing state of war, the writer is of the opinion that but little new work in the way of public improvements will be initiated in the near future, and that as a consequence, only the routine work of the Engineer's office will be necessary; stating that he desires to absent himself from board meetings, except at such times as there are matters requiring his attendance, and proposing that the salary of his office be reduced to \$40.00 per month.

On motion of Trustee Woodberry, the communication was ordered to be filed and the proposition accepted, and that the appreciation by the Board of the Engineer's voluntary action be hereby publicly expressed.

From Winifred F. Marr making a demand that the City of Glendale furnish her a supply of the City of Glendale water immediately upon her property in Verdugo Canon. The communication stated further that the writer is able and willing to pay all the necessary expenses of bringing the water to the said lot. The offer being conditional on prompt service. On motion, the communication was ordered to be filed.

The City Marshal presented request of Lieutenant J. G. Foster for permission to use the fire house on Thursdays as a recruiting station for the Seventh Regiment. On motion of Trustee Grist, the request was granted.

Corporal Schenck appeared before the Board and made a statement in reference to the home-guards organization, to the effect that owing to the lack of any satisfactory law governing such organizations and to the ruling of the war department, it is impracticable to go ahead with any such organizing at the present time, and as far as he is concerned, no further action will be taken.

Report of the Public Service Department for month of April was presented and ordered to be filed.

The Manager of the Public Service Department reported that the large motor for the pumping plant had been shipped and would soon be in service. He requested the authority of the Board to sell two Mahoney Transformers for 60% of the original cost. On motion of Trustee Muhleman, he was authorized to make the sale, and the proper officials of the city instructed to sign the contract, which shall have the approval of the City Attorney.

A communication was received from the Librarian of the Public Library, accompanied by a budget covering the estimated expenses for the ensuing year, totaling approximately

HOME WEDDING

"Every cloud has a silver lining", and so the story goes; though the day was dark and dreary, sunshine reigned supreme in the home of Mr. and Mrs. T. S. Provolt, 608 N. Central Ave., Thursday afternoon of this week, when Mattie Belle and Norman N. Badger plighted their troth.

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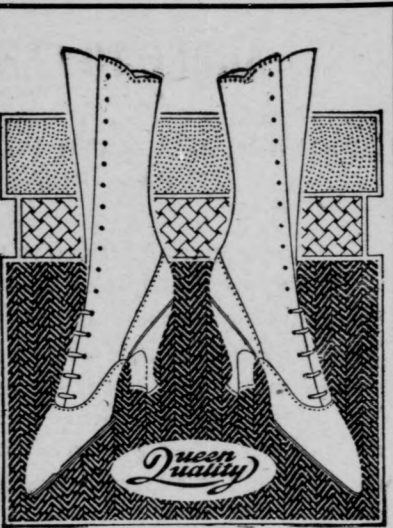

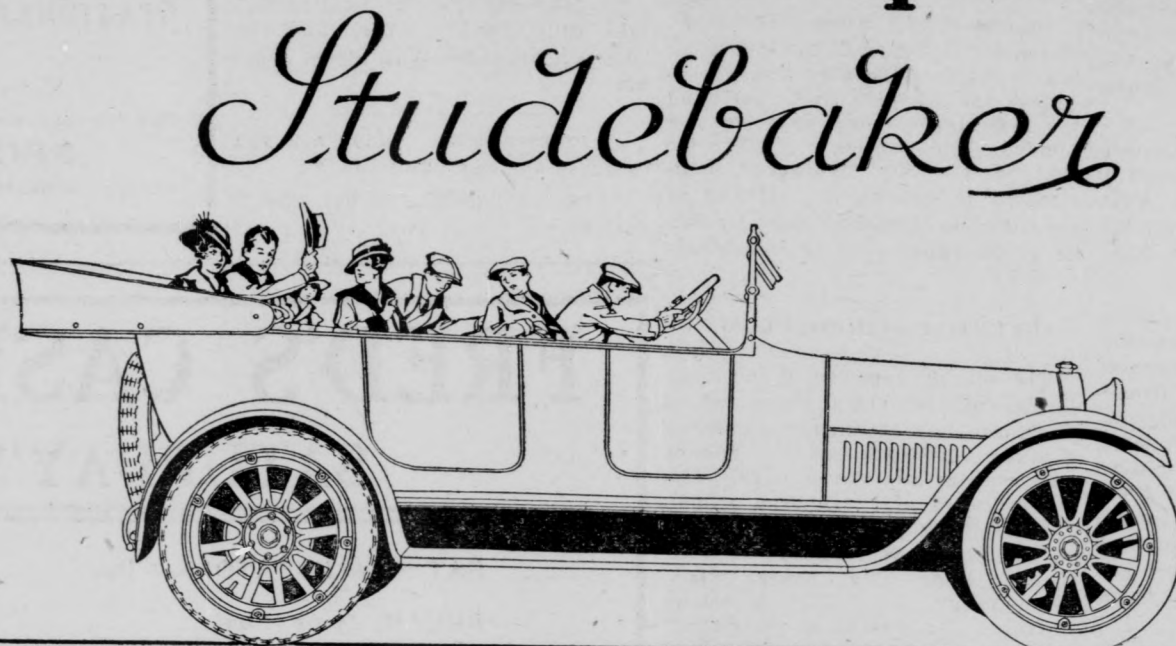
