Probably the most far-reaching proposa' concerns the income tax. The Secretary estimates that a 50 per cent increase in hoth individuals and corporations for 1916, collectable next June, would yield 165 milinon dollars additional. For 1917 he points out that to lower the income lax exemption from \$3,000 to \$1,500 For unmarried persons, from \$4,000 i to \$2,000 for married persons, to leave the normal tax at 2 per cent. but to raise the supertaxes materially would make the law produce 340 million dellars additional in June, 1918, without changing the gorporation tax. The highest rate on minortaxes under the plan outlined would be 40 per cent of all incornes over one million dollars.

Increases in the excess profit tax both by making the present law applicable to the calendar year of 1910 and applying increases next year, he thinks, would raise 226 million dollars this year and 200 million dotlars next year.
