HARDEST FIGHTING CANADIANS YET HAD

Winning Back of Positions on Ypres Salient Greatest Test

WOUNDED MEN ARE REACHING ENGLAND

The Experiences of Private GAINS WERE MADE Thomas Jones, of Moose Jaw

London, June 20.—A large number of wounded of the Canadian rank and file reached England to-day. Some of these men received their wounds as late as four days ago, when the Canadians, having regained the positions on the Types salient temporarily lost to the enemy, were consolidating them afresh.

The stories told by some who had been at the front since the first Canadian troops went to the battleline indicate that the Dominion's soldiers never had such an ordeal as during the past two weeks, either in the way of the remoraeless character of the Ger-man artiflery fire or of the terrific ex-perience of winning back the sector, perience of winning back the sector, on which high explosives had destroyed everything. KOLOMEA CAPTURED BY RUSSIAN TROOPS **KALEDINES ADVANCES**

Forces in Bukowina Have Moved On and Taken City in Galicia; Gen. Kaledines's Army Driving Toward Wladimir-Wolynski; Czar's Troops Captured 172,484 Up To Thursday Last

Petrograd, June 21.—Capture by the Russian armies of Kolomea in Galicia, and a smashing advance by the army of Gen. Kaledines toward Wladimir-Wolynski, on the Sokal line, both of which were announced by the war office to-day, indicate that a giant scissors motion is rapidly gaining impetus to wrest Lemberg again from the Teutons.

No details have been given out as yet as to how Kolomea fell, but tack was repulsed by the French ar- the capture of that city marks an important advance westward along the Pruth river and the Stanislau-Stryi railroad toward Lemberg, which practically isolates all the Austrian armies in Southern Bukowina from contact with the Teutonic forces to the north. London, June 21.—Confirmation of reports of the cutting in two of General Pflanzer's army in Bukowina are contained in a dispatch to the Star from Petrograd to-day. When the Austrians retired from Czernowits, the correspondent says, part of them retreating due south along the Roumanian border and others toward the Carpathians, their hope was to have time to hold the Russians on the fortified line running from Kuty to Sereth along the rivers Mikhodra and Sereth. 
