London, May 21.—Cable reports of a drop in prices in the United States are featured in newspapers here and are being read with great interest, as they excite the hope that conditions across the Atlantic may be reflected in Great Britain. Some writers on economics, however, hold out little hope that this will be the result, maintaining the new conditions in the United States are more likely to have a contrary effect here, but hope persists and is supported by some rather pointed indications that there was a decline in trading during April compared with March. This decline, although small, is regarded as significant because it was the first for more than a year.

## I FOREIGN POLICY WAS UNDER ATTACK

Opposition Members in British Commons Assailed the Government's Course

Lord Robert Cecil Pleaded World League Be Made Real

London, May 21.-Parliament adourned to-day for a Whitsuntide recess of ten days. The final meet-ing was notable for a vigorous attack on the Government's general foreign policy, led by Sir Donald Maclean. This attack was the out come of the belief among the Oppo-sition parties that there is a disposition to belittle the League of Na-tions and elect the Supreme Council into a permanent body as arbiter of European affairs.

Speaker Intervened.

An interesting incident, was the intervention of the Speaker to prevent the debate from developing into an attack on the policies of foreign countries. The Speaker described himself as being appalled at the contention of Sir Donald Maclean and Lord Robert Cecil that the House of Commons was entitled to discuss the policies of the nations who are parties to the League of Nations. He warned the House that if it desired to preserve friendships abroad it was advisable to discuss the motives of foreign Governments as little as possible.

Poland Was Cause.

London, May 21.—(Canadian Associated Press)—In the House of Commons last night, the Polish debate produced a most noteworthy intervention by the Speaker, who declared that the Commons had noright to discuss the Government of Poland or of any other country except its own. He said:

"The position appalls me and, far from leading to friendly feelings between us and other signatories to the League of Nations, it seems to me that it will lead to great danger of animosity.

## TAXES CREATING PROBLEMS DAILY

Needed to Straighten Out Difficulties in Canada

Ottawa, May 21. — (Canadian Press).—New problems are daily arising in the administration of the new luxury taxes.

An important point raised is that advanced by a Canadian manufacturer. Before the budget, he had contracted to fill a large order for goods now subject to an additional excise duty of ten per cent. The selling price of the goods is determined in the contract. The budget resolutions provide that in this case, the excise duty is payable by the manufacturer. Point Grey, B. C., May 21.—Samples of ore taken from mining claims recently staked in Point Grey by James Adair, a veteran prospector of Australia, show values in gold exceeding \$1,000 a ton, according to an assayers' report. Adair has three claims in this district, the Lucky Strike, Lion and Mascot, all showing silver, copper and iron and aluminum.

When he proceeded to record his claims he encountered difficulties. The Provincial Government has not officially recognized his mineral rights. He has announced his intention to press for acknowledgment, which he contends is due him under provisions of the Mineral Act.

## **ROBBERIES RAPIDLY INCREASE IN BERLIN**

Britisher Back in London Describes Growing Wave of Crime

London, May 21.—A traveler who has returned here after a visit of some duration in Germany states in these disturbed days, when the "revolution profiteer"—the successor of the war profiteer—flaunts his newly-acquired wealth in the face of an impoverished populace, robberies and burglaries in Berlin are increasing at an abnormal pace. Street signs are full of announcements offering rewards for the return of stolen goods, and in one of the main business streets of Berlin he saw this notice displayed in a fancy goods store window:
"Gentlemen burglars are requested not to break open the shop front nor tamper with the locks. There is nothing to steal here. All property is removed from the shop windows at night."

There have been scores of hold-ups.

There have been scores of hold-ups, and the other day a man was stripped of his clothes, shoes and hat and left on the side walk in his underclothes.

It is not safe for hotel guests to leave any portable property of any description in their rooms. Articles of clothing have a way of vanishing into thin air, and hotel proprietors decline all responsibility. Police statistics indicate that the number of hotel robberies has trebled within the last five years.

Instices indicate that the indirect of hotel robberies has trebled within the last five years.

To leave typewriters unpadlocked is sheer cuipable negligence on the part of the owner. The Berlin criminal police force has been obliged to organize a special department dealing exclusively with stolen machines. Cases of housebreaking have quadrupled within the last three years. Articles of clothing, bedolothes, carpets and curtains are the objects most desired by the thieving fraternity. Dishonesty among factory hands has grown to a deplorable extent, the police say. Leather belting disappears wholesale; it is cut up and sold to shoe repairers.

## **MESOPOTAMIA WILL** PRODUCE COTTON

Investigator; Sudan Also a Good Field

Oldham. Eng.. May 21.—The British Cotton Growing Association has received a report from an investigator to the effect that Mesopotamia is likely to produce a large amount of cotton in the next few years. This cpinion is expressed by B. Crapper. vice-president of the Oldham Chamber of Commerce, who went to the East to investigate the possibilities of increasing cotton growing in Mesopotamia, Egypt and the Sudan.

Mr. Crapper has told the British Cotton Growing Association that Mesopotamia possesses soil and climatic to grow excellent cotton, but that its productions is limited by its small population of 3,000,000 persons, lack of irrigation and transport facilities and the need of instruction in scientific methods of production.



Estimates Exact Cost.

Mr. Sloan estimates that one ton of pig iron could be produced in this Province, by means of the blast furnace, at about \$33, as follows: Two tons of ore at \$4.50, \$9; one and a half tons of coke at \$10, \$15; three-quarters ton of limestone at \$4, \$3; and labor and overhead costs, \$6. He points out that the last Eastern quations place Bessemer at \$42.50; basic, \$43; and foundry at \$43 and \$45. With freight rates running from \$14.80 a ton to \$16.60 a ton from Eastern Canadian and United States centres, and with other added costs because of the distance of the Pacific Northwest from the places of production, consumers in this part of the world have to pay very high production, consumers in this part of the world have to pay very high prices. The purchasing agent of Yarrows, Ltd. Esquimalt, recently stated that they paid \$75 a ton for their last shipment of pig.

Market Awaits Products.

Mr. Sloan on the question of the local market, stated that, from information secured from various sources, he was confident that the output of, say, a 300-ton blast furnace, could be absorbed in the Canadian and American West. He drew attention to the changed conditions as to costs as indicated, to the fact that the sole source of all the pig iron now used in the West was the Eastern manufacturers, and to the indications patent to anyone giving the matter thought and in touch with the situation that the requirements of the territory that a local industry would be in a position to supply are constantly growing.

All things considered, he had no hesitation in saying that the present offered a better opportunity than any previous period for the investment necessary for the establishment of a permanent iron and steel industry in British Columbia—an industry that would not alone develop the iron ore resources of the Province, not only tend to the utilization of some of the valuable water powers of the country, but would become the foundation for general industrial expansion that would be reflected in increased prosperity throughout the Northwest.

## **CIVIL SERVANTS** EYE TRADE UNIONS

Association Faces Crucial Issue With Split in Ranks

Already affiliated with the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, the advisability of completing the cojoining the local Trades and Labor thrashed out at the next meeting of the Provincial Civil Service Associ

The point at issue came up for discussion at a meeting of that body tast night held in the rooms of the Comrades of the Great War, but after preliminary discussion the mat-ter was deferred until the next meeting. Provincial President Mc-Kenzie gave notice of motion to the effect that the Civil Servants do affiliate with the local Trades and Labor Council.

With some 400 members in the Association, the issue promises to be warmly discussed.

He stated that the American Civil Service Association, comprising some 60,000 members, were affiliated with the American Federation of Labor with excellent results and without loss of prestige.

What deterred many, he stated, was the thought of strikes, but he desired to assure the assembly that no strike could possibly be affected against the wishes of the majority of the Association itself. Through the efforts of Messrs. Matson and Pilmer, the committee on gardeners wages, it was announced that that bedy was now receiving \$4.00 a day instead of \$3.76 as formerly.

Amendments to constitution and election of delegates occupied the remainder of the time. It was decided that meetings of the Association should be held on the first Monday in severy month instead of quarterly as heretofore. Fifteen will be a quorum at a regular meeting, while the quota for any other meeting is to be thirty members. The executive is to meet fortnightly.

It was decided that in the case of members of the civil service who had been members of the association and had dropped out, upon wishing reinstatement should have to pay all back dues for the period under consideration, with, however, the covering clause that these dues could be remitted all or in part by action of a general meeting, on the recommendation of the executive. A similar clause to have effect with new members more than six months in the employ of the Government did not carry last night, but will be taken up at the next annual meeting, notice of motion being thus given.

On committees and delegations, Messrs, Loveland and Edwards were appointed to permanent positions on the executive council, while Mr. Loveland will fill the vacancy on the Provincial executive. Three delegates to the Provincial convention were elected as follows: Messrs. Arthur Manson, A. B. McNeil, and French, with Messrs. Hurst, Bridge, and Mrs. Finlayson as alternates in the order named.

"Your expressed desire is equivalent to expressing a desire for the abolition of the office. No solicitor would act for the Union on a retainer such as Victoria proposes—\$500 per year—\$40 per month, and do no other municipal business, unless the office was made attractive in other ways.

"Who would benefit by the Union not being represented? The large corporations in the main. Just now the B. C. Telephone 'Company is chafing over the Union's action in forcing legislation at Ottawa placing them under the jurisdiction of the Railway Board, and they can get no rates approved until the Union has been notified and heard. The C. P. R. is objecting strenuously against the Union's successful fight last year to raise their taxation. The B. C: Electric blames me and the Union as being the cause of raising their taxation \$75,000 per year."

Disregarding the social symmetry of these surroundings, with the coming on of Winter Mr. Camsell engaged as a mail carrier on the Stikine river between Wrangell and Telegraph Creek, driving a dog team throughout the Winter of 1898-95. In the Summer of 1898 he again crossed the mountains to the Mackenzie river this time by canoe, and met experiences in traversing the Grand Canon of the Liard from which few others would have emerged to tell the tale.

After spending the following Winter in trapping fure at Fort Wrigley, he joined a Geological Survey party under Dr. J. M. Bell in the Spring. ## DISCUSS POULTRY AND SMALL STOCK

Rabbits and Chickens Subjects of Combined Saanich Meeting

In the Temperance Hall, Keating In the Temperance Hall, Keating, last night, before the combined memmership of the South Saanich Women's Institute, and the South Saanich Farmers' Institute, J. R. Terry, Provincial Government Chief. Poultry Inspector, and Mrs. E. Cheetham, president of the Victoria. Rahhlt Breeders' Association, deliv-Rabbit Breeders' Association, deliv-ered instructive addresses. Chicken Mortality.

Chicken Mortality.

Mr. Terry covered the raising of poultry chiefly from the housing angle, and in his address advocated a higher temperature for brooders and nicken houses than what was apt to chicken houses than what was apt to prevail. He described much of the mortality amongst little chicks as due to the cold and severity of the season. The effect of blasting upon incubation was another point in the speaker's address, who stated that the greatest percentage of deaths due to this cause was in the first few days of incubation. A "closed season for blasting" is now being advocated. Mr. Terry stated that, unless well experienced, nobody should launch out very heavily into the poultry business at the present time, with the price of feed and other necessities so high.

Popularizing Rabbit Meat.

Mrs. E. Cheetham in an interesting address on rabbits, spoke on the difficulty of inducing people other than old Country people to eat rabbit meat. The difficulty could be overcome, she stated, by the addition of bay leaves to the pile. Mrs. Cheetham objects to the appellation "pet stock," as applied to rabbits, which she claimed were severely practical from an economic standpoint.

The speaker advocated Flemish Glants, Belgian Hares, and New Zealand Reds as the three breeds most adapted to this climate. Both speakers were received with close attention and accorded a hearty vote of thanks.
