SHEKINAH

A perfectly formed shell pink semi-cactus. The beautiful blooms are carried on long, strong stems. The blooms average 10 inches in diameter and have great depth. First prize as seedling. First prize as "The Best Individual Bloom in the Show" at the 1935 Dahlia Society of California Show. Plants only \$12.50.

ROYAL PURCHASE

An incurved cactus that attains immense size. The bloom is full and deep and grows high out of the bush on long, straight stems. The color is a deep straw yellow with outer petals suffused with pink. The bush is four to five feet high, an early bloomer, is clean growing and resists insects. Shown three times and won three first prizes. Roots \$15.00; Plants \$7.50.

SALEM STREAMLINE

An informal decorative that has about everything a good dahlia should have. Many of the blooms, with good culture, will measure a foot across. It is a beautiful old rose suffused with carmine rose. It has substance, and long, straight stems, while in form it is very artistic. Roots \$15.00; Plants \$7.50.

RUDOLPH'S GIANT

It is an informal decorative, the color is a bright buff apricot. One of the biggest and best in the autumn shade. The bush is not a tall grower. The flower in addition to having width has depth and the centers are tight and compact on long, stiff stems. Received a certificate at Storrs. Plants only \$7.50.

MILTON J. CROSS

An informal decorative. Beautiful color of Apricot Peach with a bright golden face. The large blooms are held well above the foliage by long, strong stems. Winner of 5 medals, including 3 American Home Achievement Medals. Plants only \$7.50.

QUEEN CITY

A formal decorative. A distinctive pink, a shade halfway between cherry red and old rose. A good cut flower as well as an exhibition flower. Medium size. Plants only \$7.50.

PRIDE OF AMERICA

A semi-cactus on a long, straight, stiff stem; blooms 11x10 inches. A primrose yellow tinted pink on reverse of petals. Plants only \$7.50.

CALIFORNIA PEACH

A semi-cactus. A clear coral pink Satan. Best flower and also winner of achievement medal in 1935 show at Boston. Plants only \$7.50.

MARGRACE

An informal decorative. A brilliant scarlet, tipped and stripped with gold. On the leading Honor Rolls. Won certificate of merit at both Storrs and East Lansing. Plants only \$5.00.

JERSEY'S WHITE BEAUTY

A formal decorative of a clear glistening white. The habits of the plant and the size of the blooms are like Jersey's Beauty. Plants only \$5.00.

BONNIE BELMONT

A bright yellow semi-cactus on a long, stiff stem. Plants \$5.00.

EXPLANATION OF TYPES

According to the American Dahlia Society Classification

Informal Decorative (I. D.)—Double flowers, full to the center, usually with long, twisted petals, and often irregular in arrangement.

Formal Decorative (F. D.)—Double flowers, full to the center, usually with broad, flat petals, often rounded at the tips, and regular in arrangement.

Cactus (C.)—Double flowers, full to the center, with long, narrow, pointed petals, incurved, recurved or straight, but rolled more than half their length.

Semi-Cactus (S. C.)—Double flowers, full to the center, with coarse twisted petals, usually somewhat incurved, and rolled ordinarily less than half their length.

Miniatures (M.)—All Dahlias which normally produce flowers that do not exceed three and one-half inches in diameter, pom poms excluded, which might be any of the other types, such as M. I. D., etc.

Pompoms—Having the same characteristics as Ball Dahlias, but for show purposes, not more than two inches in diameter.

Single (S)—Open centered flowers, with only one row of ray florets with the margins flat or nearly so, regardless of number of florets.

Collarette (Coll)—Open centered flowers, with only one row of ray florets, with the addition of one or more rows of petaloids, usually of a different color, forming a collar around the disc.

Balls (B)—Fully double flowers, ball shaped or slightly flattened, floral rays in spiral arrangement, blunt or rounded at tips and quilled or with markedly involute margins, the flowers more than three and a half inches across.

OUTSTANDING MUMS FOR 1936

Double Korean Chrysanthemums

ROMANY

The dominant color is between carmine and opal red. The blooms are full, double, perfect in form. $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches across, and carried freely on wiry, branching stems. Height $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet October 5.

INDIAN SUMMER

Vivid, glowing orange. Large flower, 3 inches across, many petaled, somewhat shaggy, but attractive and distinct in form. More frost resistant in the flower than any double kind that we know. Height 2 to $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet October 15.

APHRODITE

An ivory white with a touch of pale pink. Flowers are 3 to $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches across. A single plant will make a gorgeous background in the average rockery. Height 2 feet, spread 3 feet. October 5.

VENUS

Lilac pink with rose lavender shading. The flower is single, $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches across with three or four rows of petals. Flowers in late September. Height $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet.

SATURN

Brilliant sparkling orange and bronze. Flowers almost 3 inches across and are produced in large, graceful sprays. Height $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet October 5.

JUDITH ANDERSON

Flowers are small, about $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches across, well rounded in form, clear buttercup-yellow. Fine for northern areas. Height $1\frac{1}{2}$ feet. Spread 2 to $2\frac{1}{2}$ ".
