



That we have observed with profound grief the erroneous and injurious aspersions on the character of the inhabitants of this Province generally, contained in the "Report on the affairs in British North America, from the Earl of Duratas, Her Majesty's Uniform Commons to be printed on the 11th of February, 1830," and more particularly, those parts of the said Report which represent the inhabitants spring from different national origins, as animated by the unchristian spirit of irreconcilable hatred to each other, and irretrievable cumity to Ker Majesty's Covernment, even to the extent of a traitorous co-operation with Your Majesty's enemies In any future attempts to invade this Pravince. Imputations so unfounded, laid before Your Majesty and the British Parliament and nation, are utterly unaccountable to loyal subjects and honourable men in this Province, and are in no ways justified by the misfortunes which have resulted from dissensions similar to those which have prevailed in almost every country, including the Home Dominions of the Crown, and most of its colonial possessions.

That we are fully persuaded, that the experience of the past will serve as a beacon to warn all parties of past errors, and that the Representative Assembly of Lower Canada will study to promote harmony amongst the different branches of the Legislature

That we are fully persuaded, that the experience of the past will serve as a beacon to warn all parties of past errors, and that the Representative Assembly of Lower Canada will study to promote harmony amongst the different branches of the Legislature and all classes of the people, make adequate provision for the support of Government and the Administration of Justice on the principles of the British Constitution, provide for any improvements which time and circumstances may have rendered necessary to afford a fair and equitable representation to all classes of the inhabitants, and in every part of the Province; for the application of any duties which the Imperial Parliament may think proper to impose on goods entering the St. Lawrence, to facilitate the opening of a Ship Navigation from the sea to the great lakes, and for the improvement of the Laws of the Province and the general advancement of its prosperity.

That the terms on which it has been proposed in the message before mentioned, to effect the said re-union, whereby a section of the country of only about half the population and wealth of the Province to which it is to be united, is to have one-half of the Representation, and thereby possess the power of taxing the great majority or the inhabitants without their consent, and applying the proceeds to a sectional portion of the Province, while a large debt contracted and spent for the improvement of Upper Canada, is to be imposed on the inhabitants of Lower Canada, alord sufficient evidence of the erroneous information and unconstitutional designs which have presided at the formation of the said plan, and are a sure indication of the evils which must inevently result from the sanction thereof by the Imperial Parliament. inevitably result from the sauction thereof by the Imperial Parliament.
Your Najesty's Petitioners most humbly gray and the Constitution established by the said That the Constitution established by the said Act, 31st Geo. III. chap. 31, be maintained, and no alteration thereof be

effected without the iohabitants of this Province having had an opportunity of being heard on any Bill to be introduced into Parliament for that purpose.

AT a MEETING of the COMMITTEE of PETITIONERS against the RE-UNION of the Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada, and for the restoration of the Constitution of this Province, as established by the Ac of the British Parliament, 31st Geo. III. cap, 31, held at the house of the Ionble. R. E. Caron, Esquire, in the City of Quebec, the 14th April, 1840.

Resolved, I.—That the Chairman transmit by a special Messenger, the Petitions of the Districts of Quebec and Three Rivers, to Her Majesty, to be delivered to Her Majesty' Principal Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, to be laid at the foot of the Throne.

- 2.—That he do also, transmit the Petitions to the House of Lords and the House of Commons, to Members of those Houses respectively, to be presented.
- 3.—That the said Messenger be furnished with the Letter of T. W. C. MURDOCH, Esquire, Chief Secretary to His Excellency the Governor General, acknowledging the recept of a certified Copy of the Petition to Her Majesty, presented to His Excellency on the part of this Committee.
- 3.—That the said Messenger be furnished with printed Copies of said Petitions, with a statement of the signatures and certified marks of the Petitioners in the different localities, distinguishing, in so far as is practicable, names of Proprietors and non-proprietors—and those of English and French origin: That he be also, furnished with Copies of the Journals of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Lower Canada from 1834 to 1837, both inclusive—the Journals of the Special Council of Lower Canada, and the Ordinances passed therein—the Journals of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Upper Canada, during the Session of 1837, 1838, 1839 and 1840—Copies of such other documents as may be deemed necessary for the information of the Members of the Lords and Commons, charged with said Petitions; and more particularly the Reports of the Committee of the House of Commons on the Civil Government of Lower Canada, in 1828, and 1834,—the Reports of the Royal Commissioners of 1836—the Report of the Earl of Dunham, and other papers laid before Parliament, relating to Canada.
- 4.—That The Chairman be requested to accompany the Petitions and Documents with Letters to the Members of Parliament to be intrusted with the presenting of the said Petitions.
- 5.—That the said Messenger be authorised to wait upon the Montreal Committee, and take charge of such of the Petitions of that District as may then be in readiness, with such Papers and Documents as may be intrusted to him by the said Committee.
