TREATY BETWEEN TURKY AND RUSSIA.
The knowledge of the treaty between Russia and the treat at last become public. The following is an extensive of it. It is dued the 9th of July; being, according to the Turkish chromology, the 2th day of the moon, and consists of the preamble, 6 articles, and a conclust a, sungned by the Serastier Achmet Pacha, on the part the part of Russia. The third article specifies, that in conformity to the principles hald down as the basis of the treaty and on the consideration of this reciprocal defence, Russia being desirous of maintaining the independence and complete preservation of the Ottoman Empire, he Impered Majesty engages to afford to the Porte all those auxiliary forces both of seand land, which circums ances may oblige Turkey to require; and in case such emergency should rise, his Sublim Majesty is to decide on the number of forces both by set and land which he may desire. The fourth article privides, that of the two Powers, that which demands suc aid from the other shall have solely to provide provisions fo those auxiliary forces. The fifth article allows that, al acting upon this treaty for a long time, yet, if circumstances should arise to require any alteration of the provision contained therein, the term of eight years is defined to the pu pose, to commence from the step of the ratifications but if circumstances abould demand an intermediate re vision, the parties agree to trent thereupen.
