THE RIGHT HONOURABLE THE LORD MAYOR.

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PREFATORY NOTICE.

THE greater portion of this collection was brought together at the request of the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland, and was intended to form part of the Irish section of the St. Louis Exhibition. For various reasons the scheme had to be abandoned, and the pictures would have been dispersed in the ordinary course without being exhibited, but the Corporation of London, on being approached, generously placed their Galleries at the Guildhall at the service of Irish Art, thus enabling the London public to have an advantage which has been denied to the visitors at St. Louis, and at the same time admitting of the collection being considerably augmented by the introduction of certain important examples which would not have been permitted by their owners to go so far as St. Louis.

We know by the fragments left to us that the Irish of early times had carried the arts of illumination, design, architecture, and metal-work farther than any other nation of Western Europe. These arts were moving towards their perfect form when (in the twelfth century) the Anglo-Norman invasion laid its forbidding hand on the crafts that needed wealth and a settled life. The last of the beautiful purely Irish churches, and the last great piece of metal-work, the shrine of S. Manchan, had been finished within two or three years of the landing of the Normans at Wexford. Within a century all these beautiful arts had withered away.

The development of a great and ancient tradition having thus been stopped, metal painting did not develop as it would naturally have done, from illumination or design, but grew up as an offshoot of the schools of other nations.

There are so many painters of Irish birth or Irish blood in the first rank at this moment, that extreme interest is being taken in this bringing together of sufficient specimens of their work to enable students of art to discover what common or race quantities appear through it. There is something of common race instinct in the work of all original Irish writers of to-day, and it can hardly be absent in the sister art.

We have in the Dublin National Gallery a collection of the works of the old Masters which it would be hard to match in the United Kingdom outside London. But there is not in Ireland one single accessible collection or master-piece of modern or contemporary art.

Until recently art in Dublin has been systematically ignored by officialdom, and the encouragement to the production of modern painting has been confined to a grant of £300 per year to the Royal Hibernian Academy (which was founded in 1826) for the upkeep of its schools and its annual exhibitions. This sum is far less than that given to the Royal Scottish Academy for similar purposes.

A gallery of Irish and modern art in Dublin would create a standard of taste, and a feeling of the relative importance of painters. This would encourage the purchase of pictures, for people will not purchase where they do not know.

Such a gallery would be as necessary to the student if we are to have a distinct school of painting in Ireland, for it is one's contemporaries that teach one the most. They are busy with the same problems of expression as oneself, for almost every artist expresses the soul of his own age.

I think anyone who looks at the collection at the Guildhall will admit that we have artistic capacity, and that with the same opportunities, not only of other European countries, but of such cities as Glasgow, Liverpool, and Manchester, we should develop a beautiful and original artistic expression.

I feel that even if our students are expected to work without ever seeing or being stimulated by the sight of a Corot, a Watts, a Whistler, or a Sargent, yet to allow the pictures of men who belong to us by birth or blood to be hung everywhere but in Ireland, is an injustice that we must do away with.

I and my friends look forward to having in Dublin, sooner or later, a gallery where such works, and, if possible, the works of all great contemporaries may be hung. We have had promises of a picture from many of the painters exhibiting at the Guildhall. The finding of a site and of a building in Dublin should be the lesser part of our task.

* * *

On February 4th, 1903, the President of the Royal Hibernian Academy, and a Committee of artists, formed a deputation to the Lord Mayor and Corporation of Dublin. The Lord Mayor, in reply to their address, said that the subject of forming such a collection in Dublin had long engaged their earnest attention, but that there were difficulties in the way of their providing funds, but that the project had their entire sympathy, and that they would join a committee, or deputation, to the Chief Secretary, or Lord Lieutenant, praying them to help form such an institution.

On July 1st of the same year a Select Committee of the House of Commons was appointed with the Hon. Arthur Elliot in the chair, to consider the proposal that a portion of the site appointed for the College of Science (right in the centre of the City and in the midst of the other educational buildings) should be allocated to a new Royal Hibernian Academy building, and to the founding of a collection of modern pictures.

Sir Thomas Drew and myself were called as special witnesses, and I was able to state that many of the greatest living artists (amongst them Whistler, who was then living) were interested in the scheme to the extent of promising to present a representative example of their work to form the nucleus of such collection. Also several famous collectors had promised pictures and some sums of money on the condition that a site was granted. The chairman in summing up the evidence said that the desirability of such an institution had been clearly shown, but that without excluding some of the Public Offices no room could be found on this spot. He, however, encouraged the idea of any new proposal.

ARIDANE was a daughter of Minos and Pasiphaë. When Theseus was sent by his father to convey the tribute of the Athenians to Minotaurus, Ariadne, in her love for him, provided him with the thread (which she herself had received from Hephaestus) to enable him to find his way out of the Labyrinth. Theseus in return promised to wed her, and she accordingly left Crete with him, and they arrived together at the island of Naxos, in the Ægean Sea. Here, as tradition states, Theseus forsook her, and she was left in loneliness in Naxos.

The ancient writers give different accounts of the ultimate fate of Ariadne. The prettiest legend makes her the bride of Dionysus, and he is

so enamoured of her beauty that he flings the crown he has given her to the sky, where it remains as a brilliant constellation in her honour.

Sudden the gems are turned to fire; and fixed





JOHN O'LEARY was the editor of "The Irish People," the organ of the Fenian Brotherhood, and was one of the committee of three which governed the Brotherhood, in association with James Stephens. He was condemned to twenty years' penal servitude, but released after five years on a promise not to return to Ireland until twenty years had elapsed. Since his return he has taken part in almost every Irish intellectual movement. The influence of his character and intellectual courage has been among the most powerful factors in shaping the new Ireland which is growing up. Many of the leaders of the literary movement in Ireland to-day met one another for the first time under his roof.

"In the year 1265, a Guelph noble of the upper vale of Arno, named Buondelmonte, who had been made citizen of Florence, demanded in marriage a

young person of the Ghibeline house of Amidri, and was accepted. While the nuptials were in preparation, a noble lady, of the family Donati, stopped Buondelmonte as he passed her door, and bringing him into the room where her women were at work, raised the veil of her daughter. 'Here,' said she, 'is the wife I had reserved for thee. Like thee, she is Guelph; whilst thou takest one from the enemies of thy church and race.' Buondelmonte, dazzled and enamoured, accepted the proffered hand."—Sismondi.

ALFRED ELMORE was born at Clonakilty, in the County of Cork, on the day of the battle of Waterloo, June 18th, 1815. His father, an army surgeon, removed to London when his son was twelve years old, and young Elmore began his career by drawing from the antique in the British Museum. In 1832 he entered the schools of the Royal Academy, and exhibited there in 1834. Afterwards he visited many of the foreign capitals, and spent two years in Rome. He returned in 1844, and in the following year he became an Associate of the Academy. He died in 1881.

CURRAN, the famous orator, was born near Cork in 1750, and studied at one of the Inns of Court, London. He rose to eminence at the Irish Bar, and entered the Irish House of Commons in 1784. He was famous for his eloquent defence of many Irish patriots, and was an opposer of the union with England. He died in 1817.

HUGH DOUGLAS HAMILTON, portrait painter, was born in Dublin in 1734. He studied under James Mannin, and at first worked in crayons in Dublin, and then in London. In 1778 he went to Italy, where he remained several years, and under the advice of Flaxman, took to painting in oils. On his return to Dublin, in 1792, he was elected a member of the Royal Hibernian Academy. He died in 1806.

Upon the sixth seal being opened, the apostle beheld an appalling earthquake, with a spectacle of universal commotion and terror. Every mountain and island was moved out of its place. After this terrible vision there was a pause in the course of the avenging angels.

Francis Danby was born 1793, near Wexford, Ireland, and exhibited his first picture in Dublin, in 1812. He was a pupil of a painter named O'Connor, and the two set off together to try their fortune in London, but their funds being exhausted, they got no further than Bristol. Here Danby stayed, supporting himself by teaching. In 1825 his picture, "The Delivery of Israel out of Egypt" gained him the Associateship of the Academy, and he went to London. From 1830, for eleven years, he lived in Switzerland, owing to a quarrel with the Academy, painting no important pictures, but devoting his time to boat-building, yachting, and teaching. In 1841 he returned to England, and began painting large subjects for exhibition, with all his old enthusiasm. He died in 1861 at Exmouth, where he had resided since 1847.

The Vicar and his future wife, gaily dressed, are before the counter of a mercer, who is showing them a piece of stuff, which the lady examines most carefully. Behind an errand boy is giving a message to the mercer's wife. A little dog lies at the foot of the counter, and on a stool beside it are some of the purchases made by the future Mrs. Primrose—a bunch of orange-blossoms and some rich hangings, probably for that green bed which is described as the limit of their annual migrations. The colour and execution of this work deserve especial attention.



The scene is by the side of a stream, and a nude figure of a female is sitting complacently in the foreground amid some white and red drapery, but a short distance away two others, also nude, are hurrying from the water at an alarm which has been given by some peasants standing near. The sky is a lively azure, and with the vivid green of the grassy banks, is in most agreeable contrast to the fair nude figures.

WILLIAM MULREADY was born at Ennis, Ireland, 1786. From the age of fifteen he supported himself, and is believed to have tried scene-painting, for in later years he was wont to say that he painted on a very large scale when he was young. At the age of fourteen he entered the Academy Schools, and showed great perseverance. In these early days he taught drawing to many persons of note, one of them being Miss Milbanke, afterwards Lady Byron. He was elected Associate and Royal Academician in one year, his name never appearing in the catalogue with the lesser title. Among his earliest friends was John Varley, whose sister he married when he was little more than seventeen years of age, but the union was an unhappy one, resulting in early separation, and this sad experience remained a trouble to him all his life. He died in 1863.

In 1798 he was elected an Associate of the Royal Academy; in 1800, Member; and in 1830, on the death of Sir Thomas Lawrence, he was made President.

He was a Member of Parliament from 1829 to 1841. He founded the National Repeal Association, and in furtherance of its objects addressed immense multitudes throughout the country. In 1843 he was sentenced to 12 months imprisonment for holding a meeting at Clontarf forbidden by the Government, but the sentence was reversed by the House of Lords, and he was released. He died at Genoa, 1847.

107. THE MORNING AFTER THE WRECK.

The picture shows a Dutch East Indiaman ashore in the Ooster Schelde. The sea is still in angry commotion from the effects of the storm which has been raging on the previous day. Part of one of the disabled vessel's masts is drifting about in the water to the left, and attached by a rope to the stern of the ship. Busy craft are all around endeavouring to secure the floating pieces of wreck. To the left are some seagulls and a buoy; to the right, some distance away, on the low-lying coast of Holland, is the town of Zierikzee, with its church tower and windmills clearly visible, for in that part of the picture the light is breaking, but to the left dark masses of cloud are still about, betokening that the storm has not yet wholly passed away.

One of the chief features in this work is the observance and study which is shown in the treatment of the water, which seems angrily chafing with something of the fury of the day before. Its colour, too, and the formation of the waves, indicate that the shore is at hand, and that a depth of only a few fathoms exists; an appearance quite distinct from the deep-water sea-room of the North Sea.

THE correctness of Stanfield's painting of the sea was based on personal knowledge. He was born at Sunderland in 1793, and commenced life as a sailor. When still quite young an accident disabled him for active service; and forming an acquaintance with Douglas Jerrold, he was employed to paint scenes for Jerrold's theatrical entertainments. In 1818 he was engaged as scene painter at the old "Royalty," a sailors' theatre, and subsequently held appointments with Daniel Roberts at the "Cobourg" in Lambeth, and finally at Drury Lane, where his drop scenes were much admired. He soon, however, began to exhibit pictures. He was elected Associate of the Royal Academy in 1832, and Royal Academician in 1835, and was thereafter a regular exhibitor at the Academy. He died in 1867.

This incident is taken from Shakespeare, who, in writing his famous tragedy of the Scottish Thane, based the scene on Hollinshed's "Chronicles of Scotland." Macbeth is giving to his noblemen a supper or banquet, to which Banquo has also been bidden. But Banquo's murderers are at the moment doing their work, and Macbeth, speaking to the company of the "noble Banquo," wishes he were at the feast. As he stands up to "drink and carouse to him," Banquo's ghost appears on a chair behind him. Macbeth, "turning about to sit down," sees the ghost which fronts him, so that he falls into a great passion of fear and fury, and knowing now that the dark deed he has ordered has been successfully accomplished, utters in his agitation many words about it, by which, when the company came to learn of the murder, they suspected Macbeth. "Pr'ythee, see there! behold! look! lo! how say you?" These are the words he is uttering. His Queen attempts to reassure the company by telling them that the King is often thus, and bidding them not to mind him, turning the next moment fiercely to her husband with the words, "Are you a man?" In 1050, Macbeth, it is said, repaired to Rome, probably by pilgrimage, and distributed money broadcast among the poor, presumably to





obtain absolution. Seven years later he was dethroned and slain at Lumphanan, in Mar, by Malcolm, who thereupon became King of Scotland as Malcolm III.

DANIEL MACLISE, R.A., was born at Cork in 1811, and studied at the School of Art there. He gave much attention to the study of anatomy, which laid the foundation for his "future pre-eminence in figure drawing." He came to London in 1827, entered the Schools of the Royal Academy, and gained silver medals and also the gold medal in 1829. He was elected Associate of the Royal Academy, and in 1840 became Royal Academician. His death occurred in 1870.

RICHARD ROTHWELL, portrait and subject painter, was born at Athlone, Ireland, in 1800. At the age of fifteen he began his studies in Dublin, and after a few years was elected a member of the Hibernian Society. Coming to London, he assisted Sir Thomas Lawrence, and occasionally exhibited at the Royal Academy from 1830 onwards. Afterwards he migrated to Leamington, Dublin, Paris, and finally to Rome, where he died in 1868.

A fight between the boys is interrupted by the appearance of the master, who has taken the youngest, but evidently the more pugnacious combatant by the ear; the lad's doubled fists and firmly set teeth prove that he is quite ready for another round, while his bigger adversary, showing the blood from his mouth to a group of backers, is evidently not sorry for the interruption. Two boys appeal to the master for and against the adverse parties. This picture is a fine example of the painter's early study of the Dutch school.

The broad estates of the Earls of Desmond and Ormond adjoined one another in Ireland. The Earl of Desmond was the head of the Fitzgeralds, an all-powerful family in Munster, and the Earl of Ormond was the chief of the Butler family. There were incessant disputes between the two houses, and whereas at the present day they would be settled by a judicial Court, they were then determined at the point of the sword. Open battles were fought to settle the litigated questions, which, however they might carry victory

or defeat, never brought conviction. It was in one of these mêlées that the Earl of Desmond, being wounded and taken prisoner, was borne from the field on a litter, slung across the shoulders of some of Ormond's men. "Where now," cried they, "is the great Earl of Desmond?" "In his proper place," was the fierce and witty retort of the disabled combatant, "on the necks of the Butlers." With one hand uplifted in defiance, the other is tenderly given to the sorrowing wife, who wearily follows him, while behind paces the prisoner's horse. The winding road marks the course down which the group have hurriedly come, not unexpectant of an attempt at rescue, as is seen by the anxious backward glance of the leader.
