SUBJECT: Transfer of 11 Chinese ex-PW's billeted
in 8th Army Steckade

TO: Legal Sec., GHQ, SCAP
(Attention: Lt. Col. Blackstock,
Chief, Prosecution Division)

1. Twenty three Chinese ex-PW's who suffered long forced labor in Japanese Chu San Labor Camp until freed by U.S. forces last September were detained from repatriation under the request of your section to serve as witnesses in trial against the responsible Japanese in this case of atrocity. By some mixed-up reason they were sent to 8th Army Steckade and been quartered there since.

2. This Mission is now consulting G-4 to find a more suitable place for them and has made a house available to quarter part of these witnesses within the scarce facilities furnished to us. It is requested that first half of eleven of these witnesses be transferred immediately to be quartered in this Mission for a change of environment and to take up light duties as readjustment to ordinary life. This Mission will be responsible for their safety and make them available for your sec. at any time.

3. Attached is a list of the eleven witnesses desired for the first group of transfer. Steckade commandant has been consulted and found in favor of this action. Your prompt authorization on this matter to Capt. Millar will be appreciated.

1. These are not United States prisoners, hence the Chief Provost Marshal has no official interest in the matter.

2. The 8th Army Stockade is a place of confinement for prisoners held by the United States Army authorities and is not a suitable place for the detention of Chinese to be held as witnesses for the International Military Tribunal.

3. Recommend that:

a. These witnesses be released from confinement and delivered to the custody of the Chinese Mission.

b. A letter be written to the Commanding General, 8th Army in regard to the six (6) Chinese Nationals now held in protective custody by the 8th Army and direct him to release these prisoners to the custody of the Chinese Mission in Japan.

c. A letter be written to the Imperial Japanese Government directing that the five (5) ex-POW's now in confinement at Akita be released to the custody of the Chinese Mission in Japan.

d. A reply be made to the Chinese Mission in Japan enclosing copies of letters written.

SUBJECT: Restitution of Ammonia Oxidation Equipment
to Yung Li Chemical Works, Nanking, China.

1. Yung Li Chemical Works, Nanking, China, has informed us that the Ammonia Oxidation equipment in their Pookow Plant was removed by the Japanese in 1942, and was reinstalled and operated at Yokosu Plant of Toyokatsu Kogyo K.K. at Omuta, Fukuoka Prefecture, for making nitric acid for war purposes since April 1944.
2. As this equipment is an integral part of Yung Li Chemical Works' plant at Pookow, and is urgently required in future for the production of acid for industrial uses, we hereby request that the same be returned to the original owner at the earliest opportunity.
3. Please issue necessary directives to insure the safe-keeping of this equipment and to facilitate its prompt return to China.

SUBJECT: Shipment of Two Anchors, etc., to China.

1. Reference is made to Chinese Mission memorandum (Ref. No. 0076/FS) of 26 June 1946 and Headquarters reply (AG 386 CPC/FP of 7 July 1946 on the subject mentioned above.

2. The attention of General Headquarters is cordially invited to the following:

- a. The objects in question have been displayed in a public park undoubtedly with the idea of glorifying war and militarism. The Chinese Mission is strongly of the opinion that such display of trophies taken in an aggressive war is contrary to the occupation objective of educating the Japanese people in the fundamental principles of peace and should therefore be discontinued without further delay.
- b. For this reason the request from the Chinese Mission is not merely a matter of restitution of property but concerns one of the most important occupation objectives.
- c. The Far Eastern Commission in Washington decided on or about 23 May 1946 that all property looted by the Japanese should be restored to the rightful owners, regardless of when the looting took place, provided that claims for the restitution of such property are substantiated.
- d. The objects in question are unquestionably Chinese. The Japanese will readily admit that and the Chinese Mission has reason to believe that they will be glad to return them to China.

3. We shall appreciate it if the matter can be favorably considered on the above grounds.

1. The case of the Chinese involved was first brought to the attention of Legal Section when, in February of this year, a military government officer attached to the 11th Airborne Division brought a case file into this office. Supplementary investigations were carried out and it was determined that the Chinese had been subjected to treatment which would warrant prosecution.

2. At that time, the Chinese Mission in Japan was contacted regarding the case and expressed a desire to participate in the prosecution. The necessary Chinese officials have not, as yet, arrived in Japan. The latest correspondence involving the matter is a radio dated 7 June 1946 from CINCAFPAC to CG, USAF, China, No. C-61780, requesting that the three Chinese officers referred to in previous correspondence come to Japan as soon as possible and requesting the ETA. No reply to this message has been received. The Chinese prisoners involved were, however, moved to more suitable quarters in the 8th Army Stockade.

3. Legal Section is prepared to prosecute this case as soon as the Chinese arrive, and is interested in doing so.

4. Legal Section recommends that the requests in paragraph 3 of inclosure #1 be granted.

1. By notification of Legal Section, GHQ SCAP 17 Chinese Army personnel and 6 Chinese nationals have been discovered in custody of Eighth Army Stockade by this Mission. They were part of the ex-Japanese PW's who badly suffered forced labor at Chusan Mine, a well-known case of Japanese atrocities, being investigated by Legal Section, GHQ, SCAP; and they are retained in Japan for war criminal trial after the bulk of PW's were repatriated to China in December 1945. It is informed that the International Prosecution Section of the IMTFE is also interested in this case and value these ex-PW's as to save them from bringing witnesses over from China.

2. This Mission is informed that 5 other ex-PW's of above labor camp were still mis-imprisoned at Akita serving a Japanese prison term for killing a Chinese traitor in a rebellion at Chusan Mine, occurred July 1 1945. Their names appear in attached roster and Legal Section is interested to have them as witnesses too.

3. After representatives of this Mission visited the Eighth Army Stockade and informed the Commandant about the facts of this case, above mentioned Chinese personnel were no longer treated as prisoners and their living condition has been improved considerably. This Mission appreciates the effort and cooperation already given by the Stockade Commandant, but understands the limitations of his authority to give full consideration to Chinese witnesses in his custody. It is hereby requested that the following adjustment be made for the sake of humanity and justice:





SUBJECT : Disposal of Former Japanese Army and Navy Equipment.

1. Receipt of your memorandum on the above subject dated 26 April 1946 is acknowledged.

2. Destruction of Japanese artillery ammunition is well advanced and only small quantities remain to be destroyed. This ammunition has been found to be extremely unstable and severe hazards are inherent in its handling. Accordingly, it is considered inadvisable to entail the risks involved in preparing for shipment and transporting this ammunition to China. Furthermore, it is not desirable to suspend present disposal operations at their present advanced stage in order to inspect and sort out items of ammunition which might be suitable for your purpose.

3. Much Signal communication equipment and Engineer material which is suitable for civilian use has been returned to the Japanese Government for the purpose of furthering the objectives of the occupation. The exact amount of such equipment which still remains to be so returned is not definitely known, but its availability will be investigated upon receipt of your formal request for the precise items you require.

4. Policy instructions are in hand which restrict the transfer to the Allied Nations of enemy equipment essentially or exclusively for use in war or warlike exercises and not suitable for peacetime civilian use to these quantities appropriate for examination and research only. Manufactured articles which are suitable for civilian use and which are not required to further the objectives of occupation may be transferred in larger quantities if available.

1. Reference is made to your letter dated 22 March 1946 subject as above. The following information has been received by this Section regarding the three Chinese Vessels seized by the Japanese:

- a. Lung Shun, 920 ton steamship, is under repairs at Osaka and is scheduled to resume operation on 20 April 1946.
- b. Ho Shun, 885 ton steamship, is under repairs at Hokodate, and is scheduled to resume operation 10 April 1946. Both the Lung Shun and the Ho Shun are being used by Civilian Merchant Marine Committee in the Hokkaido Coal Trade.
- c. Li Liang, 425 tons surveying ship, no information, although the second Demobilization Department submitted information as follows: Liliang, 500 ton dredger, captured at Shanghai in August 1941. No information as to the present location. It was previously reported to be in Shanghai, but this information has since been reported to be false.

2. Your request to return these vessels to Chinese Government cannot be favorably considered at this time, vessels indicated in paragraph a. and b. are scheduled for repatriation operations. A formal claim should be submitted by the Representative of the Chinese Government to be filed with General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

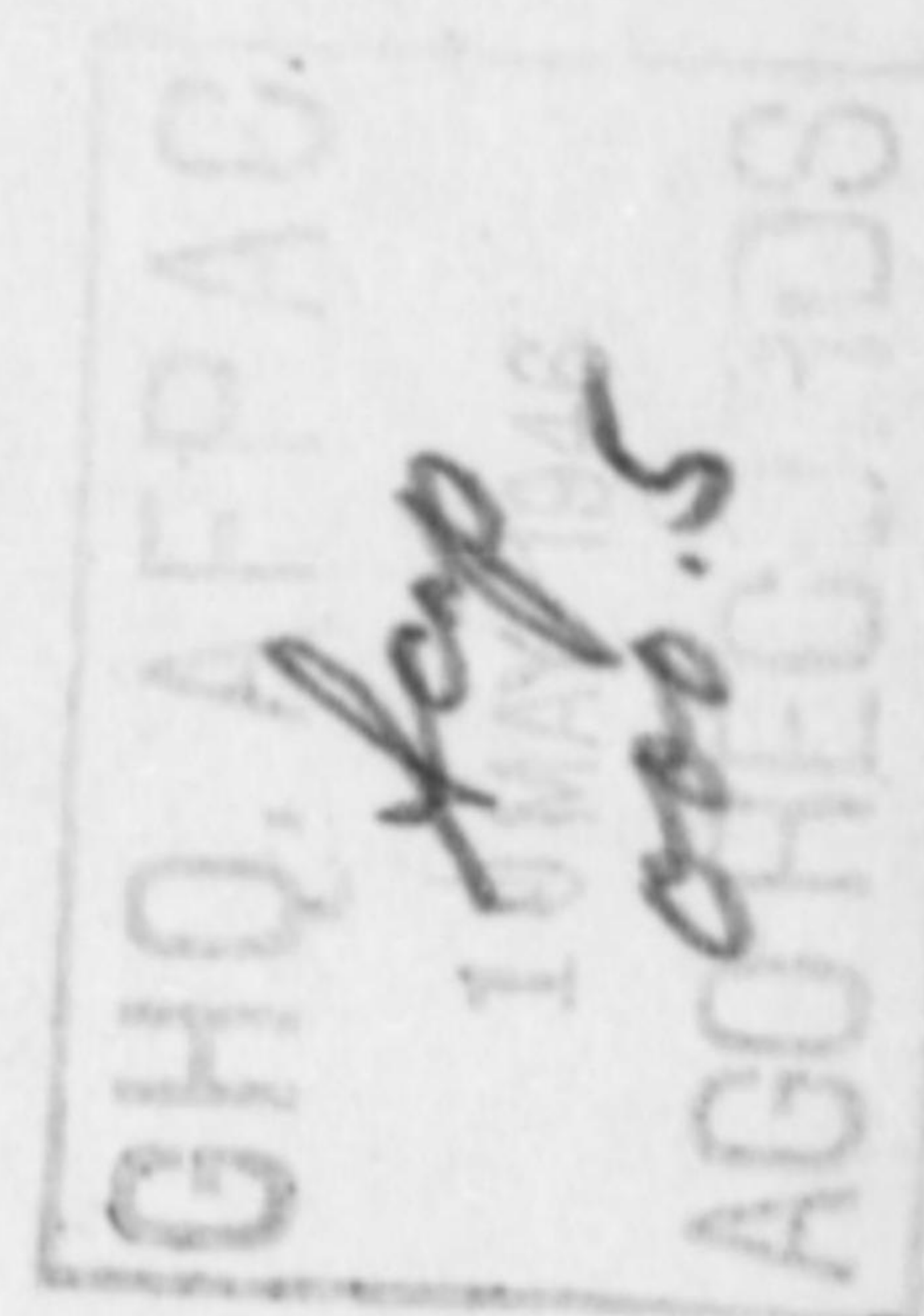

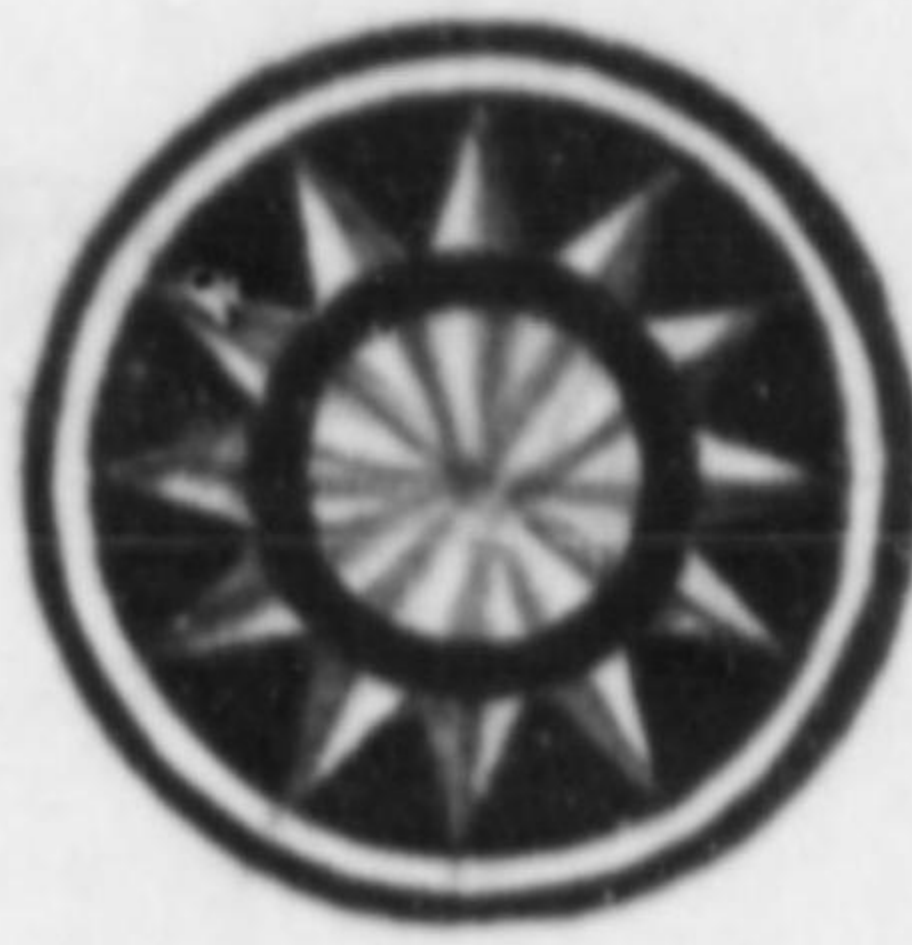

3. It is suggested that the Chinese Government be advised that subject company will be liquidated by SCAP under its ~~direct~~ directive from the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Washington. In case the Chinese Government considers that it has a legitimate claim to this property, it is recommended that the Chinese Government be advised to file a formal claim for later consideration by an international claims commission, whenever such commission is established.
