



ECLIPSES IN THE YEAR 1848.

I. A small Eclipse on the Sun's northern limb at the time of New Moon, March 5, in the morning, visible only in the north-eastern parts of North America, including Greenland and Iceland.

II. An Eclipse of the Moon on the 19th of March, at the time of Full Moon, in the evening, visible about twenty minutes in New-Brunswick.

III. The Sun will be Eclipsed, April 3, at the time of New Moon, in the evening, invisible in New-Brunswick.

IV. A very small Eclipse on the Sun's southern limb, at the time of New Moon, August 28, in the afternoon, visible only in a small tract in the Southern Ocean.

V. There will be an Eclipse of the Moon in September, visible and total. Beginning at 11h. 40m. eve. on the 12th, and ending on the 13th, at 3h. 20m. in the morning. Duration of total darkness, 1h. 38m.; whole duration, 3h. 36m. Depth of immersion in the earth's shadow, 20.42 digits on the northern side.

VI. Sun Eclipsed September 27, at the time of New Moon, in the morning. This Eclipse will be invisible in America, excepting the north-eastern Coast of Greenland.

*Made at Partridge Island on the approach of Vessels to the Harbour
of St. John.*

- One Ball, close, for one square-rigged vessel.
- One Ball, half-hoisted, for two square-rigged vessels.
- Two Balls, close, for three square-rigged vessels.
- Two Balls, separated, for four square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant, of any colour, for five square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant over a Ball half-hoisted, for seven square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant under two Balls close, for eight square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant between two Balls separate, for nine square-rigged vessels.
- A Flag of any colour, for ten or more vessels.

[The above are hoisted at the East or West yard-arm, according to the Quarter the vessels first appear in, and when their rig can be made out, the following descriptive colours will be hoisted at the mast-head :]

- A Union Jack for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.
- " with a Red Pendant over, for a two-decker.
- " with a Blue Pendant over, for a Frigate.
- " with a White ditto, for a small armed vessel.
- A Blue Pendant, for a merchant ship or barque.
- A Red ditto, for a merchant brig or brigantine.
- A White and Blue ditto, for a foreign square-rigged vessel.
- A White ditto, without a Ball, for a topsail schooner or sloop.
- A Flag, Blue and White horizontally, a neutral fleet.
- A Pendant, White and Blue, a neutral man of war.
- A Blue Flag, a neutral merchant ship.
- A Red, White and Blue Flag, an enemy's fleet.
- A Red, White and Blue Pendant, an enemy's man-of-war.
- A Union Jack over neutral or enemy's signals, the vessel is detained or a prize.
- A White Flag over any signal, the vessel bears a flag of truce.
- A Red Flag pierced White, for a Steam-boat from Digby.
- A Blue Flag pierced White, for a Steam-boat from Saint Andrews or Eastport.
- A Red Flag with a White square, for a Steam-boat from Boston.
- A Ball at the mast-head, vessel is on shore or in distress ;—should immediate aid be necessary, guns to be fired.

In thick weather a gun will be fired on Partridge Island in answer to each gun heard at sea. There is a Fog Bell on the Island, which is rung in foggy weather, to warn vessels of their approach to the shore. When a vessel requires a Pilot, her descriptive Pendant will be shewn at the yard-arm instead of a ball.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS,

NEAR THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN.

The Falls are level or still water about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them. For a few days in the spring of the year, the height of water in the River St. John renders the passage of the Falls extremely difficult.

THE UNITED KINGDOM.

(ALEXANDRIA) VICTORIA I., Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland. (daughter of the late Duke of Kent, —born November 2, 1767; died January 23, 1820,—by *Victoria Maria Louisa*, sister of the Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, and of Leopold, King of the Belgians; born August 17, 1786;) born May 23, 1819; succeeded her uncle, William IV., June 20, 1837, married February 10, 1840, to PRINCE ALBERT, of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, born August 26, 1819. Issue:—1. Victoria Adelaide Maria Louisa, born November 21, 1840; 2. Albert Edward, Prince of Wales. (Heir presumptive to the Crown,) born November 9, 1841; 3. LIGHT HOUSEES.

Isaac Woodward, Esq. Surveyor of those Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy belonging to New-Brunswick, and also of those belonging to Nova-Scotia, which are partly supported by this Province.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light on approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the South Point of Seal Island. This is a plain White Light—elevated about eighty feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the Compass. A very dangerous Rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called Blonde Rock, lies $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. by W. by Compass from the Light House. Between this Rock and the Island there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof.—A plain White Light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next Light on the coast of Nova-Scotia is placed on the West side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold, and not indented; the Light is, therefore, chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin. A White Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Bearings and Distance by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House:

This Light bears from the Light House on Brier Island N.N.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. 22 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor, E. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. distance 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock off White Head Island, N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W. $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

To the Southernmost of ditto, called St. Mary's Ledge, W. S. W. 2 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W. and by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. $12\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous Rocks and Shoals—many of them always above water, and which extend Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous Breaker called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands, near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. $18\frac{1}{4}$ miles.

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable Seal Islands S. and by W. $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed white Lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bearing from each other E.S.E. and W.N.W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other Lights upon the Coast, (British or American.) Both the Buildings are painted White. The following are the bearings by Compass from them, viz:—

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge (St. Mary's) E.S.E. easterly.

" Gannet Rock Light, E. by S. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. 13 miles.

" Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.

" Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.

" N. E. Rock distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.

" Little River Head, N. by W.

" Libby Island Light House, (American) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights into one, as they will be then not more than three-

fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the Lights.

[It is recommended that the Ship's Compasses should be well compared and adjusted, (particularly in new ships,) before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point: and, as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westerly, or (1 $\frac{1}{2}$ points) it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, * that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay, South Channel, between the Old Proprietor and N. W. Ledge, is S. W. & S., but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order, after passing Grand Manan, and the plain White Light (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo-Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the Inner Bay of Passamaquoddy;—it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour. It is a fixed white Light. The building is painted White, with a red cross on it.

Point Lepreaux Lights.—Upon this projecting head-land two Lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant twenty-eight feet.—Both Lights can be seen from every point of the compass where they may be useful—both are fixed and white. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This Light, at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established about fifty years, requires no particular notice, further than it is a fixed white Light, and the Light House is painted Red and White in vertical stripes. The Light was enlarged in Nov. 1846.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or Bar, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a Light is established, which is eminently useful to the Coasting Trade of St. John, and to all other vessels having Pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the Harbour at all hours of the night.—A fixed white Light. The House is painted White and black, in stripes vertically.

Quaco Light.—A revolving white Light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This Light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted White and Red, in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the Point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, Nova-Scotia. The House is about 120 feet above the tide-mark, and is painted white. A plain white Light.

CHARADES, ENIGMAS, REBUSES, &c.

Having observed in the 74th page of your Almanack for 1847, a Charade by "J. Moore, Peterville," which should have been termed an Enigma, I therefore take the liberty of making a few brief remarks as to the names and arrangement of Charades, Enigmas, Rebuses, and Enigmatical Rebuses.

A CHARADE is made up of one, two, or more words, to make a compound word, as tea-pot, in-do-lent, &c., and if a single letter is ever used it must either be a number, liquid, or vowel.—No transposition or inversion used.

An ENIGMA is known by its nature and paradoxical qualities, and may be either simple or compound.—It is merely a riddle.

A REBUS is made up sometimes of a whole word, syllables, vowels, or letters, as one-half, one-third, one-fourth, one-fifth of a word, and always the first part of a word, and, if they please, transposition or inversion used.

An ENIGMATICAL REBUS is a word chosen, either simple or compound, and treated on at the first as an Enigma, then transposed, inverted, dissected and trisectioned, as seemeth them good.

In the Enigmatical answer to Charade, by "W., Fredericton," last year, he says, "An island's name transpose," whereas it ought to have been inverted. For instance : ELBA—able. Transposition and inversion are not synonymous terms.

N. B.—The last Rebus in the 74th page of last year's Almanack, would have been better under the term Enigmatical Rebus. M.

INSTRUCTIVE AND AMUSING EXTRACTS.

Small Potatoes—This term is so generally reproachful that the person or thing to which it is applied is placed in the lowest attitude. But even small potatoes should not be despised, as the following facts, which were related to us by the one of our townsmen who derived much profit from the proceeding, fully illustrates.

Some years ago a gentleman visiting a farmer in Tolland, Connecticut, took from his pocket a small intruder, which somehow got in there at home. It was thrown out with a smile, and the farmer taking it in his hand to look at it, a curious little boy of 12 at his elbow asked what it was. Oh nothing but a potato, my boy—take it and plant it—and you shall have all you can raise from it till you are free. The lad took it, and the farmer thought no more about it at that time. The boy, however, not despising small potatoes, carefully divided it into as many pieces as he could find eyes, and put them in the ground; the product was carefully put aside in the fall, and seed for several hills obtained for the next spring. The product was all kept for seed, until the fourth year, the yield being good, the actual product was 400 bushels! The farmer, seeing the prospect that the potato field would by another year cover his whole farm, asked to be released from his promise.

With the same calculation, prudence and industry, how many who are disposed to regard the trifling things on which fortunes are built, as too small potatoes to receive their attention, would have been in independent circumstances, if they had husbanded small advantages. Small potatoes should not be despised, even though there be at first but a few in a hill.—*Portsmouth Journal.*

A speedy and efficacious remedy for Dysentery.—A writer in the Tipperary Free Press recommended the following as an almost infallible remedy for Dysentery. Take a pint of the finest flour, tie it up in a clean piece of fine linen or thin muslin, put it in a large saucepan or skillet, cover it over with pure new milk, put it by the fire-side, where it will simmer actively by the heat for two hours, until it will be reduced to half the quantity, take out the flour from the cloth, and spread it on a table, reduce the flour to its original fineness with a rolling pin, throw away the milk in which it has been prepared, then put about half a pint of pure new milk in a small porringer, boil it on the fire, and when boiling thicken it with some of the prepared flour, let the patient take a large tea cup full of it when cool, and in four or five hours more take the same quantity, and the complaint though ever so violent or malignant in its nature will be finally arrested in its progress. A third quantity may be taken if necessary.

To Cure Diarrhea.—Mix 32 drops oil of cinnamon; 2 fluid ounces of laudanum; 4 fluid ounces of compound spirits of lavender; 4 fluid ounces tincture of rhubarb. Dose—A tea-spoonful once in three hours for an adult. The ingredients can be procured and mixed at any drug store.

To REMOVE DUST FROM THE EYE.—Immerse the affected eye in a vessel of clear cold water, and then rapidly open and shut it a few times, when the dust will be washed away.

Resuscitation of the Drowned.—The vulgar method of rolling drowned persons on barrels, and various other equally absurd methods of restoring suspended animation, no doubt, more frequently kills than cures. Dr. Mott of the American Shipwreck Society, gives the following directions which cannot be too extensively promulgated:—

"As soon as the body is removed from the water press the chest suddenly and forcibly downward and backward, and instantly discontinue the pressure. Repeat this without intermission until a pair of common bellows can be procured; when obtained, introduce the nozzle well upon the base of the tongue. Surround the mouth with a towel or handkerchiefs, close to it. Direct a bystander to press firmly on the projecting part of the neck, called Adam's Apple, and use the bellows actively. Then press upon the chest to expel the air from the lungs—to imitate natural breathing. Continue this an hour at least, until signs of natural breathing come on. Wrap the body in warm blankets, and place it near the fire, and do everything to preserve the natural warmth, as well as to impart artificial heat, if possible. Avoid all friction until respiration shall be in some degree established."

Preparation of Coffees.—Coffee roasted only till it becomes slightly red, preserves the maximum of weight and aroma, but gives out less colouring matter. In this state 100 pounds are found to have lost 15, but have increased to the bulk of 130.—Roasted to a chestnut color, as is commonly done, the loss is 20 per cent., while the increase in volume is from 100 to 153. This swelling of the grain depends upon the property which the nitrogenous matter deposited within the tissue has of puffing up remarkably when heated. If the heat is continued until a dark brown color is produced, and the grain is covered with a sort of glaze, the loss is 25 per cent., while the original quantity of nitrogen, 245 per cent., is reduced to 177, being a loss of one-fourth.—*Silliman's Journal*.

RECEIPT FOR CURING HAMS.—7 lbs. coarse salt, 5 lbs. brown sugar, 2 oz. salt petre, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. pearl ash, 4 gallons of water. Boil all together and scum the pickle when cold. Put it on the meat. Hams to remain in 8 weeks—beef 3 weeks. The above is for 100 lbs. weight. It is said that hams cured by this mode are of superior quality. It is called the “Newbold receipt,” a person of that name in New Jersey having, as it is said, attained great celebrity for the excellence of his hams, the mode of curing which was kept secret till after his death.

CURING HAMS.—The following is the mode practiced by W. Stickney, of Boston, which has been much admired. To every two quarts of a saturated solution of common salt, is added one ounce of summer savory, one of sweet marjoram, one of allspice, half an ounce of saltpetre, and one pound of brown sugar. The whole was boiled together, and applied boiling hot to the hams, which remained in the pickle three weeks.

To Boil Bacon.—Soak the bacon for several hours; take off the skin before you boil it; for it has been proved by experience that a pound of bacon boiled *without the skin* will weigh an ounce heavier than a pound boiled *with the skin*. Fat bacon should be put into hot water, and lean into cold water.—*Practical Receipts*.

PRESERVING CABBAGES.—There are several good ways of keeping cabbages during winter by burying them out of doors. The difficulty is, it is hard to get at them during winter, without damage to those left. The following plan appears to avoid this difficulty:—Cut the head from the stump, and pack closely in a cask, taking care to fill up all the vacancies with chaff or bran, and keep in a dry cellar.

EARLY LETTUCE.—Take up the plants, which have been sown in the open ground in autumn, and set them in a hot bed as soon as it is made, and they will be fit for the table two weeks earlier than those from seed sown in the bed.

CANADA THISTLES.—J. B., of Oneonta, N. Y., gives us his mode of destroying Canada thistles. He says—“Salt them—use salt freely, and your cattle and horses will gnaw and stamp them to death. If some thistles appear the second year, repeat the process, knowing that the salt is not wasted if a little is ‘trodden under foot of men’ or of beasts.”

Another method of destroying Canada thistles is by cutting them as close to the ground as possible with a scythe, in the month of June, or while they are in fresh bloom. If cut before rain, so much the better, as the water will be likely to get into the hollow stalk and rot it.

To cook PARSNIPS.—Persons who have never eaten parsnips cooked according to the following mode, have no idea what an excellent dish they are:—Scrape the parsnips, wash and slice them lengthwise; boil in just water enough to cover them till thoroughly done. Then put in a piece of butter, with a little salt and pepper. Beat up an egg with a spoonful of flour, and pour over them; they are then ready to dish up. Parsnips are likewise very good, split once and roasted with pork in the dripping-pan.

PARSNIPS FOR HOGS.—The Prairie Farmer says they are the best of all roots for this purpose, and states that a hog, 22 months old, and weighing alive 750 lbs., never ate anything but raw parsnips and sour milk.

Remedy for the Heaves.—Take one hundred and eighty grains of tartar emetic, and divide it into three equal doses of sixty grains each. Mix one of them in wet bran, and give it to the horse.—Repeat the dose once in two days, and this disease will be greatly alleviated, if not perfectly cured.—*Par. Far.*

Cure for the Foot Rot in Sheep.—Take honey 4 oz.; nitrate of copper 1 oz.; strong ascetic acid 2 drachms; rub down the nitrate of copper thoroughly in a wedgewood or porcelain mortar, and gradually mix it with honey; then add the ascetic acid so as to form a mixture of uniform consistency, and apply it to the feet of the sheep.

To prevent Dogs from killing Sheep., a New York farmer recommends bells being put on one or two sheep in each flock; for a sheep-killing dog being a sneaking creature is apt to start off on hearing the noise; and another advantage of the bell is the warning it gives when the sheep are chased, especially at night, when they are generally still, unless disturbed by intruders.

A REMEDY FOR RATS.—Pulverized cantharides, spread on bread and butter, are said to be a positive remedy for rats—after partaking of the dish, they generally leave the premises altogether.

COAL ASHES FOR MANURE.—M. Allegany Co., Pa. So far as our observation goes, coal ashes are not a very valuable manure; we think they do, however, generally produce some benefit. On heavy soils, their mechanical effect is favorable in making the soil more open. Sometimes they contain iron and sulphur in so large quantities as to render their application injurious to vegetation. Mixing them with fresh lime or strong wood ashes, might in such cases be useful.

Plaster for the Interior of Houses.—Take air-slacked lime eight parts; sifted plaster (gypsum) four parts; powdered quick-lime one part; mix well together in small quantities with water, and use immediately. This composition under ordinary circumstances will not crack.

WASTE OF MANURE IN CITIES.—The London sewers pour daily into the Thames, 115,000 tons of mixed drainage. One part in 30 is regarded as rich, fertilizing, solid manure, or 3,800 tons daily. This amount would richly manure every year more than 50,000 acres of land.

ASPARAGUS—Horticulturists say that the best way to kill weeds on asparagus beds is to water them liberally with pork or beef brine. The salt kills the weeds, while it nourishes the asparagus, which is a marine plant, and grows the better for having salt.

Somebody has said that water in which potatoes have been boiled, sprinkled upon plants of any kind, is sure death to all insects in every stage of their existence.

RATS may be got rid of, it is said, by placing a mixture of flour and lime near their holes.
