COOKS FOR THE NEW ARMY
Local Food Purveyor's Will Furnish 150 to 200

New Orleans restaurant and hotel keepers at a meeting Friday night at the Association of Commerce agreed to give up the services of between 150 and 200 cooks for the new army.

New Orleans has been called upon to furnish about 300 cooks for the new army. They will be divided into two classes Class A and Class B. Class A cooks will receive \$125 per month and room and board and Class B cooks will receive \$80 per month.

Alexandre Alcator, one of the most noted of the French chefs was tendered the position of superintendent of this division, and he has accepted.

CANDIDATES CHOSEN FOR OFFICERS' TRAINING CAMP

The names of 371 men chosen to attend the second officers training camp at Leon Springs, Tex., were announced from Jackson Barracks yesterday. They are directed to report at camp August 26. The selections are pretty equally divided between city and country. In the list are Charles Tenney Jackson, the novelist; Charles E. Harp, telegraph editor of the States; Albertus Koch, of the Item staff; Representative J. O. Stewart, of Calcasieu; Representative F. M. SUITS FOR DAMAGES BEGUN

Aftermath of Collision of Auto and French Market Car
Suits for damages against the New Orleans Railway and Light company were begun in civil district court yesterday by Mr. and Mrs. Paul Signorino, parents of the minor, Anthony Signorino, on behalf of their son for \$8,000 damages. Mr. and Mrs. Paul Castiglioni, parents of the minor, James Castiglioni, on behalf of their son for \$3,500, and Paul Danove who asks for \$5,208 damages.

According to the petitions which are identical, the accident occurred at the corner of Chartres and Dumaine, Aug. 12, 1916. They state that the two youths and Danova were riding in Anthony Signorino's auto down Chartres street. At about 9:30 o'clock they were in the act of crossing the French Market tracks when a car of that line, romping along at a rapid rate without sounding any warning signal, it is alleged, struck and overturned the machine, hurling the occupants to the pavement. Anthony Signorino's left arm was broken in two places and he was bruised and otherwise hurt about the chest, arms and legs. James Castiglioni suffered severe injuries on the head, arms and body, and was laid up for four months. Paul Danove's wrist was broken, besides which he suffered other injuries on the head, arms and body which incapacitated him for work during four months.

BARLEY CROP HURT BY FUNGUS GROWTH

Madison, Wis., Aug. 14.—Optimistic reports of Wisconsin's bumper barley crop are being discounted here by agricultural authorities. Barley stripe, a fungus disease which whenever it occurs is certain to shatter high yields and cause heavy losses, has been found in several of the important barley growing sections of the state. Some farmers are reporting as high as 36 per cent of their plants killed by the pest.
