

CASH WITH ORDER—Cnstomers will please remit when ordering. If goods are wanted C.O.D., 25 per cent, or one-fourth of the amount, must accompany the order. No plants sbipped O.O.D. No plants shipped to Florida.

HOW TO SEND MONEY—Remittances should be made by postoffice money order, express money order, drafts or checks. Where it is not possible to obtain these, the letter should be registered.

STAMPS---We will accept stamps in good condition (one or three-cent stamps preferred) the same as cash, but we ask those remitting stamps to wrap them In oiled paper, if possible, to prevent their sticking together or to the order.

The printed form should show that it is issued by state, county or city relief office and signed by the authorized relief officer and should also be signed by the person ordering the seed in the place for signing for receipt of the seeds. Seeds selected must be vegetable seeds only and no quantity larger than one pound of any one variety will he supplied on these orders.

Non-Warranty Owing to the many conditions beyond our control which might affect the germination and crop, and in accordance with the universal custom of the seed trade, Job P. VEGETABLE PLANTING CALENDAR

This planting Calendar is prepared so it's easy to follow and we suggest you use it as it will be found very valuable when planting your garden. Of course planting time varies depending on your location and remember this calendar is based on Raleigh and farther south so naturally for farther north planting time would be later. If you live north of Raleigh your planting would be one week to one month later. New York latitude would average one month later. Depth of planting may be slightly varied with soil density—this is, on light sandy soils seeds or bulbs are planted deeper than on heavy or clay soils.

Plant the seed in early spring; soak overnight in water; plant in rows, or rather hills, 1 foot apart and 2 feet be-tween, or 3 feet between if to be cultivated with a plow; put from 4 to 5 seeds in each bill; when well up, thin out to 2 plants.



Sow in drills during winter or early spring 3 inches spart and 1 foot from row to row and cover with about 1 ½ inches of earth.

To have a continuous supply plant every two weeks till the middle of August; farther South they may be planted even later. Make the rows 2 to 3 feet apart, drop the beans d inches apart and cover 1½ to 2 inches deep. Give frequent but shallow cultivation up to blessoming time, net afterward and never when the plants are wet. Plant in a light loamy soil that warms up quickly. 

out much bottom heat, or small pots may be plunged into the soil in the frames, with-seeds placed in each. In three or four weeks these may be transplanted into open ground. 


