Alexander Hardy, Thomas Botham and Ellen Hardy his wife vs. James M. Harbin and others. IN EQUITY.

To the Honorable Judges of the Circuit Court of the United States for the Northern District of California, in Chancery sitting.

I. Alexander Hardy, a citizen of the State of New York, at present serving in the Army of the U. S. in the Department of the Potomac; Thomas Botham, a resident of Brantford, Upper Canada, and a subject of the Queen of Great Britain and Ireland and Ellen Hardy Botham, his wife, a native and citizen of the State of New York, but at present residing with her said husband Thomas Botham in Brantford aforesaid, bring this their bill against the defendants herein, residents and citizens of the State of California, James M. Harbin, resident of Solano county, George Tyler, John G. Parrish, F. W. Pratt, J. B. Hartsough, Jeff. Wilcoxon, Jackson Wilcoxon, Wm. S. Emery, Edward Bynum, W. G. Hunt, Thomas Marston, M. D. Rahm, C. Nelson, Frank Buckner, Thaddeus C. Hoppin, John Hoppin, Charles Hoppin, H. J. Cooper, S. D. Moore, Jas. A. Douglass, H. C. Yerby, Jas. A. Hutton, J. F. Boon, L. M. Lowe, residents of Sacramento county, California, Joseph D. Bristol and Mrs. J. D. Bristol, James Cullerton, John Sime, Lloyd Tevis, J. B. Haggin, residents of the city and county of San Francisco, California.

And divers other persons as yet to your Orators unknown, but whose names, when discovered, they pray may be made parties defendant hereto, with proper and apt words to charge them with the premises &c.

And thereupon your Orators complain and say—

II. That your Orators Alexander Hardy and Ellen Hardy Botham are the only children and heirs at law of John Hardy, who died in the month of December, A. D. 1849, intestate, happening by chance to be at the house of Stephen Cooper in Benicia, but being at that time a resident and domiciled in the county of Yolo upon his Rancho Rio de Jesus Maria and being known and called at the time of his death and in California as Thomas M. Hardy.

III. That the said John Hardy was a native of Upper Canada and left there about the year 1830, leaving behind him his wife and three children—his said wife died before the said John Hardy, and one of the said children by name Nancy died before attaining majority and unmarried. The said Ellen was married to her present husband, before the death of her said father.

IV. The said John Hardy, after leaving Upper Canada, changed his name to Thomas M. Hardy, and after spending some years in Texas and Mexico came to California, and by the said name of Thomas M. Hardy was always known in California, from the time of his arrival there until his death.

V. That on the 20th day of September 1843 the said Hardy obtained from Manuel Michelotoreno then Governor of California a grant of concession of the said Rancho Rio de Jesus Maria containing 6 square leagues of land which has since been located by the officer of the United States Government and ascertained to contain 26,637 42-100 acres of land. And said Hardy stocked his said rancho with horses and cattle and built a house thereon and resided thereon for many years and up to the time of his death. He also owned at that time a launch, which he used to navigate the Sacramento river, and it was while engaged in navigating the Sacramento river in his said launch that he chanced to be taken sick therein on the river, at Benicia, Solano county, and was taken to the house of Stephen Cooper and there died.

VI. That the said John Hardy, leaving no heirs or relatives in the State of California, on the 7th day of March 1850, one Charles P. Wilkins, then Prefect of

the District of Sonoma, assuming jurisdiction over his estate, appointed Stephen Cooper to be administrator of the estate of the said John or Thomas M. Hardy deceased, and on the 27th day of March 1850, issued to the said Stephen Cooper, what purported and were intended to be Letters of Administration upon the estate, by virtue and under color whereof the said Cooper proceeded to act as administrator of the said estate. But your Orators aver that the said Charles P. Wilkins had no jurisdiction over the said estate nor authority to appoint an administrator thereof, and that his proceedings in that behalf and the appointment of said Cooper administrator and all his acts under color of such appointment were utterly null and void.

VII. That at the time of his death the said Hardy, besides the said Rancho Rio de Jesus Maria, left a large amount of personal property, to wit: 24 mares, one stallion, fifty heifers, some oxen, cows and other cattle; two chests of carpenter's tools, one small sailing vessel, twelve and a half ounces of gold dust, some debts due to him, and other personal property, the whole of said personal property being worth not less than fifteen thousand dollars. And the total amount of debts due by him at the time of his death and the expenses of his last sickness and burial amounted to no more than five hundred dollars.

VIII. That afterwards and on or about the 27th day of March A. D. 1850 the said Charles P. Wilkins, Prefect as aforesaid, (his office having been abolished by law and Probate Courts having been constituted in the different counties in this State) transmitted to the Probate Court of the county of Solano the papers and documents in his possession relating to said estate and undertook to transfer jurisdiction of the said estate to the said Probate Court of Solano county. But your Orators aver that the said Wilkins had no jurisdiction to transfer, that no law of the State authorized him to transfer any jurisdiction in any case to any Probate Court, that he could not thus transfer his jurisdiction if he had any, and the said Probate Court could not take jurisdiction by any such transfer, but only by original petition presented and proceedings instituted in *inovo* in accordance with law, and that the said Probate Court of Solano county in particular had no jurisdiction whatever and could not legally take or assume jurisdiction over said estate in any way or by any means, inasmuch as the laws of the State of California conferred jurisdiction over the estate of the deceased exclusively in the Probate Court of the county of Yolo—the county where the deceased being a resident of the State resided at or immediately prior to his death—notwithstanding he might happen to die in another county.

IX. That no proceedings were taken in said Probate Court of Solano county to acquire jurisdiction over the said estate—no petition was presented for letters of administration, no notice given of any such application or of any intention of the said court to proceed in the settlement of the said estate, nor were any letters of Administration or other authorization issued by the said court to said Stephen Cooper, nor was any security for the faithful performance of his duty given by said Cooper.

X. That afterwards, to wit on the 9th day of April 1851, the said Stephen Cooper petitioned the said Probate court of Solano county for leave to sell the whole or part of the real estate of the said intestate—that is to say, the said Rancho Rio de Jesus Maria—and the said court made an order in accordance with the prayer of the said petition. But your Orators aver that even if said court had any jurisdiction in respect to said estate, which they deny, they failed to acquire any jurisdiction to make said order or any other order of sale, because they say there was no petition for an order of sale by said Cooper as administrator to the said court setting forth the description of all the real estate of which the said intestate died seized, neither condition or value of its respective portions, nor of its rents or profits, nor did it appear, nor was it the fact that there was insufficient personal estate to pay the debts and expenses of administration, nor did the said petition contain the names and ages of the heirs of the deceased, nor the averments which are material to confer jurisdiction. That the said Judge did not make any order directing all persons interested to appear before him, at a time and place specified, not less than four nor more than ten weeks prior to the time of making such order, to show cause why an order should not be granted to the administrator to sell so much of the real estate of the deceased as should be necessary to pay such debts as were by law required, nor was any copy of such order served on all persons interested in said estate, or published four weeks in a newspaper designated by said court, nor was such order served or published in any way.

XI. And your Orators further show, that the said petition and application was false and fraudulent in fact, for that no necessity in fact existed for the sale of said real estate, that the personal property was abundant for the payment of all the just debts of the said intestate and of said estate and of administration, that said petition did not truly state the amount of personal property that had come to the hands of the said Cooper, but only the said gold dust, launch, and cooking utensils to the value of two dollars, and a note said to be worthless on which there was fifty dollars due, nor was it true as therein stated that all of said property had been disposed of, for all of the stock upon said rancho remained undisposed of, nor were the allegations of the said petition true in respect to the debts outstanding against the deceased. That the only debts set forth which were contracted by the deceased amounted to \$217 04, that a debt of one McDaniel, which was wholly fictitious, fabricated and fraudulent, which was for pretended services rendered to the estate after the death of said intestate, and for which said estate was in no wise liable, that said claim was manufactured for the purpose of making an apparent necessity to sell the said real estate to pay debts, and with the same intent the said petition further states the existence of other indebtedness which had not been presented, though more than a year and a half had then elapsed since the decease of said intestate, which allegation was wholly and utterly false, and the whole amount of real indebtedness of said estate that existed was only \$217 04, and the said rancho thus fraudulently sought to be sold and by said court ordered to be sold was appraised by the appraisers appointed by said court at \$33,300, and was worth more than that sum at the time of said sale, and was agricultural and pasture land easily divisible, and a small or large portion thereof could have been sold separately or in several parcels, and at a fair sale a very small portion of said rancho would have produced sufficient to have paid all the debts due or even the amount which was pretended to be due.

XII. And your Orators further show, that no notice of the said sale was given in accordance with law, that no notice was given of the time of said sale, or of the place of said sale, nor was the same reported in three public places in the county in which said land was situated. That the day and place of said intended sale was advertised in a newspaper called the *California State Gazette*, published at Benicia, a hundred miles from the premises to be sold, to wit the Town of Fremont in Yolo county, while there were three public papers printed in Sacramento, within fifteen miles of the said land, and there could scarcely be selected a paper less likely to give notice to those wishing to purchase. That in that notice no hour was specified at which said sale would take place, but only that it would take place sometime between sunrise and sunset.

That no place was specified in the town of Fremont where the said sale would be made. That said sale did not take place at the town of Fremont, as the same was advertised, but, with the intent to conceal the same and prevent the presence of bidders, the said sale was actually held at a place called Virginia Ranch, about fifteen miles from Fremont, the place designated in the notice. That such change was made without any notice and fraudulently and maliciously with the intent and purpose of sacrificing the said land and enabling the parties hereinafter named to purchase the same at a price far below its value. By means of which proceedings many persons who desired to be present and to bid for the said land at such sale were not able, after diligent enquiry, to discover the place of said sale, and could not be and were not present at said sale.

XIII. And your Orators further show, that the said sale was fraudulently conducted, and that the said Cooper conspired with George Tyler, John G. Parrish, James M. Estelle and James M. Harbin to sell the said rancho at a price greatly disproportionate to its value, that at said sale the said Cooper was requested by the said Parrish, acting for himself and said Harbin, Tyler and Estelle, to sell the whole of said rancho in one body. That said rancho was thereupon so offered; that beside the said four confederates there was one other person present who bid upon the said land; that thereupon the said sale was suspended and the said bidder was taken aside by some of said confederates and such inducements offered or measures taken by them as induced the said person to refrain from further bidding; that thereupon the said sale proceeded and the property was knocked down to the defendant James M. Harbin for the grossly inadequate sum of \$6,500, the said purchase being made by said Harbin for himself and said Tyler, Parrish and Estelle.

XIV. Your Orators further show, that these several other persons who were desirous of bidding at the said sale, but who were prevented from so doing

by the fraudulent practices which are hereinbefore set forth, and legal proceedings were threatened and intended by one or more of them to set aside the said sale, but who were induced by the said purchasers to desist from taking such proceedings by the payment by said purchasers of a large sum of money. That thereafter an order was made by said Probate Court of Solano county confirming said sale, the said Cooper ordered to make a conveyance to the purchasers, and he accordingly made, executed and delivered a deed of the said Rancho Rio de Jesus Maria, reciting the said petition, order of sale, sale and order of confirmation.

XV. That at or after said sale it was agreed that said conveyance from Cooper should be made to them jointly, and accordingly the said conveyance was made to said Harbin, Parrish, Tyler and Estelle, said four confederates July 28th 1851 by said Stephen Cooper, administrator as aforesaid, and on the 19th day of March 1852 the said Tyler conveyed his one fourth of said land to Harbin, reserving 640 acres of choice land, to be selected by him, for \$18,000, and shortly after Parrish sold his fourth to Chas. K. & John Hoppin for \$18,000, reserving the sum of six hundred and forty acres. And your Orators aver that said fourth was worth that sum, and that the whole of said rancho at the time of said sale was worth the sum of \$75,000.

XVI. Your Orators further show, that all the frauds and fraudulent practices and all the matters and things hereinbefore set forth and alleged were not discovered by your Orators or either of them, nor had they or either of them any notice whatever thereof, until within less than three years prior to the bringing of this suit.

XVII. That afterwards, on to wit the 8th day of June A. D. 1852, a petition for the confirmation of the said title was presented to the Board of United States Land Commissioners to ascertain and settle private land claims in the State of California, thus claiming title to the said rancho through the said deed of Cooper, and afterwards, on the 26th day of July, 1855, the said title was confirmed by the said Board, and afterwards in the District Court of the United States for the Northern District of California on the 23d day of March A. D. 1857, and the decree made final by stipulation. The land was surveyed by the United States surveyor and a patent was thereafter issued by the United States board upon such confirmation and survey for said land to James M. Harbin, J. D. Bristol, J. G. Parrish, George Tyler, James M. Estelle, John H. Hoppin, Charles R. Hoppin, those claiming the said land under and by virtue of said sale by Cooper, which patent was issued on the 3d day of July, A. D. 1858, but was not recorded in the county of Yolo until the day of December, A. D. 1858.

XVIII. Your Orators further show, that the persons hereinafter named, and against whom process of subpoenas is prayed, claim to own the said Rancho Rio de Jesus Maria by name through and under said conveyance or deed of said Stephen Cooper and under and by virtue of said patent. But your Orators aver that said sale of Stephen Cooper was utterly null and void and conveyed no title, and that said order of sale, sale, order of confirmation and conveyance were without any authority in Law and wholly null and void, and that the confirmation of title in the said Board of Land Commissioners and of the District Court of the United States, obtained by virtue and by means therefore is in fact and in equity ought to be only a confirmation of the title of your Orators, and that the said patent and any and all title thereby acquired is in trust and ought in equity to be held and treated as in trust for your Orators, to whom the said rancho and the title thereof ought to and does in justice belong.

Your Orators further show that the said James Estelle is dead, and for that reason is not made a party hereto.

XIX. May it please your Honor to grant a writ of subpoenas addressed to the said James M. Harbin, Stephen Cooper, resident of Colusa county, California; Thomas R. Lowe, resident of Sierra county; F. W. Pratt, J. B. Hartsough, Jeff. Wilcoxon, Wm. S. Emery, Edward Bynum, W. G. Hunt, Thos. Marston, M. D. Rahm, C. Nelson, Frank Buckner, Thaddeus Hoppin, Jno. Hoppin, Chas. Hoppin, H. J. Cooper, L. D. Moore, James A. Douglass, H. C. Yerby, James A. Hutton, J. Boon, L. M. Curtis, John Longenour, Thomas Langenour, Charles H. Gray, R. B. Burton, A. Burton, H. B. Wood, E. Patten, Chas. Coil, A. G. GRAND JURY.—On Monday next the Grand Jury will meet at Woodland.

COURT OF SESSIONS.—On Monday next Judge J. N. Hoag will hold the Court of Sessions at Woodland.

ON the first page will be found published in full the complaint filed by the Hardy heirs against the owners of the Harbin Grant.

REMEMBER that the District School will commence on Monday next, under the superintendence of Miss M. H. Slavan.

FLOUR AND BRAN.—On Wednesday last R. Gardner shipped by the Defiance, Capt. Zimmerman, for Sacramento, 3500 sacks flour and 100 tons bran.

DEFAULTER.—C. L. Bird, Treasurer of Sacramento County, has absconded with about \$20,000. The securities are all responsible men.

ANOTHER ESCAPE FROM THE SACRAMENTO JAIL.—On Wednesday last a prisoner by the name of W. M. Donelson, escaped from the jail at Sacramento. He was charged with horse stealing from this county.

APPOINTMENT.—William J. Johnson has been appointed Post Master, at Woodland, Yolo county.

A CAMP MEETING commenced yesterday and will continue throughout the ensuing week, near the Cacheville road and about a mile from this place, on Judge Gwinn's ranch.

INSANE ASYLUM.—On the 1st instant there were 577 patients in the Insane Asylum at Stockton. Admitted during the month of August, 20; discharged, 12; died, 5.

LAYING THE CORNER STONE.—We understand that the Free and Accepted Masons of Yolo county will meet at Woodland on Saturday next, the 19th inst., to lay the corner stone of the new Court House with Masonic ceremonies. It is expected the citizens of the county and members of the different orders will be present. Judge H. H. Hartley will deliver the address.

MARYSVILLE FAIR.—Having just returned from Marysville we take pleasure in saying that the fair held the past week, was quite successful, although the attendance was not very large at the commencement. Yolo was fully represented in the various departments, particularly the stock department, and we are glad to see our farmers and agriculturists taking the interest they have in this District Fair. High encomiums were paid on the stock exhibited from our county, and we feel proud of it, and may the growing interest never abate. The display of fruits certainly never was excelled in any State in the Union. The President's annual address was delivered in a clear, distinct manner, and well worthy the attention of Agriculturists. Many of its points are of incalculable advantage to our farmers, and will pay a careful perusal. As announced, the Society will pay every dollar in premiums, and be able to start next year on a firm basis. Much credit is due to the officers of the society for their efforts and exertions.

DULL TIMES.—There is a very striking contrast in the business appearance of our town the present season compared with that of last year. Then it was difficult to pass along Front street for the waggons loaded with grain waiting their turn to discharge it. Now a waggon load of grain is not seen every day, unless it is for the mill. Then our merchants, with double their present force, were employed from early dawn till late at night; now they are comparatively idle half the time. Then money was plenty for all immediate wants, now hard to obtain for the most pressing necessities. It is easy to account for the immediate cause of this stagnation in the trade of our town—the low prices of grain or rather the almost entire absence of any market for wheat; but the remote cause, the reason why there is no market for grain at remunerative prices, such as ruled last year, is a problem more difficult of solution, the consideration of which we must leave for the present to other hands.

The County Court

Of Yolo county convened at Woodland, September 7th, 1863, pursuant to law. Present, Hon. I. N. Hoag, Judge.

The case of Tiery Wright vs. Spencer Glascock was called and set for trial Tuesday, September 8th, at 10 o'clock.

In the case of P. L. Duston against his creditors, it was ordered, on motion of Atty, that the plaintiff be released and discharged from all his debts and liabilities.

Wm. Fowler, sr., guardian of Hugh Fowler, vs. Chas. H. Gray. In consequence of some irregularity in the proceedings, C. H. Sprague, att'y for defendant, gave notice of a motion to dismiss said action.

John Plummer vs. Clark & Stewart. In this case, the proceedings not being conducted in accordance with the rules of the Court, J. T. Daley gave notice of motion to dismiss the action.

Court adjourned till to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Tuesday, September 8th, 1863.—Court met pursuant to adjournment.

Wm. Fowler, sr., guardian of Hugh Fowler, vs. Charles H. Gray. On motion of C. P. Sprague, att'y for defendant, the case was dismissed, and it was further ordered that the defendant recover of plaintiff costs of the court.

In the case of John Plummer vs. Clark and Stewart, on motion of J. T. Daley, att'y for defendants, it was ordered that the action be dismissed, and that the plaintiff pay to the defendants their costs of the court.

Tiery Wright vs. Spencer Glascock. In this case, C. P. Sprague & H. G. Burnett appeared for the plaintiff, and J. T. Daley for the defendant. The case having been argued, the Jury gave a verdict for the defendant.

In the case of John Plummer vs. Clark and Stewart. On motion of I. W. Jacobs, it was ordered that the case be placed on the calendar for trial at the next term of court, costs having been paid and the rules of the court having been complied with.

On motion the Court adjourned for the term.

A FIRE occurred in Sacramento at two o'clock Sunday morning, on Tenth street, between H and I, which resulted in the destruction of buildings, horses, mules, vehicles, merchandize, etc., to the value of \$25,000. Eighteen horses and mules perished.

The steamer Brother Jonathan brought down to San Francisco on her last trip from Victoria three miners from Cariboo, who deposited in the Mint about 12,000 ounces of gold dust worth upwards of \$209,000.

ON PAROLE.—The editor of the Democratic Standard, Virginia City, acknowledges the defeat of his party in that city very briefly. He says: "We met the enemy yesterday and are out on parole this morning."

TEN thousand dollars have been subscribed in Humboldt and along the line for the building of a telegraph to California. The line will be in operation in three months.

The British frigate Phaeton was at St. Thomas on the 4th of July, at noon. She hoisted the American flag at her main and fired 21 guns in honor of the independence of the United States. The flag of the American Consulate at St. Thomas dipped three times in acknowledgment.

BREACH OF TRUST.—Edward Brickle, of Desert Well, N. T., sent his hired man a few days ago to Carson city with team and \$300 in coin to buy provisions. The man failed to return, and has not been heard from since.

COPPER.—Holders of good Copper stock are firm in prices, and we hear of but little offering. The ship Washington, for Boston, carried 700 tons of ore averaging 20 per cent.

A sale of one c'aim in the Lancha Plana Company was made last week to a resident of Stockton, at \$6,000. It is stated that \$8,500 has since been offered. The Keystone has about 60 feet on the market here, held at about \$130. The mine is being developed with a large working force. Shipments have been limited for the last two weeks, and machinery is being erected for more effective operations. The shaft is down 280 feet.

The Napoleon is regularly sending down from 175 to 200 tons per month. Ore is now taken out at a depth of 165 feet. The main shaft has been sunk 185 feet.

In Placer county the different companies are vigorously at work, and a considerable amount of capital is being expended.

The Copper Hill Company is shipping good ore.

The Newton (Amador county) sends down about 100 tons monthly. This company is not incorporated, and has no stock in the market.—Ex.

THE inventor of the Monitor is about to become the recipient of a magnificent testimonial at the hands of a number of ship builders. It is a splendid model in eighteen carat solid gold, of the class monitors, weighs fourteen pounds, is perfect with machinery, and contains a music box which plays nine airs, among them the national airs of Sweden. Its length is eighteen inches. This splendid present cost \$7,000.

THE Sacramento steamer due here yesterday noon had not yet arrived at the time we went to press last night. In consequence we have no late war news. The dispatches to the Union in the earlier part of the week contain the important intelligence, that Burnside and Rosecrans are in possession of the whole of East Tennessee, with the exception of the Chattanooga region. Nothing of importance from Charleston, beyond that the siege is being steadily prosecuted.

Indictment of the Pirates.

The Grand Jury of the United States Circuit Court, have indicted the persons engaged in the Chapman affair, as pirates. The indictment avers:

Ridgeley Greathouse, late of the city and county of San Francisco, in the District and Circuit aforesaid, banker, and Ashbury Harpending, of the same place, trader; Alfred Lubery, of the same place, laborer; W. C. Maw, of the same place, mariner; Lorenzo L. Libby, of the same place, mariner; James Smith, of the same place, plasterer; Thomas W. Blund, of the same place, clerk; John McFadden, of the same place, attorney at law; Wm. D. Ward, of the same place, laborer; John E. Kent, of the same place, laborer; John Fletcher, of the same place, plasterer; Wm. W. Mosen, of the same place, surveyor; George W. Davis, of the same place, street contractor; Albion T. Crow, of the same place, clerk; M. H. Marshall, of the same place, laborer; Thomas Poole, of the same place, laborer; Alfred Amund, of the same place, mariner; Heery C. Boyd, of the same place, machinist; J. W. Place, carpenter; Richard H. Duval, of the same place, clerk; Gideon C. Jones, of the same place, trader; and Joseph G. Baldwin, of the same place, mill owner, each then and there being a citizen of the United States, did "on the 16th day of March, A. D. 1863, and on divers other days, as well before as after the above named day, at the City and County of San Francisco, in the District and Circuit aforesaid, with force of arms maliciously and traitorously aid, conspire, consult, consent and agree to and with each other, and other false traitors, whose names to the said Grand Jurors are unknown, to aid and assist the said citizens of the United States of America then and ever since in rebellion under said pretended Government, the Confederate States of America, in a hostile capture of vessels belonging to said United States of America, and the citizens thereof, and the prosecution of said rebellion against the United States of America."

The indictment further charges that said accused "unlawfully, falsely, maliciously, and traitorously did compass, imagine, and intend to raise and levy war, insurrection and rebellion against the United States, and to subvert and overthrow the government thereof in concert with the citizens of the United States then and ever since in rebellion, under said pretended government called the "Confederate States of America." Also, that the said parties, with force and arms maliciously and traitorously did procure, prepare, fit out and arm, and caused to be procured, prepared, fitted out and armed, a certain vessel called the J. M. Chapman, then lying and being in the port of San Francisco, in the District and Circuit aforesaid, to cruise on the high seas, and commit hostilities upon the citizens, property, and vessels of the said United States of America." And that the accused did, with the said vessel, called the J. M. Chapman, maliciously and traitorously sail and depart from said port of San Francisco, in the District and Circuit aforesaid, in the service of the said citizens of the United States, then and ever since in rebellion under said pretended Government called the Confederate States of America, against the United States, on a cruise upon the high seas, to commit hostilities upon the citizens, property, and vessels of the said United States, in contempt of the said United States of America, their Constitution and laws.

A MINING TRAGEDY.—A Cariboo correspondence of 20th August says:

A very melancholy story is told by a Mr Shibley and two others, who have lately returned from a prospecting trip down the Bear River. At a certain point by the river they found some white rags fastened up as flags or signals of distress, and upon searching the neighborhood they at last found a blanket, which, upon removal, was found to cover a body in a state of decomposition. They also found by the head of the body a tin cup, bottom up, upon which was scratched "Donald Munroe, of Inverness, Scotland, died of starvation, June, 1861." The poor fellow had quietly and composedly stretched himself out in his blankets, and covered himself carefully, that the incorruptible might put off the corruptible, and alone in this wilderness he passed from earth to the presence of his Creator.

BROUGHT DOWN.—Last evening, a constable of Granite Township brought from Folsom a colored man named Abram Gray, who is charged with grand larceny in having stolen two hundred and thirty dollars, last week, from a person employed on Fred Werner's ranch, in Yolo county. It seems that the victim, who had been imbibing rather freely, was taking a nap in the slaughter house, when Gray was sent to wake him up. Soon after this, Gray was missing, as also the money. The officers got on Gray's track, and he was arrested in Folsom. His examination will probably take place to-day or to-morrow before a Justice of the Peace in Washington.—Bee, 9th inst.

THE people of Nevada Territory have voted almost unanimously in favor of calling a Convention to frame a Constitution for the State of Washoe, and the delegates elected thereto are all Union men.

THE French Mint is coining Mexican dollars for circulation in Mexico.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—A young man named Benjamin W. Mason, while at work in the saw mill of Leech & Co., at Buena Vista, near this place, on Tuesday last, was almost instantly killed. He was oiling the carriage of the mill, and his head came in contact with a portion of the carriage and a timber, by which accident, literally speaking, his head was mashed to pieces.—*Grass Valley National.*

Lincoln's Letter.

Chicago, September 3d.

The following is the substance of the letter from the President to the Union mass meeting to be held at Springfield, Illinois, to-day. After regretting his inability to attend, he says: There are those who are dissatisfied with me. To such I would say, You desire peace and you blame me that you don't have it. But how can we attain it? There are but three conceivable ways: First—To suppress the rebellion by force of arms. This I am trying to do. Are you for it? If you are, so far we are agreed. The second way is to give up the Union to dissolution. I am against this. If you are, you should say so plainly. If you are not for force, nor yet for dissolution, there only remains some imaginable compromise. I do not believe any compromise embracing the maintenance of the Union can be possible. All that I learn lead to a directly opposite belief. The strength of the rebellion is its military. The army dominates the country and all the people within its range. Any offer of terms made by any man or men within that range, in opposition to that army, is simply nothing, for the present, because such man or men have no power whatever to enforce their side of the compromise if one were made with them. Compromise, to be effective, must be made, either with those who control the rebel army, or with the people first liberated from the domination of that army by the success of our army. Allow me to assure you that no word or intimation from the rebel army or from any of the men controlling it, in relation to any peace or compromise, has ever come to my knowledge or belief. All charges or intimations to the contrary are deceptive and groundless. And I promise you that if any such proposition shall hereafter come, it shall not be rejected or be kept secret from you. You dislike the emancipation proclamation, and perhaps would have it retracted. You say it is unconstitutional. I think that the Constitution empowers its Commander in Chief with the laws of war in time of war. Now, the most that can be said is that slaves are property. Is there—has there ever been—any question that by the laws of property, both of enemies and friends, may be taken when needed? And is it not needed when our taking it helps us or hurts the enemy? Armies would even destroy the enemy's property when they cannot use it, and even destroy their own to keep it from the enemy. Civilized belligerents do all in their power to help themselves or hurt their enemy, except a few things regarded as barbarous. The proclamation is law, and valid or not valid. If it is valid, it cannot be retracted any more than the dead can be brought to life. Some of you profess to think that a retraction would operate favorably to the Union. Why better after retraction than before the issue? There was more than a year and a half of trial to suppress the rebellion before the proclamation was issued; at least one hundred days of which passed under an explicit notice that it was coming unless averted by those in revolt returning to their allegiance. The war has certainly progressed as favorably since the issue of the proclamation as before. I know, as fully as any one can know the opinions of others, that some of the commanders of armies in the field, who have given us our most important victories, believe the emancipation policy and colored troops constitute the heaviest blows yet dealt to the rebellion; that one, at least, of these important successes could not have been achieved unless it had been for the aid of black soldiers. Among the commanders holding these views are some who have never had any affinity with what is called Abolitionism, or with Republican party politics, but who hold them purely as military opinions. I submit their opinions as being entitled to some weight against the objections often urged that emancipation and arming the blacks are unwise as military measures, and were not adopted as such in good faith. You say that you will not fight to free negroes. Some of them seem to be willing enough to fight for you; but no matter, I use them exclusively to save the Union. Whenever you shall have conquered all resistance to the Union, if I shall urge you to continue fighting, it will be an apt time then for you to declare that you will not fight to free negroes. I thought that in your struggle for the Union, to whatever extent negroes should cease helping the enemy, to that extent it would weaken the enemy in his resistance to you. Do you think differently? I thought that whatever negroes can be got to serve as soldiers, leaves just so much less for white soldiers to do in saving the Union. Does it appear otherwise to you? But negroes, like other people, act upon motives. Why should they do anything for us if we will do nothing for them? If they stake their lives for us the must be prompted by the strongest motive—even the promise of freedom, and the promise made must be kept.

MURDERED BY INDIANS AT OWENS RIVER.—Kinson, who arrived at Aurora September 7th with the express from Owens river reports that four men who had gone about thirty-five miles above the ford after some timber were attacked by a party of Indians numbering about thirty, and three were instantly killed, the other escaping by swimming the river through the rapids. Kinson could not give their names.

Amendments to Bill in Equity.

Amendment 1st. Paragraph XI. is amended so as to read as follows after the word "due" by inserting: "Whereas as in fact the said Cooper had received from the personal and of the real estate the sum of six thousand dollars or thereabouts, which he did not appropriate to the payment of debts of the estate, nor did he render any account thereof to the said Probate Court or Judge, nor was that fact mentioned or disclosed in any of the proceedings, but the same was studiously concealed."

Amendment 2d. Paragraph XII. is amended by adding at the end thereof the words: "And among those presented from being present was one H. Lee, who went to the town of Fremont for the purpose of bidding at said sale, and prepared to bid as high as \$20,000 and prepared to pay that sum therefore, but when the said Lee and a number of other persons came on the day named for the sale and found the place of sale changed, they could not procure a conveyance to the said new place of sale."

Amendment 3d. Paragraph XIII. is amended by inserting after the word "present" the words "by the name of Abner Bryan"—and also after the word "bidding" the words "and they paid to said Bryan \$200 for that purpose."

Amendment 4th. Paragraph XIV. is amended so as to read as follows:

XIV. Your orators further show that there were several other persons who were desirous of bidding at the said sale and of becoming purchasers of the said rancho, and who would have bid a much larger sum than was bid at said sale, and they had endeavored and attempted to be present at the said sale, but they had been prevented from being present at said sale and from the opportunity of becoming purchasers by the fraudulent contrivances and practices of the said confederates, and they intended and threatened to move to set aside the said sale, and for a re-sale, and they would have done so if the said confederates had not induced them to desist from so doing by improper means and influences with Joseph Winston, who was then the Probate Judge of said Solano county, and upon whom it devolved to confirm or reject the said sale. They agreed that he the said Winston should have and receive and he did have and receive in fulfillment and performance of the said corrupt agreement two thousand acres of the said land at the nominal price of twenty cents per acre. To another one who went to Fremont to attend said sale and who was unable to be present at the place of sale for the causes aforesaid, by the name of Hastings, they paid a large sum of money. With another one, the said Lee, who was as aforesaid prevented from attending the said sale and who was a practicing Attorney and Counselor at Law, they agreed to employ him to perform the trifling service of moving a confirmation of the sale, and in pretence of payment for such services, but in reality as a compensation and as a reward for abstaining from resisting the confirmation and from moving to set aside the said sale, they the said confederates agreed to pay him and did pay him four thousand dollars in cash and agreed to convey to him or caused to be conveyed to him two thousand acres of the said land, and the said Lee thereupon moved a confirmation of said sale, and thereupon an order was made by said Probate Court of Solano

county purporting or attempting and intending to confirm said sale after some sham and pretended opposition, and the said Cooper was ordered to make a conveyance to the purchasers, and he accordingly made executed and delivered a deed of the said Rancho Rio de Jesus Maria, reciting the said petition, order of sale, and order of confirmation.

Your Orators are informed and believe and therefore aver, that the said several persons hereinbefore charged in respect to said sale and other proceedings touching the said Estate, acted under the belief that the said Hardy died without any heirs, and that said estate was a vacant inheritance.
