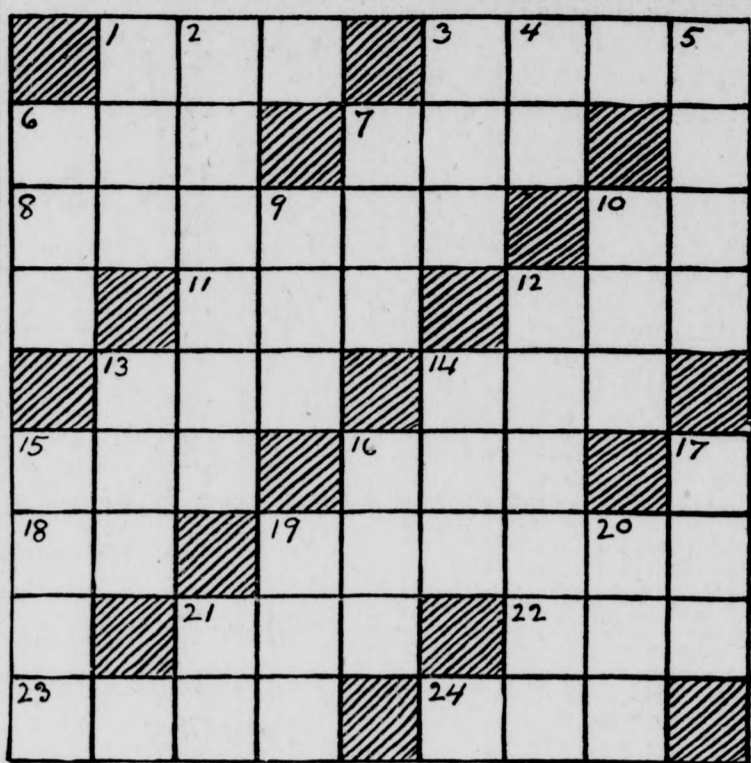

HOW TO SOLVE THE CROSS WORD PUZZLE

The definitions are numbered to correspond with the numbers on the diagram. Any word defined in the text under "HORIZONTAL" will begin at its number, shown on the diagram, and will extend all the way across to the first black space to the right of that number. That is, the word must begin in the square that contains its identifying number, and extend as far as the white squares continue uninterrupted. Any word defined under "VERTICAL" will also begin in the white space that contains its number, but will extend downward as far as the white squares remain uninterrupted.

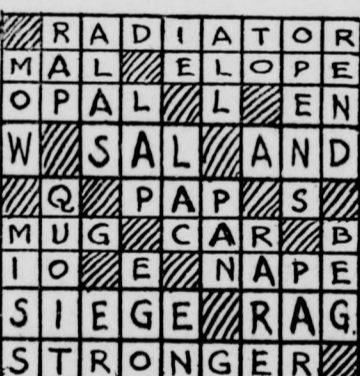

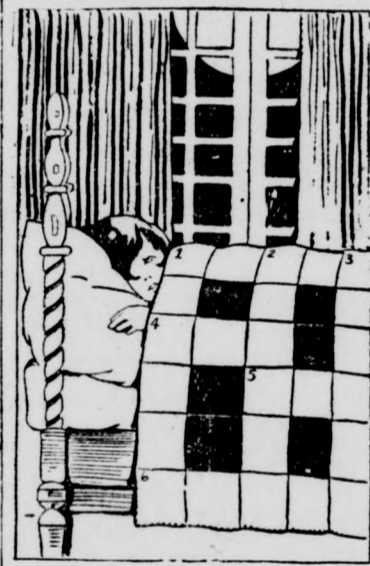

UNCLE WIGGILY'S WIND WAGGLE

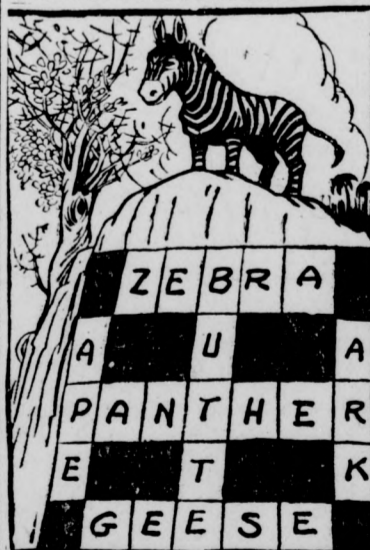

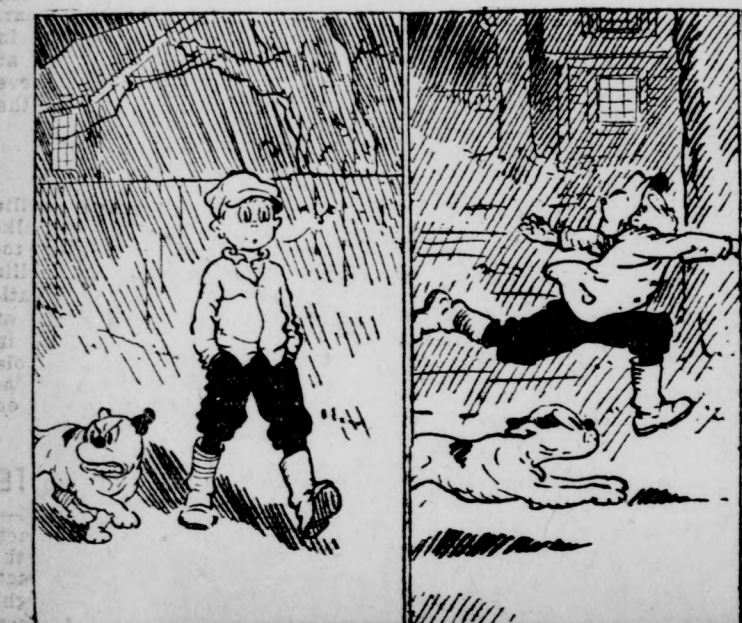

ROAD TO CALVARY EDMONDS' THEME

Presbyterian Pastor Takes Congregation In Spirit On Way To Cross

As a preliminary to the celebration of the resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ, at the Easter-tide, Rev. W. E. Edmonds led his audience in spirit to "the place called Calvary," at the Sunday morning service in the Glendale Presbyterian church...

"In these simple words does the inspired writer chronicle the most momentous event in the history of the world—the place which is called Calvary. Have you been there, not only for pardon of your sins, but for power, and to catch God's vision for your lives? We all need to go to Calvary, to understand its meaning and to yield to its purpose."

"I stand dumbfounded as I see a world gone mad in so-called celebration of the birth of Christ, but no-one seems to be going wild over the tremendous fact of the incarnation, namely, that God was in Christ, reconciling the world to Himself."

"I stand dumbfounded as I see a world almost beside itself in an extravagant, superficial observance of the stupendous fact of the literal bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ that we call Easter. Thousands, led by movie and grand opera stars, and by silver-tongued orators, climb the hills early on Easter morning and engage in what seems almost like cheap celebration and desecration, rather than commemoration."

Why, in God's name, why does the world not understand that Easter means everything or nothing, in proportion to whether or not, when Christ rose from the dead, we rose with Him, and by faith and devotion positionally with Him in the Heavens? It is we then be risen with Christ, let us seek those things which are above. You celebrants of Christmas and Easter, make more of Calvary, for apart from Golgotha, your Christian and Easter celebrations are a farce and belong with the tom-tom of heathen deities.

Calvary's Message
"For what does Calvary stand? What is its message? Calvary is the place where sin comes out in its true colors. There are no mistaks at Calvary; it stands outside the rush and roar of the world. God is summoning us to Calvary today, we who have so oft made vows, only to break them; who have gone to the Lord's table professing to be the children of God, and have gone out to live like the worldling! These sins and weights and doubts, let us drag them out into the light of Calvary—for Calvary is God's finding-out place; Calvary is God's X-ray, where sin is revealed as sin, and sin, when it is finished, brings forth death."

"Again, Calvary is the place of heartbreak. The Bible is full of records of heartbreak: Abraham, with his only son, on Mount Moriah; Jacob mourning over Joseph slain. But at Calvary, God's heart broke, as there in the darkness His Son bowed His head under the weight of our sins, and nine and cried out: "Why hast Thou forsaken Me? Go thou to Calvary and see Him and learn the meaning of the Cross of Christ, "for a broken and contrite heart, O God, Thou wilt not despise."

Stands for Salvation
"Calvary is also a place where victory has been won. It stands for salvation, the complete defeat of the devil and the powers of darkness; here the debt was paid and, through faith in the atoning sacrifice, the sinner goes free. Calvary is the place of justification. Men often feel that there is something further to be done, but Christ said: "It is finished. We must go on to perfection," or there will be no victory in life. A man may be truly saved and yet have no triumph over sin in his life. Many a believer is living a seamy life spiritually, one day up and another day down; now winning, now losing. O, let us go back to Calvary; there is safety there."

Foodstuffs Advanced
Perceptibly In Price
SACRAMENTO, March 31.—Foodstuffs advanced in price for the quarter ending March 1, according to W. G. Merrill, state purchasing agent. Flour jumped \$1.50 per barrel over the preceding quarter, standing at \$9.14 per barrel on March 1. Sugar has increased from \$6.05 per hundredweight in December, 1924, to \$6.35. Ham and bacon showed an average increase of six cents per pound and fresh meat advanced 2 cents per pound during the period mentioned. Dried fruits show a slight increase in price.

BLOOD POISONING REMEDY IS FOUND

Ordinary Aniline Dyes Are Used To Counteract Work of Bacteria

NEW YORK, March 31.—Relief from the dread ravages of blood poisoning and a general advance in many branches of bacteriology are forecast as the result of a discovery growing out of several years of experimentation by Dr. John Woolman Churchman, a member of the staff of the Loomis laboratory and associated in hygiene at Cornell university's medical school.

The remedy, which has had good results in many cases in which it has been tried, lies in simply dyeing the bacteria with aniline dyes such as are used in coloring cloth. Experiments already have been made on infected throats, middle ear disease, suppuring or pus-forming joints, infected wounds and general infections with great success. The treatment of pyorrhea is believed likely to be put on a sound basis by the use of an aniline dye, and it now seems probable that their use may make possible the cure of certain skin infections without incision, Dr. Churchman said, continuing:

"A particular dye is selected for a particular disease, as special dyes are used for special fabrics. For instance, gentian violet and acriflavine are used for skin infections usually. It is strange to note how certain dyes cause an extraordinary suspension of vitality in bacteria, even when used in weak solution. Used with proper care, they can prevent the growth of organisms thought to be quite resistant. Injected into the blood, aniline dyes have successfully combatted general infections or blood poisoning. Solutions of dyes of certain strength left in cavities like the joints have been found powerful enough to check the effect of the infection, without damaging the tissues. Their lack of irrigating properties has led to their use in skin infections. But because the tissues can so easily be damaged by dyes which may be poisonous in too large quantities, great care must be used in the cure. The results are difficult to interpret but indicate that many forms of septicemia will be successfully fought with dyes in the near future."
