Glendale's Officials Favor Senate Bill No. 178 On Colorado Dam Plan

Urging the adoption of Senate bill 178, providing for the Colorado river dam project to supply water to Southern California, the City Council today passed a resolution favoring the measure and instructed City Manager V. B. Stone to send telegrams to all Southern California senators and assemblymen in the state Legislature to exert their utmost to secure its passage.

Immediate action on the project is necessary, in the opinion of Stone, if future development of the San Fernando valley is to be provided for. The San Fernando valley can easily accommodate a population of 1,000,000, he said; Glendale 250,000 and other valley cities in proportion. Los Angeles, he said, will be a city of 6,000,000 and the entire metroolitan area will probably have

This bulletin is issued by Richardson D. White, superintendent of Glendale city schools; J. Harold Williams, Ph. D., research director, and the following editorial committee, composed of teachers of the city schools, Carrie M. Noble, Wilson school; Emma Saxton, Magnolia school, and Norman R. Whytock, Glendale Interme-

Percentage Small
It is interesting to note that while many California cities are struggling with their foreign pupils, the elementary school enrollment of Glendale is characterized by a uniquely homogeneous racial group of children. The number of white pupils is found to be slightly less than 98 per cent of the entire school population as compared to slightly more than 2 per cent for all other races

Glendale's Move To Increase Cross-Country Speed Gets L. A. Backing

Glendale's move for more rapid train schedules between Chicago and the Pacific coast has struck a sympathetic response. A. G. Arnoll, secretary-manager of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, announced today that the Los Angeles chamber will immediately take up the fight for rapid transportation and will conduct a systematic survey to determine where and to what extent present running-time can be cut. In making the announcement, Secretary Arnoll emphasized the fact that rapid New York and middle-west train service to Florida is one of the main contributing factors to that state's lure to tourists. Southern California must have equally good service over the railroads to remain in competition with Florida,

Speed War Feared Present fast running-time of sixty-eight hours to Chicago can

be bettered by eight to ten hours, is the belief of investigators, it was said. Only a "gentlemen's agreement" between the three leading rail lines into Southern California prevents these lines from lopping many hours off their present schedules.

Without the agreement, a dangerous speed war would result, ailroad officials maintain. Average speeds of from twenty-nine to thirty-two miles per hour on some of the fastest trains can easily be bettered without jeopardizing the safety of patrons and pedestrians,

however, it was pointed out.

Mr. Arnoll said that although
railroad officials would have nothing to say in regard to the proposed speeding up, he was inclined to believe a saving of from five to eight hours can easily be effected and that at the proper time the railroads will be the first to endorse the faster sched-

ules.
As an added feature of the better transportation campaign it is hoped to have cars, and, later, full trains, dispatched through from Atlantic seaboard cities without change at Chicago or other points, Secretary Arnoll said.

IF YOU DON'T WANT-Worry, don't invest in wildcat stock.

Criticism, don't get elected to public office. Blame, don't assume any responsibility. Friends, then impose on their generosity. Peace of mind, then outrage your own conscience. Customers, then treat them with scant courtesy. The favor of God, then close your mind to goodness.

ELECT BIG MEN

When many of us, adopted Californians, lived in cities and towns in the east and middle west we did not have to think ahead very far in planning for our private business or for municipal improvements. What sufficed for today would be sufficient for tomorrow. Our officials could be myopic as far as civic problems were concerned and still do very well. Growth in population was not one of the things for which we had to plan or with which we had to deal very often.

But it is different in California. Here we are very much like the parents of the rapidly growing boy who find it difficult to keep him properly clothed. Trousers and sleeves must be lengthened frequently or garments discarded for larger ones, or the boy becomes the object of ridicule because he looks "as if he had been picked too soon." Our parents used to get around this problem by buying us clothes two or three sizes too large for us, then they could take a breathing spell while we grew into them.

The "city fathers" of a rapidly growing community like Glendale must resort to the same tactics if they keep up with our growth properly. What fits us today will be outgrown tomorrow. We, as a city, cannot plan for this year alone. We must look forward five, ten, twenty years. Our worst enemies are forced to admit that there is no limit beyond which Southern California cannot go in the next decade or two.

Glendale is large for her age, but we can't stop growing now. We have forged ahead of cities that were far in advance of us ten years ago, and there is no reason why we should not maintain the lead we now have.

Glendale cannot build for today alone. Our city officials must be men and women who can see five and ten years ahead and who will shape our municipal policies with an eye on the future. Little men will not do for Glendale. We must have people with a vision of Glendale's possibilities. Remember this,

LATIN TEMPERAMENT

Latin peoples are not famed for self-restraint, neither are Latin nations, and when President Coolidge undertook to arbitrate in an argument between Chile and Peru he demonstrated his courage.

When the president gave the decision to Chile, the Peruvians, who had asked him to settle their differences with their neighbors, accused him of "favoring the guilty party." Now, it is said, they are tearing down coats of arms over American consulates in Peru, holding public meetings to invent new terms of epithet to hurl at the American chief, sending telegrams of protest to the American state department, passing denunciatory resolutions in their Congress and burning effigies of the American president.

Someone explains the difference between the stability of our North American republic and the changeable character and unsettled condition of many republics in Central and South America as being due to the difference in temperament of the people. We Anglo-Saxons, or Nordics, accept the will of the majority or the decision of an arbiter and drop the matterexcept when the umpire rules against the home team. The campaign preceding an election may be characterized by the most intense bitterness on both sides. But when the election is over the will of the majority is known and all trace of acrimony vanishes. We help to perpetuate the republic by accept-

In Latin countries the minority does not always accept the will of the majority. If the result of an election is not pleasing, a revolution may follow.

Peru was a party to the invitation to President Coolidge to arbitrate in this international argument. Refusal to abide by his decision seems childish to us. But perhaps we should be charitable and lay it to racial temperament.

GARRULOUS WOMEN

Woman has always had the name of demanding the last word in any conversation, and it was predicted that when she got into politics she would turn our legislative bodies into "gabfests." But it has been proved that the talkative sex has been unjustly accused. Women elected to Congress and to the state legislatures have had very little to say.

Miss Jeanette Rankin of Montana, the first woman elected to Congress, was very quiet. In fact, she was criticised for not making herself heard in Congress. Miss Alice Roberts of Oklahoma had very little to say and she did not particularly enjoy the loquacity of the male members of Congress. 

ROAD TO CALVARY EDMONDS' THEME

Presbyterian Pastor Takes Congregation In Spirit On Way To Cross

As a preliminary to the celebration of the resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ, at the Eastertide, Rev. W. E. Edmonds led his audience in spirit to "the place called Calvary," at the Sunday morning service in the Glendale Presbyterian church, using the text: "And when they were come to the place called Calvary, there they crucified him, and the two malefactors, one on the right hand and the other on the left.' He said:

"In these simple words does the inspired writer chronicle the most momentous event in the history of the world—'the place which is called Calvary.' Have you been there, not only for par-don of your sins, but for power, and to catch God's vision for your lives? We all need to go to Calvary, to understand its meaning and to yield to its purpose.

"I stand dumfounded as I see a world gone mad in so-called celebration of the birth of Christ. but no-one seems to be going wild over the tremendous fact of the Incarnation, namely, that 'God was in Christ, reconciling the world to Himself.'

"I stand dumbfounded as I see a world almost beside itself in an extravagant, superficial observance of the stupendous fact of the literal bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ that we call Easter. Thousands, led by movie and grand opera stars, and by silvertongued orators, climb the hills early on Easter morning and engage in what seems almost like cheap celebration and desecration, rather than commemoration.

Why, in God's name, why does the world not understand that Easter means everything or nothing, in proportion to whether or not, when Christ rose from the dead, we rose with Him, and by faith are seated positionally with Him in the Heavenlies? If we then be risen with Christ, let us seek those things which are above. You celebrants of Christmas and Easter, make more of Calvary, for apart from Golgotha, your Christian and Easter celebrations are a farce and belong with the tom-tom of heathen

BLOOD POISONING REMEDY IS FOUND

Ordinary Aniline Dyes Are Used To Counteract Work of Bacteria

NEW YORK, March 31.-Relief from the dread ravages of blood poisoning and a general advance in many branches of bacteriology are forecast as the result of a discovery growing out of several years of experimentation by Dr. John Woolman Churchman, a member of the staff of the Loomis laboratory and associate in hygiene at Cornell university's medical school.

The remedy, which has had good results in many cases which it has been tried, lies in simply dyeing the bacteria with aniline dyes such as are used in coloring cloth. Experiments already have been made on infected throats, middle ear disease, suppurating or pus forming joints, infected wounds and general infections with great success. The treatment of pyorrhea is believed likely to be put on a sound basis by the use of an ani-line dye, and it now seems probable that their use may possible the cure of certain skin infections without incision, Dr. Churchman said, continuing: Use Explained

"A particular dye is selected for a particular disease, as special dyes are used for special fabrics. For instance, gentian violet and acriflavine are used for skin infections usually. It is strange to note how certain dyes cause an extraordinary suspension of vitality in bacteria, even when used in weak solution. Used with proper care, they can prevent the growth of organisms thought to be quite resistant.

"Injected into the blood, aniline dyes have successfully combatted general infections or blood poisoning. Solutions of dyes of certain strength left in cavities like the joints have been found powerful enough to check the effect of the infection, without damaging the tissues. Their lack of irrigating properties has led to their use in skin infections.

"But because the tissues can so easily be damaged by dyes which may be poisonous in too large quantities, great care must be used in the cure. The results are difficult to interpret but indicate that many forms of septicaemia will be successfully fought with dyes in the near fu-
