





Ogon and Willard.

Our one Ogon Japan plum tree was received, as has been stated, in October, 1894. The tree was slightly damaged by the tornado of the next year. As we have said, the tree, this season, was so heavily laden that it was necessary to give support to most of the branches. The plums began to ripen July 24. They average somewhat smaller than the Willard, and are much of the same shape, being round with a sature sometimes pronounced, sometimes not. The skin is a bright, unbroken yellow, the flesh yellow, solid, fairly juicy, but of inferior quality, but excellent for preserving-not canning. The flesh parts freely from the pit. The Ogon is reported as a shy bearer in some places. Its fault, aside from quality, is that it bears too freely. One must either prop the trees or thin out the fruit. Comparatively few of the plums have rotted, though the season has been favorable to rot. Many have cracked, some slightly, some nearly to the pit. This may be due to too much rain. The Ogon comes in just about as the Willard goes out. As judged by one season, the Ogon, and as ties. We recommend them unreservedly. judged by four seasons, the Abundance Texas Farm and Ranch.

are absolutely curculio-proof at the Rural Grounds.

The Willard is of a deep red color with the tiniest dots of yellow, so that the skin looks as if sprinkled with gold dust. The plums average about 11/2 inch in diameter; they are nearly round with a slight suture. The flesh is yellow, juicy and of better quality than that of the Ogon, though a shade inferior to the Abundance. To our taste, there is a decided banana flavor about the Willard, though no other writer in describing it, in so far as we know, has alluded to it.

The Willard Plum, as judged by this season, is no less curculio-proof than the Abundance or Ogon. There is no longer any doubt about it that the best of the Japan plums are valuable acquisitions for many parts of our country, and we are more than glad that we were fortunate enough to be the first of American papers to praise them from actual experience-Rural New Yorker.

The Burbank Plum.

The Burbank plum is again bearing a large crop of fruit this season as it did last.

This variety of plum has a habit, as far as my experience goes, of setting four times as much fruit as the tree ought to ripen. Five-year-old trees on light sandy soil well fertilized have borne crops for three seasons, and each season there were so many upon the trees that to have fine fruit thinning was necessary.

The Burbank is quite different from some other varieties of plums; they hang to the tree and do not drop-so that a tree of this variety will carry to maturity a great number of plums, but if not thinned out very heavily the fruit will not be large.

This season I have seen the difference in thinning and not thinning in a marked degree. Some trees were thinned early, and in a week the plums were a third larger on these trees than others which had not yet been thinned .- The Central States Fruit Grower, St. Joseph, Mich.

The Botan or Abundance plum is immense this season. The trees are fairly staggering under their load of fruit. The same may be said of the Burbank. No one will fail to have plums in abundance who plants and cares for these two varie-

Our Peach Trees are budded on seedlings grown from Tennessee and Alabama Pits. They are free from Aphis or Root-knots, and have fewer borers than those from most nurseries.

We can supply beautiful medium and small-sized peach trees this year. The lands upon which our peach trees are grown this year produces a light, well-matured tree, with fine roots. These trees will answer well the purpose of "June Buds," and are very much better to transplant, as they will be well matured to the terminal bud, while June Buds are often tender at the tips. The little trees we offer should not be confounded with the little culls left after the larger trees have been dug and offered so cheaply by other nurseries. Our peach trees have been grown with especial reference to the Southern trade, where small sizes are mostly wanted. The Yellows and Rosette are unknown in this locality, and we have been careful not to bring in any buds from affected localities.

RATES.-As we send this list to the trade only, we make the difference in prices between the 10, 100 and 1000 rates very slight—simply sufficient, as a rule, to cover the difference in the expense of handling in the smaller numbers. We uniof handling in the smaller numbers. We uni-formly tie in bunches of 10, when consistent with the order, and we suggest to our customers to make their orders for varieties in multiples of 10 as far as practicable. Orders for 50 and not over 300 trees, if for not less than 10 of a variety, will be charged at the rate per hundred. Orders requiring 300 trees or more, and not less than 10 of a variety, will be filed at the lowest quoted prices. Orders for less than 10 trees of one variety, will be charged at the rate per ten.

SEASON.—Our packing and shipping season begins by the 20th of September, and continues until about the first of March.

We have great advantages to offer here in early shipments for the North in Spring. We do not accept orders for trees we do not grow, as we never buy trees to sell again. You can de-pend upon us for fresh dug trees. Each order is taken up separately, and not until it is wanted for shipment.

SHIPPING DIRECTIONS .- We respectfully beg our patrons to furnish us with explicit direc-tions as to shipping, and the mode of conveyance by which they desire trees forwarded. When no by which the directions are given, we forward according to the best of our judgment. But in no case do we assume any responsibility as to safe delivery and condition of Trees and Plants after a proper shipment by us.

RELEASE.—When prepayment of freight is not required, we will Release and Guarantee, and required, we will Kelease and Guarantee, and take forwarder's receipt and mail to consignee. It is left to the option of the shipper of trees over some railroads, whether he will release them or not under the clause "Value less than \$5,00 per 100 lbs." If released under this clause, the freight is less on roads governed by this classification, and we will assume it to be proper to make this release, without reference to the to make this release, without reference to the value of the trees, unless instructed to the con-trary. This clause does not apply upon roads under some of the district classifications, and because of this confusion we will not be held responsible for any oversight to release, unless instructed by our customers. Claims for delay or loss must be made to the forwarders.

PACKAGES.—The cost of package must be added to the prices quoted in this list, as follows:

Hores 30 inches square, from 7½ to 9 feet long; as the trees may require, each \$2.50; boxes 24 inches, \$2.00; boxes 18 inches, \$1.50; bales from 25c. to 75c. each.

PACKING.—Goods will be packed in moss, and especial care taken to insure their arrival in the best condition.

ASSORTMENTS .- We do not require customers Assocrates, we do not require customers to take an assocrament they do not wish, but will sell one variety alone if desired. If any substi-tution can be allowed, either in grade or variety, it should be so stated when making the order. As a rule we do not substitute without permission.

CAUTION.—We accept all orders upon the con-dition that they shall be void, should any injury befall the trees from frost, hail, storm, fire, or other causes over which we have no control

To northern customers, who wish to lay in stock for Spring trade, we will ship late in Fall or early in Spring, and allow time for payment till May 15th. If shipment is required in the Fall for Spring use, a note is to be given upon receipt of the trees. We do not allow any discount for cash, but we make our prices low to command cash. or prompt returns. In orders command cash, out we make our prices low to command cash, or prompt returns. In orders when the time is not mentioned, 30 days is to be understood. Interest at the rate of 8 per cent per annum must be paid on over due accounts. Should prices be changed, either higher or lower, during the season, the prices ruling at the time the order is made, are expected to stand.

If trees show any signs of shrivelling upon arrival, they can usually be restored by being thoroughly watered and buried entirely under the ground for two or three days.
