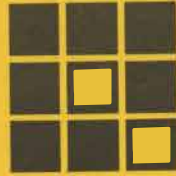

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Urban Talks Eye Coming Decade

Consolidation of city and county government, loss of manufacturing industry and a critical shortage of low and middle income housing could be among the most significant developments of the next 10 years in the Greater Rochester Area, according to local residents who responded to a questionnaire in connection with the RIT-sponsored Urban Policy Conference.

The questionnaire results were distributed last week at the second session of the conference, "Alternative Futures for Greater Rochester," being conducted at RIT's Metropolitan Center by the Washington, D.C., based Brookings Institution.

The more than 100 government, business and community leaders who are attending the series of 13 one-day Urban Policy Conference sessions are using the questionnaire results in an examination of alternate future growth and development policies for the Greater Rochester Area.

Other developments predicted in the survey included: intensified racial tensions and unrest; polarization of urban--suburban populations; continuation of central city renewal program; and county-wide school integration.

Also at last week's session, the Rochester Center for Governmental and Community Research released new 20-year population projections for the Greater Rochester Area.

The calculated projections show what population shifts will occur if present

Gold placed fourth in the Connecticut

state championships last year, as a high school senior.

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trends continue: by 1990, the city of Rochester will be 41 per cent non-white, compared to 17.6 per cent in 1970; the county's population will shift from predominately young to predominately middle-aged by 1990; the City will continue to lose population and the county will continue to gain, but the rate of change will slow.

"The Conference participants and the Brookings staff are using this data to help project the political, social, economic and environmental conditions that can be expected in the Greater Rochester Area during the two-time periods 1972--1975 and 1975--1980," Edward P. Curtis, Jr., vice president for RIT public affairs, said.

"If, based on research and discussions, the conference participants determine we're not headed in the right direction, they will outline alternate futures that appear more beneficial to the area," he said.

The conference will continue March 23 and 24.

'Photo-Science' Seminar Here March 20-24

An intensive and novel, five-day program designed to assist engineers, scientists, and technicians in applying photography to data acquisition will be sponsored by the College of Graphic Arts and Photography March 20-24.

Titled "The Photographic Process as a Scientific Instrument," the program is divided up into five related daily segments. Participants may register for the entire session or for the entire session or for the particular one day segments that meet their own requirements.

Class sessions will run from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each day, with optional evening seminar sessions. Although a bachelor of science degree or equivalent experience in physics, chemistry, or engineering is assumed, registration is open.
