ECLIPSES IN THE YEAR 1842.

There will be five Eclipses this year—three of the Sun and two of the Moon, in the following order:—

The first will be an Eclipse of the Sun on the 11th of January, at 11h. 19m. in the morning, which will be invisible in all North America, but visible and annular in the South Pacific Ocean.

The second will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon on the 26th of January, at 0h. 54m. in the afternoon, and consequently invisible in the North American Provinces.

The third will be a total Eclipse of the Sun on the 8th of July, at 2h. 5m. in the morning, and of course invisible in New Brunswick.—The path of total phase passes through part of Spain, the South of France, North of Italy, Austria, Russia, Tartary, Chinese Tartary, and China, to the Pacific Ocean. In the North West part of this Continent a partial Eclipse will be visible.

The fourth will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon, on the morning of the 22d July, at 6h. 1m. in the morning, invisible in the North East part of the United States and in this Province, but visible in the Southern States.

The fifth Eclipse will be an annular one of the Sun, on the 31st of December, at 2h. 6m. in the afternoon, invisible in North America. It will be visible throughout South America, and in the neighbouring Seas, including most of the South Pacific Ocean, and a great part of the Southern Ocean, extending to upwards of 70 degrees of south latitude.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS.

The Planet Venus will be *Morning Star* from the beginning of the year to its superior conjunction with the Sun, March 5. From this, to its inferior conjunction, December 18, it will be *Evening Star*; and from this, to the end of the year, it will be *Morning Star*.

Jupiter will be *Morning Star* from the beginning of the year, to its opposition, July 10; and thence *Evening Star*, to the end of the year.

Mars will be *Evening Star* from the beginning of the year to its conjunction, June 25; and from thence to the end of the year, *Morning Star*.

OLD AND NEW STYLE.

The Julian Year, introduced by Julius Cæsar, 45 years before the Birth of Christ, made every fourth year, without exception, a Leap Year. This, however, was an over correction; for it supposed the length of the tropical year to be 655 $\frac{1}{4}$ days, which is too great, and induces an error of 7 days in 900 years. Accordingly, as early as the year 1414, it was perceived that the equinoxes were gradually moving from the 21st of March and September, where they ought always to have fallen, had the Julian Year been exact. A new reform of the Calendar was thus required; and it took place under the popedom of Gregory XIII., by the omission of ten nominal days after the 4th of October, 1582, so that the next day was called the 15th, and not the 5th. This change was immediately adopted in all Roman Catholic countries, but tardily in the countries of Protestantism.

In England, *the change of Style*, as it was called, took place after the 2d day of September, 1752, eleven nominal days being then struck out; so that the last day of Old Style being the 2d, the 1st of New Style (the next day,) was called the 14th, instead of the 3d. The same legislative enactment which established the Gregorian Year in England in 1752, shortened the preceding year (1751,) by a full quarter. Previous to that time, the year was held to begin with the 25th of March, and the year 1751 accordingly did so; but that year was not suffered to run out, being supplanted, on the 1st of January, by the year 1752, which it was enacted should commence on that day.

Russia is now the only country, in Europe, in which the Old Style is still adhered to, and the difference between other European and Russian dates amounts, at present, to about two weeks.—*American Almanack.*

SIGNALS

Made at Partridge Island on the approach of Vessels to the Harbour of Saint John.

- One Ball close, for one square-rigged vessel.
- One Ball, half hoisted, for two square-rigged vessels.
- Two Balls, close, for three square-rigged vessels.
- Two Balls, separated, for four square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant, of any colour, for five square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant, under a Ball, for six square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant, over a Ball, half hoisted, for seven square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant under two Balls, close, for eight square-rigged vessels.
- A Pendant between two Balls, separate, for nine square-rigged vessels.
- A Flag, of any colour, for ten or more vessels.

[The above are hoisted at the East or West yard-arm, according to the quarter the vessels first appear in, and when their rig can be made out, the following descriptive colours will be hoisted at the mast head :]

- A Union Jack for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.
- " with a red pendant over, for a two decker.
- " with a blue pendant over, for a frigate.
- " with a white ditto, for a small armed vessel.
- A blue pendant, for a merchant ship or barque.
- A red ditto, for a merchant brig or brigantine.
- A white and blue ditto, for a foreign square-rigged vessel.
- A white ditto, without a ball, for a topsail schooner or sloop.
- A flag, blue and white horizontally, a neutral fleet.
- A pendant, white and blue, a neutral man-of-war.
- A blue flag, a neutral merchant ship.
- A red, white and blue flag, an enemy's fleet.
- A red, white and blue pendant, an enemy's man-of-war.
- A Union Jack over neutral or enemy's signals, the vessel is detained or a prize.
- A white flag, over any signal, the vessel bears a flag of truce.
- A red flag, pierced white, for a steamboat from Digby.
- A blue flag, pierced white, for a steamboat from Saint Andrews or Eastport.
- A red flag, with a white square, for a steamboat from Boston.
- A Ball at the mast head, vessel is on shore or in distress ;—should immediate aid be necessary, guns to be fired.

In thick weather a gun will be fired at Partridge Island, in answer to each gun heard at sea. There is a Fog Bell on the Island, which is rung in foggy weather, to warn vessels of their approach to the shore.

When a vessel requires a Pilot, her descriptive pendant will be shewn at the yard-arm, instead of a ball.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS,

NEAR THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN.

The Falls are level or still water, at about three and a half hours on the *flood*, and about two and a half on the *ebb*, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light on approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light—elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the coast. A very dangerous Rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about two miles S. S. W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this Rock and the Island there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof.—A plain white Light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next Light on the Coast of Nova Scotia, is placed on the West side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The Coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is, therefore, chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin.—A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light bears from the Light on Brier Island, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. 21 miles. It is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about 20 miles.

Bearings from the Gannet Rock Light House—

- To the Old Proprietor, which dries at $\frac{1}{2}$ ebb, (very dangerous.) E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. 7 miles.
- “ Black Rock, (always above water 25 feet.) off White Head, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.
- “ South West Head of Grand Manan, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.
- “ Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, (dry at $\frac{2}{3}$ ebb,) N. W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.
- “ Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, (always out of water,) S. W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.
- “ Machias Seal Island Lights, (distant about thirteen miles,) W. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

NOTE:—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extend Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westward, about eight miles, lies a dangerous breaker, called the Roaring Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open. The red glass having been removed from the

Lantern, there is now a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Machias Seal Islands Lights.—There are two fixed white Lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other Lights upon the Coast, (British or American.)—Both the buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz. :

- To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's,) E. S. E. easterly.
- " Gannet Rock Light, E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. 13 miles.
- " Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.
- " Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.
- " N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.
- " Little River Head, N. by W.
- " Libby Island Light House, (American,) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing in to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights into one, as they will then not be more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the east of the Lights.

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light (American,) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy;—it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour.—It is a fixed white Light. The building is painted white, with a red cross on it.

Point LePreau Lights.—Upon this projecting head land two Lights are placed, one above the other in the same House, and distant twenty-eight feet.—Both Lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and white. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This Light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established about fifty years, requires no particular notice, further than it is a fixed white Light, and that the Light House is painted red and white, in vertical stripes.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or Bar, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a Light is established, which is eminently useful to the Coasting Trade of Saint John, and to all other Vessels having Pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the Harbour at all hours of the night.—A fixed white Light.—The House is painted white and black, in stripes, vertically.

Quaco Light.—A revolving white Light is placed on a small rock, off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This Light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach.—The Light House is painted white and red, in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the Point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, (N. S.) The House is about 120 feet above the tide mark, and is painted white.—A plain white Light.

AGRICULTURAL AND MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.

Let farmers be careful in preparing seed-grain; for they will reap a great advantage in so doing. The most approved mode of preparing wheat, rye, oats or barley, is to soak it from 12 to 24 hours in a strong brine, having salt-petre in it, and, immediately before sowing, to mix with it enough of lime, plaster or wood ashes to make it so dry that it may be sown evenly. A crop of flax may be greatly increased by mixing with the seed an equal quantity of fine salt, and thus sowing it.

TURNIPS.—Turnips grow best on a light, sandy or gravelly soil, or a sandy loam. It should be made rich, soft, and fine. New land is best, and swarded land next to that which has been lately cleared from the forest. To secure a turnip crop decidedly against the fly, it is recommended to steep the seed 12 or 24 hours before sowing, in fish or train oil; drain off the oil from the seed, and roll it in plaster; this will separate the seed from the glutinous adhesion of the oil, render the casts pure, and enrich the crop.

POTATOES.—Potatoes should be hoed when first up, just to clear out the weeds, without making any hill. After they grow up about six or seven inches, they should be hilled for the last time. If weeds spring up among them, they should be pulled out, not hoed out; for if hoed again, many new potatoes will set, which will never grow large enough for use, but will check the growth of those early set.

CABBAGES.—The seed should be sown about the 20th of April, if the climate and season admit, or as soon thereafter as may be done, that they may be transplanted about the 20th of May. The ground should be well mellowed and manured. Hoe them in the morning, while the dew is on, once every week, until they begin to head. Do not pull them till there is danger of their freezing in the ground;—an early snow will do them no injury. When removed from the garden or field, set them out again in a trench, dug in the bottom of your cellar.

Save good Seed.—Some farmers and gardeners allow their earliest peas, beans, corn, cucumbers, &c. to be picked for eating, and save "what is left," or the latest and refuse, for seed; then they will complain that they degenerate. The finest and earliest of every kind of vegetable should be saved for seed; by this method, instead of degenerating, they may be improved. Every cultivator should attend to this subject, for it is very much neglected, and great loss is occasioned for want of a little time and attention.

Cows.—Keep no more cows than you can keep well. One cow well fed will give as much milk as two treated indifferently, and produce more butter. If a cow be wintered badly, she will rarely recover during the summer, so as to become profitable to the owner. Cows should by all means be kept under a shelter in extreme weather; particularly those which give milk, or a failure in the quantity of milk will be experienced.

Near London, it is the custom to sow large quantities of oats, to be cut green for stall-feeding the milk cows; these are always sown on land most highly manured for the purpose, with four and sometimes five bushels of seed per acre; the yield is prodigious, and is found to be one of the most valuable crops that can be grown, coming off the land in time for a full crop of turnips for the winter, or of late potatoes.

SHEEP SHEARING.—Dr. Deane says, that the largest lambs should be sheared at the time of the new moon in July. Their fleeces will yield as much the next year, and the wool will be better; and, as cold storms rarely happen at that time of the year, the lambs will do better without their fleeces than with them.

CURIOUS EXPERIMENT IN THE MANAGEMENT OF PIGS.—The following experiment has been made by a gentleman of Norfolk:—Six pigs of nearly equal weight, were put to keeping at the same time, and treated the same as to food and litter for seven weeks. Three of them were left to shift for themselves, as to cleanliness; the other three were kept as clean as possible by a man employed for the purpose, with a curry-comb and brush. The last consumed, in seven weeks, fewer peas by five bushels than the other three, yet weighed more, when killed, by two stone and four pounds upon the average.

Preservation of Butter.—At a late Council of the Royal Agricultural Society of England, a jar of butter was received from Henry Wood, Esq. as a specimen of the successful mode adopted for its preservation when that article is intended for export to foreign climates. Mr. Wood informed the council that this butter had been prepared on the 19th of June, according to the process adopted in eastern countries, where it was used for culinary purposes instead of hog's lard, which the Mahometan law prohibited, and would keep for any length of time in a perfect state of preservation, although it contained no salt, or other additional substance. This preservative state of the butter was induced by the removal of scum, and the dissipation of the watery particles of fresh butter, effected by the gentlest possible application of sufficient heat to produce the result. Mr. Wood stated that in Asia this gentle heat was obtained by the natives by filling a large open earthenware pan with powdered and well dried cow dung, and then setting fire to it, introducing into the midst of the burning cow dung an earthen vessel containing the butter, which thus became melted; and when the scum, as it rose, had been successfully removed, and the watery particles driven off by the heat, it was poured into a jar and preserved for use. Mr. Wood suggested that a sand-bath, properly regulated, might answer the same purpose as the dried cow dung, and, as the process was so very simple, there could be no difficulty in preparing it; and that, when once prepared, the butter never became tainted. Mr. Wood stated that he carried with him to the Cape of Good Hope some butter prepared in the same way, a year previously, and which was there pronounced to be superior to the salted butter of the colony, and for culinary purposes far superior to lard.

CATERPILLARS.—Destroy utterly every caterpillar;—leave no nest undemolished on your fruit-trees. This may be done by burning brimstone under their nests—by sprinkling ashes or fine sand on them and the limbs where they are, when wet by the dews or showers; or by putting a mop or wisp of tow on a pole and brushing their nests with brine.

FENCES.—While repairing your fences, remember that a fence well made will stand a dozen times as long as that which is poorly made. While you drive your business before you, and do your work well, all will be easy; but suffer it to lag, or slug and slight it, and soon it becomes a grievous burden. Set the top end of the posts in the ground.

Clearing Lands.—For the good of land, and for the ease of clearing, I would prefer to have the chopping done in the months of June and July, and take a spring burn the next season. I prefer this course, first, because there will be no sprouts in the land; and second, because the stumps will come out three or four years sooner than they would if chopped in the winter or spring months, as then they are sure to sprout, and thus long retain some vitality. To clear land slow and easy, I always girdle; and that work should be done in June, when the sign is in the heart. [?] I have seen the leaves withered and dried in one week. I always choose to let beach and maple timber stand un-

til about half the top and branches fall to the ground, which will take place in some five or six years. When I wish to clear the piece, I cut the balance of timber down a few days before I wish to burn, always preferring the spring, as there will be less herbage on the ground at that time, and the burn, of consequence, more complete. I have seen land cleared that would not cost one dollar an acre to fit it for the seed; as in dry weather, when so prepared, the fire usually cuts it up effectually.

Life Preservers.—A capital article in the way of Life Preservers, and which is always at hand in the time of accidents, and when the patent contrivances are certain to be missing, is to be found in the hat which every man wears. Any hat placed flat on the water, with the brim down, will retain within itself sufficient air to buoy up the most emaciated person for a long time. The only article which can at all approach to a competition with the hat in this important service, is the common hucket, of which there are generally several about every steamboat's deck. Skilful persons have made many experiments with these articles, and in every case with a happy result.

Incombustible Wash.—Slack stone lime in a large tub or barrel, with boiling water, covering the tub or barrel to keep in all the steam. When thus slacked, pass six quarts of it through a fine sieve. It will then be in a state of fine flour. Now to six quarts of this lime add one quart of rock or Turks' Island salt, and one gallon of water; then boil the mixture, and skim it clean. To every five gallons of this skimmed mixture add one pound of alum, half a pound of copperas, by slow degrees add three fourths of a pound of potash, and four quarts of fine sand or hickory ashes sifted. We suppose any kind of good hard wood ashes will answer as well as hickory. This mixture will now admit of any colouring matter you please, and may be applied with a brush. It looks better than paint, and is as durable as slate. It will stop small leaks in the roof, prevent the moss from growing over and rotting the roof, and render it incombustible from sparks falling upon it. When laid upon brick work it renders the brick impervious to rain or wet.—*New York Mechanic.*

Locomotion.—The last project for locomotion which we have heard proposed, is that of two long, pointed and parallel elliptic spindle balloons, between which the pedestrian stands, travels, or flies, as occasion may require; while extending an arm over each balloon, which by their buoyancy, so nearly sustain his weight that he can bound twenty or thirty feet at each step, or occasionally scale across a river or ravine like a flying squirrel. Fifteen miles per hour is mentioned in anticipation, as a walking speed.—*Id.*

To drive nails into hard wood.—It is said that by dipping the points of nails into lard, they may be driven home in hard wood without difficulty. The New Genesee Farmer says that carpenters who are engaged in repairing old buildings, sometimes carry a lump of lard for this purpose; on one of their hoots or shoes.

To revive old Writing.—Immerse the writing in water in which copperas has been dissolved; if the writing is suffered to dry, the copperas will make it re-appear with as much freshness as if it were new.

Baits for catching Fish.—Fish are wonderfully attracted by strong smelling substances, as camphor, assafoetida, &c. Artificial insects are much used in catching fish, especially trout; they are made of different colours, according to the hours of the day, in order that they may imitate the natural objects which appear at these different periods. Those who fish in fresh water, employ cheese sometimes as a bait, and prefer that which emits the strongest smell.

In a word, endeavour to have cheerful and merry companions at your meals, — what nourishment one receives amidst mirth and jollity, will certainly produce good and light blood."

AGE OF ANIMALS.—The age of a bear rarely exceeds 20 years; a dog lives 23 years; a wolf 20; a fox 14 or 16; lions are long lived. Pompey lived to the age of 70. The average of cats is 15 years; a squirrel and hare 7 or 8; rabbits 7. Elephants have been known to live to the great age of 400 years. When Alexander the Great had conquered one Phoros, King of India, he took a great elephant which had fought very valiantly for the King, and named him Ajax, and dedicated him to the sun, and let him go with this inscription:—"Alexander the son of Jupiter, hath dedicated Ajax to the sun."—The elephant was found with this inscription 350 years after. Pigs have been known to live to the age of 30 years: the rhinoceros to 50. A horse has been known to live to the age of 62, but averages 25 to 30. Camels sometimes live to the age of 100; sheep seldom exceed the age of 10. Cows live about 15 years. Cuvier considers it probable that whales sometimes live 1000 years. The dolphin and porpoise attain the age of 30. An eagle died at Vienna at the age of 30. Ravens frequently reach the age of 100. Swans have been known to live 300 years.—Mr. Mallerion has the skeleton of a swan that attained the age of 200 years. Pelicans are long lived. A tortoise has been known to live to the age of 107.

SHEEP AND DANDIES.—The following is from a report made by the committee on sheep, at the Worcester cattle show:—"A sheep should be judged of like a dandy, by the fineness of his coat. We hag pardon of the sheep for the comparison—but it is so apt! In both cases the coat is the most valuable part of the animal. What is the sheep good for without the fleece? and what is a dandy good for without a coat?"
