





BAROMETER AND MINE GAS. Greater Output Obtained by Increasing Air When Pressure is Low.

The relationship between barometric pressure and mine gases is pointed out by J. Cecil Alter in a communication to the United States Weather Bureau. In 1917, he says an engineer of the Bureau of Mines made a record over a period of eight months of the appearance of an unusual gas in a number of the precious metal mines near Eureka, Utah. The occurrence of the gas was associated invariably with a fall of barometric pressure. The gas appeared a few hours and endured until the barometer began to rise. Another investigation covering a similar period, in which many more gas analysis and barometric readings were made, has just been completed by G. E. McElroy.

His conclusion is that the gas, which is extremely heavy (a mixture of carbon dioxide and nitrogen) and which will extinguish a light within an inch of the same level repeatedly, is contained in a reservoir in a fractured stratum of rock and escapes into the mine workings with a falling or low barometer, except during the miner or more rapid falls, which would not allow the gas to escape through the fissures before the rise in the barometer occurs. The ventilating fans serve to work the gas out of the tunnels. It has been the practice to send the holsting skip into the mine carrying a carbide lamp to test for gas before sending any workmen in.

Mr. Alter was told by a retired mine owner that for many years while operating a deep mine at Butte. Mont., he regulated the speed of his ventilating fans by the barometer which he kept at the top of the shaft. He said that he secured a greater production per man by increasing the amount of air pumped in to the men when the barometer was low.



EMPIRE SHIPPING **BOARD SUGGESTED**

London, Sept. 2.—The report of the Imperial Shipping Committee, just made public, recommends the substitution of an imperial shipping board for the committee as at present constituted.

According to the report, the shipping board would inquire into complete recarding occan rejet rates

According to the report, the shipping board would inquire into complaints regarding ocean reight rates and conditions of inter-Empire trade which, from time to time would be referred to the board by the various Governments of the Empire for a decision. The board would also exercise its power of conciliation between inter-imperial shipping and promots co-ordination in regard to harbors and other facilities necessary for the development of inter-Empire shipping.

The committee recommends that the chairman of the board should be six representatives on the board who would act for the shipping and commercial interests of the whole Empire.

It is suggested that rotation of these representatives among the Dominions of the Empire could be arranged. The committee thinks the board should be incorporated by royal charter. It estimates that the total expenses in connection with the functioning of the board would not exceed a few thousand pounds sterling, which, the report says, could be met by agreed contributions from each part of the Empire.

The sole deposit of magnetite which approaches commercial size in this district is situated about one mile up a creek flowing in Head Bay at the head of Tiupana Arm in Nootka Sound. Mr. W. M. Brewer, of the British Colymbia Bureau of Mines, roughly estimates the tonnage of iron ore to be 250,000 tons known, 250,000 tons probable ore and 275,000 possible ore.

The deposit is located in a large body of garnetized limestone at the contact of a large intrusion of finegrained diorite. Small amounts of copper are associated with the magnetic, but by far the greater portion of it is free from both copper and sulphur.

At this point a mass of crystalline limestone, several thousand feet in thickness, outcrops along the shore for over a mile. It strikes in a northeast direction and can be seen to extend over the summit of a mountain about a mile or more eastward. It is coarsely crystalline, and varies from pure white through shades of blue and grey, to black. It is steeply folded, and in places is checked by a closely spaced set of compression joints. Here and there there is solul dykes and sills extend into the limestone in several directions. The quarry is situated at a point where the marble is cut by several such dykes and sills.

Though the attempt to produce marble from these beds on a commercial basis seems to have failed, the facts remain that there is an unlimited quantity of marble conveniently, situated at tidewater, and that operations of the Nootka Quarries Company, Limited, proved that the marble can be quarried in sufficiently large blocks, and that it can be sawn, rubbed, turned and polished to produce an excellent stone for building and ornamental purposes.

On Vargas Island, about two miles inland from the north shore, a deposit containing considerable manganese was recently discovered by Mr. Hovelaque, of Clayoquot. As yet only a small amount of work has been done, and the highest assays obtained showed not over 15 per cent. manganese which is much too low to be considered of economic value.

The deposit occurs less than fifty feet above sea level, in a low, swampy area underlain by a band of cherty, ferruginous tuffs of the Vancouver group, which have been sheared and slickensided, and are sheared and slickensided, and are strongly weathered to a depth of ten feet or more. The weather rocks contain much limonite, and some pyrolusite, which forms films on the shear planes.

The area underlain by the sheared tuffs is quite extensive, and future work may disclose areas having sufficiently high proportions of manganese to enable it to be mined at a profit. The deposit is interesting because it is the first discovery of this metal on the west coast.

Alunite

A peculiar, light colored rock thought to contain the mineral alunite, was discovered on the narrow peninsula, between Easy Creek and Kokshittle Arm, in Kyuquot Sound, in 1908. In 1911 the San Juan Manufacturing Com-A peculiar, light colored rock thought to contain the mineral alunite, was discovered on the narrow peninsula between Easy Creek and Kokshittle Arm, in Kyuquot Sound, in 1998. It was first staked as a possible gold deposit; later the British Columbia Pottery Company used the material for fire clay and for the manufacture of, sewer pipe. In 1911 the San Juan Manufacturing Company used the material for making a powdered household cleanser and mechanical soap. Prior to 1914 it was being considered as a possible source of potash, and during the war

was being considered as a possible source of potash, and during the war when the scarcity of potash fertilizer became acute, the Kyuquot deposits again came into prominence.

In 1913 C. H. Clapp made a thorough investigation of the deposits, during which he found that they consisted largely of silica, pyrophylite and natro-alunite (i.e., the sodabearing alunite). In spite of this report, however, still further efforts were made to interest the public in these deposits as a source of potash fertilizer; and in order to settle the matter definitely the British Columbia Bureau of Mines sent W. M. Brewer and P. B. Freeland into the district in 1919 to sample the deposits as carefully as possible. The samples were later analyzed and checked by five different chemists.
