According to Sir Robert Gillin the united Kingdom was worth eight billion dollars in 1901.

As a part of the efforts of the British to become independent of American cotton, about 30,000 acres will be under cotton cultivation on the West African coast.

Nearly 50,000 foreigners have recently left the United States to spend the winter in their own countries.

The school children of Kansas City opened a savings bank account three years ago, and today have a total deposit of \$17,358.

It is said that 1,000,000 men were furnished employment during the harvesting of the country's wheat crop this year.

In plea for biennial elections, the Worcester Spy suggests a plan, which, while it naturally will not appeal very favorably to those who are strong partisans, will meet with the approval of all who are endeavoring to secure non-partisanship in municipal affairs.

The election, yesterday shows again the absurdity of the Massachusetts system of annual election for city and state. The best of communities have been doing away with this system and had that the biennial session of the legislature, biennial election of legislators and executive officers produce better government, reduce expenses and is altogether more satisfactory than the old-fashioned system of annual elections.

The ideal system, it seems to us, is the biennial system both for municipalities and states. The same election comes every four years, anyhow. The state election should come at the same time as the national election. Under a biennial system this would bring the state election in the even years and the national

pal elections could be held biennially on the odd years at the usual date in November. In New York state even the town elections are held in November, under a recent change of law.

Every election is something. It secures the time of the voter as well as of the election officers. A two-year term is none too long for city and state officers to become properly acquainted with their duties and to thoroughly understand them.

The system in Worcester is particularly bad, as before the state election comes off, we have to prepare for the city election. We get to a great degree of non-partisanship by the state election than we would by holding them on the same day. We would get far more by holding them a year apart.

We have developed very little non-partisanship in municipal affairs in Massachusetts. The principle has not been advocated generally. The independence is spasmodic and sporadic. Where the public opinion is advanced, the organizations non-partisan organizations to run the town or city elections, surely the line of distinction on the run question and not on real municipal issues such as would happen under an ideal system.
