MEMORARDOM OF CONVERSATION

PARTICIPARTS: Thomas J. Plores and Jack Gillespie

SUBJECT

Guban Political Matters

- 1. GILLESPIE phoned me on 12 December from Atlanta. He said that he had been told by Francisco Caligas that the tentative date selected for the invasion of Cuba is between 26 December and 3 January. There are eight to ten thousand man available in the Dominican Republic who already have Cuban uniforms. They are volunteers and mest are Dominicans. The initial target will be the Isle of Pines.
- 2. CAJIMAS was to leave for Puerte Rice on 12 December and from there he was to go to the Dominican Republic on the same day. He planned to return to Puerto Rice the night of 12 December and will be back in Miami on 13 December. CAJIMAS was to be accompanied on the trip to the Dominican Republic by (fm) VIDANA.
- 3. CAJIGAS said he feels that TRUJILLO will cellapse if the situation in Cuba continues as it is for the next six months.
- 4. GILLESPIE said he had reported the above information to Charles HARDING, the FBI agent in Atlanta with whom he is in touch.
- 5. On 15 December GILLESPIE phened me again to report that CAJIGAS and Budy FERMANDEZ had just returned to Atlanta. CAJIGAS told GILLESPIE that William PAWLEY was back in Washington. TRUJILLO told CAJIGAS that PAWLEY had promised that he would have information on the United States official position on the Cuban matter within three days. An important personage from the Dominican Republic was to come to the United States on



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15 December to meet with PAWLET on 15 or 16 December. TRUJILLO said that he is holding the PERMAZA force until the United States' position is known.

- 6. CAJIGAS told GILLESPIE that he fears and dislikes PANISY because of some earlier transactions in Guba in which both were involved. CAJIGAS expressed a dislike for having FAMISY support TRUJILLO since this might involve some future commitments.
- 7. CAJIGAS told CILLESPIS he knows where to get some arms in the United States, but wants assurances that the United States Coverment will not interfere with such action.
- 8. On 16 December GILLESPIE phoned to report that GAJIGAS had been phoned on the night of 15 December by Emilio HUNEZ Portnesses. HUNEZ said he had seen PARLEY on the night of 15 December after the latter had dired with Vice President HIGE. According to HUNEZ, PARLEY claimed that he was to meet with the DCI at 0900 on 16 December. HUNEZ mentioned several names, including Julio SANCHEZ and Jean GERARD (phonetic), who were to be members of a junta. MUNEZ said that PARLEY wanted to drop him as head of the revolutionary movement. According to HUNEZ, TREJILLO would not allow the revolutionary army to leave the Dominican Republic without the United States Government's approval.
- 9. CAJIGAS said that PAVLET is having General PEDRAZA sign notes in excess of a million dollars. CAJIGAS said that he does not like the way the situation is developing and he will step out of the picture rather than work with the generals and TRUJILLO, although he would be willing to work with a group of businessmen.
- 10. CAJIGAS said that GERARD, who was hung from his balcony on the night of 15 December, was the first man on the list given to PAVLEY by TRUJILLO.
- 11. GILLESPIE expressed personal distrust of PAVLEY, and said that he had discussed PAVLEY with H. Graham MCRISCH, for Assistant Attorney General now a prominent Vashington attorney. FORISCH spoke adversely of PAVLEY, whom he characterised as a great apportunist.

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12. GILLESPIE urged that someone contact CAJIGAS, whom he considers to be a "great gentleman." CAJIGAS is presently staying at the Biltzore Hotel in Atlanta, room 60). According to GILLESPIE someone tried to locate CAJIGAS a couple of days ago. GILLESPIE asked if we had tried to to so and I replied that we had not insofar as I know. I told GILLESPIE that it might be the FBI.
