If the customer does not accept the goods on these terms, they can be returned at once and no sale has been made.



PLEASE ORDER EARLY

We shall greatly appreciate it if our customers will adopt our suggestion to send us their spring orders for seeds, plants and bulbs during January and February. Shipment need not be made until you want the goods.

PACKING CHARGES

No charge is made for boxes or packing, except for two-bushel seamless sacks, which are charged at market value; these bags are returnable for credit at the price charged. Any extra charges over actual postage on Parcels Post orders is for the extra packing required.

While these do best to reach their greatest perfection in a light sandy loam, any good well-prepared garden soil suits them. Plant when the ground has become permanently warm in hills 6 feet apart each way, 8 to 10 seeds in a hill. After the second tier of leaves have formed, thin out to 4 plants in a hill. Watch carefully for insects of various kinds, especially the melon louse that works under the leaf and shrivels it, causing the plant to die. To fight this successfully, raise up the vines and spray underneath with "Nicotine Sulphate" Pyrox, or Arsenate of Lead. When the vines have made a good start, they are not bothered with insects thereafter.

Delicious Gold Lined. Flesh thick, fine-grained and sweet; color green, with a gold margin next to the seed cavity; slightly oval and heavily netted. A variety which every melon planter should not overlook to include in his list.

Emerald Gem. Among the standard varieties, this has long been a leader. Customers frequently complain that Ruta Bagas grow too long in shape, rather than in a round form. Careful inquiry has developed the fact that this is caused by sowing the seed too early.

In the locality of Philadelphia and New York the seed should

not be sown until August 1st, when it will invariably develop perfectly globular formed roots. Seed sown earlier than this invariably produces the long shaped roots with long stems.

for the benefit of those who are not familiar with these terms, we wish to make the following brief explanation:

Annuals. These grow and bloom, mature their seed and then die in the same year, such as Asters, Balsams, Poppies, Sweet Peas, Morning Glories, etc., some of which may be sown in the house from March to May, or outdoors after danger from frost is over.

Biennials. These grow from seed sown during mid-summer, flowering the second year, after which they die; many of the varieties bloom the first season if sown early. In this class we have Pansies, English Daisies, Campanula Medium, Dianthus, etc.

Perennials. Those which live from year to year, such as Aquilegia, Delphinium, Foxglove, etc. Seed may be sown outdoors from June to September and transplanted late in fall into their permanent quarters, and protected during winter with a light litter of straw or leaves. The hardy perennials not usually needing any protection after the first winter; the half-hardy perennials require protection during the winter, and the tender perennials during the winter require greenhouse protection.


FLOWERS AND PLANTS FOR PARTIALLY SHADED LOCATIONS

Our list this season has again been thoroughly revised. Many of the older varieties of Dahlias have been omitted and superseded by others that are much superior. The natural season for the Dahlia to be at its best is during September and October; in fact, effort to get superior blooms before that time should not be attempted. To get large flowers, the plants should be disbudded up to August 1st.

Spade or plow the ground to a depth of about 10 inches. As a fertilizer, use either well-rotted stable manure, or, better still, sheep manure, which should be well mixed with the soil. When the soil is properly prepared, dig a hole, 6 inches deep, in which to plant the Dahlias. The bulbs should be laid down flat and covered to a depth of 4 inches. Every Dahlia should have from 2½ to 3 feet space and at least 4 feet between the rows.

As soon as the plants are a foot above the ground they should be tied to a stake. Keep the ground well cultivated and free from weeds. Never leave more than one shoot to a plant if you want to grow exhibition flowers. You will have better plants and larger flowers.

About Dahlia Plants.—It happens sometimes that there is an unusually large demand for certain varieties, and our stock of roots becomes exhausted. In such instances we will send out strong plants after May 1st, after which time most all Dahlia orders for plants are filled, these give equally as good results as tubers or roots.

MICHELL'S HARDY POT-GROWN ROSES

The Roses we are offering are all strong 2-year old field grown plants that were dug last Fall and potted into 5-inch and 6-inch pots. They were then stored in cold greenhouses where they will start into growth naturally this Spring and by planting time they will be in prime condition. Roses thrive best in an open sunny position and they should be planted away from all trees and shrubs so that, the roots will have the full benefit of the nourishment in the soil. Roses are gross feeders and and consequently require a rich soil. Select a well drained position where the soil is good and dig in a liberal amount of well decomposed stable manure thoroughly mixing it with the soil. For best results the beds should be made from 4 to 5 feet wide, planting the Hybrid Teas 18 inches apart and the stronger growing Hybrid Perpetuals 2 feet apart, planting all about 8 inches or 10 inches from the edge of the beds. The pot grown plants we send out arrive with a ball of earth around the roots this ball should not be disturbed but should be thoroughly were when planted growing Hybrid Perpetuals 2 feet apart, planting all about 8 inches or 10 inches from the edge of the beds. The pot grown plants we send out arrive with a ball of earth around the roots, this ball should not be disturbed but should be thoroughly wet when planted. Budded Roses should be planted so that the bud is about 2 inches below the surface of the ground, firm the soil well around the roots and give a thorough watering. Throughout the Summer, the surface of the bed should be frequently cultivated. The Roses we send out require no further pruning, but are ready to be planted when received, but instructions for pruning the following seasons will be found under the headings of the different classes. The best method of protecting Roses for the Winter in this locality is to draw up a mound of soil around the base of the plant to a height of 8 inches or 10 inches, thereby protecting the buds at the base of the plants from the alternate freezing and thawing, which is so injurious. In addition to this a covering of strawy manure, evergreen boughs or corn stalks is very beneficial. When Roses are growing freely they are less liable to insect pests or fungous diseases than if they are starved or otherwise neglected. A weekly application of Bordeaux Arsenate of Lead Mixture will keep the plants free of almost all insect pests as well as fungous diseases, but if mildew should appear in spite of this periodical spraying use Sulphide of Potassium at the rate of one half ounce to one gallon of water. Green fly or aphis are easily kept in check by tobacco dust or spraying with any nicotine solution.

HARDY CLIMBING AND RAMBLER ROSES

As an ornamental plant for covering verandas, porches, side walls, pillars, fences, etc., these are unequalled calling forth more admiration than anything else that can be used. They require no pruning in the Spring beyond the cutting out of very old or dead wood and shortening of the laterals and long canes to make the growth conform to the space to be covered; but a severe pruning in July directly after they have finished flowering is beneficial. Cutting away at that time all old flowering wood will encourage a vigorous growth, which will give an abundance of flowers the following season.

American Pillar. The large single flowers are a lovely shade of cherry pink, with a clear white eye surrounding numerous golden yellow stamens. The canes are of a strong vigorous growth and flower freely. The foliage is distinct and decorative.



HYDRANGEA HORTENSIS

It has been the general opinion that the plant is not hardy, but in many places it is not afforded even the slightest protection, although we recommend that care be taken, especially for the first few years after planting, and especially so with the French sorts, to protect them over winter with a covering of manure or other suitable litter, and also to wrap the plants in burlap, straw or even paper will do, as this will protect the flower buds, which are often injured in severe winters, although the plants otherwise do not suffer. If winter protection is used, same should not be removed until all danger of frost is over, otherwise the tender shoots are nipped in the cold nights of early spring, and few flowers are the result. These varieties of Hydrangeas often change their colors; for instance, pink varieties will sometimes turn blue. If, however, it is desired to change pink Hydrangea blue, this can be usually accomplished by incorporating into the soil a few handfuls of soot or iron filings. Lump alum broken into small pieces and incorporated into the soil, about ½ lb. to each plant, will usually produce the same results.





HOW TO CARE FOR SHRUBS

When received plant them to the depth they werewhen in the nursery; cut them back to within 18 inches fromtheground, put a quantity of fertilizer such as bone meal or sheep manure around the roots, firm the soil about them well and water thoroughly two or three times a week until they are established. The flowering varieties should be planted in a sunny position. Each season after they have flowered prune them back to ensure a wealth of flowers the following sea-

STRAWBERRY PLANTS

There are two types of Strawberry Plants, one known as "Pot Grown," usually ready for shipping in July and August, and the other known as "Layer Plants," usually shipped in the spring months and the latter is what we are offering here. Layer plants set out in the early spring usually bear a few berries the first season, while the main and succeeding crops come the following season and later. The layer plants should be set out in April, when possible, about 1 foot apart, in rows two feet apart.

EARLY VARIETIES

Early Jersey Giant (Perfect). It is brilliant scarlet-crimson in color, and exceptionally firm. Berries very large, conical with pointed tip. A very heavy yielder.

Premier (Perfect). This variety has no weak points, it is a vigorous grower, doing well on all types of soil. The plants are enormously productive, commencing early and bearing through a long season. 
Fig. 675. Copper tank, holding about 5 gals., complete with pump, nozzle and hose.....\$25.00

After applying, the weeds blacken and die; the grass usually also becomes blackened and may remain Erado so for a few days, but it quickly recovers its color, and Weed Gun young growths appear on the bare spots previously occupied by the weeds.

Should the weather be very hot and dry, the lawn should be thoroughly watered at the expiration of 48 hours after the application.

It acts as one of the most powerful fertilizers for grasses if applied as a top-dressing in the early spring. For top dressing as a fertilizer apply \(\frac{1}{4} \) ton per acre.

MELROSINE FOR KILLING ROSE BUGS.



Rose-growers know the mean bug—a disgusting, long-legged, grayish-brown quick-flying beetle about three-eighths of an inch in length, who suddenly appears in myriads when roses come into bloom, attacking, to satisfy his voracious appetite, first the white and lighter-colored roses, from which he passes to the yellow, pink and red blooms, and then, without hesitation, to paeonies, Japanese iris, rhododendrons and other blooms. He infests also, on occasion, grape-vines, cherry and other fruit trees, always leaving destruction in his wake.






