KANSAS PUBLISHES LOW COST TABLOIDS

The Cooperative Extension Service at Kansas State University has published a new garden tabloid, "Use Your Head," third in a series which pack a lot of information into an attractive package at low cost.

Gary Vacin, extension editor at KSU, said that they printed 50,000 copies at a cost of 6.3 cents per copy. After only about 10 days, there were less than 300 remaining.

Distribution of the 12-page tabloid was handled mostly through county extension offices, with just a few held back for distribution directly by state extension horticulturists. Another 1,000 copies were distributed as part of a garden promotion by Radio Station KSAC.

Bill Sullins of the KSU information staff did the writing and editing, and Warren Pray and Kelly Cunningham handled the graphics.

Vacin said the garden tabloid is typical of the new look in graphic design folks will be seeing on publications coming from KSU's newly consolidated art shop (formerly Extension Service and Experiment Station each had own shop).

WRITER/EDITOR POSITION OPEN IN PERU

An agricultural or extension editor to write and edit in the English language is sought by the International Potato Center in Lima, Peru, to support a global research and training network.
