## Canadian Customers Please Note

In accordance with the ruling governing the importation of Nursery Stock from the United States into Canada, it will be necessary to obtain a permit from the Secretary of the Destructive Insect and Pest Act Advisory Board, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, and file same with the Collector of Customs before shipment can be cleared. Seeds are exempt from this ruling, and may be shipped into Canada without a permit. Gladiolus bulbs come under the classification of Nursery Stock.
This ruling must be complied with in order to make delivery and we ask you, in the event of an order, to secure this permit, advising us of the number of same, that we may mark it on the outside wrapper.

## Terms Of Sale

PRICES: The prices quoted herein are our very lowest current prices. They cancel all previous quotations made either by letter or advertisements.
GUARANTEE: I exercise every care to ship only first class stock, but give no warranty, expressed or implied, and will not be in any way responsible for the results of planting or forcing of any seeds, bulbs, roots or tubers sent out by me.
To satisfy my customers in every way has been my first aim. Bulbs found to be not true to name should be retained by the customer and I shall replace number that are untrue, free of charge. No planting stock or bulblets will be included in this case.
If you have any complaints to make about any stock received from me, please do not hesitate to do so and I shall correct any error as I shall not consider our transaction complete until you are absolutely satisfied.
Cash with order or in advance of shipment. I shall accept unused U. S. postage stamps up to the amount of fifty cents.
POSTAGE: We prepay postage anywhere in the United States and Canada on orders amounting to $\$ 2.00$ and over on Gladiolus bulbs. On orders of Gladiolus bulbs amounting to less than $\$ 2.00$, add 25 cents to cover postage. Orders for plants and Amaryllis bulbs will be sent Express Collect.
TERMS: CASH WITH ORDER. Remit by bank draft, express or postal money orders. CANADIAN CUSTOMERS PLEASE REMIT BY POSTAL MONEY ORDERS. DO NOT REMIT BY PERSONAL CHECKS. POSITIVELY NO. C. O. D. ORDERS ACCEPTED
My season for bulb shipping takes place from October 1, to May 1.
Write your address plainly as I had orders last year which I was unable to get in the hands of the purchaser. If your handwriting is poor please print your address.

## Order Early

All orders are filled promptly the day they come in or the day after. il you do not receive your order in two weeks please notify us promptly as there have been occasions where people sent orders which we did not receive. In such a case please repeat the order so an immediate replacement of goods can be made.
Order your Petunia and Dahlia seeds or bulbs early as they might easily be damaged if carried around by the postman in zero weather and exposed to frost for hours.
SUBSTITUTION: In the latter part of the season we may be out of some varieties so please give me your second choice. In case no substitution is desired please advise us in your order.
PACKING: Through years of experience I have worked out the most satisfactory method of packing seeds and bulbs and there is very little possibility of damaging the same in transit, either by frost or moisture.

Those who want bulbs of any of the varieties mentioned in the catalog but do not want them until spring should send their orders in now and we will pack and hold them until the date fixed for shipping. In this way you will be sure to get what you want. After February, we might be out of many varieties, as our stock is not any too plentiful in some varieties.
We will have only large size and half size bulbs this year, as the smaller sizes will all be needed for propagation.

## Substitution

If any variety is out of stock, we will substitute a similar variety unless otherwise instructed, so it is best to state in your order whether or not we shall substitute.

## Spirit Of St Leuis (Gladiolus)

This new, wonderful Glad has made good everywhere in this country as well as in Australia, and New Zealand. I have received the finest reports of it from all over. According to Ridgeway's color guide, the color is Carnelian red. However, for those who are not acquainted with this book, it would be described as orange. It is perfect in every way. Spikes are four to five feet tall with five to eight large open flowers perfectly placed. A very healthy grower and good propagator. Bulblets mostly flower from four to five months after planting. Due to its high merits it will soon be one of the most widely grown Glads. Flowers 60 days after planting. Following is one of the many letters which I received concerning this Glad:

July 30, 1930
Dear Mr. Diener: I want to tell you that I have "Spirit of St. Louis" in bloom here now. I am sorry there isn't a chance to show it at Boston. I heard all kinds of unkind remarks about it and expected the usual "Lemon", a good grower just back from the coast said "It's no good". I grow every good Glad I can hear of, all the Australian, New Zealand, Tasmanian varieties, all of Mair's, Pfitzers, Kelway's Lemoin's, Vilmorin's and all the United States ones (and U. S. has plenty of poor ones). I have 750 varieties and over 300 new this year. This is just to show I have a fair comparison. I have "Spirit of St. Louis" in front of me with seven very large flowers open and guess I'll get another one or mavbe two; a fine orange in color and a very fine variety. Possibly Mrs. S. A. Errey can be grown as well, have seen some that were, but it flakes and burns while "Spirit of St. Louis" stood out doors until five were open.
Accept my congratulations on it. I'll want 50 or 100 more in the fall and mine were half size bulbs. I'll sure give it a good word in my reports this fall.

## Diener's 1929 Gladiolus Hybrid Tristis Seeds

This gives anyone a chance to raise stock from the Hybrids who wishes to do so. They are very vigorous growers and will have a successful future for winter cut flowers. Directions for planting:
The seeds should be handled like Freesias. Sow them in six or eight-inch pots or boxes containing leaf mould. Do not use fertilizer. Cover the seeds very lightly with soil. Leave the seedlings in the pots or boxes until they have finished growing. Plant the young bulbs out in October.

## How To Sow Gladiolus Seeds

In the southern temperatures where there is only light frost or none, the seeds should be sown out in the late fall, in rows, in the open, one foot apart. The seeds should be covered with a half inch of sandy soil, about the same as onions. Water them well and keep them free from weeds. Cultivate the soil once a month. Many will flower five months after sowing. In climates where there is a heavy frost, it is best to sow the seeds in boxes or hot beds using good sandy leaf mould soil or 3 to 4 year old manure in which to sow them. Take them up in the fall and handle like the regular size bulbs.

## Gladiolus Culture

## Soil

Gladiolus will grow in almost any kind of soil, but a heavy clay loam containing some sand seems to be best for them. The ground should be well spaded in the spring, and if it is not rich enough, some bone meal, or old well-rotted manure should be spaded under.

## Planting

The depth that bulbs should be planted will vary with local weather conditions. Where there is a heavy rainfall and strong winds, they may be planted as deep as three inches; this will tend to keep the flower spikes from bending or breaking. Under average conditions we find the best results are obtained when they are planted about an inch deep. Bulblets should not be covered with more than half an inch of soil. They will grow faster if the outer hard shell is removed just before planting.
As Gladiolus have their enemies in insects and fungi, it is well to dip the bulbs before putting them into the ground. For this purpose use one part of $40 \%$ Formaldehyde solution to one hundred parts of water. The bulbs should be left in the solution for from three to five minutes immediately before planting.
If the leaves are too pale when they develop, sprinkle the ground about with a little Scotch Soot or fresh Portland Cement.
Planting may be done from April to the first of July (in Southern districts from January to July). If this is done at intervals of ten days to two weeks, blooms may be enjoyed until late fall. Gladiolus bulbs should be planted in the full sun, as shade prevents them from attaining full perfection of size and color.
We do not recommend heavy fertilizing. This treatment will increase the size of the flower, but tends to lessen the vitality of the bulb. Top fertilizing with equal parts of dry blood and bone meal, to be worked in with a hoe, will give the best results.

## Cultivating

At all times from planting until the bulbs are taken up, the ground should be well cultivated, kept loose and free from weeds and other foreign growth. When spikes are heavy with buds and blossoms they may be bent or broken by wind or rain. The following offers a simple method of minimizing this danger: Set stock out in rows, and on each side of the row drive stakes from four to six feet apart, and securely fasten to these, run two lines of wire properly spaced to support the spikes.

## Watering

Newly planted bulbs should not be watered until the foliage has reached a height of six or eight inches. From this time until a month after the flowering season the ground around them should be kept thoroughly moist. Care must be taken to avoid having moisture on the buds and blossoms while they are exposed to warm sunshine. It is therefore well to apply water to the lower part of the plants and to do the watering only during the early morning or evening hours.

## Cutting, Digging and Curing

When cutting flowers be very careful that at least four leaves are left on the bulb. This will preserve its life; if it is stripped of its leaves it cannot survive. It is best to let seed pods form on the spike if a strong bulb is desired for reproduction.
Bulbs should be dug when the seed pods are all formed and the spikes begin to wither. They should be lifted with the leaves attached and stacked in the open with the bulbs together and the leaves facing the same way. The bulbs should be covered with burlap to prevent injury from the direct rays of the sun. The leaves will draw much moisture from the bulbs and assist them to ripen. If the weather prevents this treatment, they may be cured in any thoroughly dry place. After ten days or two weeks the leaves should be cut away and the bulbs left in a protected place for another period of ten days or two weeks. At this time the new bulbs should separate easily from the old ones. If they do not, more drying is necessary.
When the proper time arrives the bulblets should be taken off and stored for the next planting. The outer husks should be taken off the bulbs, leaving them with a clean silky appearance. They should be stored in a dark frost-proof place in boxes not deeper than six inches and so constructed as to insure a free circulation of air.

## Sowing Of Petunia Seed

Prepare a seed bed by taking leaf mould soil which has been mixed with some clean white sand (use positively no fertilizer in this soil when sowing). Sift this through a fine sieve into seed pans and flats within two inches from the top. Fill the remaining two inches at the top of the receptacle with boiling water and let the water seep through the soil and let the soil then stand for a day. This will have killed all weed seeds, worms and fungi contained in the soil. Smooth over the surface of the soil, but do not pack, as Petunia seeds will not grow in soil which has been packed. After the surface is smooth, sprinkle with fresh, cold water so that the soil will settle evenly. Sow the seeds over the top. If you are in a dry atmosphere sprinkle a very little of this sterilized soil over the seeds. In damp climates no soil covering is needed, but a sprinkling of charcoal dust is good. Place a clean pane of glass over the flats or seed pans. If the sun strikes the glass place over it a single sheet of newspaper. Always keep the seed bed moist, but not wet. Use a Scollay sprinkler. Do not sow the seeds too closely, as they are to attain three to four leaves before transplanting. The glass should be removed as soon as the seeds have sprouted. The young plants should be transplanted as soon as possible into flats, spacing them one inch apart.
Petunia seeds sowed out in this sterilized soil will germinate $100 \%$ and the young plants will grow faster and be more vigorous. Also you will not be bothered with weeds and fungi. These seed are cleaned by a process where only fertile kernels are selected. Ants will carry off the seeds if they have any access to same. Snails will eat the young seedlings, a great many in one night. For this reason, seed boxes should be placed so that snails and ants are unable to reach them. Most of the loss of the seed occurs in this way. We would suggest in this case that the seed box be placed on small blocks of wood, the blocks resting in jars or pans, the latter containing either oil or water. The ants or snails are unable to cross the oil or water, and so cannot reach the seed.
If you have successfully raised Petunias from seeds before, use your own method. The above is given to those who are unacquainted with the handling of Petunia seeds.

## Handling Of Ycung Pet̂unia Plants When Growing In 3-Inch Pots For The Market

In order to have large flowers and brilliant colors in three inch pots, a good soil is absolutely essential for the young plants.
Following are directions for preparing the best soil: It is best to use an even mixture of leaf mould and old rotten manure (four or five years old or from the hot bed.) However, if no old manure is available leaf mould will do. To a cubic yard of soil add a four inch pot of fresh Portland cement, a five inch pot of bone meal, a five inch pot of dried blood and a regular water pail full of white sand. After mixing all of these ingredients, in a dry condition, run them through a fine screen. Let this soil lay in the open in the shade of a tree or at the north end of a building to ferment for at leasi three months before using. Do not add anything else as this is the best mixture for proper results. Do not use powdered sheep manure, chicken manure, or fish meal, for these ingredients act as poison to Petunias. When transplanting, the young plants should be planted so that just the root part reaches into the soil. If poor soil is used plants will be spindly, flowers small and colors bleached out. This has been the cause with many complaints in regard to the Petunias not being large. You cannot raise good plants in poor soil in three inch pots. Many mistakes are made in that the seedlings are set too deep. It is very essential to be careful in transplanting so that only the roots are under the ground as when planted too deep they take much longer to start growth and many will damp off.
My Petunias should not be pinched back when young as they are naturally stocky and of dwarf growth which I have accomplished by years of careful selection in that direction.
I receive thousands of questions from my customers every season in regard to growing and cultivating Petunias best, and as my time is continually taken up in my work I have tried to cover the most important of them in this article. ## Amaryllis Seeds

Amaryllis seeds should be sown in boxes or seed pans (in greenhouse or hot bed) containing finely sifted sandy leaf mould to a thickness of three inches. Smooth out surface of soil evenly and sprinkle thoroughly. Spread seeds closely together (so close that they touch one another) and cover with the same soil, just sufficient to hold down. Keep moist, but not too wet. If air is too dry cover with glass. In case of very hot sun, cover the glass with a sheet of paper in order to prevent the heat from burning the young plants. Plants will come up in about three weeks and should remain in the same box for two or three month. Replant in three inch pots or in boxes about two inches apart. Seedlings, when given the proper care, will commence to flower fifteen months after sowing. Seeds may be sown at any time of the year in a greenhouse.

About ten years ago I started to cross it with my own Hybrids obtaining some wonderful new colors in copper, coral, salmon and orange. These I crossed again, this time for distinct colors and larger size. The ones I offer now are from the second generation and some even are from the third. ## Statice Sinuata (Everlasting)

This is one of the best cut flowers for florists as well as the private gardens. Is easily and quickly raised and flowers continually. The more you cut of the flowers, the more it will flower.
By years of selection and crossing I have produced some beautiful clean colors in all shades of the rainbow and having large flowers on stems measuring from two to three feet.
Statice is to be cut when the flower is just at its best. Put up in bunches containing from one to two dozen stems to each bunch and hang them up in a dark room where they will keep for months. These are used during the winter months when flowers are scarce.
Directions for sowing: Sow the seeds in cold frames or boxes. Smooth the surface of the soil and sprinkle the seeds over it just as they are. Do not separate the seeds. Then press them into the soil with a smooth board. Cover them very lightly and keep them moist. If the atmosphere is very dry it is best to cover seeds with burlap and moisten the burlap three or four times each day. The seeds will be up in eight to ten days. Leave them in the full light as soon as the plants appear. Transplant two feet apart as soon as the seedlings have four or five leaves.

## Directions For Sowing Dahlia Seeds

Sandy leafmould or any good garden soil should be used. Use a box or pan to sow the seeds into. Fill the receptacle 3 inches with soil. Smooth the surface over with a smooth board, then sprinkle seed over the soil and press into the ground. The seeds should be very lightly covered with the soil, in fact, it should be shaken over the seeds with a fine sieve. Put the seeds in a warm, moist place and see that the soil is not permitted to become dry.
Glass may be put over the flats to preserve the moisture. In this case, if the sun shines on them, they should be protected by a single sheet of paper over the glass. Otherwise, too great a heat will develop between glass and soil. Remove the paper at night and in dark weather.
It will be three months before all the seeds are up, which is natural with Dahlias. Some seeds come up in four days, while others take months. When they are up, take them out of the seed box inside of three days. To do this without interfering with the other seeds, use a sharp-pointed stick and drive it down into the soil next to each seedling and lift same up. Put each plant into a 3 inch pot. In the pots they can be kept back for $2-3$ months or until ready to go into the open. Plant in the full sun and stake early.

## Tomatoes

For many years I have been working on tomatoes, crossing all kinds together to derive a large size tomato of an exquisite flavor. I raised hundreds of large sized varieties but their fruit was too imperfect having heavy cores and being rather crippled.
In 1916 I first got what I had in mind, a good, large tomato from a cross of San Jose Canner and Trophy which is the Diener tomato now and which is now raised, mostly on the coast for canning, on thousands of acres, as it has proved the most satisfactory tomato for canning and for katsup. One corporation raises over 6000 acres of the Diener tomato.
The Ventura tomato is a smaller tomato of regular market size weighing from four to eight ounces. It is immensely free bearing, has very solid, perfectly formed fruit and a very fine flavor. It is the best Fungi resisting tomato yet produced.
Most of the trouble with tomatoes on the coast is not disease but too much sunlight. I have always believed that a tomato wants all the sun it can get but that is not so as I found out by an experiment. I planted a patch of tomatoes, half under lath house shading and the other half extending into the full sun, both halves joining each other. The same variety, same seeds, soil, etc. were used. Those in the full sun died completely after the first crop was picked in August while those under lath shading kept healthy and bearing fruit until February, six months longer than those in the full sun. The variety that I used for this trial was the Ventura tomato so if you have trouble in raising tomatoes in your locality, try shading them. Cheesecloth will do for shading if you have just a small garden. Raise a few tomatoes in small lots. It is best to train them up on eight foot high, 2 inch stakes. Train just one shoot, cut all side shoots away and tie the main shoot with strong twine. Set the stake at least $21 / 2$ to 3 feet in the ground so it will not fall over in heavy rains and wind. Place the stakes about three feet apart. Enrich the soil by fertilizing. Water once a week but never over the leaves. Keep the leaves and flowers dry as otherwise the flowers would drop off. By this method you will be able to raise a quantity of fruit of the finest quality. You will be surprised at what an amount of this healthy delicious fruit you will eat. Do not eat the skin. You can easily remove same by dropping the ripe fruit into boiling water for just a few seconds and then dropping them into cold water. A little salt and mayonnaise and "Oh boy, what a feast." The pepper tomato has a more spicy flavor and many of my customers prefer this variety.
